**BURGlar CAPTURED.**—Upon returning from a professional call about 3 o'clock on Thursday morning of last week, Dr. Dingman discovered a burglar in his house. He immediately seized the fellow and held him till the assistance of some of his neighbors was procured, when Mr. burglar was marched to the lock up. The fellow was of the genus tramp. He gave his name as William Martin, and professed to hail from Michigan. He had gained entrance to the Dr's residence by forcing a cellar window; but evidently nabbed before he had time to appropriate anything, as nothing was found upon him. He was brought before L. Bolton, J. P., who committed him to trial. Constable Woods took him to Stratford Thursday evening.

PERMITS MODEL SCHOOL.—The professional examination of the Model School was held last Friday and Saturday in the Stratford High School buildings. Of the 27 who had attended 23 have passed, and the Board have two still under consideration. The following are the names of those who have passed, with the number of marks taken. The total number of marks was 575, one half or 288 was necessary to pass:—Fennell, Maggie Thompson, 49; A. A. B. M. A. 424; Alice M. Flynn, 420; Mattie E. Morier, 413; Lizzie E. Lennox, 409; Agnes Knox, 401; Jessie Duncan, 358; Catherine Campbell, 352; a new season, 341; Arch. K. Mustard, 441; Thos. Wesley Cosens, 422; Gregory Tom, 417; W. Brown, 407; Samuel J. Wilson, 399; A. Ferguson, 375; W. Elliott, 364; Alex. Martin, 362; Peter J. Nevin, 354; J. C. Roger, 348; Mann Leake, 332; G. Howe, 324; John Mackey, 295. The Board decided to renew their certificates for one year, the holders having passed the intermediate examination.—Times.

THE "BLACK LIPS".—At Osgeoda Hall, on Tuesday, Mr. Justice Oiler delivered judgment on the demurrer in Roberts v. Clinie, the demurrer being allowed. This involves a new and important question. The facts were these. The License Commissioners of the North Riding of the Parish issued a list, copies of which were sent to all the tavern-keepers in the riding, with instructions not to sell liquor to any whose names were on the list, because they were habitual drunkards. The plaintiff in the above case took exception to being thus publicly proclaimed an habitual drunkard, and entered an action against the License Inspector for defamation of character. The defence set up was that the statute empowered the Commissioners to issue such instructions. His Lordship thought that the plaintiff was taken under the Act to any member of the family of a man who drank so excess to prohibit the tavern keeper selling liquor to him did not empower License Commissioners to act in a similar manner and publicly proclaim a man to be a drunkard throughout his country. The Commission might properly have passed a resolution requesting the tavern keeper's attention to the clause of the Act above referred to, but the resolution passed by the Commissioners in respect to the list of alleged drunkards was, in his opinion, altogether outside of their power, and the resolution was therefore void and the defence could not be allowed.

ESTHER OWEN FLINT.—Court Royal Oak, Canadian Order Foresters, of this town, has made arrangements with this town's talented and gifted and dramatic and dialect recitals in the Osborne hall on Wednesday evening next, 2nd prox. The many flattering testimonials which Mrs. Flint has received from the Canadian and American press lead us to anticipate for our citizens a literary entertainment of no mean excellence. Mrs. Flint's recent appearance in Mount Forest, the *Confederate* says: "Those who attended the entertainment in the town hall Wednesday evening last, were well repaid. Mrs. Flint is an eloquent and rare talent. Our space forbids us commenting on the several pieces rendered by her, and we must therefore be content with saying that each was given with all the effect imaginable. This lady's impersonation is grand, and her facial expression most wonderful; she can change from the grave to the gay in a moment. We cannot too highly commend her, and should she ever visit this town again, and we hope she may, a bumper house will greet her." Mrs. Flint's selections for Wednesday evening next are sufficiently varied to furnish scope for an exhibition of her dramatic powers in the various phases in which she is said to excel. The Foresters have also engaged Prof. Holland's string band for the occasion; in addition to which a limited number of vocal selections will be rendered by Miss Wilson and Mr. B. Coe. The entertainment promises to be unusually attractive, and we trust that the management will be repaid for their enterprise by a well filled hall.

The entertainment given in the town hall on Wednesday evening of last week by Messrs. Less Bros. and their employees was a very successful affair. The hall was tastefully decorated, and nothing was left undone that would tend to make the gathering enjoyable. Addresses were delivered by Dr. Phil (who acted as chairman and filled the position with his accustomed ability), and by Geo. and Wm. Hess. The remarks of Messrs. Hess were especially interesting, as these gentlemen gave a brief history of the development of their business, which began in a small workshop, in an upper part of a humble building, and has gone on extending until today this enterprising firm numbers on its pay roll 125 hands and disburses nearly one thousand dollars a week in wages. With a business reputation established, and with orders coming in faster than they can be filled by the large number of hands already employed, the future of Listowel's chief industry, under a policy that will preserve the markets of the Dominion from spoliation by the foreigner, is destined to be even more progressive than it has been in the past. The addresses were interspersed with excellent vocal music by Messrs. Cameron, Bricker and others. At the conclusion of the entertainment an adjournment was made to the fire hall, where a splendid spread was in waiting. The employees and their ladies subsequently spent a few happy hours in the enjoyment of the merry dance.

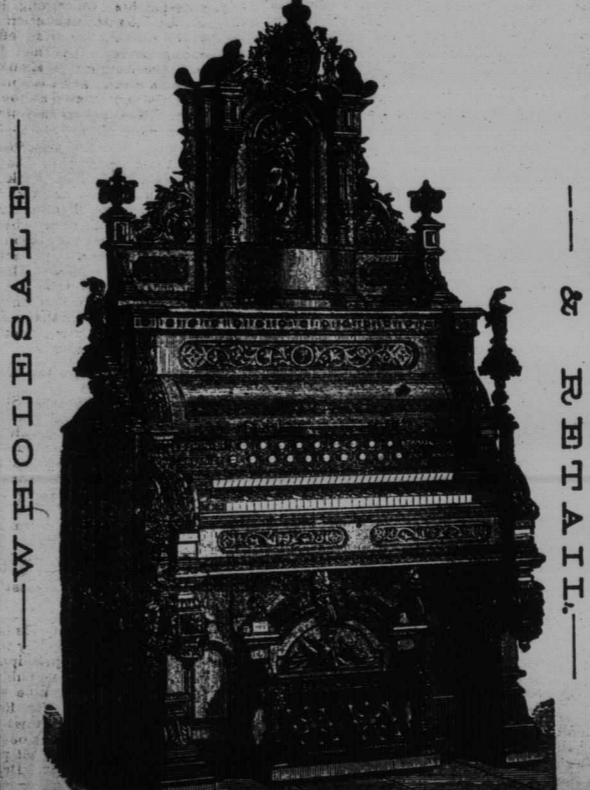
