Labor Opposes Intervention.

Russia Receives Moral Support of Winnipeg Workers—French Officers Reorganize Poles—Germany Shows Her Hand—Poles Have Naval Patrol on Vistula—K. of C. Ask For "Republic of Ireland" Recognition.

REORGANIZING POLISH LINES.
BERLIN, Aug. 16. Reorganization of the Polish northern front has been undertaken by French officers according to a despatch from Meschitz Prussia.

TRADE DELEGATION STOPPED.
LONDON, Aug. 16. The Russia Trade Union Delegation which arrived at Reval, Estonia, on July 20th, has not been permitted to proceed on the proposed voyage to England. The International situation is given as the reason.

HUNS AIDING REDS.
PARIS, Aug. 16. A German aerial service has been organized, according to advices to the

French Foreign Office, to supply Russian Soviet states with all military information concerning Polish strategic movements, that the German pilots can gather in flights from East Prussia. It is also reported that huge supplies of munitions and food are being shipped the Russians.

THE TRAIL OF THE HUN.
BERLIN, Aug. 16. The commander of the Soviet division which entered Soldau approximately fifteen miles from Mlava, told the inhabitants that this territory would never again belong to Poland, according to despatches received yesterday. The Polish Burgoemaster fled. The despatches say that citizens are

jubliant and the German flag is again flying over the town.

L. G. AND WRANGEL.
LONDON, Aug. 16. Premier Lloyd George stated in the Commons to-day that the Government had made it clear to General Wrangel that if he further attacked the Soviet forces he must do so on his own responsibility.

POLES ARE WATCHFUL.
WARSAW, Aug. 16. An armored flotilla is patrolling the Vistula river between Warsaw and Thorn to prevent Russian Bolsheviks from crossing the stream in a movement to encircle the city.

TWELVE MILES FROM WARSAW.
LONDON, Aug. 16. Russians are pressing their fight for Warsaw within twelve miles of the capital on the northeast as indicated by Sunday's official statement from Moscow, received to-day.

A BARK FROM AUSTRIA.
VIENNA, Aug. 16. The Workers Council yesterday passed a resolution declaring it would prevent the transit of war material to Poland.

ANY EXCUSE OR NONE.
LONDON, Aug. 16. Workmen in Upper Silesia regard France's recognition of General Wrangel as equivalent to a declaration of war on Russia, and accordingly will refuse to recognize the French representatives in the Plebiscite Commission, contending that they are not neutral, says the Daily Mail's Katowitz correspondent.

L. G. FOR LUCERNE.
GENEVA, Aug. 16. A telegram received at Lucerne from London says that Lloyd George will arrive at Lucerne on Wednesday but his departure depends on the Polish situation.

TRALEE TROUBLES.
DUBLIN, Aug. 16. Four constables were fired on at Tralee, on Saturday and two slightly wounded, and at midnight a newspaper office, military stores and wagons were destroyed by fire.

86 TOO MANY.
NEW YORK, Aug. 16. Miss Laura Brownell made eighty seven loops in the course of an two mile airplane drop yesterday, which is claimed as the world's record for woman.

BOLSHEVISM IN NEW YORK.
NEW YORK, Aug. 16. Services in the Russian Orthodox Cathedral of St. Nicholas were interrupted yesterday by what church dignitaries charged was a Bolshevik attempt to precipitate a riot. Five alleged rioters were escorted from the church before police reached them.

A WINNIPEG PROTEST.
WINNIPEG, Aug. 16. "We vigorously protest against any intervention by the Imperialistic or Canadian Government in Russia," was the essence of a resolution endorsed yesterday by fifteen hundred people who attended a protest meeting under the auspices of various labor organizations here.

CLASSIC TESTS.
ANTWERP, Aug. 16. The classic pentathlon, five tests of

strength and speed and skill, which the athletes of ancient Greece thought showed the measure of man, will be attempted at the Olympic Stadium to-day.

K. OF C. AND IRELAND.
NEW YORK, Aug. 16. Resolutions urging that "the United States recognize without delay the Republic of Ireland" were made yesterday by Supreme Officers of the Knights of Columbus to the Secretary of State, the President of the United States Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Local Yacht Club Willing to Celebrate.

BUT WANTS ASSURANCE OF FINANCIAL SUPPORT.

That the Royal Cape Breton Yacht Club will issue a formal challenge for the America's Cup as soon as the assurance is received from A. C. Ross, of Montreal, that the financial arrangements are completed, was the decision arrived at by the executive of the club at a meeting held on Tuesday afternoon.

Immediately after reaching this decision, F. E. Lucas, commodore of the club, sent a telegram to Mr. Ross telling him of the club's action in the matter. The telegram is as follows:

The executive agrees that a formal challenge will be issued only when the club is assured that satisfactory financial arrangements are completed and are further assured of the cooperation of the yacht clubs throughout Canada.

Commodore Lucas in a statement made to the Record on Tuesday afternoon, said that the members realized that the club, was not in a position to finance the scheme alone, but that they were more than willing to take the matter up for the other yacht clubs of Canada, providing that complete assurances was given that they would get the necessary financial support. "We do not want to commit the club as the matter now stands," said Mr. Lucas.

As the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, the Halifax Club and the Bras d'Or Club are the only clubs in Canada eligible to challenge for the historic yachting trophy of the world, and for which Sir Thomas Lipton has for many years been trying to wrest from the Americans, it will be in the name of either one of these clubs through whom the challenge would go backed by the other clubs of the Dominion. The challenge of Mr. Ross, which has been made to the New York Yacht Club, has already created a great deal of comment both in Canada and the United States, and if the local club should be the club chosen by Mr. Ross to make the challenge, it would mean a big thing for Sydney and Cape Breton.

