St. Petersburg, May 30.—The St. Petersburg May 30.—The St. Petersburg telegraph agency has received the following from Shanghai:

"News has been received here that seven Japanese ships, two of which were armored, and four Russian ships have been sunk.
"It is confidently believed here that the Japanese are awaiting the publication of Admiral Rojestvensky's official despatches from Vladivostock before admirting the extent of their own losses."

Where Is Russ Admiral? Tokie, May 80.—The personal fate of Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky is not known. There is some belief that he possibly perished.

TOGO WAS TOLD BY WIRELESS.

Coubled Sound Islands and Pourse Terrible Fire Into Russians.

London, May 30.—According to the correspondent of The Dally Mall at Socul, Corea, early on Saturday morning. Vice-Admiral Togo, with practically all the powerful fighting ships of the Japaness navy, was at Masampho, Corea, when wireless signals from his scouts, between the Tsu and Quelpart Islands, announced the approach of the Russian fleet is full force.

A few hours later the scouts reported that the Russians were not ascending the western channel.

Admiral Togo immediately started at full speed around the north of the Tsu Islands, and when he doubled the islands he saw the Russians coming in two columns. He then brought a terrific fire to bear on the flank of the port column, and as the Russians fell into disorder he forced them steadily eastward towards the Japanese coast, where they were attacked by every vessel that flew the Japanese fag.

Repeated torpedo attacks were delivered, some of them with the great-set success.

TOGO'S BATTLE REPORTS.

Tell the Tale of His Effective Nava Work in Corean Straits Sat-urday and Sunday,

Washington, May 30.—The following official report from Tokio was received at the Japanese legation yesterday:

Immediately upon the receipt of the report that the Russian squadron was in sight, our combined squadron started for attack. Weather is fine to-day, but heavy seas.

Second report received night of May 27:—

Combined squadron attacked the Russian squadron to-day near Skinoshims (southeast of Tsushims) and deteated it, sinking at least four ships and inflicting heavy damage upon others. Damage to our ships is insignicant. Our destroyers and torpedo flotillas delivered attack after sunset. Third report received Monday, May 29:—

Main force of our combined squad-ron continued pursuit since the 27th, and attacked 23th, near Liancourt Rocks (northeast of Okinoshims) a squadron of ships, consisting of Nich-olas I. (battleship) Orel (battleship) Senyavin, Aprexin and Isumrud. Iz-umrud fled, while the remaining four vessely surrendered.

His Death Leaves Only Four of the Fathers of Confederation,

Aged Statesman Passes Away at Ottawa After An Ilinese of Eight Years -Was a Lawyer and a Journalist Son of a United Empire Loyalist -Entered Politics In 1858 As a Reformer-Sketch of His Career.

Ottawa, May 30.-Hon. W. M. Macdougall, one of the fathers of Confederation, died yesterday. He was 83 years of age and had been confined to his room for the past eight years. Sir James Grant states that death was due to general debility. The death of Mr. Macdougall leaves only four of the makers of the Confederation compact calive. They are Sir William P. Howland, Sir Hector Langevin, Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. A. McDonald. About twelve years ago Mr. Macdougall fell and broke a leg, and he was never able to be around very much since that time. The last political contest he as engaged in was in South Grenville, when he ran in the Liberal interest, and was defeated by the late Walter Shanly. Mr. Macdougall was always recognized as one of the ablest men in the Dominion. He leaves a widow and family.

Hon. William Macdougall was descended from John Macdougall a native of the Highlands of Scotland and a U. E. Loyalist, who served during the revolutionary war. He was the son of the late Daniel Macdougall, of York, now Toronto, and was born there. He received his education at Victoria College, Cobours, and he studied in the law office of Hon. J. H. Price. In 1847 he was admitted as an attorney and solicitor, and in 1862 he was called to the bar, being created a Q. C. in 1821 by the Marquis of Lorne.

Mr. Macdougall contributed to news Mr. Macdougall contributed to newspapers during his student days, and after his admission as attorney, he established the Canadian Farmer, which was changed later to the Canadian Agriculturist, which he published till 1858. In 1850 he established the North American, a semi-weekly newspaper of radical proclivities. In 1857 the publication was discontinued, being merged into The Toronto Globs, and Mr. Macdougall joined the editorial staff.

