For diffolving the present General Assembly of Nova-Scotia, and calling a new one.

HEREAS I have thought fit, by, and with the Advice of His Majesty's Council, to dissolve the present General Assembly, which now stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-eight Day of February next. I do for that End publish this Proclamation, and do hereby dissolve the faid General Assembly accordingly.

And the Members of His Majesty's Council, and the Representatives of the several Counties and Towns with-

in this Province, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on that Day.

And I do hereby further declare, that, with the Advice of His Majesty's Council, I have this Day given Order, to issue out Writs, in due Form, for calling a New General Assembly; which Writs are to bear Teste on Tuesday the Twenty-second Day of January instant, and to be returnable on Tuesday the Fifth Day of March next.

GIVEN under my Hand and Seal at Halifax, this 22th Day of January; in the 33d year of His Majesty's Reign.

HEREAS by the Writs issued on Tuesday the Twenty second Day of January last past, for dissolving the late General Assembly, and calling a new one, the same were made returnable on Tuesday the Fifth Day of March next. And Whereas, it has been represented to me, and there is reason to apprehend, that the Sheriffs in certain of the Counties in this Province, may not be able to make due returns thereof, within the time aforefaid; I have thought fit, by, and with the advice of His Majesty's Council, to enlarge the time for returning the said Writs, generally, throughout the Province. And I do hereby declare that the same is so enlarged, to Wednesday the Twentieth Day of the said Month of March. At which time, and not on the said Tuesday the Fish of the said Month, last mentioned, the same are to be returnable, of which the several Sheriffs throughout the Day of the said Month of March. the Province, and all Persons who shall be Elected under the said Writs, are hereby required to take due notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

IS Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, having, by his two several Proclamations (hereunto annexed) dated the 22d January, and 19th February last, dissolved the last General Assembly, and called a new one, and appointed the same to meet and sit at Halifax this Day, being the Twentieth Day of March, 1793; the following are the Names of the Members returned by the Sheriss, for the several Counties and Towns within this Province, to represent the same, in the said General-Assembly, summoned to meet as before mentioned, viz.

After which, a Message was delivered from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, by Mr. Secretary Bulkeley, commanding the immediate Attendance of the House in the Council-Chamber.

Accordingly the House went up to attend His Excellency, when the President of his Majesty's Council, by His Excellency's Direction, said,

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor has been pleased to command me, that it is his Pleasure, that you do immediately repair to the Place where the House of Assembly of Nova-Scotia, usually sit, and there chuse a fit Person to be your Speaker, and that you do inform His Execllency of your Proceedings hereon.

And the House being returned,

Thomas Barclay and Jonathan Sterns, Esquires, were proposed Candidates for the Chair.

The Members present, unenimously expressed their entire Approbation of the Merits and Abilities of both Gentlemen, but as their Wishes for both, could not be gratisfied, Mr. Wallace, Member for the County of Halifax hoped, that one or other of the Gentlemen would withdraw, and save the Members the pain of Balloting; upon which Mr. Sterns declared, that the high Respect and Esteem he had for Mr. Barclay,

Barclay, added to the Experience he knew he possessed of Parliamentary business, were Inducements sufficient for him to relinquish any Pretensions to the Chair, and requested, that Mr. Barclay might be the object of their Choice, in Consequence of which, Mr. Wallace then proposed to the House, for their Speaker, the said Thomas Barclay, Esq; in which he was seconded by Mr. Pyke.

The House then calling Thomas Barclay, Esq; to the Chair, he stood up in his Place, and expressing the sense had of the Honor proposed to be conferred on

him, submitted himself to the House.

The House then again unanimously calling Thomas Barclay, Esqr; to the Chair, he was taken out of his Place by the said Michael Wallace, and John George Pyke, Esquires, and conducted to, and placed in the Chair accordingly.

A Message was delivered to his Excellency, by a Committee of the House, informing his Excellency, that the House had chosen a Speaker in Obedience to his Excellency's Commands.

