Lord Esher's Disclosures

Lord Esher's book "The Pomp of Power," though wrong-headed in its contempt for the civil or political power in warfare, has proven important not only because of its own revelations, but those which it has elicited from others. It has impelled Lord Beaverbrook, who was the chief agent in the formation of the Asquith-Bonar Law Coalition of 1915 to make revelations too. Lord Esher cherishes a special dislike for Beaverbrook and for his course in surrounding himself with Canadians when placed in charge of the Ministry of Information. Among the secrets that Beaverbrook has disclosed is that it was so much the shell campaign of Lord French, which brought about re-contraction and coalition, as differences between Winston Churchill, at that time First Lord of the Admiralty, and Lord Fisher, First Sea-Lord. Bonar-Law learned through an anonymous letter that Fisher was about to resign and at once went to see Lloyd George to find out if this were true. On confirmation, he and Lloyd George walked over to see Asquith and suggested a Coalition in order to reassure the public—an offer which was gratefully accepted. As A. A. Baumann ("A Truthful Tory") points out in "Truth," this was as it should have been at the outset of the war. In July 1914 the Asquith cabinet had temporized for days on the question of whether Britain should support France in the event of war, and only decided on action after Bonar-Law and Lord Lansdowne in a joint communication written in behalf of the Unionist party pledged support of the opposition to any war measures the Government might adopt. Bonar-Law seems to have been the real man of the hour, though he modestly effaced himself for months.

It may be that Lord Esher had not read the books of Hindenburg and Ludendorff when he wrote "The Pomp of Power" for he seems to assume that the attrition policy of Joffre, Robertson and Haig accomplished little, whereas the Germans reluctantly admit that it accomplished a great deal. But in the latter period of the war brought to the front soldiers like Foch and Pétain, Wilson and Byng, who had more dash and initiative and accomplished results that the war of attrition could not have brought about.

In his commentary on Lord Esher's book Mr. Baumann asks, "By the way, can a country be called civilized which objects to entrusting the command to a general because he is known to be a bad Frenchman?" Yet this is what happened in France, when British and the urgent advice of Sir Henry Wilson suggested Foch for the supreme command. Incredible as it appears an influential party in the French Chamber wished to give the chief command to General Sarrail—an utter failure at Salonica—because he was supposed to be a sounder Republican than Foch. Clemenceau was so far impressed by the arguments of his anti-clerical friends, that he actually offered the supreme command to Sarrail. The latter refused to accept, save on one condition, the release of his old political leader and the head of the Anglophobes of France, Caillaux. This was too much for Clemenceau, who shortly retired Sarrail from his command. It is well that it was, for Britain would never have consented to place her armies under the command of an incompetent political general like Sarrail. New light is thrown on Caillaux, by Lord Esher. He was not an active traitor but at the time the war broke out a pro-German, who stuck to his theory that an alliance with Germany against Britain was the true policy for France. The charges that he tried to assist Germany after the outbreak of the war are regarded as unfounded.

It will be many a long day before we know the whole truth about the war; but these disclosures show how little contemporary humanity knows about the small and concealed events which shape their history.—Saturday Night, Toronto.

RUSSIAN SOVIET SEIZE BRITISH STEAMERS.

Troops From Halifax Guard Cape Breton Mines -- Imposing Funeral For Arthur Griffith -- French Cabinet Sustains Poincare -- Americans Purchasing Coal From Britain.

A CASE'S BELL.
LONDON, Aug. 16. A view of reports confirming the recently reported seizure by the Russian Soviet authorities of four British steamships at Batum, engaged in carrying oil from the Caucasus, the British Government is making further representations for release of these vessels, it is learned to-day.

TROOPS TO PROTECT PROPERTY.
SYDNEY, Aug. 16. Nova Scotia is still in the grip of the coal mine tie-up with no hope expressed by any responsible source that the strike will end as suddenly as it commenced. Troops are now on the way from Halifax, and due in the strike area at noon, fully equipped to protect mine property at all costs, but no acts of the strikers to date appear to justify their presence. There are some reports of obstructing attempts made by mine officials to man the pumps and safety apparatus.