In 1858 he was returned to Parliament, after three unsuccessful attempts, for North Oxford, as a Reformer. He sat for that constituency, till 1863, and from that date until 1882 was the representative successive of the former. ald-Sloetic administration, May, 1862, fill March, 1864. He was one of the Reformers in Hon George Brown's Cabinet being Provincial Secretary. He was an active promoter of the Union, and attended the Union Conference at Charlottetown, 1864, and in Quebec, 1864. In 1868-67 he was present at the Colonial conference in London, England. He was the first Lieutenant Governor or Rupert's Land and the Governor of Rupert's Land and the N. W. T. He has also published sev-

Mr. Macdougali was married twice. His first wife was Amelia Caroline, daughter of Joseph Easton, Milibank, Ont., who died in 1869. His second wife was Mary Adelaide, daughter of John Beatty, M. D., of Cobourg, Ont.

Bishop Macdonell Dead. Alexandria, May 30.—Bishop Macdonell of Alexandria, who was being treated for a serious Illness in the Hotel Dieu, Montreal, died yesterday morning at 8 o'clock.

man Catholic Bishop of Alexandris, was born in the Township of Lochiel, Glengarry, Ont., November 1, 1833. He was educated at the local schools, and for three years taught therein. He subsequently took a full theological course at St. Joseph's College, Ottawa, and was ordained to the priesthood in 1862. In September, 1866, he was appointed vicar-general of the Diocese of Kingston, and on July 18, 1890, was raised to the episcopate as the first bishop of the newly created Diocese of Catholic Bishop of Alexandria bishop of the newly created Diocese of Alexandria. The late bishop spoke Gaelic as fluently as he spoke English

THE RUSSIANS HAVE HEARD FROM TOGO.

Admiral Togo has conquered his enemy, points out the Detroit News, 'Admiral Rojestvensky has discovere that it is one thing to run amuck through a trawling fleet and a very different thing to encounter an emy of superior fighting ability. Popular enthusiasm is stirred by the sweeping victory in Korea Straits. Japan will have no end of friends but conservative people will let the thought of the awful sacrifice temper their enthusiasm somewhat. A brave admiral was ordered to take several thousand seamen and many millions of dollars worth of nava equipment half way around the globe to probable execution. The dallying displayed by Russia invited defeat. When the formidable nature of her enemy was discovered, Russia still trifled, sending out a detachment that could have been met and smashed anywhere by Japan. The mikado, confident of the quality of his ships. his men and his commanders, waited calmly for Russia to mass all the mayal strength she would dare to send against him. Then Togo struck the fateful blow, Full details are not yet at hand.

The story still will be coming weeks hence, for the details of a great mayal engagement are slow to gather and analyze. Where there are between 500 and 1,000 men in charge of a great machine like a battleships, each ship has a story of battle all its own. The general result is sufficient for the present. Russian naval power in the Pacific is a thing

It is doubtful, under the circumstances, if Russia will be able to challenge Japan again during the life of this generation. Japan may now be said to have her fleet firmly planted in Manchuria, for she can subsist her army without hindrance on the sea. She can utilize her fleet, which will no longer be needed for home protection and for guarding transports across the Straits, to invest Vladivostok, to challenge possession of Saghalien, and to blockade the sea approaches of Siberia, Rusmia must rebuild her navy. She must depend entirely upon the Siberian railway for transporting troops and subsistence to Manchuria. Having cut off approach from the Pacific, Japan will naturally undertake a campaign for isolating the Russian army, with intent to compel either its withdrawal or a surrender. Russia must look to her line of communications towards the west. She must watch for a cutting out movement for the isolation of Vladivos tok, and she must be on the defensive against a general attack.

Admiral Togo stands before the sworld as the winner of its greatest naval battle. Other commanders have had more ships to confront, but nobody has yet encountered such a weight of broadside or such massive defensive equipment. The Russian battleships were formidable affairs, and they were well supported by pruisers, auxiliaries and torpedo craft. For months they have all been manoeuvering and practicing for this very event. Nobody can question the courage and devotion of the Rassians any more than they can question the quality of the Japs, but it is a horrible thing to contemplate that after all these centuries of civ-Ilization; after 2,000 years of christianity, two highly enlightened nations cannot submit their disputes to an impartial tribunal of justice, but must rend each other like wild beasts contending for a bit of territorial privilege.

