Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—I wish to heartily endorse the majority of the thoughts expressed in the letter which appeared in this morning's News signed "W. W. W."

The majority of the speakers at the M. C. L. I. debate (which decided almost unanimously against the present system) are fathers of children who are or will be attending our schools,

The answer given by the Hon. R. K. Bishop in the Legislative Council yesterday to questions tabled by Hon. J. A. Robinson are most interesting, especially question No. 8 which shows that the teachers receive a premium for every scholar "passed."

Does this account for much of the "cramming" the ever increasing amount of home lessons which is taxing to the utmost capacity the mental and physical powers of our children, and imposes on the parent the necessity of having to "teach" the lessons and work out problems, so that the teacher may find the children fitted for the daily examination?

I am daily coming in contact with an expression of opinion to the effect that our educational system is entirely wrong. It does not help the average child to know when leaving school just what avocation to take up and follow as his life's work, but develops rather "the machine made" article and which places so many "square pegs" in "round holes."

Trusting that something will be done in this connection when the Bill comes before the Legislative Council. I am, yours, etc.

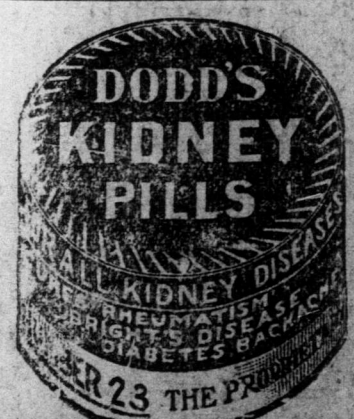

There was a subsidence of the anthracite strike scare to-day, and consequently a falling off of the pressing demand for hard coal from frightened consumers. The belief is gaining ground on both sides that an agreement will be reached, and that if there is a suspension of work on April 1st it will not last long.

BERLIN, March 19. Public opinion has to Churchill's speech has not yet crystallized, but his references to Germany are regarded in many quarters as highly inopportune.

The negotiations which followed on Lord Haldane's trip to Berlin are being continued, but any big hopes of success are gradually fading. The negotiators would now be satisfied, in all probability, if they could achieve no more than a simple removal of the sources of misunderstanding.
