The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON



I visited a home recently which was decidedly unique in one way, and that was this: There were two as dear children as ever were petted and noticed and admired into ruination of their childish charm, and yet they actually were not the center of attention or anything like it.

They were subordinated to their elders, taught to respect them thoroughly, to obey instantly and to some extent to actually practise that old proverb, "Children should be seen and not heard."

The difference between this and the ordinary household was most noticeable at the dinner table.

In the average household where there are children who are old enough to come to the table with the family, the whole conversation usually centers about the children. Their sallies, which are listened to with rapt attention and receive an unwholesome amount of applause and laughter, admonitions of their table manners and prohibitions as to their diet, are the backbone of the table talk.

In this household, except to ask for something to eat, those children never spoke unless they were spoken to. They ate what was put on their plates—every bit of it, too—listened to the conversation of their elders, and when they had finished murmured their "Please excuse me's," slipped silently

Fads and Fashions.

The very intense blues, greens and purples have a tendency to deaden a white skin so that its pallor becomes almost ghastly.

In the chic semi-princess dresses the new models maintain the slender silhouette and the body-and-sleeve-in-one idea prevails.

The metal and crystal beads are used a great deal, especially with the metal gauzes, and the effect is very splendid and magnificent.

Any color can be veiled with another shade of itself, and white can be used over almost anything—old rose, cerise, canary, blue, salmon.

Delicately colored buttons in soft blues, pinks and purples—known as Dresden—will be used on silks and chiffons, as well as crystal ball buttons.

In the new satins and crepes many of the delicate, intricate designs of the old India shawls are given in contrasting tones by the weave of the material.

Many black velvet dresses are trimmed with three different kinds of lace. Gold and silver laces are frequently combined on satin of delicate colorings.

The combination of two materials still is used by the majority of modistes. With the black and white-striped velvets there is generally used black or white cloth.

A new note in trimming, which is exceedingly simple and yet giving an

Oriental tone of color to the clothes is the use of curious old disks and old gold and silver ornaments.

It is quite noticeable in the newest gowns that the belt is inconspicuous and apparently a part of the soft folds of the bodice, and yet a distinct line between the bodice and the skirt.

Coque feathers in white, tipped with colors, are quite popular on turbans. Big black velvet shawls are either trimmed with plumes or with huge bows of maline or venetian lace. These are worn in the evening.

In combining colors, the brightest shade is almost always veiled with the darker, and if a third color is introduced it is limited to the details of the dress—the sash, the embroidery or the bead trimming.

The sleeves of some of the coats are often finished with a trimming of small buttons suggesting a high cuff. When cuffs are used they are in two extremes, either the high-rolling shape or just a narrow turned back band.

Caps with their full crowns of gold or silver net, their frills about the face and their quaint flower or jewel garniture, are made for wear under hats, the cap frill framing the face coquettishly and softly under a more flaring hat brim.

This is a season of oddly-finished girdles and sashes. They may be of chiffon or net or of tulle, and they are embroidered or spangled with glass and silver or gilt beads. Besides these there are the straight girdles with original knots and bows.

Asquith Upheld.

The probability that Asquith's appeal to the electors on the Lord's Veto Bill would be upheld has been growing daily since the first election returns came in on Saturday night. They are decisive. The Government allies have 152 members returned against Balfour's 147. This is a majority of 5 on 299 seats, and if the results of the remaining 371 seats showed the same mathematical uniformity of gain, this would give the allies a majority of 11 over the Unionists. The outlook, however, is more favourable to Asquith than the figures would indicate, judging by the statement in the news message that these 299 seats give one member more to the coalition groups than they had in the last Parliament from the same constituencies; in other words, Balfour has met with a net loss of one on these 299 seats, and he would have to make a net gain of 83 on the next 371 seats in order to make a tie with the coalition groups.

Numidian in Collision.

Messrs. Shea & Co. received a message yesterday to the effect that the Numidian was delayed in sailing owing to a collision which she had with another vessel on the voyage from Liverpool to Glasgow. She did not sail owing to the effecting of necessary repairs, until Monday and is due here Tuesday next.

BRUCE PASSENGERS.—The S. S. Bruce arrived at Port aux Basques at 7.35 a.m. to-day bringing Mrs. E. Pilot, Mrs. P. Powers, Rev. Mr. T. Henderson, Miss Sears.

The Ingeborg Lost.