Ten ships of steel, with their enginment of men, sent to the bottom of the sea in a few hours; four more captured, and the rest of the demoralized members of the fleet fleeing from pursuit, is a disaster only exceeded by some of the supreme catacvisms of nature, like the destruction of St. Pierre or Lisbon. In such a conflict the loss of life is excessive because there is no time for measures of humanity until the victory is won. A riddled mass of steel filled with 700 men who are exhausted with work, beside themselves with excitement and half of them wounded, has but a poor show for succor

A rather surprising and interesting matter was disclosed in reference to the Murray street pavement. This, it was claimed, was equivalent to a bribe and would disqualify the signatures thus obtained. It was also claimed that a promotor of the company offered residents on the street bonuses of \$10 to \$20 each, and some a premium of two cents for every yard of their frontage if they would sign the petition for a bitulithic pavement.

A letter was enclosed, evidently written by a promotor, and signed by him, to one resident, Mr. Brown, in which Mr. Brown was offered a bonus of \$10 and all the dirt he wanted, if he would sign the petition.



WILD TIME AT LICENSE BOARD

Five Commissioners Reported for Duty at this Afternoon's West Kent Session

Mr. Baxter, said he had received no notice of his resignation from Mr. Hanna and would take no notice from anyone else. He was going to continue business. He had engaged J. B. O'Flynn to represent him.

Mr. O'Flynn said at 10.10 'This morning Mr. McKibbon had telegraphed the Minister withdrawing. his resignation. a resignation.

Mr. O'Flynn read the response as

follows:
"Your leregram withdrawing resignation accepted by the Minister immediately it was received, and your successor has been appointed, "E. SAUNDERS."

"Mr. Martin, you're all right," faunted Mr. Baxter, "Just because you favored Irish Jack. We'll go on with business."

"I must refuse to take any part in the work," said Mr. Martin, "if there is to be a going on after these despatches. I feel that the intention of the Government is clear."

Chairman Baxter then asked all except the old members of the Board to withdraw.

JAPAN AGAINST GANADA

Why its Statesmen Discriminate Against Our Goods.

Hon. Mr. Fielding, In the House ons, Saye Our Freedom of Action In Labor Matters Was Jespardized by Existing Imperial Treaty— Col. Sam Hughes Gives An Inkling

Cel. Sam Hughes Gives An inking into More Grafting.

Ottawa, May 30.—In the House yesterday, Col. Sam Hughes said the Government had expropriated a square mile of property in Kings County, N.S., for a camp ground. The property, he said, consisted largely of sand, and was not of much value for anything else than a camp ground. Three Liberals acted as arbitrators, and they decided the land to be worth from 350 to 370 per acre, although the best of it had been bought just previously at from 36 to 430 per acre, and much of it for 32 an acre and even less. The total price charged to the Government was about \$23,600.

Sir Frederick Borden replied that the matter was to-day in the exchequer court, as a result of the Department of Militia having taken possession of the land for a training ground for the militia of Nova Scotla. The Department thought it would be preferable in this case to have the proper price determined by the courts. The case was now before Judge Burbidge himself. He promised all the papers.

Japan Not So Friendly.

Mr. Barker of Hamilton cotton Co. It set forth that there was a good market in Japan for Canadian duck, but he was unable to ship any because, as he learned, there was a discriminatory duty in Japan of 5 per cent, against Canadian cottons as compared with British and United States goods. The agent thereupon offered a reduction in price of 5 per cent, to meet this discrimination, but although Japanese merchants favored Canadian duck and were anxious to buy it, they were prevented by prejudice on the part of Japaneses efficials against Canadian-imade goods, owing to a feeling that they had been discriminated against by Canada in the past, and that Canada had declined to make the same concessions to Japan as Great Britain and the United States had made.

Mr. Fielding said that Canada refused to be beund by an imperial treaty with Japan, which we had had an opportunity of Joining, but the Government felt that if they assented to it Canada's freedom of soilon would be compromised in other direc

inter freedom.

Mr. Foster wanted to know, why we would have been compromised. Mr. Fistens replied that the others in volved a favored-nation arrangement, and its acceptance would have affected our freedom of action in labor matters. He promised to bring down the correspondence to Parliement.



He had to sit chained with four or six others to the rowing benches, which were set at right angles to the side of the ship, without change of posture by day, and compelled to sleep, still chained, under the benches by night, exposed to the elements by day and night allike, leneduring the lash of the overseer, who paced up and down the sangway which ran between the two lines of benches; wearing the coarse canvas shirt and serge jacket of the rower; feeding on the insufficient meals of coarse biscuit and porridge of eil and beans, chained along with the vilest malefactors." 

CANADA'S NEW-OBSERVATORY. What An Observent Pressman Saw

What An Observant Pressman Saw During Recent Visit.