According to telegrams received by Commodore Lucas from Mr. Ross on Tuesday, the present indications are that the \$1,000,000 required for the undertaking will easily be raised, and he advises the club not to worry about the finances, as all the newspapers of Canada will give their support editorially and otherwise by boosting the project. Mr. Ross also advises that all of the trust companies of Canada will take the money subscribed and disburse it without cost. The local club will await a reply from Mr. Ross, and if the money is forthcoming, a challenge will be issued.—Sydney Record.





Half Yearly Report of Newfoundland Board of Trade.

Your Council have decided to re-peat the note of warning that appeared in their last report, and in their opinion great caution must be exercised during the next year or two if we are to maintain the position we so fortunately occupy to-day. There has undoubtedly been considerable inflation of business and credit, which condition may bring in its train serious difficulties during the period of readjustment, unless all branches of the business community adopt a policy of cautious but sound trading.

The energies of the Board of Trade in general and the Council in particular, have during the past six months been very much occupied in dealing with the Regulations of the Exportation of Codfish. The last annual report contained a synopsis of the events leading up to the issue of the Proclamation providing for the Restriction and Regulation of the Export of Codfish. It will be remembered that at the last annual meeting, it was agreed that a special meeting of Board should be held for the purpose of giving the members an opportunity of expressing their views on the subject of these Export Regulations. This meeting was held on the 5th February, was largely attended and adjourned until the 7th February and again adjourned until the 9th February when the following resolution was passed:—

(a) That the Newfoundland Board of Trade recognize that the Fish Export Regulations are essential; but those now in force do not entirely meet the requirements of the Trade of this country.

(b) It is the opinion of the Newfoundland Board of Trade that the Advisory Board, should if at any time it is essential that the prices are to be adjusted—and supplies regulated—meet the whole body of St. John's Fish Exporters, and as many Outport shippers as possible, and fully discuss the matter and recommend to the Government the necessary alterations.

(c) That the Newfoundland Board of Trade is of the opinion that shippers should have the right of offering their supplies of Codfish direct to the buyer in all markets excepting Italy at present, and Italy as soon as conditions will permit, providing they maintain the prices and regulations set forth.

(d) That the Newfoundland Board of Trade write the Government

requesting them to grant the desires and wishes of the Trade.

The Regulations were very thoroughly discussed at these meetings and it was with much satisfaction that the Council were able to observe the great interest that the members of the Board of Trade were taking in this matter. The Resolutions were duly conveyed to the Government and your Council were able to note with pleasure that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in a speech made by him in the House of Assembly expressed the intention of the Government to accede fully to the desires of the trade as expressed in the resolutions. An Act to regulate the Export of salt Codfish was subsequently passed by the Legislature, which, if properly administered should overcome many objections to the regulations as enforced last season. This Act calls for the appointment of a special Board for the Regulating of the Exportation of Codfish. This Board will consist of seven members, two of whom shall be appointed by the majority of Fish Exporters in general meeting, the others by the Governor in Council. Hon. W. B. Grieve, O.B.E. and R. B. Job, Esq., were elected by the fish exporters as their Representatives on this Board, and those appointed by the Governor in Council are, Joseph Sellars, Esq., G. M. Barr, Esq., J. T. Cheeseman, Esq., M.H.A., all of whom are members of the Board of Trade. There is so far no official information obtainable, as to the form that the regulations will take this season, but as the porters to be held in the first week in September when the Codfish Exportation Board will report on all matters relating to the export of fish for the ensuing season, we presume no definite action will be taken until after this meeting.

During the months of February and March a special Committee was appointed by the Fish Exporters to prepare a scheme for the improvement of the cure and the standardization and the inspection of Codfish. This Committee met on numerous occasions and prepared a series of proposals for the improvements of the cure, inspection and standardization of Codfish. These proposals were submitted to the Commission appointed by the Government, under the Codfish Standardization Act of 1920, and adopted by them without any material alteration. They have now been published throughout the Dominion. It is reported that already, much improvement has been made in the curing of this season's fish, and there is evidence that many of the fishermen are making every effort to carry out the suggestions made for the improvements of the cure.

Since the last annual meeting, the Board of Trade has been conducting an inspection of all Codfish shipped to Brazil. This inspection has been carried out under the supervision of our Secretary, with the assistance of a number of sub-inspectors, and has we believe given satisfaction. The Codfish standardization Commission propose and indeed have decided, that all cargoes and shipments of fish from Newfoundland must be inspected and certificates issued before they can be exported. This inspection is to be carried out under the control of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, and in consequence the inspection by the Board of Trade will not be required in future.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION.

The Council are pleased to note that the Government propose to make a provision for an increased terminal facilities at both ends of the Risd Newfoundland Company Line, and that the Coastal Steamer Service appears to be meeting the present requirements of the Trade.

WATERING VESSELS.

The present and previous Councils have given considerable attention to the improvement of facilities for watering vessels, and the position as it now stands is fully disclosed in a letter received from the Municipal Council, dated the 28th March, reading as follows:—

No. 1.—The Council would request that the owners of each premises shall install water supply, at their own expense, consisting of a 4 hydrant with 2 steam pipe and hose.

No. 2.—The application for water to be as at present, and the water man or a man from the Water Department to be sent to the premises to turn the water on and off.

