Shoots Engineer Dead at His Post - Plunders the Mail Car.

Blows Open the Express Safe and Secures a Large Amount of Booty-Hot on His Trail.

Missoula, Mont., Oct. 24-An eastbound passenger train on the Northern Pacific was held up last night near Drommond, Mont., 45 miles from this city, and Engineer Dan. O'Neil was killed

The train, which included mail, baggage and express cars and nine coaches, arrived at Missoula at 10.20 p.m., and proceeded eastward after a short delay at this station. It arrived after midnight at a place two miles west of Drummond. There the train was signailed to stop and the engineer slowed up. While doing so, he saw a man creeping toward him over the tender. The man, who was armed, called to O'Neil to stop the train instantly. The engineer took in the situation at once, and pulling open the throttle, tried to start the train a full speed. The robber divined his purpose and fired at him. The shot took effect and the engineer fell dead at his

The robber then proceeded to rifle the express and mail cars. He plundered the mail and blew open the safe in the express car, which was wrecked. The amount of plunder which he secured is not known at present, but it is supposed to be large.

The excitement on the train was in-

ense. Word of the attack was sent to Drummond, where it was tele-graphed to Deer Lodge, about fifty out at once and a search for the robber began. It was thought at first that eight men were engaged in the hold-up, but latest advices are that one man perpetrated the murder and

SOUTH OXFORD.

Prof, Goldwin Smith, in The Week ly Sun, discusses the political situation in Ontario, with special reference to the South Oxford scandal, he says:

It was pretty certain that the Ontario government, rather than meet the Legislature at once, would choose to fight out the battle for office in the election courts and such bye-elections as mught ensue. It was not less certain that if they did take that course the election courts and the byeelections, if any followed, would become the scene of a desperate struggle such as would call all the machinery of intrigue and corruption into play. This anticipation has been signally fulfilled by the incidents of the trial in South Oxford, the riding on the recovery of which the hopes of the government were specially founded. It is in evidence that a large sum had been expended in the purchase of evidence against the sitting member. The head of the party in power has been praised for the fighting spirit which he has displayed. Were it a matter of fisticuffs valor would deserve its meed. Unfortunately the "fight" is to be carried on with weapons the employmen of which is degrading to the community and unterly subversive of the integrity of elective government.

WHAT McGILLICUDDY SAYS.

The Goderich Signal says: 'Some of the more foolish of the Liberal newspapers are chuckling with ghoulish glee over the retirement of Hon. J. I. Tarte from the cabinet, and would give the impression that Mr. Tarte was dismissed by the premier.

"These papers simply pervert the facts, wilfully or ignorantly, and in either case are not reliable guides to their readers. There are always vultures who delight to settle down upon the carcass of a lion, but they usually make sure that the lion is dead before they settle down. In the present case our gleeful contemporaries are a little "too previous." It is quite true that Hon. J. I. Tarte has resigned from the cabinet, and the premier has accepted his resignation, but it is not true that Mr. Tarte is dead, politically; neither is he sleeping; nor has he left the Liberal party-as some of the minor politicians and short-sighted newspapers would have the people of Ontario believe, and as our Tory friends fondly hope and pray for.

Hon. Mr. Tarte has carried out his original intention by submitting his resignation to the premier at the first opportunity after the arrival of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in this country from Europe, whither he had been for some months past. Sir Wilfrid has not had a great deal of time to acquaint himself with the question at issue, but has deemed it proper to accept the resignation of the minister of public works. There is no personal feeling involved in the resignation or its acceptance. There is no room for ghoulish glee on the part of Liberals who are opposed to Mr. Tarte's views, and there is no reason why the Tories should rejoice that they have succeeded in capturing their strongest opponent.

"Hon. J. I. Tarte is, first of all, a newspaper man who believes in a progressive policy for Canada. After that he is a statesman who has endeavored to do more for the development of this country than was ever attempted by any of his predecessors in office. He is in favor of trade and tariff reform suitable to the times and conditions. If he cannot have a free hand as a statesman, owing to the holding back of the tail-enders amongst his colleagues, then he must needs grapple with the great questions through his power as a newspaper editor. And that's what he will do.