Of what pessible use can it be to the farmers of Canada to have a few scientists in Ottawa gasing through telescopes at the stars, and why should Canada ge to the expense of a fine new observatory in order to house these star-gazers better? These were doubtless some of the thoughts in the minds of a party of newspapermen who on Saturday evening. April 29, accepted an invitation of Chief Astronomier King and his assistants, Dr. Klotz and Mr. Plaskett, to visit the new observatory into which they have just moved in the past few days. The new building which is of Nepsan stone like the Parliament Buildings, is situated on the Experimental Parm, about three miles from the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa. It was built at this point to secture a clay foundation and to avoid the vibration which prevails wherever there is a rock foundation. The building is fitted with all the apparatus for observators. fitted with all the apparatus for observ ing and calculating the motions of the heavenly bodies, the chief glory, of

course, being the new fifteen-inch tele

heavenly bedies, the chief giory, of course, being the new fifteen-inch telescope.

New, as to the practical work of this great institution, which has already made a record which is worldwide. In the first place, the institution gives fixed points for the surveyers who go out to determine the boundaries of Provinces, and the international boundary itself. Next, the Department fixes the location of islands and capes, by which the Maries Department makes litter charts, and every new island, roof and shoal sharted reduces the cost of marine insurance, which in turn reduces, the cost of transportation. Lastly, the astronemers hope to be able by the study of the sun, the centre of our solar system, is elevate meteorology to an exact series. What this would mean to the world averyons can see who know what great service the present seator-ological system is performing. There are many other things of the meet vital importance, connected with the keeping of a standard time and the measuring and weighing of the action. measuring and weighing of the earth which this observatory is doing, no which this observatory is doing, not only as a part of the world-system of observatories, but for Canada itself, a country so vast that it cannot as a small country like, say Belgium, be considered as a plain surface, but must be divided into appropriate sections. As showing how Canada's work stands, it may be stated that when she took her part in drawing a British astronomical werld girdle, and when the astronomers of Canada met those of Emgland in Australia, these two parties binding the world-girdle together were but one-tenth of a second apart in their measurements, a difference so elight as to amount almost to perfection.

Canada'o Rights in Border Waters.

Among the several questions new pending between London and Washington Ferming to regarding Canada, one of the most important affects, the interpretation of the River and Harber Act of 1902, providing fee an American-Canadian Commission to investigate and report on the problems of water level, water supply and navigation of the waters adjacent to the boundary line, including all lakes and rivers whose natural outlet to by the St. Lawrence River.

Some question has arisen as to the scope of the commission of six, which already has been appointed, the Washington Government having taken the tentative position that its jurisdiction did not include the St. John River, where certain obstructions have been placed to the annoyance of Canadians. It is the wish of the Canadians that this river be included in the investigation, and they held that such was the intention of the act. A similar interpretation was placed on the law by Mr. Choate, the American Ambassador at London, when he presented the invitation for the appointment of the commission. In view of this fact, the representations of the London Government on the subject will be again taken up at Washington, and given careful consideration.

REVOLUTION THREATENS.

Crown is Said to Be Imperilling the People's Rights.

People's Rights.

Vienna, May 29.—The political situation in Hungary has passed within the last few days from the passive state of recent months into a comparatively acute stage that is threatening really berious consequences.

Count Tisza, it is said, will be removed from the Premiership this week, and in his stead will be appointed, if he can form a C:blinet, Gen. Baron Ferjervary, formerly Fungarian Minister of National D.F. nee, which office he had to resign because of great unpopularity arising from his extreme partisanship to the Crown in matters within his jurisdiction.

The rights guaranteed Hungarians under their constitution, leading men of that country say, are upon the ewe of being threatened by the Crown's action, and Hungarians are preparing to contest these infringements in a manner in which holds the possibility of bringing serious results the mirror of the periods.

tion, and Hungarlans are preparing to contest these infringements in a manner in which holds the possibility of bringing serious results to the mutual itie of the dual monarchy.

The possibilities with which the present situation is pregnant may lead to a state of affairs meaning practically revolution, especially as Baron Ferjervary is thought to be a man who will carry out the Crown's wishes, irrespective of Hungarian national demands. The situation has not been so threatening as it is to-day since peace was established between Austria and Hungary in 1867.

Oscar's Ministers Resign.

Christiana, Norway, May 29.—King Oscar at Saturday's council of Ministers declined to sign the law creating a separate consular system for Norway. The Ministers immediately tendered their resignations, but the King refused to accept them. They then declared they must ask for their immediate dismissal, as they could not sign the King's veto.



