INFANTILE PARALYSIS

(Issued by the Department of the Public Health, Nova Scotia) Acute anterior poliomyelitis, commonly called infantile paralysis because it usually affects young children, is at present epidemic in exceptionally virulent form in the city of New York, and has caused many deaths inasmuch as there is a possibility that the epidemic may spread it is thought wise to issue this bulletin.

The disease is not unknown in Nova Scotia, an occasional case being reported in widely separated localities. With us, it is more common in the rural districts in the cities and towns.

It is due to one of the tiniest of microorganisms, an organism so small that it can be detected only when massed in groups in the field of the microscope. The germ loses its virulence very quickly when exposed to the air, and this is doubtless one of the reasons why the disease is not more prevalent than it is. Some "strains" of the organism appear to me more active in causing the disease than others. It is thought that the "strain" responsible for the present epidemic in New York may have been brought by immigrants from southern Europe.

We are ignorant of many of the factors concerned in determining an attack of the disease. It is infectious, and yet it is unusual for more than one child in a family to be attacked even though several exposed to infection. Occasionally, however, several members of a family may be infected, and on rare occasions adults suffer from the disease. Often the strongest and apparently the healthiest member of a family is the one to fall ill, so that the best of health does not insure safety from attack.

The first symptoms are, as a rule, indefinite and may suggest only some disorder of digestion. The characteristic paralytic paralysis usually does not appear for three or four days. During the time of epidemic, therefore, the slightest indisposition on the part of a child should lead to a physician being summoned.

Many cases are "abortive" and do not go far enough to cause any paralysis. Such cases may, however, transmit the infection of others.

The infectious element is given off especially in the discharges from the nose, throat and mouth, but possibly also in discharges from the bladder and bowel. It is thought that infection is received principally through the mouth. All dis-

charges from a patient should, therefore, be disinfected immediately upon issuance from the body, and any article soiled by such discharges should also be disinfected at once. It is of special importance that the hands of those in attendance upon the patient be most carefully cleansed after rendering the patient any service. The dishes used by the patient should be separately washed, better sterilized, and reserved for his use alone.

It is generally thought that the infection is disseminated especially by "carriers"—people who, although not themselves ill, have been in contact with patients or their discharges and harbor the germs in their throats. Those who have had the disease, even in the abortive form, may also be carriers for some time after convalescence has set in.

It is difficult to identify carriers, but all who may have come into contact with patients suffering from the disease, or who may themselves have had it, should regard themselves as possible carriers and ask the advice of a physician as to how they may render themselves non-infective.

Every patient suffering from the disease should, of course, be strictly isolated, and every case of the disease should be immediately reported (as required by the Public Health Act) to the appropriate Medical Health Officer. If energetic measures are adopted upon the appearance of a case, the community may be saved epidemic.

Dangers of a Thunder Storm

The fear of being struck by lightning is both a very real and a very sensible fear says the Philadelphia Inquirer.

But lightning can be avoided like all other evils. It will strike in certain places and it will not strike in other places. There are reasons for its behavior: in both cases for nature never operates by chance.

A steam engine or a railroad coach is as safe as any place in the world as far as lightning is concerned. No one has ever been struck by lightning while he was aboard a train.

The business part of a city likewise is never struck by lightning. Neither are the tall skyscrapers ever hit. It is a matter of record that insurance companies never have any losses from lightning striking any building with metallic sides and framework of iron and steel.

A steel battleship is also safe from the bolt from the clouds, as is a steel wind mill tower. This is because every one of the objects is its own lightning rod and needs no further protec-

tion than they can give themselves.

There is another list of things which lightning will surely strike. It will strike a country house or a house in the outskirts of a town. It likes to hit a barn, church, school house, tree, stack or animal, especially if it is near a wire fence.

As for a house, the safest place in a lightning storm is your iron or brass bed. It is very dangerous to stand near the bed because you are taller than the bed. The reason why you are safe when lying on it is that the bed head and foot extend above the bed and the current will not leave the bed to pass through your body. The walls and the floor of the room may be ripped to pieces but you will be safe as long as you lie still in your bed.

Feather beds offer no protection whatever from lightning unless they lie on a metal bed. If the bed is of wood and the springs are steel the food of the bed may be split to pieces, but you will nevertheless remain unharmed.