No. 3.—The water to be turned on by no other person, except by servants of the City Council.

No. 4.—The approximate cost of the installation for each premises is being prepared by the City Engineer. He is interviewing the principals of the firms interested regarding the details.

No. 5.—It is to be understood that if the owner of the premises does not agree to the proposals, the Council will not be able to supply the water to that particular premises.

Your Council approved of No. 1, 2, 3 and 4, but objected to No. 5, which they considered could not be enforced, and thought that the owner of the premises who does not agree to the proposals should get a supply of water as usual.

PORT OF CALL FOR VESSELS GOING TO MEDITERRANEAN.

Shortly after the appointment of Captain Walter Kennedy, as Government Agent at Gibraltar, he reported

to the Department of Marine and Fisheries that in his opinion, much benefit would be derived by owners of vessels and cargoes making Gibraltar a port of call on the passage to the Mediterranean, if a supply of spars, booms and necessary gear, were kept at Gibraltar which would be available for Newfoundland vessels requiring repairs there. The difficulty of obtaining such supplies at that time necessitated the vessels lying in Gibraltar for many weeks. Since Captain Kennedy's return from Gibraltar, he has supplemented his report by a personal statement given at a meeting of Shipowners, called together by your Council. In this report he recommended,

- (1) That Gibraltar should be abandoned as a port of call, and that Malaga should be substituted as such.
- (2) That all vessels making Malaga a port of call on entering the Mediterranean should immediately notify the Government Agent.
- (3) That where possible ship business should be conducted through the Government Agent.
- (4) That a sufficient supply of spars and gear be maintained at the port of call to be available when repairs are necessary for Newfoundland ships.

It was also agreed that a scheme should be prepared for putting into operation Captain Kennedy's suggestion as to vessel supplies.

The meeting of Shipowners, after thanking Captain Kennedy for bringing the matter to their notice resolved,

- (1) That Malaga, and not Gibraltar be made the port of call for orders for vessels bound to the Mediterranean.
- (2) That Masters and Owners should place their interests in the hands of the Government Agent.
- (3) That definite instruction should be given by the Custom Authorities (St. John's), that masters calling at Malaga as a port of call must report to the Government Agent on arrival.

MARCONI WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

During the month of April, Mr. A. H. Morse, Manager of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Co. of Canada, was present in the city negotiating with the Government for an extension of the Wireless Telegraph Service, and during his stay gave a lecture to the members of the Board.

LEGISLATION.

When the House of Assembly was in session, the Council convened a meeting of those interested and made certain recommendations to the Government on the following Bills:—

- (1) The Survey of Foreign going and Labrador vessels.
- (2) The Act to Regulate the Exportation of Codfish.
- (3) The Act to provide for the standardization of Dried Codfish.
- (4) The Act to amend the Business Profit Tax Act.
- (5) The Act respecting the Certificates of Masters and Mates.
- (6) The Act to provide for the bettering of information respecting the Codfishery.

INCREASED WATER SERVICE IN ST. JOHN'S.

The Council are advised that the Government have decided upon the laying of a water main from Long Pond, Petty Harbor, to supply the Lunatic Asylum and Government Sanatorium. It is reported that this service will entail an outlay of from forty thousand dollars and will supply these two institutions only. Your Council think that an expenditure of this magnitude should provide something more than a supply for these two institutions, and that provision should be made to supply, if desired any property within the vicinity of the main with water.

It is also felt that the public should have had an opportunity of considering the proposal for the installation of this service before the scheme was definitely concluded.

Ponzi Has Served Prison Terms.

Previously Convicted in Montreal and Buffalo.

Boston, Aug. 11.—Sensation followed sensation in the Ponzi case today. Charles Ponzi, who recently jumped into notoriety as a spectacular financier, admitted that he was the Charles Ponzi who served terms of imprisonment in Montreal and Atlanta some years ago.

At the moment that he was making a formal confession of his past, the Hanover Trust Company, in which Ponzi was a director, was closed by Bank Commissioner Joseph C. Allen. Mr. Allen declared that the reports of his agents indicated that the Bank was doing business in an unsafe manner. Ponzi resigned from the directorate of the Bank this afternoon.

The admission of Ponzi and the closing of the Trust Company were quickly associated in the minds of hundreds who had been waiting anxiously in the downtown streets for developments that had been hourly expected. A crowd soon gathered in front of the Hanover Trust Company at the corner of Washington and Water Streets, and presently the

street was filled almost to the exclusion of traffic.

Ponzi, who organized the Securities Exchange Company and took in millions for investments from thousands of clients, said in his statement to-day that he took the blame for another person in Montreal. He also insisted that he was still solvent and could pay all notes now outstanding against him.

Fish Regulations and the S. W. Coast.

Under present conditions it is practically impossible to do business on the South and West Coasts, and the mercantile community is so hampered and handicapped by Government control that fish buying in many places has been greatly curtailed, if not stopped altogether. The Telegram is not a preacher of blue ruin, but no sane person can remain unappreciative of an unprecedented situation such as exists in some of the Western Districts. Everybody is uneasy: Shippers and fishermen alike regard the prevalent state of affairs as verging upon ultimate disaster. The whole system is tied up because of the difficulties thrown in the path of exporters, and the trade of the West Coast is in danger of being utterly destroyed. Notwithstanding all the protestations of the Government Press to the contrary, the Fish Export Regulations constitute a restraint of Trade. When regular exporters are not permitted to ship their cargoes unless they submit to annoying formalities, detrimental to their prospects, and this by Act of Parliament, it is a restraint of trade. By this restraint neither fishermen nor suppliers are profiting. The former cannot dispose of their catch, because the latter will not buy, and the reason why is that the conditions imposed do not allow them. Under such conditions it is any wonder that the Fishing Industry on the West Coast is almost paralyzed. The chafing restrictions under which new fish cannot be exported to Europe until all the old stocks on the market and in Newfoundland have been cleared out, are very disturbing to West Coast shippers, who are ready in June for the export of new fish. Thus there is created another restraint of trade.