A Message was delivered from His Excellency, by Mr. Secretary Bulkeley, commanding the Attendance of the House in the Council-Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker Elect, with the House, went up to attend his Excellency in the Council-Chamber, where Mr. Speaker Elect, was presented to his Excellency by Mr. Pyke, upon which the President of the Council, by His Excellency's Command, declared the Choice the House had made, was approved of by His Excellency.

The House being returned, and Mr. Speaker having taken the Chair.

Mr. Speaker reported, that the House had been in the Council-Chamber, where His Excellency had been pleased to approve of the Choice the House had made of him to be their Speaker, and that he had spoken to the following Effect;

May it please your Excellency,

Your Excellency having been pleased to approve of the Choice of the House of Assembly, in electing me their Speaker, merits my warmest Thanks, which I most humbly intreat you to accept. When I consider the important Office I am called on to fill, and how unequal my Abilities are to the Task, I experience the painful Sensations of Dissidence, and Fear. In your Benevolence, and Candour I however trust for a favourable Construction of my Conduct, and if at any time I may be found guilty of an Error in Judgement, that your Excellency will attribute it to human Frailty rather than Design. I am directed by the House of Assembly, to request of your Excellency, as the Privileges of this House, that the Members thereof during their Sessions, may be freed from all Molestation, that they may have Freedom of Speech in their Debates, that they may have the Power of of punishing their own Members, and have free and favourable Access to your Excellency as His Majesty's immediate Representative, on all Occasions.

Mr. Speaker also reported, that his Excellency in reply said, He would grant to the House of Assembly, all the Rights and Privileges he was authorised to do, by Virtue of His Commission and Instructions from His Majesty.

After which Mr. Speaker said his Excellency was pleased to make a Speech, of which Mr. Speaker said, he had, to prevent Mistakes, obtained a Copy, which he read to the House, and is as followeth, viz.

Gentlemen of the Council and House of Assembly,

IN a Constitution of Government, analogous to that of Great-Britain, there are Occasions, when it is peculiarly defirable, to have convened a new, and complete Representation of the People. In this view, I have particular Satisfaction in the present Opportunity of meeting you in General-Assembly, and of advising with you

on the means best adapted to advance the public Weal; and I am very happy that in meeting a new elected House of Assembly, it is in my power to commence our intercourse with cordial Congratulations on the general Prosperity, and Harmony, that prevail throughout the Province: From whence we may expect to derive additional respect, with the increase of Public Credit, and its consequent Benefits.

The prosperity of the Country, being thus happily rooted by mutual Considence, and love of our King and Country, I rely on your Wisdom, Loyalty, and Patriotism, to cultivate and establish it. While a great portion of Europe, is agitated by Distractions, in which Great-Britain may eventually, not remain wholly unconcerned, it is our pride to rejoice, in our Attachment to His Majesty's Person, and Government, under which we enjoy the best Fruits of a Free Constitution, Peace and Security, undisturbed by any Animosities, or differences, whatever.

Gentlemen of the Assembly,

The state of the Public Revenue will be laid before you, and I trust, you will provide for a due Support of the Public Credit, and of the annual Provincial Establishment. You may rely on my ready co-operation in every measure of Public Utility; as I shall on your Moderation, Candour, and Liberality in the discussion of the Public Business; and in making such Dispatch as the nature of it will admit.

The Papers which may be necessary for your Information shall be laid before you; and I shall communicate with you, by message, during the Session, as occasion may require.

On Motion, ordered, That Mr. Sterns, Mr. Wallace, and Mr. Howe, be a Committee to prepare an Address in Answer to His Excellency's Speech.

Mr. Wallace, moved, That an humble and dutiful Address to His Majesty, should be prepared and transmitted from this House, by the Portland Packet, expressive of the continued steady loyalty, and affection of the good People of this Province, to His Majesty's Sacred Person, and Government, and of their unalterable Attachment to our present happy Constitution, which was unanimously resolved, and the following Gentlemen were immediately appointed a Committee to confer with His Majesty's Council, and to request them to unite with this House, in a joint Address, viz. Mr. Wallace, Mr. Howe, Mr. Stern:, Mr. Millidge, and Mr. Tonge.