During the day the safest place in a house is in the centre of a room, provided there is no stove near.

Contrary to the popular opinion it makes no difference whether doors or windows are open or closed. Lightning can get in under any circumstances if it wants to.

Says the Halifax Recorder:—A. B. Crosby's name is mentioned in connection with the vacant senatorship, occasioned by the death of Senator MacDonald, Cape Breton. Mr. Crosby, while not a native of that County, resided there for some years.

The Victoria election recount is finished, and Premier Murray and his colleague, J. G. Morrison, are declared elected with increased majorities.

The new Y. M. C. A. annex recently completed by C. H. Wright, contractor, of Wolfville, will be a great asset to Alford. It measures 40x100 feet, has a good hardwood floor, and is fitted with electric lights. Almost the entire floor space is given to an auditorium in which concerts and services of various kinds will be held. A ledge which runs around three sides of this room will serve a double purpose, in supplementing the now overcrowded writing tables in the old building adjoining, and as gallery seats for a favored few when an entertainment or a service is in progress.

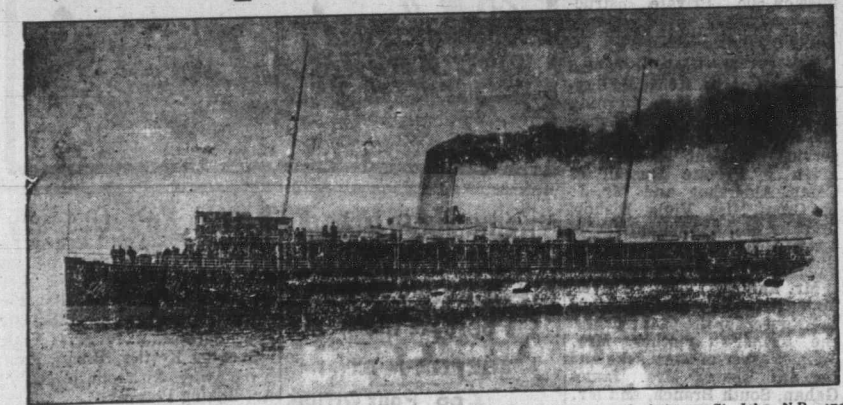

# North Toronto Station

The opening of the North Toronto Station of the Canadian Pacific Railway a few days ago marked a red letter day in the history of the Queen City of the West. The banquet given by the Mayor and Aldermen of Toronto to Mr. A. D. MacTier, the general manager of the C.P.R., showed distinctly the amicable relations which exist between the Company and the city. The new station was turned over into the hands of the city and under skilful hands was elaborately decorated with a profuse supply of bunting, and the evening ceremony, at which Mr. MacTier formally declared the station open for business was attended by thousands of people, who thronged every part of the station. Mayor Church paid a great tribute to the Canadian Pacific and rejoiced in the extremely happy relations which existed between them.

Mr. A. D. MacTier in replying, concurred in the good feeling existing. The design of the new station is free adaptation of the Italian Renaissance to the requirements of the present day. It is a single story building, faced externally with Tyndall limestone from the Tyndall quarries, Manitoba; the choice of this Canadian stone has been justified by the excellent color effect of the masonry in the mass, an effect equal to any that could be obtained by the importation of the better kind of building stones from the States. A large and spacious waiting room 70 feet by 50 feet, of lofty proportions occupies the centre portion of the structure, marked on the South elevation of the building by three large semi-circular headed windows; it faces the South with the main entrance centrally placed on the front. To East and West of this central block are two subsidiary wings roofed at lower level and devoted to station facilities; that to the East to men's and women's rooms with their respective lavatories, and that to the west to ticket offices. To the North of the waiting room is the Concourse beyond which are the parcel, baggage and express rooms. Opening from the Concourse is the midway, which is 20 feet wide and 150 feet long, passing underneath the tracks and from which access is had to the various overhead platforms. Flanking the building at its northwest corner is the