There may not be any cause for alarm, but there is cause for great uneasiness. Notwithstanding that a section of the Government press says that the situation is daily improving, there are evidences that this—unfortunately—is not so. We wish that it were correct, but first-hand testimony completely disproves the inspired statement of the Advocate on Saturday. This paper editorially commenting on the situation existing on the West Coast announces that "all cargoes on the West Coast have been dispatched, and outright sales made in each case." Doubting that ex parte statement the Telegram yesterday wired Burgeo and Grand Bank firms asking them if this were so. The Burgeo wire was sent via Anglo; that to Grand Bank by the Postal-Telegraphs. Promptly came back the answer from Burgeo signed by one of the principal exporters there—original of which message can be seen at this office—and reads as follows: "All vessels in this vicinity tied up. No outright sales effected so far as we know."

"Conditions serious. Fish deteriorating and business at a standstill. We have received cable from Lind and Couto, Oporto, as follows: "We cannot guarantee 75/70 shillings, that price being positively unobtainable. New Norway fish selling at 69/70 shillings and a further large quantity expected. Our stores bare of British fish and want supplies. Have requested Coaker to allow you to dispatch parcel for sale at best possible price without guarantee. We, for our part, will guarantee to obtain the utmost market value."

That is the situation at Burgeo and vicinity, and extends throughout the districts of Burgeo and LaPoile and Fortune Bay. Similarly it exists in Burin. In the face of such a condition, how can the Advocate truthfully declare that all cargoes from the West Coast have been dispatched on outright sales; and how can it defend its argument that "West Coast shippers stand to gain considerably as a result of the Regulations." Up to the time of writing, no reply has been received from Grand Bank, but we doubt not that Burgeo is an epitome of the whole West Coast.

The Railway Commission

Operations to be Under Their Control. The following announcement is reprinted from the Evening Advocate, of yesterday, the official organ of the Government: "The Government has completed arrangements with the Reid Newfoundland Company respecting a Commission to operate the railroad and steamship service of the company. The Government has appointed Hon. W. F. Coaker and Mr. T. A. Hall, Government Engineer, to represent the Government on the Commission. A third Government Commissioner will be appointed later. It is the intention of the Government to secure the services of a professional railroad operator competent to become the general manager of the system and he may become the third commissioner. The Reid Newfoundland Company has appointed Messrs. H. D. Reid, R. G. Reid and J. P. Powell as the Reid Newfoundland Company's Commissioners. It has been agreed that no salary as Commissioner is to be paid Hon. W. F. Coaker, Messrs. H. D. Reid and R. G. Reid, each having agreed to serve as a Commissioner without salary. The Commission will hold its first meeting this afternoon when a chairman will be selected. The railway and steamship system of the Reid Newfoundland Company will therefore be operated by the above Commission for a period ending June 30th, 1921."

Archbishop at Odein.

COMPLETES VISITATION OF PLACENTIA BAY. ODEIN, via Argentinia, Aug. 15. His Grace Archbishop Roche with Fathers McGrath, Rawlins and Savin, arrived at Odein on Sunday afternoon. A splendid reception waited His Grace and party. Rev. Fr. Deo, the pastor, met them in his motor boat before entering Odein. Confirmation was administered to over 100 candidates. The first sod on the site of the new Presbytery was turned and the location for the building blessed by His Grace. The beautiful church has under gone extensive repairs on the outside, and the new Presbytery will be added to the buildings comprising the church plant. The Archbishop thanked the people for their very cordial reception and urged the importance and necessity of co-operation with their pastor in matters of church and schools in the parish. The people of Odein are well known for their excellent qualities, especially their devotion to the church at all times. Now that their new pastor, Fr. Deo, who has all his energies and time for the benefit of the parish, the new Presbytery will soon grace the beautiful site selected by the Archbishop. The party left again for Argentinia the same evening. This completes the visitation of Placentia Bay.—Com.

Police Court.

A resident of Torbay, at the instance of Head Constable Byrne, was charged with having in his possession a quantity of liquor contrary to Section 4 of the Prohibition Act. Mr. H. A. Winter appeared for the Crown and called Head O'Neill, who deposed to seeing the defendant with his horse and express on New Gower Street on August 2nd and having a conversation with him. He thereupon searched the wagon and found in a box under the seat three full bottles of liquor and one empty bottle; the defendant claiming that he had purchased them at the Controllers and at Stafford's. He then took the bottles to the lockup and visited defendant's house, where with Head Byrne and Constable O'Neill a search was made and some liquor found. One room that was locked had to be entered from the outside of the house with the aid of a ladder. Two jars and two bottles were found in this room. Two days after the seizure the defendant told the police that his statement about buying the liquor from the Controllers was wrong and that the liquor had been purchased from a man at the Long Bridge. Mr. Higgins in cross-examination elicited the fact that the information came from Constable O'Neill, and that the seizure was made because it was supposed that the liquor was being sold. The evidence of the assistant Government Analyst was given, but His Honor, wishing to have the evidence of the person who made the analysis, the case was postponed until Thursday at 10.30.