The House then proceeded to the Choice of Officers, when

Mr. James Boutineau Francklin was chosen Clerk. The Reverend Joshua Wingate Weeks, Chaplain. Mr. Adolphus Viet, Serjeant at Arms, and Mr. Peter Etter, Senior, Messenger. The Clerk took the usual Oaths.

Ordered, That Mr. Millidge, Mr. Pyke, Mr. Hartsborne, Mr. Dickson, Mr. Tonge, Mr. Sterns, Mr. Moody, Mr. Dewolf, Mr. Maclean, Mr. Howe, Mr. Freeman, Mr. McMonagle and Mr. Schwartz, be a grand Committee of Justice.

A Motion being made for a Committee of Five, to be appointed in the usual Mode by Nomination, for the Purpose of examining the Public Accounts, jointly with a Committee of His Majesty's Council, and reporting thereon, Mr. Tonge, thereupon moved, that thesaid Committee be now chosen by Ballot, which being seconded and put and the House dividing thereon, there appeared for the Motion Eleven, against it Sixteen.

Then the House adjourned, till To-Morrow at Ten of the Clock.

A Petition of Benjamin Belcher, Esqr, was presented by Mr. Baxter, and read, setting forth, that the Petitioner at the late Election, for King's-County, was nominated one of the Candidates, to represent the said County in the present General-Assembly; that in consequence of Jonathan Crane, Esqr; one of the sitting Members for the said County, having taken as the Petitioner conceives, undue means to qualify Electors at the said Election, to vote in his behalf, the Petitioner was not returned for the said County, and therefore prays, such Relief, in the Premises, as to the House shall seem meet.

Ordered, That the said Petition do lie on the Table.

Mr. Sterns, reported from the Committee, appointed to prepare an Address, in Answer to His Excellency's Speech, and presented an Address, accordingly, which he read in his Place, and afterwards delivered in at the Table, which was again read by the Clerk, and upon the Question put thereupon, unanimously agreed to, and is as follows.

The Humble ADDRESS of the Commons of Nova-Scotia in General Assembly.

WE His Majesty's fairhful Subjects, the Commons of His Loyal Province of Nova-Scotia, beg leave to return Your Excellency, our fincere Thanks for Your Speech, at the opening of this Session of the General-Assembly.

Fraquent

Frequent Opportunities of exercising the Right of electing the Members of that constituent Branch of our Government, which is peculiarly popular, has been by the Wisdom of our Ancestors, considered as highly favourable to the Liberty, Happiness, and good Government of the People; and we gratefully acknowledge Your Excellency's Wisdom, in conforming the Measures of our Colonial Government, in that Respect, to the Rules adopted by our Parent Country, to which our Constitution is analagous.

The perfect Harmony, that prevails throughout this Province, is the best Security for its Prosperity, Respectability, Credit, and all their consequent Benefits, the continuance of which, we have the fullest Considence, will be ensured to us by your Excellency's just, mild, and prudent Administration.

While we view with extreme Concern, the distracted State of a Great Portion of Europe, in which we regret, that *Great Britain* may possibly be, in some Degree eventually involved, it is our Happiness to be sensible, and Pride to acknowledge, that our Freedom, Peace, and Security are derived from, and secured by our unalienable Attachment to our most Gracious Sovereign, and the excellent Constitution under which we live.

Sensible of the Importance of supporting the Public Credit, and the Necessity of providing for the annual Expences of the Provincial Government; we shall chearfully grant the Supplies requisite for those Objects.

We confidently rely on your Excellency's ready Co-operation with us in every Measure of Public Utility, and beg leave to assure your Excellency, that we shall on our Part conduct the publick Business, which shall come before us, with Liberality, Candour, and all possible Dispatch, and shall duly attend to such future Communications, as your Excellency shall be pleased to make to us during the Session.

Resolved, That the said Address, be presented to His Excellency, by the whole House.