BRITISH COAL FOR U.S.A.
NEW YORK, Aug. 16. Five vessels laden with British coal reached here to-day with 20,000 tons consigned to railroads, and public utilities at New York City. Several hundred thousand tons are now on the high seas enroute to the Atlantic Coast, reports from dealers said.

FUNERAL CEREMONY.
DUBLIN, Aug. 16. Arthur Griffith was laid to rest, on Wednesday morning at Glasnevin Cemetery, following solemn requiem mass. The Cathedral was crowded and thousands stood outside. Archbishop Dwyer of Dublin represented the Catholic Church. Cardinal Logue, who was prevented by indisposition from attending, sent a solemn message of sympathy. WATERING PLACE ATTACKED.
LONDON, Aug. 16. Two hundred Irish irregulars made an attack on Bundoran, a popular watering place at Donegal Bay, says a Central News despatch to-day from Londonderry. Visitors to the resort fled in terror. Reinforcements have been sent to the National Army barracks there, says the despatch.

GRAND TRUNK RESIGNATION.
OTTAWA, Aug. 16. An official announcement of the resignation of Howard G. Kelly from the Board of Directors of the Grand Trunk Railway was made to-day. Ceasing to be Director, Mr. Kelly automatically ceased to be President of the road. Mr. Kelly's resignation, in common with those of other directors of the Grand Trunk and Canadian National Boards, has been in the hands of the Government for some time. In view of pending reorganization of the Canadian National Board, the Government has appointed Major Graham Bell, Deputy Minister of Railways, to fill the vacancy on the Board, created by Mr. Kelly's resignation.

IRISH OFFICER SHOT DEAD.
BELFAST, Aug. 16. Commandant Edward O'Brien, of the National Forces, was shot dead at Waterford last night while helping to extinguish a fire in the police barracks.

ORPHANAGE TRAGEDY.
MONTREAL, Aug. 16. Twelve persons are believed buried to death in a fire which destroyed St. James' Boys' Orphanage at Shawbridge on Tuesday night.

POINCARÉ SUSTAINED.
RAMBOUILLET, Aug. 16. The entire French Cabinet, headed by M. Poincaré arrived here at 9.30 on Wednesday morning and immediately convened under the Chairmanship of Premier Millerand. Poincaré at once gave an exposition of the unsuccessful conference at London and there followed a discussion as to the advisability of summoning parliament. The Cabinet unanimously supported Poincaré's stand on the German reparations situation at the London meeting.

BEAVERBROOK ON NORTHCLIFFE.
LONDON, Aug. 16. Lord Beaverbrook in the Daily Express of Wednesday publishes a eulogy of Lord Northcliffe, but refers with candor to some aspects of the great publisher's character, remarking on the publishers immunity from the daily criticisms that await politicians and his ability, to strike without inviting a prompt return blow. Lord Northcliffe was bitterly sensitive to attack when some public men responded with personal rejoinder after he had inflicted agony upon them.

True Aim of Sport.

(From the Toronto Globe.)
There is a good deal of discussion over the alleged loss by Great Britain of leadership in sport. At a recent British amateur athletic meeting it is said that eleven out of seventeen championships were won by foreigners. Among the winners of first, second and third places were Norwegians, Swiss, Estonians, Swedes, a Frenchman and an Italian. The result may be due in part to the ravages of war, although by this time there would be a good many competitors who were too young to take part in the war. But, however, that may be, it is not necessary to take a gloomy view of the loss of championship records. The true test of sport is the average of all the amateurs. The main benefit of sport is the healthful exercise for body and mind which it affords to a great number of men and women. The Ottawa Journal says that the Britisher looks to sport for recreation first of all, and is not so anxious to win as some of his neighbors. If men and women are fond of exercise, and take plenty of it, and if they cultivate the spirit of fair play, we need not be unduly anxious about the prizes.

Measures Atoms.