Exporting Ore to England.

The Dominion Iron and Steel Co. is undertaking the sale of Bell Island ore in the European market. Arrangements have been made for the shipment of some 24,000 tons to Middleburg, England. A 6,000 ton cargo steamer is at present en route to Sydney for the first shipment, and three others will follow. Heretofore the Dominion Company used all the ore mined, at their own plant, in the manufacture of steel.

For Workmen's Homes.

Thirty new baths which will be installed in the new houses now in course of erection on Merrymount Road, arrived yesterday. The work of building is going on apace and some of the houses will likely be ready for occupancy about the end of September, or perhaps earlier.

Epworth League Picnic.

The Wesley Epworth League has arranged to hold a picnic on the Southside Hills to-morrow (Wednesday) 18th. Members are asked to provide in the usual way, and will meet at the church at 2.30 p.m. A programme of sports and games which will make the evening enjoyable has been provided.

Big Three Want to Control Fish Market.

PROBABLE TROUBLE AHEAD.

At the meeting of the Advisory Board held last evening the prices of fish for Greece and Portugal, but not for Italy or Spain were settled. Brazilian conditions remaining unchanged. Mr. G. M. Barr at the meeting was anxious to have, Hawes handle the Italian situation, but it appears that Mr. Coaker does not seem inclined that way, the former gentleman seeing perfection in Hawes, the latter, Mr. Coaker appearing to have had enough of him. Mr. Coaker is inclined to handle the Italian market himself, selling all the fish to the Consorzio and charging the owners of the cargoes no commission. In conversation with a fish merchant on the above facts he said he was of the opinion that should the Big Three effect sales to the Consorzio of their own fish it is probable that they will repeat the tactics of last year and reduce the sale price. It is very evident that Mr. Coaker is top dog. The Brazilian conditions remaining unchanged, as a result of the embargo placed on the Brazilians by this silly enactment, it will be the end of November before they will get a meal of our succulent new codfish, at which time it will have lost considerable of its flavor and its quality will be impaired. As there will be few buyers of codfish this fall an effort will be made to induce the Banks to increase the limit price of their advances, and enable the trio to handle half the catch of the country on their own terms.



MILLEBAND SPEAKS.
 PARIS, Aug. 16.
 Any differences between the Allies, relative to the policies they will follow, have no influence upon their cordial relations, said Premier Millerband at Le Quesnoy town, in the devastated region, which the Premier visited on Sunday, "Divergencies of views," he declared, "are quite natural, even between the Allies, but they do not weaken the reciprocal deep esteem or the conviction that the maintenance of their Allies for Entente nations, is the moral duty and necessity of the hour. However painful are certain comments, when these divergencies become marked, at the same moment it is realized that next day the Allies will walk hand in hand toward the same purpose, which is the reign of liberty and justice."

BATTILING FOR WARSAW.
 WARSAW, Aug. 16.
 Fighting at various points on the Warsaw front is reported in to-night's official communique. Radzimin, northwest of the capital, is again in Polish hands, after an all day fight. The Russians attacked on both sides of Radzimin, at Zegzezi, and at Okuniew, less than fifteen miles due east of Warsaw.

NOT INCLINED TO GIVE WAY.
 LONDON, Aug. 16.
 Premier Lloyd George, replying to a question in the House of Commons today, concerning Labor's ultimatum against war on Russia, declared that any attempt to dictate the policy of the Government or Parliament by industrial action struck at the root of the democratic constitution of the country, and would be resisted by all the forces at the Government's disposal.

CLOUD BURST AT TOLEDO.
 TOLEDO, Ohio, Aug. 16.
 Damage, estimated at five millions of dollars, was done here to-day by a severe rainstorm, which floated away great stretches of the city having flooded cellars and paralyzed traffic. It was one of the most severe storms that ever struck the city and district.

JUST TO SHOW THEY COULD.
 DUBLIN, Aug. 16.
 Thirty armed men, after a strenuous avoiding the military guard, raided the Dublin Custom House. They went through the buildings and left in a few minutes without taking anything. The hail porter was made to face the wall by one of the raiders while the remainder hurried through the buildings or acted as sentries. The object of the raid had not developed to a late hour.

BOLSHEVIKS HAVE WARSAW.
 LONDON, Aug. 16.
 Russian Soviet troops have entered Warsaw, the Polish capital, according to the Kovno, Lithuania, correspondent of the London Times. The dispatch says the staff of the fourth Bolshevik army entered Warsaw Sunday.

NEGOTIATIONS PROCEEDING.
 LONDON, Aug. 16.
 An announcement that the Polish and Russian armistice and Peace delegates had met at Minsk, was made by Earl Curzon, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in the House of Lords to-day. Negotiations were doubtless proceeding, he added.

BY MAJORITY VOTE.
 WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 16.
 Eighty-three per cent. of the members of the Street Railwaymen's Union have voted to join "One Big Union," according to an announcement to-day by C. Tannen, President of the Union.

U.S. ATHLETES AHEAD.
 ANTWERP, Aug. 16.
 Track and field teams of the United States continued to gather honors in the second day of the seventh Olympiad. It outclassed all other nations combinations, but its members were not strong enough, individually, to win all first place honors, particularly in the classic pentathlon, in which the Finnish star, Lethonen, proved to be the best all round athlete. In addition to the United States scoring the greatest number of points, the only world's record of the day was made by Frank Loomis, of Chicago, in the four hundred metre hurdles, with fifty-four seconds flat, a full second better than the time made by C. Bacon in the London Olympic. In other events of heats before the semi-finals in eight hundred metre run, all United States contestants retained their places, but it was generally conceded that a South African, B. G. Rudd, was a sure first in the final.

