Something is brewing in the East without question, and the nations will be remiss in their duties to their own interests if they fail to take cognizance of the fact.

The question of prohibition is still agitating the country, and there is little question that much difficulty will be found in enforcing the law. The soldiers who are returning from France express great disgust over the dry enactment which was put into force while they were absent from the country. The refusal of Great Britain to allow prohibition advocates to land in that country, has angered the dry organization; and they are now going to China instead. There will be little disturbance in this country on May 1st, according to statements by the labor leaders. America is not yet ripe for Bolshevism, and the day is expected to pass with the usual speech making and nothing more.