EXILED POTENTATES

ONCE POWERFUL DUSKY MONARCHS BANISHED TO AN ISLAND.

ing Mwanga and King Kabba Rega Sent Into Exile by the British-Mwanga Made One of the Bloodiest of Records That Any Native Prince of Africa Ever

Achieved-Kubba Rega's History. The British have sent into exile two of the most distinguished expotentates of Central Africa. . King Mwanga and King Kabba Rega are now sojourning on one of the Seychelles Islands in the Indian Ocean about 1,000 miles east of Zanzibar These islands are thus to be famous as the home of two African lings as well as the region that raises the sea cocoanut, a fruit of great swim-ming qualities. When the sea cocoanut drops into the ocean, as it often does, it is likely to drift clear to India, Java and the other Malayan Islands, where it is esteemed as a treasure. The people there imagine that the fruit grows on the bottom of the ocean and comes to their islands for their special regalement. Mwanga's family circle in his new home is comparatively small. While he was King of Uganda, on the northern and western shores of Victoria Nyanza, his establishment contained about 1,000 wives, quite a moderate number, considering that his royal father's harem included over 7,000 women. King Mwanga is of ancient lineage, being able to boast a longer ancestry than many a distinguished person in civilized countries is able to trace. Though a savage in all that the word implies, he can climb his ancestral tree through a line of twenty kings of Uganda, back to the time of Queen Elizabeth. Before his country came into the possession of the British he had an army of 25,000 men, over 2,000 muskets and plenty of ammunition which he obtained from the Zanzibar traders. He has reached

throne when he was about 20 years This barbarian made one of the bloodiest records that any native African prince ever achieved. His father permitted many missionaries, Protestant and Catholic, to settle in Uganda. They were very successful in their missionary work, and thousands of converts were made; but when Mwanga came to the throne he decided that the superstitious beliefs of his ancestors were good enough for the people of Uganda, and he set about the large undertaking of wiping out all the Christians in the It was he who murdered Bishop Hannington, who was approaching Uganda from the Indian Ocean, little suspecting that there could be any hostile intent on the The Bishop part of the new ruler. was shot, and the fifty helpless porters with him were speared to death Then Mwanga set about the work of killing all the native Christians and destroying all the work the missionaries had done in six years.

Most of the King's atrocities were

the age of 35 years, and came to the

crowded into the first six months of 1886. The annals of martyrdom show no finer examples of heroic fortitude and unshaken faith than these Uganda massacres present. native Christians were shockingly mutilated, tied to trees and burned alive with fuel piled high around them. The victims numbered about 2,000, and it is not known that a single one abjured his now faith to save his life. Several thousands more would undoubtedly have been slain if British forces had not arrived on the scene in time to stop the further effusion of blood. The courageous death of these hundreds of people proved that the Waganda are superior African tribe, and that in

them may be developed the best and sternest moral qualities. The executioners who carried out the cruel will of the King said later that they were amazed at the calm demeanor of their victims. While dying they sang sacred songs and prayed for their murderers. The head executioner went to the King and told him he had never seen men die so bravely. He said they endured pain without a murmur, and prayed to God in the fire. The King and the chiefs around him laughed heartily when told of the dying prayers of the victims. The young monarch remarked that God did not seem able to the Christians from his rescue

power. The blood of the martyrs has deed been the seed of the church in Uganda. In no part of Africa have such wonders been wrought through missionary effort. There are now 90,000 professing Christians in that There are now country. There are over 300 churches one of which will seat an audience of 2,000 persons. Over 50,000 of the natives can read, and most of the Bible has been translated into their

language. In spite of the atrocities Mwangs had committed it was decided to retain him on the throne if he showed himself amenable to white influences. He still retained large influence over a great number of his people. His actions, however, demonstrated only stupidity and duplicity. He turned Protestant, Catholic and Mohammedan by turns. British has been removed from his country forever. King Kabba Rega never pretended to submit to the British. He was king of the large country of Unyoro, north of Uganda. He never made treaty with the British, and declared that he would fight them to the lest. The British claimed his country because it was a part of the Egyptian the whole of which is now in the British sphere of influence. Several hard campaigns were fought against Kabba Rega before his power was broken. At last he went into hiding, and the British chased him for over a year from one swamq to another until he was finally cap-