clock tower rising to the height of 140 feet, and four large clock dials, 8 feet in diameter, which will be a great convenience to entire neighborhood. The vestibule under the tower leads to the concourse. A sidewalk (protected by a marquee) is laid along the southwest sides of the station so that patrons may enter there or at main entrance, centrally on the South side or at the lower vestibule, the expectation being that the latter entrance have already secured tickets and only requires to pass directly to the trains, relieving the main waiting room of much of the congestion that might otherwise occur. A private driveway also runs along the west side of the station so that vehicles may drive up to either entrance and pass through under the track to the baggage and express rooms and out on Yonge Street to the North of the station. Internally the waiting room, lower vestibule and concourse are lined with marble for their entire height, the architectural effect being obtained by the use of different colored marbles all set in practically the

same plane so as to avoid as far as possible all offsets and other dirt-collecting projections. The plaster ceilings are treated in a broad manner with large panels. The midway is lined with glazed brick for its full height as are the stairs leading up to the platform. At night the main waiting room will be illuminated by four large bronze standards each topped with a cluster of treated bulbs and a large reflector. A complete system of electric locks of British manufacture have been installed; of this the large clock in the tower forms a part. All ornamental iron work, plastering, marble work, heating, ventilating, plumbing, electric work, etc., have all been carried out by Toronto firms. Wherever possible, and there are but few exceptions, all materials and labor employed in the construction of the building are of Canadian or British origin and Canadian timber has been used for all woodwork whether rough lumber or finished mill work, this being one of the requirements of the C.P.R. in connection with all their work under construction.

## HUN SHIPS BADLY SMASHED IN JUTLAND FIGHT

LONDON, July 14—The Daily News Amsterdam correspondent learns that of the German warships engaged in the Jutland battle, five dreadnought battleships, the Koening, Grosser Kurfuerst, Markgraf, Kaiser and Kaiserin; four battle cruisers, the Derfflinger, Seydlitz, Moltke and Von Der Tann; two other battleships, the Hessian and Rhineland and four small cruisers, are now in German shipyards undergoing repairs. The Seydlitz he says, which had all her superstructure blown away, sank in shallow water while being towed to harbor, has since been salvaged.

**Sheep Industry Meetings**

The meetings being held in Kings County by representatives of the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, are being well attended and much interest is being shown in the revival of this industry in many of the sections visited. Mr. George E. O'Brien, Maritime Representative has pointed out the gains resulting from organization in the disposal of wool through a central point where it is properly graded. The matter of washed vs. unwashed wool is clearly set forth showing that manufacturers do not want tub washed wool and that the farmer who washes his wool according to present prices loses not only 5 cents per pound but does not get paid for the labor of washing it. Wool loses 1-3 its weight from washing, and unwashed wool at .35 cents per pound is equal to about .55 cents for washed wool.

Mr. Stetson, expert in wool grading from the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa who during the spring has graded some 57,000 pounds for farmers in Nova Scotia and P. E. I. clearly indicates the advantages of having a central point in the County for wool grading which work is done free by the Department.

There was much discussion relative to the practical work connected with sheep husbandry particularly with reference to keeping more ewes for breeding. Good breeding grade ewes are at present worth from \$12 to \$15 each.

Is the booze selling in New Glasgow being stamped out? A look at the docket at the Police Court this morning would not be apt to convince anyone that such is the case. On the contrary it would give the impression that it is on the increase. Ten men faced the magistrate this morning, all charged with being drunk and incapable. The customary fine was imposed. Gus Noylea was convicted of the first offence against the N. S. Temperance Act, and was fined \$50 and costs. He paid the fine.—Free Lance.

**BRITISH FORCES CUTTING GAPS IN ENEMY'S LINE.**

**Large Number of German Dead**

London, July 17—The British official statement on the progress of the campaign issued tonight, reads: Rain and heavy mist again interfered with the operations. Nothing of importance occurred on the British front today.

In the local actions which have taken place, and a number of unwounded German prisoners taken by us since July 1, is 189 officers and 10,779 other ranks.

"The German losses in artillery are even greater than at first reported. The captured armament already collected by our troops now includes five 8-inch howitzers, three 6-inch howitzers, four 6-inch guns, five other heavy guns, 37 field guns, thirty trench-howitzers, sixty-six machine guns and many thousands of rounds of ammunition of all descriptions.

British Front in France, July 17 via London—The British today captured a German trench in the neighborhood of Pozieres.

The capture of the trench strengthens the new British line in this vicinity.

The British also cleared out nests of German machine gun operators who had been holding out in cellars and behind barricades in the ruins of Ovillers and La Boiselle. Otherwise the situation along the British front is unchanged at this hour.