Ordered, That Mr. Secretary Bulkeley, do wait on His Excellency, to know his pleasure, when he will be attended by this House.

Mr. Millidge moved, That Benjamin Belcher, Esq; be heard by himself or Counsel on the Merits of his Petition, on Saturday next, which being seconded and put, passed in the affirmative, and thereupon

Ordered, That Mr. Belcher, be heard by himself or Counsel, on the Merits of his Petition, on Saturday next accordingly.

Mr. Sterns reported from the Committee, appointed to confer with His Majesty's Council, on the subject of a joint Address to His Majesty, that they had made known to the Council, the Resolution of this House thereon.

Resolved, That no Petition of a private Nature, be received after Monday, the 1st of April next.

A Message was received from the Council, to inform the House, they had appointed a Committee, to confer on the subject of a joint Address to His Majesty, and that the said Committee, would be ready to meet the Committee of this House at Twelve of the Clock on the above occasion.

Ordered, That the Committee of this House, do attend accordingly, and that the Clerk do acquaint the Council therewith.

Mr. Secretary Bulkeley reported to the House, That His Excellency having been waited upon, pursuant to the Order of this Day, to know when he would be pleased

to be attended by this House, had been pleased to appoint, To-merrow at Twelve of the Clock, at the Government House.

Ordered, That Mr. Pyke, Mr. Sterns, and Mr. Maclean, be a Committee, to report what Laws will expire, on the 30th of June next.

The Commissioners of the Revenue, presented to the House, a General Statement of the public Accounts, of the Province, from the 26th of May 1792, to the 10th March 1793.

Ordered, That the said Statement, do lie on the Table, to be perused by the Mem-

bers.

Then the House adjourned, till To-morrow, at Ten of the Clock.

Friday, 22th March, 1793.

PRAYERS.

A Petition of Alexander Haines, an unfortunate Debtor was presented by Mr. Millidge, and read; setting forth, that the Petitoner from His Attachment to his Majesty, during the late War in America, has been deprived of the greater Part of his Property, by Consiscation, which puts it out of his Power, to Discharge a certain Bond given by him in the Year 1766, to one Daniel Woods, an Inhabitant of the United States, that the said Woods, has obtained Judgment and Execution against the Petitioner, on the said Bond, and thrown him into Jail at Annapolis, (although he has offered to surrender all the Property he is now possessed of, with an Assurance to make full Satisfaction of the Debt, if hereafter in his Power;) where he has been consined a long time, in great Misery and Want, to the extreme Distress of an infirm Wise, and numerous Family, who depend upon his Labours for Support, and praying the House will grant him such Relief, in the Premises, as to them may seem meet.

Ordered, That the Petition, do lie on the Table.

Mr. Millidge, moved, That the Sheriff of King's County, at present in the Town of Halifax, be directed to wait the Commands of this Hause on the Subject of a Petition from Benjamin Belcher Esquire, complaining of an undue Election for King's-County, and praying Relief; which being seconded, and put, passed in the Negative.

Mr. Speaker, and the House, attended His Excellency, with their Address, pur-

fuant to the Resolution of Yesterday,

And being returned,

Mr. Speaker reported, that His Excellency was pleased to give this Answer.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

Feel fingular pleasure in your Address. The Kindness, Respect and Loyalty so generously declared, affects me with increased Sensibility, at this particular Time, and affords me the fullest Expectations that from such Sentiments, Prosperity will be derived to His Majesty's Subjects in this Province, which is eminently the Object of His Majesty's most Gracious Care, and of our best Duty.

Mr. Millidge, moved, That the Sheriff of King's-County, should be directed to make a report of his proceedings relating to a scrutiny, held on the Election of Jonathan Crane Esquire, one of the sitting Members for King's County; which being seconded, and put, passed in the affirmative.

The Sheriff, then by Order of the House, delivered in the said proceedings ac-

cordingly, and thereupon,

Ordered, That they do lie on the Table, to be perused by the Members.

On Motion of Mr. Tonge, ordered, that the Petition do lie on the Table.