Most expert machinists think they are very accurate when they measure to the quarter of a thousandth of an inch, but science goes them more than 10,000 times better. Dr. W. P. Davey of the General Electric Company has been able to use the waves for the diameters of atoms. To express these diameters in inches it would be necessary to write down a decimal point and 7 zeros before putting down the first significant figure, and Dr. Davey doesn't stop at the first figure, either. He measures to three and sometimes four figures. For instance, followed by seven zeros, and if then, after the last zero, you put down 123 you would have the diameter in inches of the atom or ion of chlorine in ordinary table salt. The number is accurate to 1 per cent. Some of the measurements are 10 times as accurate as this; for instance, the distance from the centre of the chlorine ion to the centre of the sodium ion is 0.0000001108 inches. To date the diameters of 25 different kinds of ions have been measured. The X-rays not only show the dimensions of these ions, but also their arrangement in space. Some crystals have all the ions apparently arranged on the corners of tiny imaginary cubes, and still others have ions at the corners of cubes and extra ions at the centres of the cubes, and still other crystals have an even more complicated structure.

Significant Gestures.

Thought may be communicated not only by speech, but by bodily movements or gestures. Considered as a form of language, or rather an equivalent for it, gestures are manifestive, demonstrative and imitative. Striking the breast to denote grief, or turning up the nose to express contempt, is an example of the first kind; laying a finger on one's own lips to denote that a person is deranged, belongs to the second class; while the Neapolitan's custom of expressing the idea of weariness by wiping his forehead with his thumb to indicate the removal of sweat, is an instance of the third category. To this last class, the imitative, belongs to the American Indian fashion of indicating that a man is a liar by placing his hand to his lips and distending two fingers, in imitation of the forked tongue of a venomous snake.—Ave Maria.

Household Notes.
Frosting that must wait before being served on a cake should be covered with a damp piece of cheesecloth. Green apple pie should be well sweetened and seasoned with a little cinnamon, salt, and finely chopped salt pork. When a dishcloth reaches the raveling stage throw it away, as its lint will make a tangled webbing in the drain pipe. An old bread box is an excellent receptacle for the fifty pounds of sugar which you will use during canning season. Those little yellow tomatoes make an excellent relish when filled with chopped water cross mixed with French dressing. Put the fat left over from the roast through the food chopper, try it out in the top of a double boiler, strain and use in cooking. When making lemonade add the sugar to the water before adding the lemon juice or ice. Your lemonade will not require so much sugar. Seven inches from the ground is likely to be the fashionable length for street skirts.

Household Notes.

If the lids of pound lard substitute cans are enameled in white and stenciled they make unique tea glass coasters for the summer porch. To cleanse bronze articles immerse them in boiling water, rub with a flannel rag dipped in yellow soapuds and dry with a soft cloth. If small pieces, such as napkins, soft collars, and handkerchiefs, are ironed on top of the sheets, there is a great saving of time and electricity. An olive oil bath is very fine for a palm or fern. Put two tablespoonfuls of olive oil at the root of your palm or fern about once a month, and you have no idea, unless you have tried this, what the improvement will be. A delicious dressing for pear salad is made as follows: Mix 1/4 cup of cream with 3 tablespoons cottage cheese. Add 1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 tablespoon currant jelly, and season with salt, pepper and paprika.

Obituary.

ALEXANDER JAMIESON.
With the first breaking of dawn on the morning of August 16th, the soul of Alexander Jamieson, returned, to its maker. For some months past, he knew the end was not far off, and with a calmness born with a life of true Christianity he prepared for the inevitable. All his ten children were with him before he passed away, and surrounded by loving care on every hand, his soul passed to its maker, while he slept as quietly as a tired child. He had reached the age of seventy-two years, having been born in Peterhead, Scotland in 1850, and came to this country some thirty-five years ago in connection with the herring industry. He resided for a number of years at Hr. Grace, and later in Sound Island, Piacenta Bay. Coming to St. John's some fifteen years ago, he became Master Cooper with Bishop Sons & Co., Ltd., which position he held up to a few months before his death, when ill health rendered it necessary for him to rest. Since leaving work he gradually became weaker, until the end came yesterday morning. He leaves behind him to mourn, his wife, six daughters, and four sons, all of whom, with the exception of two daughters at Sound Island, reside in the city. The funeral takes place tomorrow, Friday, at 2.30 p.m., in the General Protestant Cemetery.