Word was received in the city yesterday that the Danish Schr. Ingeborg on a voyage from France to Grange-mouth recently, sprang a leak and was abandoned by her crew who were picked up by a passing steamer and brought into Leith. This vessel was well known here. She ran ashore at Beaverton last year, was towed off and was repaired here. The whaler which towed her off billed for salvage which was disputed and she lay here at Duder's wharf for a long while. Eventually she was laden with seal oil by Bowring Bros. and sailed for Glasgow the past spring.

Trestle Collapsed Under Weight of Train

Sydney, N.S., Nov. 29.—A railway accident which was most peculiar in that its effects were not very much more serious, took place this morning at No. 2 Colliery. No. 3, known as the "small trestle," gave way beneath the coal train, engaged in hauling to the bank, and two men were injured. As the locomotive, which was passing over the trestle about eight o'clock, the men in the cab became aware that the trestle was sinking beneath the weight. If they had stayed by the locomotive they would have been uninjured, but they accepted the warning and jumped. They had before them a fall of twenty-six feet. Charles McCutish, a brakeman, evidently tumbled on some hard object, for his jaw was fractured. The other man injured was Joseph Mullins, foreman of the coal bank, who had an ankle sprained. The men, of course, expected the trestle would collapse completely and that the locomotive and cars would be piled in a confused heap beneath. As luck would have it, however, the trestle did not give way completely, and the locomotive was left hanging by the wheels. It had not been removed at noon. The accident is supposed to have been due to the weakening of the trestle by the recent rains.

"A Rummy Cove."

An old Chelsea bus-driver once gave an amusing description of Mr. Holman Hunt, the well-known artist, who has just died. When he was painting his famous picture, "The Light of the World," it was his custom to work from eight o'clock at night until four in the morning, and then go out for a run before bed. Said the old bus-driver, after giving an account of Carlyle and his methods: "But there is a rummy cove on the first floor round the corner, who has something standing all night at one window, while he sits down at the other, or stands, and seemingly is a-drawing of it. 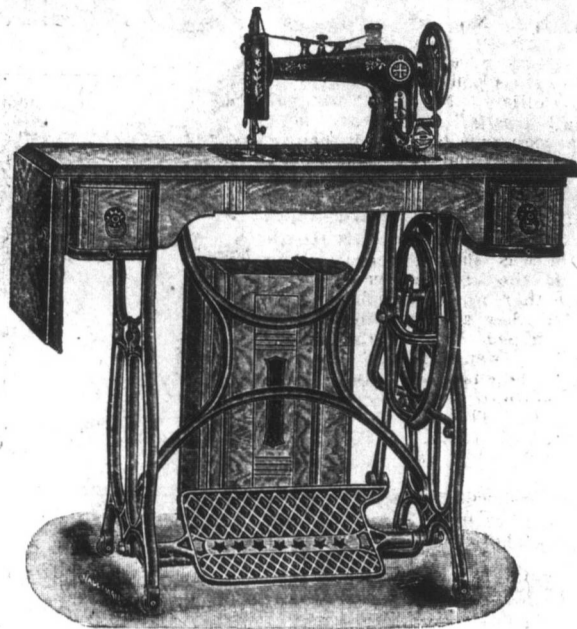
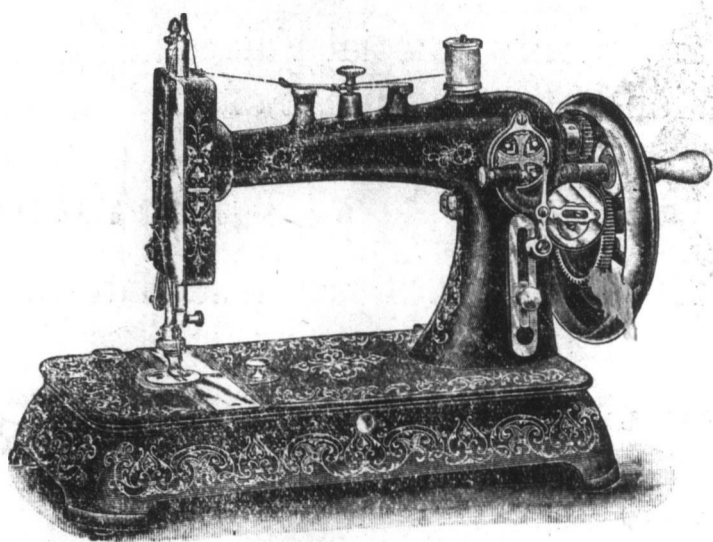