PARLIAMENT ADJOURNED.
 LONDON, Aug. 16.
 The House of Commons to-night, without division, agreed to the motion of Bonar Law, Government leader, and adjourned the House until October 19th, but empowering the Speaker to summon Parliament earlier, should public interest demand it. This, and Mr. Bonar Law's undertaking that in the event of Russia's armistice terms to Poland being materially altered, the Government would take no action without consulting Parliament, meets the Opposition's objections that the country should not be committed to any intervention against Russia without the consent of Parliament. Bonar Law confirmed that the armistice terms to Poland, as announced by Russia, had the approval of both Great Britain and Italy, and said that if they were sincerely adhered to, Great Britain would not interfere between Poland and Russia. Paragraphs in the newspapers recently, considered by some to have been inspired, had led the public to expect some new developments of the policy toward Ireland by the Premier or Bonar Law, on lines of dominion home rule, but this expectation met with disappointment. Lloyd George confined himself to repeating his previous offer that the Government would discuss settlement with any representative of Irish opinion, not excluding Sinn Feiners, provided they accept three stipulations, which he carefully defined, viz., that Northern Ulster's six counties must be treated separately; that there must be no secession, directly or indirectly of any part of Ireland from the United Kingdom and that the Government could not agree to anything that would involve any detraction from the security of the British Isles or of their safety in case of war. This guarded statement, although announcing no new policy, will probably be interpreted as an intimation to continue outside discussions of dominion settlement, which have made such unexpected progress recently, and enlisted support in hitherto antagonistic quarters.

He declared the court illegal, and those taking part were subject to arrest under "Irish Republic" laws.

COMING TO NEWFOUNDLAND.
 HALIFAX, Aug. 17.
 Gilbert Scott, grandson of the famous English architect, Sir Gilbert Scott, leaves here to-day for Newfoundland to superintend construction of the new Tower of the Anglican Cathedral, originally planned by Sir Gilbert.

Raiding Turnip Fields.
 Farmers are complaining of the raid being made on their turnip patches by boys and young men. The taking of a turnip or two is not complained of but it seems that when a raid is made dozens of small turnips are pulled up and discarded. One farmer in particular after a raid on Sunday night last lost what would be 3 barrels of turnip in this way. He has since placed a dog's house in his turnip patch and so far no further raids have been made.

Through Canadian Eyes

(By J. R. Smallwood, Halifax Herald.)
Hot Weather!

Halifax, in common with all Eastern Canada, has been "enjoying" hot weather during the past three days. On Sunday it was above 80 in the shade; on Monday it was 83 in the shade, and yesterday it was 86. Most people who were not compelled to be at work spent their time in trying to keep cool, and every resort was filled. Silver Sands, Cow Bay, was dotted thickly with bathers, while on North West Arm hundreds enjoyed a cool breeze, canoeing.

Building New Hotel.

Halifax is shortly to have another new hotel—this time a million and a half dollar one. At present there are several hotels—the Halifax, Queen, Carleton, Prince George and others. The fact that another is deemed necessary is eloquent of the growing prosperity of this city. In Halifax one beholds an inspiring example for St. John's. St. John's should have a tourist traffic twenty times as great as that of Halifax, and would have, were it not for the lack of sufficient accommodation. If there is one thing that an American or a Canadian tourist or traveller demands it is good hotel accommodation, and it is a waste of time to expect him to go where that accommodation is not.

\$1,000,000 For Paving.

The city of Halifax at the beginning of this year allocated \$1,000,000 to be spent in paving streets. Last year an enormous sum was expended and next year another will be spent. By then practically every street in Halifax will have been paved. The paving is of asphalt, with brick paving for the reception of street car rails. The street car line was extended several miles this summer, and it is now proposed to extend it some more.

Trying to Force New Election.

In Manitoba the political situation is a rather unique one. The recent election there gave the government a bare majority, and now it is having the time of its life trying to keep itself a government. In opposition are Laborites, Farmers and Independents. The latter are combining to make things hot for the government and thereby force another election, in which case the Laborites and Farmers would combine and go to the country together. That they would sweep everything before them seems, from all indications, to be likely. The Winnipeg Free Press, which is not a Labor nor a Farmer paper, admits the fact. That is significant. Still, one can never tell what may happen.

An Extraordinary Distinction.

Four men in the world to-day, besides the native ones, are chiefs of the six-Indian tribe of Indians at Brantford, Ontario. They are: the King, the Governor General of Canada, the Prince of Wales and—Labor Mayor! He is Mayor M. McBride, of Brantford, where he is head of the City Council, and a member of the Ontario Legislature. He was made a chief by the Iroquois Indians as a mark of their appreciation of a service which he had rendered them. He went through the same ceremony as the Prince did on his recent tour of Canada. Mayor McBride was in Halifax during the late election, and helped the Independent Labor Party in its campaign. The writer met him there, and heard from himself the story of the chieftainship.

Nova Scotia's Apple Crop.

The Annapolis Valley apple crop this year will be over 1,000,000 barrels. Though this will be 600,000 barrels below last year's bumper yield, experts say that the quality will be unusually excellent; some go as far as to say that the quality will make up in value for the loss in quantity. There is a big crop of small fruits over all Canada. In New Brunswick, however, the apple crop is only about 50 per cent. of last year's, and there is no advantage in quality to offset the loss in quantity.