Peers vs. People.

Fortunately for the peace of Parliament, to say nothing of the popularity of the Peers, the two Houses of the British Legislature rarely come into conflict, and when they do disagree the most popular in the end prevails. In this case there was something like a spiritual tug of war between the representatives of the Peers and those of the people, and the latter then won. On August 17, the public were informed in the morning papers that the Irish Land Bill had passed its third reading in the House of Commons the second reading had taken place a fortnight earlier, after two nights' debate without a division the Marquis of Salisbury, as leader of the Opposition, advising his followers to amend the Bill in Committee. This course was faithfully followed, with the result that amendments were introduced and carried by large majorities in the Upper House, and they altered the essential character of the Bill. Mr. W. E. Gladstone—then Prime Minister—backed by the whole of the Liberal Party, protested that if these amendments were allowed, the Bill would be frustrated. The result was that after a few acceptances of minor points the Bill was sent back to the Lords with all vital amendments retained, and the original clauses retained. Then it looked as if grave constitutional complications were about to take place, and great meetings were held all over the country protesting against the action of the Peers, and it certainly seemed as if the differences between the two Houses of Legislature were irreconcilable. At last the representative of the great Cecil family "climbed down," and at the eleventh hour all opposition to the Bill was removed, and the original version was passed. Thus the crisis having been averted, thus the Bill was sent up from the Commons, Lord Salisbury recommended the Peers to accept it. But at the same time, he said, if the Duke of Devonshire had moved two of the amendments which the Commons had rejected—those to move their re-insertion, he would again support them. As it happened the Duke was absent, and the Marquis realising that even in the case of a Peer, prudence may be the better part of valour—preserved a discreet silence. The political situation was saved—and the People's House secured a notable victory over their legislators.

She had been in failing health for some time, but during the last six months she gradually weakened, and death followed a stroke of paralysis, bringing a happy issue to her sufferings, and her spirit into that land from whence no traveller ever returns. Her many friends will learn with regret, that the earthly link which bound them together here has been severed. In the home circle the magnet is gone—there will the loss be felt very keenly. She was sustained by the comforting presence of her children, who did all possible to alleviate her sufferings until the end came. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, and was largely attended, the coffin being covered with beautiful flowers. Rev. W. H. Browning conducted the services at the church and graveside, when all that was mortal was laid to rest in the Methodist Cemetery. Mrs. Whiteway is survived by five children, one daughter, Mrs. J. C. Dinwoodie of Connecticut, U.S.A. by a former marriage; and by the latter, three daughters, Mildred of St. John's, Mary and Winnie at home; one son, Mr. Edwin Whiteway, Assistant with Dr. W. S. Goodwin; one sister, Mrs. Eliza Fitzgerald residing in Massachusetts, U.S.A.; Mrs. J. H. Peet of St. John's is a niece. To the sorrowing family the writer offers deepest sympathy. 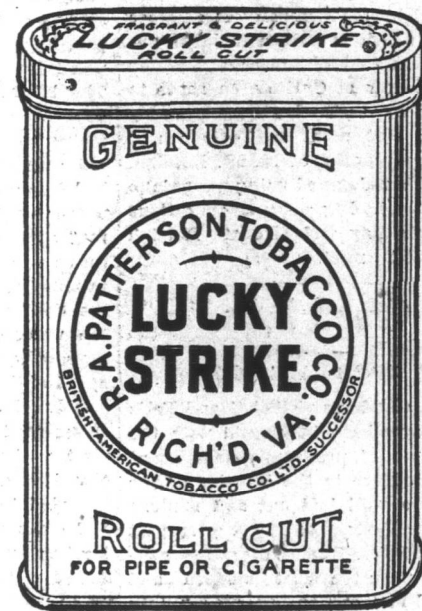

Mr. Ryan Still Missing.