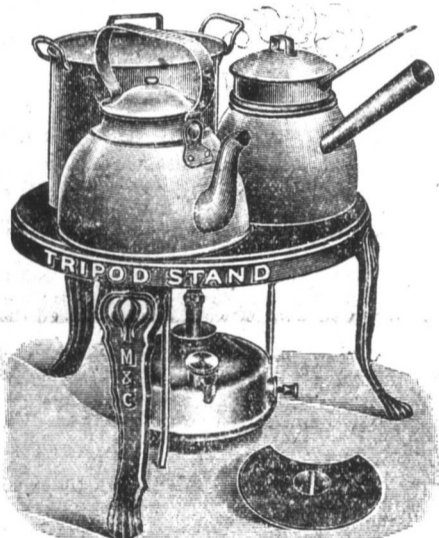

Dogfish Described as Excellent Food.

Interesting Paper on "Sea Mussels and Dogfish as Food." Read Before International Fish Congress at Washington.

Dear Sir.—The enclosed cutting from a Canadian paper contains matter which is particularly worthy of note by our fishermen. It appears that the dreaded dogfish may be made a valuable article of commerce.

At the recent Fourth International Fishery Congress at Washington, Irving A. Field read a paper on "Sea Mussels and Dogfish as Food," from which the following is an extract: The smooth and horned dogfishes constitute another article of food that prejudice is keeping from our tables. Of these I will merely state the results of my investigations. The smooth dogfish is common on our eastern coast, south of Cape Cod during the summer, and as I have shown in a recent paper, is a most destructive enemy of the lobster. The horned dogfish during the summer months has its range north of Cape Cod, where it is exceedingly abundant, and during this season plays havoc with the herring, the mackerel, and other fishing operations. This species, although it has a general resemblance to the smooth dogfish, is easily distinguished by the two horns, one being in front of each dorsal fin. The habits, composition, and food properties of the two species are very different.

The smooth dogfish is a bottom feeder, preying almost entirely upon crabs, lobsters and other crustaceans. It does not run in schools, as does the horned dogfish, which goes in enormous numbers, preying upon the large schools of herring, mackerel, and upon fish caught on the trawler's line.

In composition the flesh of the smooth dogfish is free from oil, resembling most closely the cod. The horned dogfish, on the other hand, contains a large percentage of oil and in this respect most closely resembles the salmon.

From the standpoint of palatability I have good testimony that the fresh smooth dogfish is just as good as flounder, halibut, or any other of the standard food fishes. I have had the fish served several times in various ways at the mess of the Marine Biological Laboratory, at one of the private boarding houses in Woods Hole, Mass., and in a number of private homes. In all cases, whether or not the persons knew what they were eating, favourable comments were made as to the texture and flavor of the fish. Not one adverse criticism was heard. Concerning the flavour of freshly prepared horned dogfish I can not speak from personal experience, but there is abundant testimony that it is as good. The commissioners on fisheries and game of Massachusetts have personally reported its palatability, the lack of odor or "strength" and the good consistency when cooked or canned. They say it closely re-

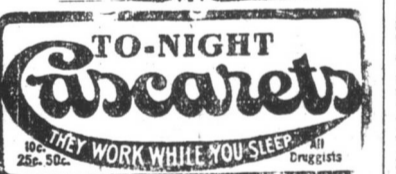
sembles halibut. The horned dogfish has in recent years been exploited in England as a valuable cheap food. A writer in a London paper states that the Plymouth council engaged an expert cook to prepare dogfish for the table with and without sauce, and that the published opinions of those who partook were excellent as to color, flavor, and firmness of the food. Both species are nutritious and boneless and are therefore a safe food for both the young and the aged.

The dogfishes are not only palatable in the fresh condition but are as good as many other fishes when preserved by the standard methods. The horned dogfish being a composition most like the salmon is best adapted for canning and is considered as good as the medium grades of salmon. A packer in Petit de Grat, Cape Breton in 1904, sent me a dozen cans of dogfish he had packed. I passed them around to my friends, who prepared the contents in different ways (fried, scalloped, creamed, etc.) In these forms the canned article was highly praised for flavour and palatability. Samples were also sent to several hotels where the fish was served as "Japanese halibut," and was pronounced most acceptable. An establishment in Halifax has been canning large quantities and putting them on the market labeled "Ocean whitefish." A firm at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island has been successful in selling the canned article as "sea bass."