No damage to our ships. According to statements of prisoners, vessels sunk in engagement May 27, were: Borodine (battleship), Alexandria II. (battleship), Jerntschug and three others. Rear Admiral Nebogatoff and about two thousand other Russlans were taken prisoners.

aptured. It is not yet clear whether three ves-It is not yet clear whether three vessels as stated by prisoners to have been sunk, are included or not in above list. There are more than a thousand prisoners, besides two throusand taken by main force of combined squadrons. The naval engagement is still in progress so that it will take some time before the final results can be known.

Russ Flagship Damaged.

According to advices received by the Navy Department from Tokie, the Jap-anese, in addition to the ships already named, captured the Russian battleship Sissol Voliky, and the Russian flag-ship was seriously democred The Loss of Life.

tollowed for the greater part of the evening. He called at the White House shortly after 9 o'clock last evening, and was immediately received.

On returning to the legation from the White House, Minister Takahira declined to discuss his conference with the President. Regarding the possible effect of the outcome of the battle on peace negotiations, he said:

"After this sweeping victory, Russia alone can be held responsible for a prolongation of the war."

Cassini Still Obstinate.

At the Russian embassy last night, Count Cassini, while naturally greatly depressed at the loss of life, expressed the belief that when fuller details came in it would be found that Admiral-Rojestvensky had saved part of his squadron, and that his passage of the straits had been accomplished not without inflicting great damage on the opposing fleet.

"Talk of peace is premature," the Ambassador declared. "If the victory be as stupendous as the Japanese would have the world believe, the neutral powers can scarcely wish for Japan to be allowed to remain without a taste of defeat. Much as I should welcome an end of the war for some reasons, my belief is that the effect of Rojestvensky's defeat will be the indefinite prolongation of the war. Russia

must fight on, pernaps for years, but until the tables are turned."

Remainder Seems Easy Now.

London, May 30.—Baron Hayashi (the Japanese Minister), in an interview with the Associated Press last night, said: "We will rejoice at Togo's magnificent victory. We had confidence he would not be so badly beaten as it was supposed the Russians thought he would be, but at the same time we were not entirely free from anxiety concerning the outcome of this long expected naval battle. Now we feel quite easy in our minds, and the remainder seems casy.

"Regarding whether this fight will prove a step in the direction of peace, we cannot judge. Outsiders cannot express an opinion of any value on this point. The question must be regarded from the Russian standpoint.

"We consider the victory as the most decisive of modern times. Its effect will be far-reaching, and it will have an influence, not only on the future of the Far East, but also on Europe.

"Russia can no longer be reckoned with as a naval power.

"It is my opinion that Togo's victory is on a par with that of Neison achieved a century age this year."

St. Petersburg Dazed.

St. Petersburg May 30.—After walting vainly all day and evening for direct news from the scattered remnants of Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky's destroyed and beaten fleet, the Russian Admiralty at midnight no longer attempted to hold out against the overwhelming evidence pouring in from all directions that the fleet on which all their hopes were centered had suffered a greater disaster than did the combined French and Spanish fleets

More bitter even than defeat is the Japanese claim of virtual annihilation of the Russian fleet, with practically no loss on their side, and many officers cling doggedly to the belief that Vice-Admiral Togo must have suffered heavily.

The Emperor was completely prostrated by the news, and, according to eports, broke down and wept.

All Lendon Rejoless.

London, May 30.—The naval battle between the fleets of Togo and Rojestvensky strikes the imagination of the British public with far greater force than any of the military operations. Hence Togo's victory arouses far more intense interest here than any incident of the war, and is greeted by the newspapers and the people with great jubilation. Everywhere it is being compared with Trafalgar and Aboukir.

"Togo," says The Daily Telegraph editorially, "has won the Trafalgar of the far east, and won it, as his allies rejoice to note, in Nelson's year."

All the morning papers pay tribute to Admiral Togo's extraordinary success. They say that the sun has set on Russia's naval glory and comment on the possibilities of peace. Universal opinion is that it would be criminal for the Emperor of Russia to continue the war. tinue the war. Russ Defeat Depresses Paris.

Russ Defeat Depresses Parie.

Paris, May 30.—The magnitude of the Russian naval disaster has fairly stunned French public opinion, which had hoped that late advices would show that Japan had also suffered some share of the losses. The disaster is generally discussed by officials, the public and the press in a tone of depression. The prevailing view is that Russia now would be compelled to terminate the war.