Archbishop Was Hurried Into London in Darkness.

London, August 10. — (Canadian Press)—Archbishop Daniel J. Mannix, of Australia, who was landed yesterday at Penzance by a British destroyer, which had taken him from aboard the White Star liner Baltic, off the Irish coast, arrived here at 6 o'clock this morning.

There were only a few reporters and a handful of priests present to greet the Archbishop, but a heavy police guard was maintained about the station.

There were no untoward incidents. A less impressive welcome for Archbishop Mannix could hardly have been staged than that which greeted him when he arrived at Haddington station.

Only the late editions of last night's newspapers published the fact that he had landed at Penzance and was coming to this city.

Therefore only a few knew that he was to arrive at an early hour to-day. Even the priests were not allowed to greet the Archbishop until he had passed the barriers into the station proper. Here the police had some difficulty in handling even such a small crowd, as nearly every one insisted on kneeling before the Archbishop and kissing his hand.

Efforts of those who took Archbishop Mannix from the station to evade the public seemed to lend strength to statements of Irishmen that the Australian prelate will attempt to go to Ireland, notwithstanding the government's mandate that he shall not.

He was first led to the subway platform and then suddenly hurried into an automobile into which his luggage had been placed. He was driven to the home of a priest in the suburbs.

Archbishop Mannix declined to say whether he had any plans for the immediate future, and would not disclose what he intended to do during his stay in England.

Rules and Regulations

RELATING TO THE STANDARDIZATION OF CODFISH; MADE UNDER AND BY VIRTUE OF THE ACT ENTITLED "AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE STANDARDIZATION OF CODFISH" PASSED 1920.

1. All fish purchased from the fishermen by any Exporter or buyer, whether in St. John's or in the Outports, shall be bought subject to a cull, to be applied according to the standards hereinafter set forth; provided however that at the following places, or such other places as shall be specified from time to time by public announcement in THE ROYAL GAZETTE:—Namely, Lead Cove, Brownsdale, Sibley's Cove, New Melbourne, Ladle Cove, Doting Cove, Musgrave, Lumsden, Cape Island, Wadhams, Peckford's Island, Holyrood, St. Mary's, Peter's River, Branch, St. Vincent; fish may be purchased on a talqual basis.

2. The standards upon which fish shall be culled are as follows:

SUB-SECTION (1) SHORE FISH

(a) PRIME OR EXTRA NUMBER ONE MERCHANTABLE

Sound Fish over 18 inches in length from crux of tail to base of the nape;

1. Having white napes,
2. Of even surface,
3. Thoroughly clean on back and face,
4. Not showing blood or liver at napes or blood at sound bone,
5. Not showing salt on the face, and
6. Split to crux of tail.

(b) MERCHANTABLE

Sound Fish under 18 inches and over 10 inches from crux of tail to base of nape being

1. Of even surface,
2. Thoroughly clean back and face,
3. Not showing blood or liver at nape, or blood at sound bone,
4. Not showing salt on the face,
5. Split to crux of tail.

(c) NUMBER TWO QUALITY

Any fish not passing as Extra Number One Merchantable, or Merchantable, but not being broken, sunburnt, slimy, dun, or very rough in appearance.

(b) WEST INDIA:—

Fish that is broken, sunburnt, slimy, or dun.

NOTE:—Talqual shall include all grades of dry fish except West India.

All Shore Fish must be thoroughly hard dried to pass as dry fish of any grade. Pickled fish must not be mixed with dry salt bulk fish, but will be graded on same standards as dry salt bulk fish.

SUB-SECTION (2) LABRADOR AND STRAITS FISH

(a) NUMBER ONE LABRADOR

Fish shall be split to the crux of the tail, washed from the knife and free from blood stains, clots, liver and gut. It shall be firm, thoroughly salted and well-pressed. It shall be washed out of salt bulk by hand. All slub and slime shall be removed from back. The fish shall be dried sufficiently to stand shipment without loss in weight.

(b) NUMBER TWO LABRADOR

Fish not passing as Number One, but not being broken, sunburnt, dark in appearance or consisting of rock cod shall be graded as Number Two quality.

(c) LABRADOR CULLAGE

Fish that is broken, sunburnt, dark in appearance, or consists of rock cods shall be graded as Cullage.

SUB-SECTION (3) SOFT CURED HEAVY SALTED NEWFOUNDLAND CODFISH

Soft Cured, Heavy Salted, Newfoundland Codfish shall be culled by the same standards as are applicable to Labrador.

3. The prices paid by the buyers whether in St. John's or the Outports for the various qualities as set forth in Section 2 hereof shall be regulated in the following manner:—

(a) SHORE FISH

There shall be paid for Prime or Extra Number One Merchantable a sum equal to 50c. per quintal more than that paid for Merchantable Fish; and there shall be paid for Merchantable Fish a sum equal to \$1.50 per quintal more than that paid for Number Two Quality; and there shall be paid for West India Quality a sum equal to \$5.00 per quintal less than that paid for Number Two Quality.

In places where, by virtue of Section 1 hereof fish may be purchased on a Talqual basis the price paid shall be \$1.00 per quintal less than the current price paid for Merchantable Quality.

(b) LABRADOR AND STRAITS FISH

There shall be paid for Prime Number One Labrador or Straits Fish a price equal to \$1.50 per quintal more than that paid for Number Two Quality of Labrador or Straits Fish, and there shall be paid for Cullage a price equal to \$5.00 per quintal less than paid for Number Two Quality Labrador or Straits Fish.