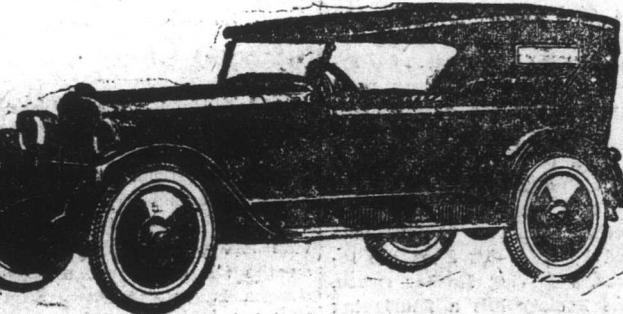

Contumacious Germany.

Just a few days over eight years ago, Germany began her war of aggression and prospective conquest and subjugation of the world to her will. Her statesmen yelled themselves hoarse in telling just what they were going to do with France, likewise Belgium, and lastly, with Britain, for having dared to take a hand against the all conquering legions of the German war lord. They boasted that all the Northern coast of France was to become German territory, and such other ports as might be found desirable were to be taken, and in addition French mines and minerals wherever situated. Moreover all the British, French and Belgian colonies overseas were to be occupied by Germany, and after victory war indemnities were to be imposed on the conquered countries sufficient to enrich the Prussian Empire, even after its war expenses had been paid out of them. Vanquished nations were to be given no chance to arise out of their ruins, but were to be kept in abject poverty for all time. Such was the German programme, but there was a fly in the ointment. Following four years of titanic struggle, Germany was placed at the mercy of her conquerors. The situation was reversed. Instead of the men of blood and iron demanding and collecting at the point of the bayonet the last penny or franc, as in 1871, the despised oppressors of the Prussian war policy were the victors. They imposed the terms of peace and the indemnification sums. But has Germany paid? Is she paying? Her own soil remained free from invasion. The victorious Allies did no more than cross the border. The might and majesty and strength of their panoplied armies were not exhibited to the German population. They did not enter Berlin as the Prussian hordes entered Paris, in conquering array after the surrender of the French capital in 1871. They halted at the border, and trusted to the good faith of German politicians to complete the terms of peace. What has been the result? Germany has been hedging ever since. France and Belgium have received nothing but empty promises from the enemy. Both shattered and exhausted themselves in the war. Great Britain and the Empire emerged from the war with an indebtedness in excess of all German expenditure in a conflict of the latter's own making. Italy was also blighted financially, and the United States was forced to incur burdens of debt, which they are now feeling keenly and will long continue to suffer from the effects. And it is to-day remarkable (but not so much so when German characteristics are taken into account) that the late vanquished enemy refuses to pay the indemnities to which she pledged

her sacred word. Perhaps the document which her plenipotentiaries signed is even now only regarded as a "scrap of paper." Much maudlin sympathy is being expiated for her by those who were the greatest sufferers at her hands, and this misplaced pity is being taken advantage of, and used as a reason why Germany should not be compelled to make good her obligations. Such was not shown to France in 1871. Is there any reason now why Germany should be permitted to have her own time in making good the damage done by her armies from 1914 to 1918? Can it be wondered at that France objects to the latitude allowed?

First Cargo of Pit Props SHIPPED BY AERIAL SURVEY CO. MAJOR COTTON MAY FLY TO WRECK OF H.M.S. RALEIGH.

CURLING, Yesterday. Special to Evening Telegram. The first cargo of pit-props shipped by the Aerial Survey Company was cleared in steamer Penare, Captain Walker from Hawks Bay yesterday. The complement was two thousand cords. Four hundred men are now employed by the Company at summer logging, which is unique in labor analytics on this part of the coast. Major Cotton is now at Curling, en route to Botwood by rail. He may possibly fly from that point to Forteau and scene of stranding of H.M.S. Raleigh, leaving Thursday and using a seaplane for the flight. Big story of operations at Hawks Bay and also of Raleigh forwarded by mail.