On Motion of Mr. M. Monagle, Refolved, that the Petitioner be heard by himself, or Counsel, on Monday next, on the Merits of his Petition, and that the Parties have Notice thereof, accordingly.

Mr. Pyke, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill, to enable the several Counties, to raise Money for the Payment of their Representatives, and the same was read, a first Time.

And a further "Sum of £100. to the Clerk of the Crown for his Attendance on the Supreme-Court " in all its Sittings and not otherwise." That in Consequence of such Vote, he did attend the said Court, in all its Sittings, personally, or by his Deputies, with the Approbation of the late Lieutenant Governor Parr, and the Concurrence of the Justices of the faid Court, without any Complaint ever being made of the Negligence, or Infuf. ficiency of his Deputies, in faid Duty, which Attendance he conceived to be within the Spirit of the Grant; that he accordingly received the faid Allowance, by Warrant, on the Treasury from the Year 1787, until the last Session, of the General Assembly, when it was struck out of the Estimate, and not voted by the House, on the Suggestion, of his not having complied with the Condition, on which it had been allowed. That the said Salary is almost the only Compensation for the Services done by the Clerk of the Crown, the Fees being extremely trifling; that he had no Notice whatever, that any Objection would have been made by the late House of Assembly, to the grant of his Salary as Clerk of the Crown, nor was he called upon to explain his Conduct, or heard in his Defence, when the Vote passed for its Discontinuance; and praying the House will reconsider his Case, and that he may from the peculiar Situaof it, be allowed to receive his last Year's Salary, conformable to the Government Listimate, and the former Grants of the Assembly, and that the same may be in suture continued to him, so long as he shall hold the Office of Clerk of the Crown, and perform, the Duties thereof, by himself and his sufficient Deputies.

A Petition of Alexander Cocken, was presented by Mr. Campbell, and read; setting forth, that the Petitioner in the Year 1788, was appointed Keeper of the Light House, on Mc'Nutt's Island, at the Entrance of the Harbour of Shelburne, by the late Lieutenant Governor Parr, that he has constantly resided there with his Family, from the Time of his Appointment, and faithfully discharged the Duties of his Office; that he has received the Sum of £115. only for his Services, whereby he has been under the Necessity of involving himself considerably in debt, for Provisions, and other necessary Supplies for his Family, which he is now totally unable to discharge; and praying the House will take the peculiar hardship of his Case into Consideration, and grant a Compensation for his Services, or such other Relief in the Premises, as to them may seem meet.

A Petition of Elisha Dewolf Esquire, was presented by himself, and read; setting forth, that the Petitioner was the late Sheriff for King's County, and received an Order from the Secretary's Office, in the Year 1790, to take a general Census of the Inhabitants of the said County, which he accordingly did; and made return thereof to the said Secretary's Office, for which Service he has received no Compensation; and praying the House will take his Case into Consideration, and Order him such Payment for the said Service, as to them, in their Wisdom; shall seem reasonable.

A Petition of Gregory Springall, of Shelburne, Merchant, was presented by Mr. Campbell, and read; setting forth, that the Petitioner, at the Evacuation of New-York removed to this Province, that he was then possessed of 119 Hogsheads of Molasses, on which he paid an Impost Duty of £254. II. 3. That he did in the Year 1786, and 1789, respectively, petition the late General Assembly for relief, to the last of which Application, he was encouraged by their having in their Session of 1788, allowed to certain other Applicants, a return of Duties, grounded on Claims, which he conceived were not more favorable than his, but that he was so unfortunate as to have his said Applications disallowed; and praying the House will reconsider his claim and grant him Relief in the Premises, by refunding the said Sum so paid by him, or such other Compensation as to them may seem meet.

That the Petitioner has also in his Possession, a Certificate from the Treasurer, of sundry Notes due from the Province to his said Father, which Notes having been either lost or destroyed, prevents him from receiving the Principal, or Interest for the same; and praying the House will take his Case into Consideration, and grant him such relief in the Premises, as to them may seem Meet.