(c) HEAVY SALTED SOFT CURED NEWFOUNDLAND CODFISH

There shall be paid for Prime Heavy Salted Soft Cured Newfoundland Fish a price equal to \$1.50 per quintal more than the price paid for Number Two Quality Heavy Salted Soft Cured Newfoundland Fish.

4. All Exported Fish from Newfoundland and Labrador shall be inspected by a duly qualified inspector or inspectors, who shall be appointed by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Their duties shall be to inspect the quality of all cargoes or shipments, to issue certificates, specifying the grades and qualities of the fish inspected, to inspect the manner in which the fish is packed and stowed and to inspect the manner in which the cargoes are stowed and the vessels' holds dunnaged.

5. The Inspector or Inspectors shall report upon any cargo so inspected to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, who shall then cause a certificate to be issued, specifying the Grades, qualities of the cargo or shipment, or may refuse such Certificate, where in their opinion the cargo is not of a quality suitable for the market to which the cargo is to be shipped, or where the cargo is not stowed, packed or prepared in such a manner as will in their opinion permit of its arrival at destination in a sound condition.

6. The Certificate of Inspection shall be in the following form:—

Department of Marine and Fisheries.

Issued by Authority of the Codfish Standardization Commission appointed under the Fish Standardization Act, 1920.

CERTIFICATE OF INSPECTOR.

This is to certify that the undermentioned fish has been packed in or loaded on board the _____ at the port of _____ by Messrs. _____ under Codfish Export License No. _____ under the supervision of duly appointed Inspectors and is of the undermentioned qualities and suitable for shipment to _____

Grade or Grades of Fish	Quantity of each Grade	Packed in or loaded on board	Marks

Secretary of Codfish Standardization Commission _____ Inspector. _____ Sub-Collector of Customs. _____ 1920

and shall be attached to the Bill of Lading covering any shipment of Codfish.

7. The Codfish Standardization Commission shall from time to time lay down such standards of grade and quality for the various markets as in their opinion seems advisable and all shipments shall be prepared in accordance with the standards so laid down.

8. The standards of quality for Shore Fish shall until further order be as follows:

BRAZIL

Quality. Number One. Light Salted Shore Fish, sound, irregularly salted and split, generally known as Madeira.

Size. Up to 18 inches.

Dryness. Must be thoroughly well dried and hard.

ITALIAN

Quality. No. 1—Prime light salted, sound Merchantable Fish; well split, of even surface, clean, white, or yellow in colour.

Size. Small, 12 to 18 inches; Large Small, 17 to 20 inches.

Dryness. Must be thoroughly well dried and hard.

No. 2.—Similar to No. 1 in Quality and Size, but not so regular in splitting, salting and colour.

SPANISH

Quality. Thick, Prime, Sound Merchantable Fish, yellow or golden colour, well split, light salted, of even surface.

Size. Small, 12 to 17 inches; Medium, 17 to 22 inches; Large, 22 inches up.

Dryness. Not too dry—"young" (that is to say soft and freshly cured) fish preferred. No. 2.—Similar to No. 1 in Quality and Size, but not so regular in splitting, salting or colour.

NOTE:—The requirements of this Quality are very small.

LISBON

Quality. Light salted, sound Merchantable fish, well split, of even surface, clean, white or yellow in colour, of medium thickness.

Size. Small, 10 to 17 inches; Medium, 17 to 22 inches; Large, 22 inches up.

NOTE.—Cargoes shipped consist of two-thirds small and one-third large and medium. No. 2.—Similar to Number 1 in size, but not so regular in splitting or salting. Fish having salt showing on face not objected to.

Dryness. Must be well dried.

OPORTO

Quality. Light salted, sound Merchantable Fish, well split, of even surface, clean, white or yellow in colour, of medium thickness.

Size. Small, 12 to 17 inches; Medium, 17 to 22 inches; Large, 22 inches up.

NOTE.—Cargoes should consist of two-thirds large and medium, one-third small. No. 2.—Salty fish of same size as No. 1 quality.

Dryness. Must be well dried.

NOTE.—All qualities, sizes over 18 inches, to be white naped.

9. The standards of quality for Labrador Fish shall until further orders be as follows:—

LABRADOR. Same qualities for all markets.

No. 1 Fish. Fish to be split to the crux of the tail, washed from the knife, free from blood stains, clots, liver and gut. To be firm, thoroughly salted and well pressed. To be washed out of salt bulk by hand. All slub and slime to be removed from back. To be dried sufficiently to stand shipment.

No. 2 Fish. Fish not complying with these requirements to be classed as Number 2 quality and to be stowed in such a manner in the vessel as to form a distinct part of the cargo.

10. Shore fish cured in Labrador style shall be known as Heavy Salted, Soft Cured Newfoundland Codfish and shall be shipped only as such. The standards of quality shall be the same as in the case of Labrador.

11. Any fisherman or vendor of fish or any person acting as agent or on behalf of such fisherman or vendor who interferes with an Inspector or obstructs him in any way in the performance of his duties under Regulations 4, 5 and 6, shall be guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$50.00, or in default imprisonment for fifteen days.

12. Any exporter or purchaser of fish or any person acting as agent or on behalf of such exporter or purchaser who interferes with an Inspector or obstructs him in any way in the performance of his duties under Regulations 4, 5 and 6, shall be guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a fine of not less than \$100.00 and not exceeding \$250.00, or in default imprisonment for thirty days.