CULTIVATE IT TO THE EXTREME LIMIT OF YOUR ABILITY.

It Is the Noblest, Most Manly and at the Same Time Most Womanly of Qualities-The Real Busis of Eduention and Success.

Teachers and parents are asked to consider the statement that a sense of duty is the foundation of real education and the basis of success. Whatever has been achieved of real importance in the world has been based upon a sense of duty. Religion itself is founded upon duty, and its main teachings deal with questions of duty-the duty of men and women toward each other and toward their Creator. Children's minds will be strength

ened, their work made easier and their ambition stimulated if they can be made to feel toward duty that it is not repulsive, but that it offers an opportunity for achievement, an opportunity for every individual to prove his worth and that he deserves to succeed. If duty can be strongly developed in the mind of a young child, the effect will remain through life and make that child's existence useful.

Parents should impress upon their children-and young people should impress upon themselves-the fact that a sense of duty is the noblest, most manly and at the same time most womanly of qualities.

The average small boy thinks that there is something "soft" about a dutiful boy. He should be taught that what made Washington a fighter and Lincoln great among his fellows was nothing else than a sense of duty to their country.

What makes a fireman brave is sense of duty. A sense of duty is at the foundation of every effort made to provide for children, to meet the obligations of life honestly. The German philosopher Fichte, as

admirable a moral character as the world has known, exemplifies as perfectly as any the beauty of a life insati, whom Emin Pasha sent as his spired by a sense of duty, and it is a life which may be well studied by those engaged in shaping the character of the young.

The very keynote of his philosophical system was based on duty. "Unsere Welt ist das versinnlichte Material unserer Pflicht," said he.

This idea-that our world is but the material, incarnation of our duty-he taught, and, what is more, he practiced what he preached. One preacher who practices his

preachings thoroughly is worth many of the other kind, no matter how elo And Fichte prac ticed his beliefs. When he was poor and a young tutor, he set a good example to every teacher. As a tutor he made his living, but he knew that his duty to the child intrusted to him was the principal thing. He knew also that every child is really formed in character and morals by the influence of its parents.

Fichte kept a journal devoted to the attitude of his employers toward their child-his pupil. Every week he told them the mistakes they had made and held them accountable for spoiling to child through flattery, too much kind ness, ill judged severity or in what

ever way. Strange to say, the parents actually put up with this for two whole years, so great was their admiration for the young tutor's moral character.

Duty well ingrained in the soul will keep a man on the right path in easy times and in hard times. Fichte is quoted here because no man better than he proves the power of a sense of duty. In small things duty guided him, and it guided him at the end.

He was just past the half century of his age and had been gloriously successful. He had been called to the chair of philosophy at Berlin, and no teacher of truth had ever been more loved or more admired. On a certain day he was to lecture, and he had chosen "Duty" for his subject. His country was at war and threatened with invasion and absolute annihilation of her liberties.

Fichte, who had talked much of the little duties of life, talked on this day of man's duty to his country. The sound of drums calling for conscripts frequently interrupted his lecture. He told the listening young man that each man's duty is to lend his individual strength and life to his country in time of danger. It was a marvelous address, and it ended well.