The smooth dogfish found south of Cape Cod is preserved best by salting and drying according to the same method employed for preparing dry salt cod. The product very much resembles cod, but has the advantage of being boneless. I have had creamed salt dogfish served in the mess hall of the marine biological laboratory to a score or more persons. They all reported that they could detect little or no difference between it and the ordinary salt codfish.

The flesh of the dogfish is apparently just as digestible as that of other fishes, is palatable, nutritious, and easily preserved. The fish are so abundant and easily obtained that they are ridiculously cheap. But prejudice is barring this wholesome food from our menus. People seem more willing to starve than to eat this fish just because it bears the name "dog." The problem now is how to put the fish on the market without an offensive label and at the same time measure the spirit and letter of our pure food law.

The packing of both mussels and dogfish ought to become a large industry. Conditions are good for creating a market for them. They are cheap, wholesome food for the masses and constitute a field of opportunity for the fishermen, the packer and the merchant.

Asquith's Appeal Succeeding.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Dec. 6.

At the close of to-day's pollings the complexion of the House of Commons stood as follows: Government coalition, Liberals, 106; Laborites, 20; Nationalists, 26. Total 152. Opposition Unionists, 147. A situation has been developed which is the result of the close contest of the ranks between the Government coalition parties and the Unionists. The pendulum slowly swings towards the Government to day, and the result of three days voting, in which 239 seats have been filled, gives the coalition one more member than they had in the last Parliament. Up to last night the Unionists had a clear gain of 5. The returns to-night showed that the Unionists had regained St. Helen's from the Laborites. This borough, with the exception of its election, had been Unionist since 1866. The Liberals gained Southwark West, Burnley and Coventry, and the Laborites gained Woolwich and Whitehaven, all from the Unionists; while this morning's return at Sunderland showed that the Liberal candidate Greenwood and Laborite Goldstone had replaced two Unionists. The turning of the tide towards Liberalism is a surprise for Unionists, who counted upon capturing half a dozen seats from the enemy. The greatest surprise was in Coventry, because that is the seat of motor manufacturing. The Liberals hardly expected to win Burnley because the Socialist Hyndman was in the field and hoped to take part of the Labor votes. The Southwark contest was one of the most interesting. E. A. Strauss, Liberal, winning by only 12 votes. In Woolwich, Will Crooks, who was turned out in the last election, recaptured his old seat by a majority of 236. The Unionists distributed their heavy guns at Battersea; but John Burns, President of the Local Government Board again surprised them, bringing up his majority from 555 in the last election to 1292. The Socialist, Shaw, whom Mr. Burns' enemies among the workmen put up in the expectation that he would divide the votes, polled only a handful. John Burns dashed around the constituency in a dog, in an automobile. Sir John Harrington, the Unionist candidate, with his wife followed suit in another. Mr. Burns replied to his friends, "Don't listen to the fine ladies who visit the mean streets only when they want something." Almost everywhere fewer ballots were cast than in the last election. More Liberals than Unionists stayed away from the polls, excluding the districts which changed 18 of the Liberals in 12. The Conservative candidates in London did poorly, none commanding 500 majority, an impressive lesson of the campaign of how strongly British voters are wedded to their parties, how slow they are to break away though the parties change their platforms radically. The newspapers appear exercised over their surprising small influence. Almost all the most important among them and those with the largest circulation championed the Unionist cause, yet they were unable to make material inroads against Liberals and Laborites. The betting on the Stock Exchange before elections was that the coalition majority would drop 65. As the elections progressed, the "long" favored 80, then 90, now it concedes that the Government will have 100 majority.

Supreme Court.

Before Mr. Justice Emerson and Mr. Justice Johnson.

The King vs. Caroline Wells.
After Mr. Browning had read the indictment, the prisoner pleaded guilty, and then made a statement confessing that she had intentionally burnt the house which was insured, but that she did not intend to apply for the insurance money.

Mr. Justice Johnson criticized adversely the admission of a confession of guilt to an indictment framed in old-fashioned terms, which a prisoner evidently did not understand.

Mr. Justice Emerson observed that the prisoner had confessed to burning her house which was insured, and that the law infers under such circumstances that she did it to defraud the insurance company.