Grand Falls. AN UP-TO-DATE TOWN.

People who have visited Grand Falls have always been impressed with the general air of progressiveness about the place. Here in the interior of the forest is a well laid out and modern little city. Up-to-date in every respect is Grand Falls. Homes there are constructed after the most modern and improved methods and everywhere in a well equipped home amidst refined and healthy environment.

Whales Declared to be Sperms. VALUABLE CAPTURE FOR MEN OF KEELS.

The Telegram learns from a well known business man who has just returned from Keel's and other points in Bonavista Bay, that the whales driven ashore by the fishermen are belonging to the sperm species. They are 28 in number and all bulls. The animals are moored in a beach at Castle's Cove, and the captors are engaged collecting the oil. For this purpose a hole is cut in the side of the head and the valuable content is dipped out with buckets. The process is very slow but the men obtain from 15 to 20 barrels of oil from each head. The whales are young, and average about 50 feet in length. The very valuable substance ambergris is sometimes found in the intestine of the sperm whale but so far the men have not found any. Ambergris when first taken out is a deep grey color of waxy consistency, with a disagreeable odor, gradually becoming sweet when exposed to the air. It is used in making perfumes.

S. O. E. Grand Lodge Delegation ARRIVED BY ROSALIND.

Amongst the passengers who arrived this morning from Halifax by S. S. Rosalind were the Supreme President and the Supreme Secretary of the Sons of England Society, the former being Mr. T. J. Russell, and the latter Mr. D. J. Proctor. On arrival of the ship the visitors were met by representatives of the local Lodge and given a hearty welcome. A joint meeting of the city Lodges is being held to-night, which will be followed by a banquet at the West End Restaurant. The visitors, accompanied by delegates from the local Lodges, will visit Harbor Grace, where the Society has a flourishing branch.

Fined For Speeding. THE JUDGES WARNING.

A taxi driver of the west end stand was yesterday fined \$100 or 30 days for speeding. The evidence for the prosecution was that at 8 p.m. on the 9th, defendant was driving east near the penitentiary passed another car going in the same direction at a fair rate of speed. In passing Butler ran over a dog, which was following a woman and her child. The latter, who it was claimed, would have been run over also, but for the mother's promptitude. The driver did not stop to see if a serious accident had happened but when he was overtaken by the other motorist at the foot of the pond, admitted he knew that he had gone over the dog. A prominent lawyer gave evidence for the Crown and it was supported by the woman, whose child had such a narrow escape. Both stated that the speed of the car was highly dangerous. Judge Morris in passing sentence commented very strongly on this matter of speeding, especially in the city limits, and announced that he intended to put a stop to same, even if he has to send the offender to the Penitentiary. He had time and again lectured drivers from the bench, but all to no use, and he had now to protect the public, and in future the highest penalty in his power would be meted out to offending motorists.

A Diamond "Rush." A great event in the alluvial diamond fields, known as "The River Diggins," is the proclamation of new ground.

For some weeks before the day of proclamation, people from far and wide have been moving along the roads in wagons drawn by teams of bullocks, donkeys, or mules, taking with them their digging gear in order that they may be ready to start digging as soon as possible after their "claims" have been pegged. On the day of proclamation all roads to the new "rush" are alive with traffic of every description; and the velvet in the vicinity of the rendezvous is crowded with motor cars, wagons, motor and push-bicycles, horses, mules, donkeys, bullocks, and even fowls and goats.

Woman Missing. LEFT GARDEN PARTY—DID NOT RETURN.

This morning the husband of Mrs. Cousins, of Murphy's Square, reported to the police that his wife had been absent from home since Wednesday last, and he can find no trace of her. Mr. Cousins states that his wife left home shortly after dinner on the 9th of August to attend the Garden Party and Regatta at Quidi Vidil Lake, and when she set out she wore a light skirt with green sweater, but had on no hat. Home Hints.