For at the close he said to his great crowd of admiring students: "This course of lectures will be suspended until the end of the campaign. We shall resume them in a free country or die in the attempt to recover her free-

Fichte left his lecture platform to enlist as a simple soldier, and, needless to say, his students followed his example in crowds. That was at the beginning of the campaign of 1813, but the example is good enough to last until now and for many hundred years to come. A year later, aged fifty-two, he died. He caught the fever while caring for those afflicted, among others for his own wife, who had gone with

the army as nurse. Make duty a strong part of your child's or your pupil's moral education. A sense of duty impels men to struggle on and do their best even in the face of failure; a sense of duty impels the successful man to make good use of his success. The hideous, empty, selfish lives of the self indulgent class are based upon utter lack of the sense of duty. In the education of a child moral teachings should come first; in a child's mental equipment moral qualities should be first considered. By example, precept, argument and through history impress upon your children the fact that without a sense of duty they are unworthy of the op-portunities that life offers to men in



AS A GOLD DIGGER. When the Lata Premier of Great Britain

Was in Australia. Lord Salisbury's retirement has once more raised the interesting question whether he did actually dig old when he was in Australia 1852. Now that he has more leisure he may satisfy curiosity by some-

thing of an autobiography. His latest biographer, F. D. How, gives the ost complete account of Lord Salisbury's Australian experiences that has so far appeared in print. According to Mr. How, who apparently gathered his information at Hatfield, roung Lord Robert Cecil was a memper of a party that pegged out a claim on the Mount Alexander gold field, which was 23 miles on the Melbourne side of Bendigo, and is now the town of Castlemaine. Mr. How cites the statement of a living mi who remembers seeing Lord Robert Cecil working the claim, and the kindness of the future Prime Minister to a sick digger in a neighboring tent is also mentioned. But Lord Robert was not among the lucky ones at Mount Alexander, where fabulous fortunes were made by a few, and he afterward proceeded to Bendigo, where his interest in auriferous operations was more scientific than personal. There is a speech of Lord Salisbury's in which he made incidental and humorous reference to a time when circumstances constrained him to become his own cook and laundress .-

London Chronicle. A Big Scheme.

Engineering gives some details of the most important of all the electrical power-distribution undertakings in England-that of the Yorkshire Electric Power Company. The area of the district is 1,800 square miles, and contains a population of close upon 2,000,000. There are within the area 158 local authorities with a population varying from 400 to 400,000, and it is the policy of the promoters to confine operations to the supply in bulk to local authorities and other large consumers. The extent of business which awaits the development of the company may be gauged from the fact that there is 2,000,000 horse-power in use in this area; 20 local authorities have works in operation or in process of construction: 16 local authorities have provisional orders, but have not yet executed them; 12 local authorities have applied for power; 110 miles of tramways have been authorized, and have been sought for thirty more miles of tramways. A reference to the map in Engineering shows that it is proposed to serve this district from four power stations, located at Thornhill, near Dewsbury, Methley, Wath, and Bingley. It has been thought advisable to locate the instalment of plant at Thorn-The first instalment of plant amount to 10,000 kilowatts, will and two 2,50 2,500 kilowatts, after which the extensions will be carried out in units of 5,000 kilowatts. The district will be first served from sixteen sub-stations. It has been arranged, adds Engineering, that a considerable area can be supplied direct from the sub-stations without transformation. The pressure of transmission is 10,000 volts, and all the sub-stations are interconnected on the high-tension side, or else served by a duplicate set of mains.

Washington Irving has aptly been called the father of American literature, but among all the writings of the wi ard of Sunnyside there is not a chapter more trenchantly powerful than that on "The Art of Bookmaking." In it the author pictures himself asleep and dreaming in the library of the British museum. His head is pillowed upon a pile of musty tomes. While he dreams he sees the different authors of the present day pouring over the manuscripts of the ancient libraries and making ample notes and verbatim cories of the same and, inde.d. going so far as to cut en ire leaves from the books of a Beaumont, a Fletcher, a Pollock and a Ben Jonson. Then the dreamer sees these modern authors pasting together the ser atim excerpts and the stolen leaves into new volumes and printing their own names upon the 'title pages. These literary piracies continue until at last the cry of "Thieves! Thieves!" is raised. Then there is a great hubbub and scurrying among the modern authors be-cause the ancient writers, whose faces and bodies are pictured within the quaint old fashioned frames hanging upon the walls of the British museum are changed into flesh and blood, ready to snatch the new books out of the hands of the kidnappers, and to claim them as the offsprings of their own brain, some of them born centuries upon centur-