Mr. Justice Emerson then sentenced the prisoner to two years, hard labour.

Mr. Justice Johnson concurred with the sentence and the term of punishment, as the law considers that a person who willfully burns an insured house, does it to defraud the insurance company and the court had admitted these facts in her own statement. But he protested against a prisoner's admission of guilt on a arraignment, in answer to an indictment, which an ignorant prisoner does not understand. He would make his protest good in a proper case.

The King vs. Herbert H. Thoms.
On arraignment in answer to the indictment for bigamy, the prisoner pleaded guilty and said he had nothing to say as to the sentence. He was sentenced to two years hard labour, from December 3rd.

The King vs. John R. Dunlop.
On arraignment in answer to the indictment charging him with shooting with intent to murder, etc., the prisoner pleaded not guilty. Mr. W. R. Howley said he appeared for the accused. The Minister of Justice moved that Tuesday be set down for trial, and asked for an extra panel of jurors. Mr. Howley consented. The court ordered it accordingly.

Herring Never So Plentiful.

From Capt. Fitzpatrick, of the Portia, we learn that from Bonne Bay to Placentia Bay he never saw herring so plentiful and of such large size and excellent quality. The waters are literally alive with them. When the Portia was at Bonne Bay 3 American vessels were then on the way, but owing to a fortnight's blow of E. and N. E. winds they could not get into the Gulf. Capt. Joseph Bonis, supervisor of the herring industry for the Gorton Pew Co., has 7 vessels loaded and on their way home from Bay of Islands and Bonne Bay, and he is waiting for 4 others. All the cargoes sent forward to date are salt bulk. Capt. Bonis has all the local schooners and all the stores in Bonne Bay filled with herring which aggregate 4,000 barrels. He has all the salt in the place bought up to cure these fish which will be shipped to Gloucester when the vessels due arrive. Herring in boat loads are taken from the nets night and day. The frost of the last couple of days will enable the herring to be frozen, and the first cargoes cured in this way will be sent forward soon. Capt. Fitzpatrick thinks that business people here and elsewhere in the country are losing a golden opportunity to make good money. Fortune Bay teams with herring of the largest size. The weather is now propitious for freezing them, and several English and other schooners now in this harbor could be chartered and sent there to load the fish which when landed in New York, where herring are in great demand, would command the splendid price of 4 cents per pound. Big profits would be made on such ventures. The herring are as large as the famous Labrador fish which were so much sought after in the early seventies.

At Rencontre three seines are down and in each there are at least 1,000 barrels of herring. The herring are so large that they will not mesh in the ordinary 2 1/2 in. net. An American concern has Critch's schooner of Stone's Cove, chartered and she is loading a salt bulk cargo at Rencontre for Gloucester.

Three American skippers were at Bonne Bay when the Portia was there negotiating with owners of vessels, residents of Burgeo and Belleoram, to charter them to take cargoes of frozen fish to New York. The Captain asserts that the American markets were never so bare of herring before. There is nothing in this line there fit to eat, and what is there has been taken from refrigerators where it had been for nearly three years; in fact it is the refuse of these depositories, so that fresh frozen herring would command ready and remunerative sales. He is assured from what he learned on the coast that the fish landed in New York would average \$8 per barrel.

Great Doings at Carbonear.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Mr. Editor,—Except for the notes of a correspondent to the Daily News, who current report says has discarded the cognomen of "Rambler," we see very little in the Press from this "historic town" of Carbonear.

Seeing that this same "old town" will figure in the public accounts for the current year for such an "abnormal" expenditure of Government monies, I think it is really a shame that all of its worthy scribes have been so lost in admiration or the very breath taken out of them by the "stupendous engineering feats" and "general improvements" which have been effected through the nerve racking and brain worrying of our gentlemanly representative, and the able men, who run the affairs of our town, as not to write a line of commendation.

Why, sir, it did not take those intellectual, up-to-date men any time to modernize this "old town," for without any flourish of trumpets did they not extend the water pipes to the back road up through Captain Frank's lane? And with the same unobtrusive eclat did they not transform the very inferno of darkest night into a blaze of electric light so that even the old age pensioner, after enjoying his full evening meal, which his beneficent Government had provided for him, may enjoy his evening stroll and his pipe of Home Rule as he wanders at the intellect of the men who show such blessings upon the class?