It is not at all difficult to keep lettuce crisp and firm, even for several days; but the secret is thorough chilling, not merely soaking in water before a meal. Do not put the head of lettuce in the icebox and then remove the number of leaves needed for your salad and trust to an immersion in cold water to make them crisp. Instead, pull the head of lettuce entirely apart the minute it comes from the market. Wash all the leaves thoroughly, then shake in a colander and put the loose leaves in a paper bag, placing the bag near the ice. Each leaf will keep crisp and firm and all the leaves can be used, though you may have to replace the paper bag occasionally when the paper becomes torn from moisture.

When cream will not whip, add the white of an egg to it. Let both the cream and egg be thoroughly chilled. Then try again and it will whip easily.

A teaspoonful of vinegar beaten into buttered frosting when flavoring is added will keep it from being brittle or breaking when being cut.

To beat eggs very quickly add a pinch of salt.

When using molasses that is not as dark as desired for ginger-bread or cookies, add a tablespoonful of melted chocolate to molasses and spices. This not only gives the desired effect in color but favors as well.

Finely pleated bands of plain silk make a very effective trimming for printed frocks, whether of cotton or silk.

To keep raisins from sinking in a cake or bread, they may be creamed with the butter, then the sugar added, and the regular process of bread or cake-making proceeded with in the usual order. The cake or bread will be darker and richer looking when this method is employed.

Before heating milk in a saucepan, rinse the pan in cold water and it will not scorch so easily.

LOGS ON FREE LIST.
WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 17.
Three changes were made in the Tariff Bill yesterday, Senator Kellogg, Republican, Minnesota, finally winning his fight to place on the free list logs of fir, spruce, cedar or western hemlock, paving posts, railroad ties and telephone, telegraph, trolley and electric light poles, and pickets, palings, hoops and staves of wood of all kinds.

AT WESTMINSTER ABBEY.
LONDON, Aug. 17.
The funeral of Viscount Northcliffe was solemnized at noon today in Westminster Abbey. Seidom has the last tribute to any Englishman, whose position was wholly personal and unofficial, gathered such an assembly. French and American Ambassadors were among the host of mourners; chief of whom was the widow, Viscount Northcliffe's aged mother, and his six brothers.

FREE STATE SUCCESSES.
DUBLIN, Aug. 17.
Troops of the Provisional Free State Government are continuing their successes against Irregulars. Latest reports tell of the capture of Malloy and Mitchell's Town. Government troops are now advancing on Dun dalk, the news of the capture of which has yet to be confirmed.

KIND OF HOPEFUL.
CHICAGO, Aug. 17.
An end to the strike of the Big Four Transportation Brotherhoods on western railroads, an improved outlook for peace in the New York Conference today, shootings, bombings and burnings were high lights in the nations railway crisis during the last twenty-four hours.

MARKING TIME.
HALIFAX, Aug. 17.
Operators and strikers in the Nova Scotia coal mining dispute were marking time this morning. Two companies of the permanent forces completed the occupation of New Aberdeen, Cape Breton, last night, without any untoward incident, and two companies of militia were being held in readiness at Amherst to proceed to Springhill. A move for settlement is anticipated shortly, with the convening of the newly elected executive, under the presidency of Dan Livingstone.

The British Way.

In spite of many difficulties the revival of business in Great Britain is marked. It is a remarkable commentary upon the return of commercial prosperity in Britain that in June, 1922, the merchandise of Great Britain in the shape of exports and re-exports amounted to \$80,000,000 against \$48,000,000 in June, 1914, and that imports similarly increased from \$58,000,000 in 1914 to \$84,000,000 this year. Some of the increases are, of course, nominal—are due to the fact that the pound has not yet par gold value. Nevertheless, the showing is a remarkable one. It reveals how Great Britain has come back through hard work and the intelligent application of human energy. In the war British people did not dishonor their great national traditions. In peace, despite senseless disturbances of industry by those of a Bolshevik spirit, they again ran true to form. The excess of imports in June was \$23,000,000, or approximately \$100,000,000 at the present value of the pound. This means that Great Britain, through her shipping, her insurance and interest on her investments abroad, is once again in the way of prosperity. She has not

borrowed—on the contrary has rather been lending—yet through her invisible credits she is able to pay for \$100,000,000 worth of goods.—Morning Chronicle.