ies ago. The obvious moral of the imaginative tale is that there is nothing new under the sun. No man, woman or child, no matter how intelligent, can ever lay claim to true originality. We are all, I hysically and menttions of other lives. We are all combinations of other people's thoughts and desires and actions; even as the walls of an ancient palace are often huge mosaics of many different stones cut from many different quarrics. While many have contributed to make us what we are, the largest

contribution is the maternal one. How much of all that is good and pure in our nature do we owe to our mothers! How much of all the peace and comfort we have enjoyed do we owe to their wise and loving minis-It is this fact which we all recognize, that the prophet uses to impress on us the love and kindness of God. No simile could he have used so effective as that in my text, "As one whom his mother comforteth.'

The words of my text have for many of us a very tender and reverent application. The greatest lessons of a sacrificing and a forgiving lo e have teen learned by most of us from the now silent lips of our Christian mothers. Though your mother may have been dead for ten or twenty yearsi yet you remember as though it were yesterday how tenderly she cared for you when you were a little child. You remember how she nursed you through that long at of sickness when you were about fifteen, and every time she left the room you would call: "Mother, mother! Where is mother?" And, alas, you will remember the dark day when you carried her out to gently let her body down into the open grave, when you laid her away to sleep among the spring flowers or when you covered her up under the soft quilt of spotless snow, the purest, gentlest, noblest, most forgiving and helpful of human companions was forever taken from your side. Remembering all this love and devotion we realize the force of the metaphor which Isaiah, the prophet, uses when, seeking to show how tenderly God loves and cares for his children, he takes the gentle, maternal influence which has done so much to develop our physical and mental and spiritual life and says, "As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I com-

Loyal Young Graham is that boy. May his mother in heaven, who gave her life for her child, be witness of this holy scene.

Sinful man sitting before me today, are you the son of a Christian mother? Whether she is alive now or ad her love for you was or is jus as great as Loyal Young Graham's mother was for him. KITCHEN HELPS.

Kettles should never be allowed to boil dry and ther be filled with cold water, thus cracking the enamel. To remove fruit stains from knives cut a raw potato in two parts and run each knife repeatedly between the

When washing greasy dishes, if little soda is placed in the water it will assist materially in cleaning the chi-

To clean japanned trays rub with cloth on which a few drops of oil have been sprinkled and then polish with a soft, clean plece of flannel. To prevent your steel knives from

rusting dip them after washing into a solution of thin paste of baking soda and water, then wipe clean and ry. Cut glass should have the greatest care in handling. A wooden tub should be used for washing, and the water in which it is cleaned should never be too warm for the hands.

When polishing knives, it is a good plan to preface the work by holding the board to the fire for a few minutes, for knives will polish better and quicker on a warm than on a cold board.





A Contrivance For Keeping Pens and Pencils From Disappearing. This is a povel idea for use on a writing table which is common property for the whole family and from where pens and pencils have a habit of disappearing.

It is intended to represent the old village stocks and is made of very thin wool stained brown or even of painted cardboard. If you want to be very realistic, gum some lichen or moss on



to the side pieces. If you make the stocks of cardboard, you must have

the side pieces at least of wood. Into the top of the highest side piece which must hang four lengths of thin chain, and a tiny padlock must likewise have a place. The chains are atpicture rings which are screwed into the tops of four pencils or pens, which are put through the four holes drilled in the front of the stocks.

The chains must be long enough to permit writing comfortably, and the whole front is glued on to a wooden stand on which at each end are fastened two fairly large lead dress weights to give it firmness.

This scheme will do away with any possibility of pencils or pens being 'lost, stolen or strayed."