Ordered, That the faid Petitions, do lie on the Table.

The Council have agreed to the Bill, intitled an Act, in Amendment of, and in addition to an Act, made in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of his late Majesty intitled "an Act, for regulating and maintaining a Light House on Sambro Island," and in Addition to, and Amendment of an Act passed in the Twenty eighth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intitled "an Act, for regulating and maintaining a Light "House at the Entrance of the Harbour of Shelburne," without any Amendment.

A Message from the Council, by Mr. Gautier,

Mr. Speaker,

The Council have come to several Resolutions, on the subject of appointing an Agent, for the Province; which they have directed me to deliver to this House.

The faid Resolutions were accordingly delivered to the Clerk.

And then the Messenger withdrew.

The Resolutions received from the Council, were read by the Clerk, and are as sollows, viz.

His Majesty's Council, having had under Consideration a Report from a Committee of the House of Assembly, appointed to take into Consideration the Correspondence between the Speaker of the late House of Assembly, and the Agent of the Province, as sent up to them by the said House; with a Resolution, for dismissing Richard Cumberland Esquire, from his said Office of Agent, purporting to be grounded on the Expediency of such Agent residing constantly in London; followed by a nomination of Philip Sansom Esquire, on the Part of the said House, to succeed to the same; to which Resolution, the Concurrence of the Council was desired,

Resolved, That it appears to the Council, that the Matter of the said Report, respects only a very late Period of the Agency of the said Richard Cumberland Esquire, and is altogether of a negative Nature; independent of which, and of the Principles of Justice, whether the said Resolution be taken to proceed upon the stated Ground of expediency, coupled with whatever Matter of blame, or upon such expediency alone, Considerations of Delicacy due to a Gentleman confessedly intitled to Thanks for his past Services, and at this moment Agent of the Government at Home, for the Province, suggest the Propriety, of at least communicating with him upon the subject, previous to any such Measure, as is proposed, being carried into Effect.

Therefore resolved, that his Majesty's Council, cannot for the present concur with

the House of Assembly, in the proposed Resolution.

The House having had the foregoing Resolutions, of the Council, under Consideration thereupon,

Resolved, That a present Conference be desired with the Council, on the subject Matter of the said Resolutions, and that the Clerk do desire the same.

The Clerk reported, that the Council, doth agree to a Conference, in the Committee-Room of the Council, as defired by the House.

Ordered, That a Committee be appointed to manage the faid Conference.

And a Committee was appointed of, Mr. Sterns, Mr. Hartsborne, Mr. Skinner, Mr. Tonge and Millidge.

And the Names of the Managers were called over, and they went to the Conference, And being returned,

A Message from his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Mr. Secretary Bulkeley.

Mr. Speaker,

His Excellency commands this House, to attend his Excellency in the Council Chamber,

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker with the House went up to attend his Excellency; where his Excellency was pleased to give his Assent, to the several Bills following viz:

An Act, for extending to the Towns of Windfor, Annapolis, and Lunenburg, the Provisions of an Act, passed in the second Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, intitled "an Act, for appointing Fire Wards, ascertaining their Duty, and for Punishing Thests and Disorders at the Time of Fire," and also of the several Acts made in Addition to, or Amendment of the said Act.

An Act, to enable the Inhabitants of the Town of Annapolis, and the Officers of his Majerty's Garrison, stationed for the Time being, in the said Town of Annapolis, annually, to nominate and appoint Supervisors, to take charge of the Commons appertaining to the said Town, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act, to amend an Act, passed in the sixth Year of his present Majesty's Reign; intitled "an Act, for regulating the Times and Places for holding the several Courts of Justice therein named, and also to enable the Supreme Court, to alter, and six, the return of Writs."

An Act, to enable the Deputy Surveyors of this Province, to Administer an Oath, or Affirmation, if Quakers, to such Persons as may be employed under them as Chain Bearers, in measuring Lands.

An Act, in Addition to, and Amendment of an Act, passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, intitled an Act, declaring what shall be deemed Merchantable Timber, for Exportation, to Great-Britain.