A total of about one hundred officers and men surrendered to the British who had steadily closed in upon them, using bombs and trench mortars, the Germans being short of food.

In an enormous cellar at Bezanin-Le-Petit the British found several hundred wounded Germans who had taken refuge there.

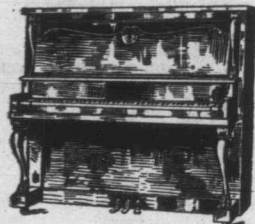

### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

**T**HE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (not sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

**Duties**—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

**In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may re-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.**

**Duties**—Six months residence in each of three years after ceasing homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

**As settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties**—Must reside six months out of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

**The act of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or rocky land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.**

### A FINE NEW BUILDING ERECTED

Borden Hall Opened With Formal Ceremonies.

Substantial Structure Recently Opened—Built from Private Subscriptions—Serves Several Purposes

Conspicuous amongst the new buildings at Aldershot Camp is Borden Hall, which was recently opened with dignified formal ceremonies in the presence of Lt.-Col. W. E. Thompson, Commandant of the Camp and Officers of Staff, Lt.-Col. Allison H. Borden, commanding the Nova Scotia Highland Brigade, Lt.-Col. Parsons, O. C., 85th Battalion; Lt.-Col. Day, O. C., 185th Battalion, and other officers and the chaplains of the various battalions.

Lt.-Col. Thompson, Camp Commandant, as chairman of the occasion, briefly remarked the notable spaciousness and substantial structure of the Hall, its pleasant site and value for the social life of the men of the Brigade. On behalf of the military authorities, he thanked Capt. Chaplain Ronald MacDonald for his labors in obtaining the subscriptions which made the Hall an actuality. Short addresses were given also by Lieut. A. L. MacDonald, 185th Battalion, and Capt. Ronald MacDonald, the latter formally conveyed the Hall in perpetuity for the use of the soldiers in camp who subscribe to the creed and discipline of the Catholic Church. He explained the purposes of the Hall and unveiled the entablature on the arch revealing the name "Borden Hall," the name being chosen, he said, to do honor to Lt. Col. Borden, commanding the Nova Scotia Highland Brigade. Music for the occasion was furnished by the 85th and 185th bands.

### Spacious Structure

The building, which is in oblong bungalow style, is 70 feet by 30 feet with a 10 foot post and a pitched roof projecting over a spacious verandah. A room 30 feet by 10 feet is cut off the northern end for an officers' reading room. It is finished in Douglas pine. Next to this is a passage way across the building opening on the verandah. Here an altar is installed for week-day mass. A sliding door opens into the common reading room which is 55 feet by 35 feet. A writing ledge runs along the exterior wall of this room and a long table in the centre holds a copious supply of magazines, newspapers, etc., etc. Writing paper of excellent quality is furnished free of charge.

Thus far the building has already justified the expenditure which we understand is about \$1200, for it has been constantly used by the boys of the Brigade and often beyond its capacity.

### LATE DESPATCHES FROM THE BATTLEFRONT

As we go to press the following latest despatches, in official bulletins, have been received:

**British Front in France, (via London) July 14**—British troops continue advance in new drive, North of Somme. They have captured the village of Bazentin-le-Petit, north of Longueval.

**Later**—British forces have taken Bazentin-Le-Petit and Bazentin-Le-Grand and Longueval after a fierce struggle around Longueval the British Troncs woods.

**London, July 14**—In the fight around Longueval the British captured many prisoners and two colonels. The hundred British soldiers who had been imprisoned in Troncs woods by Germans and had held out against the uns were rescued this morning's rush.

**Petrograd, July 14**—A serious counter attack was launched by Austrian and German forces yesterday against the Russians West of Strips. The War Office announces that in this region the Russians took 3000 prisoners, 2 machine guns and 19 machine guns.

**Petrograd, July 14**—The forces under Grand Duke Nicolas in the Caucasus have captured the whole line of Turkish fortifications West of Erzerum. Turks are retreating westward.

### The Busy East For June

This number of The Busy East is profusely illustrated with scenic views throughout the beautiful Annapolis Valley and contains in addition, splendid reproductions of two paintings by the famous Canadian artist, John Hammond, R. C. A.