But, Mr. Editor, the feat which eclipses everything of an engineering nature in this country and which excites the wonder of every visitor who detains here, is our breakwater. The forests of the north were dedicated to provide timber for this structure, while the freight trains of the Reid Nfld. Co. were taxed to bring it along, and then the energy and skill of a "steam pile driver" and manipulator were also provided by

the same Reid Nfld. Co. to finish this wonder of engineering skill.

It was affirmed last spring that this structure was only costing \$3,000; but surely such an insignificant amount could not have been so wisely administered as to provide such a boon to the travelling public, while ensuring perfect safety to the line of the Reid Nfld. Co. We have seen big seas roll upon the beach during the past weeks of easterly gales, but not even a spray has been allowed to splash upon the public road, which affords a delightful promenade to the youth of both sides of the harbour; and as they take in big breaths of delightful ozone, they bless the men whose brains conceived the mighty project and the Government which so bountifully provided the funds.

But, Mr. Editor, although this historic town figured so prominently in the Guy Tercentenary, and although so many thousands of dollars have been so willingly devoted to its improvement by our beneficent Government, yet we have some urgent needs, and I cannot desist putting forward our claim to a public building and institution demanded by our very modest neighbour, Harbor Grace.

Our friends of the Second City should be content with their public building, costing \$100,000 to \$150,000, replacing the "shack" built for them by our preceding Government, and their big dock, the cost of which another \$50,000 to \$60,000 is guaranteed by the Government of the day; and, sir, I take exception to the granting of another \$50,000 to \$60,000 to our sister district of Harbor Grace for a "Hospital," even though she has the distinction of being the "Second" City.

The place for this Hospital, sir, is right at the head of our breakwater, where patients could be landed right at the door by train and steamer from all points in this and Trinity Bay, with so little inconvenience and trifling discomfort to patients. And, sir, I have the audacity to demand before our Government allocates this amount for this very necessary institution that it authorize a commission to report upon the best site and take evidence as to which district has the best all round claim; but let the commissioners be perfectly disinterested, and we will forego the distinction of having our representative act as "appraiser." I'll grant this much to Harbor Grace, Mr. Editor, if "Mary's" Tom is promised a job on this Hospital, let him come down here with his tools and I'll give my word that he can boll his kettle on the hole in the forge near the site.

Now, Mr. Editor, no one seems to be able to give any reason why so many of our young men—yes, and many past middle age, too—are going out of the country every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon; but it is a fact that the cars are crowded upon those days with men going away from home even at this time of year.

They are surely not going out of this country to earn money, while our progressive Government with its overworked and magnanimous Premier has done so much with its agricultural, peat, mining and general development policy in establishing so many labour giving enterprises.

Those are not men from our district, Mr. Editor, for our ever-mindful and resourceful representative has been sending our Labrador men logging, which has proved a most satisfactory business, for the men have been so fascinated with conditions as to return by way of the Reid Nfld. Co.

Should Fish in Winter

In a conversation which the Telegram reporter had with Captain Fitzpatrick, of the Portia, after his arrival yesterday, he said that this trip the ship brought down to Rose Blanche and neighbourhood 60 barrels of fresh herring for bait to be used there at the winter codfishery which generally begins with the advent of the first frosty weather, and which by this time should be in full swing. The Captain says, however, that codfish about Rose Blanche and vicinity is scarcer now than for several years past. From Fermeuse to St. John's codfish of large size is abundant, and Capt. Fitzpatrick says that he cannot see any reason why on this stretch of coast the fishery could not be prosecuted all winter, as well as the S. W. section of the island. If men were supplied with trawling outfits thousands of dollars worth of cod could be caught and landed along the Southern Shore, and all that is required is for some of our mercantile men to take the initiative when a new and paying winter industry would result. Each year the fish is there to be caught if sought for, and the same applies to Trepassey and St. Mary's Bays. Fresh herring bait in plenty could be supplied by Fortune Bay or Bay of Islands.

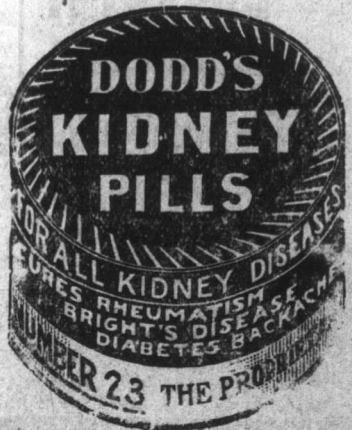