An Act, to enable the Sheriffs of the leveral Counties in this Province, to Administer the Oath, or Oaths, or if to a Quaker Affirmation, by Law required, to be administered to such Person, or Persons, as the said Sheriffs may respectively have Occasion to employ, as Appraiser, or Appraisers, of Goods, Chattles, Lands, or other real Estates by them attached on messe process, or taken in Execution.

An Act, in Addition to, and Amendment of an Act, made in the fifth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, intitled an Act, to enable the Inhabitants in the several Townships in this Province (Halisax excepted) to cause any absent Proprietor of Lands within the same, to pay a Dividend, or Proportion, of any County or Town Charge, to be assessed according to Law, and to bear their just Proportion in repairing Highways, Roads, and Bridges, within the said Townships respectively.

An Act, for extending an Act, passed in the Thirty second Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, intitled an Act, to prevent unnecessary siring off Guns, and other fire Arms, in the Youn and Suburbs of Halifax, to the Town Plot of Dartmouth.

An Act, in Addition to, and in Amendment of an Act, passed in the Thirty sourth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, intitled an Act, for appointing Commissioners of Sewers.

An Act, to amend and render more productive an Act, passed in the Thirty sourth. Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intitled an Act, to raise a Revenue, for the Purpose of paying offall such Debts, as are now due by the Province, or which shall become due, before the first Day of July next, the funded Debt only excepted.

An Act, for providing for the Support of his Majesty's Government in this Province, by laying an Additional Duty, on Wine, Rum, and other Articles herein mentioned, and for encouraging the Agriculture, Fisheries, and Commerce, of this Province.

An Act, in Amendment of, and in Addition to an Act, made in the Thirty third Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, intitled an Act, for regulating and maintaining a Light House, on Sambro Island, and in Addition to, and Amendment of an Act, passed in the Twenty eighth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intitled an Act, for regulating and maintaining a Light House, at the Entrance of the Harbour of Sbelburne.

An Act, to continue in Force, the several Acts herein mentioned.

An Act, to amend an Act, passed in the Thirty second Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, intitled an Act, to prevent the Windsor and Hamond Plain Road, being injured, by heavy loaded Carriages.

An Act, to prevent Obstructions of the Navigation, in the Ports, Harbours,

Rivers, and Creeks, within this Province.

An Act, for granting to his Majesty, certain Duties, on Wine, Rum, and all other distilled Spirituous Liquors, and Brown Sugar, for the Purpose of paying the Interest, and reducing the Principal of the public Debt of this Province.

After which Mr. Speaker, delivered to his Excellency, a Bill for appropriating

the Supplies granted this present Session, and spake as follows, viz.

May it please your Excellency,

I am directed by the House of Assembly, to present to your Excellency, a Bill for appropriating the Supplies granted this present Session, and most humbly to intreat your Excellency, will be pleased to Assent thereto: The House of Assembly, trust by the Bills now passed, they have effected every object to which their Attention was required, by your Excellency's Speech, at the opening of the Session.

His Excellency was pleased to give his Assent to the said Bill following, viz:

An Act, for applying certain Monies therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year of our Lord, One Thousand seven Hundred and Ninety three, and for appropriating such Part of the Supplies granted in this Session of General Assembly, as are not already appropriated, by the Laws, or Acts of the Province.

After which, his Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech, viz.

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of the Council,

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

The Public business being dispatched, and the Season of the Year requiring the Attention of the Country Gentlemen to the Cultivation of their Farms, I gladly embrace the Opportunity, to grant you a Recess.

It is with Pleasure, that I acknowledge the Diligence and Ability with which you have conducted the Affairs of the Session. To render efficacious the Provisions made for the Security of the Public Creditors, as well as the Laws enacted for regulating the general Police of the Province, I earnestly recommend to you, to continue your Exertions for the public Good, in the respective Places of your Abode, by encouraging and promoting Industry, Order, and a willing Obedience to the Laws and Con-