Reading Your Own Hand.

A great palmist, by name D'Arpenigny, says that there are seven classes of hands. "The elementary, or large palmed hands, which are the lowest type, the active or spatulate hands, the artistic or conical shape, the useful hand which is square, the philosophic or knotted hand, the psychic or pointed hand, and the mixed hand. The important point in the elementary hand is the proportionate length of palm and fingers, the longer the fingers the better the hand, the larger the palm the more the animal rules."

In the spatulate hand the palm is broader at the base and the fingers at the tips. Discoverers, inventors, and energetic people have such a hand. The artistic is one of the most attractive types, the palm being slightly tapering, the fingers broad at the

base with nice nails. Conical hands belong to people who are impressionable, impetuous, generous and emotional—not necessarily a good type, it depends on the amount of emotion allowed.

The square hand is square all over at the wrist, at the base of the fingers even the finger tips. This is a practical hand, the people are usually methodical and orderly, apt to be hidebound, lacking in imagination but full of perseverance.

The philosophic hand is generally long and rather angular, with bony fingers ending in long nails, the knuckles knotted and large. It is the hand of an ambitious person but one who seeks power by knowledge and for the sake of knowledge, rather than from selfish or material motives.

The psychic hand is long, narrow, delicate with tapering fingers and almond shaped nails. The mixed hand cannot be classified.

ONE MORE FORTNIGHT.
LIMERICK, Aug. 16.
Michael Collins, head of the Irish Provisional Government, expects that military operations in South Ireland will be completed within the next fortnight. He gave this opinion in an interview to-night.

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY.
DUBLIN, Aug. 16.
Glasnevin Cemetery to-day received another Irish patriot, Arthur Griffith, President of Dail Eirann, whose body is to lie forever in the soil in which sleep Daniel O'Connell, Parnell and others, whose life work was for Ireland. Solemn Requiem Mass was said for Mr. Griffith in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception this morning. The impressive ceremony was carried out in the presence of a congregation that filled the beautiful edifice, while outside thousands who were unable to gain admittance, prayed for the soul of the man whom everybody considers gave his life for Ireland by arduous labors, to effect peace as truly as though he had laid it down on the battlefield. Michael Collins, in the full uniform of commander in chief of the army, sat with the members of his staff directly behind the consular corps during service in the cathedral.

MORE SOLDIERS FOR PROTECTION.
QUEBEC, Aug. 16.
The Royal 22nd Regiment, with full equipment, including eight machine guns, have been entrained at Levis, and are waiting orders to proceed to Nova Scotia, coal fields, where a strike is on. The regiment is about two hundred strong.

STRIKE SITUATION WORSE.
SYDNEY, Aug. 16.
With four collieries still flooding rapidly, and two of them reported already damaged, the general strike situation in Capt Breton to-night is worse than at any time since it started twenty-four hours ago. The pumping service, which for thirty-six hours was maintained by officials and other volunteers, is falling through exhaustion of the men. Colonel Elkins from Halifax, with 250 troops, have occupied number two colliery at New Aberdeen, after cars with a party of workers, who had been sent from Sydney to man the pumps had been stoned, and workers sent back to Sydney. Reports from Pictou and Cumberland countries on the mainland indicate that all is peaceful there.

ENGLISH PRINTERS STRIKE ENDED.
LONDON, Aug. 16.
The printers strike, which has long disorganized English provincial newspapers, has been settled at a joint conference, and an agreement signed, under which the Typographical Association agrees to recommend that strikers resume work immediately, with a weekly reduction of three shillings, and to take a ballot on the recommendation of the acceptance of a gradual total wage reduction of twelve shillings and six pence, when wages will be stabilized until December, 1923. Employers and organizations agree to recommend the reinstatement of strikers in their former positions.

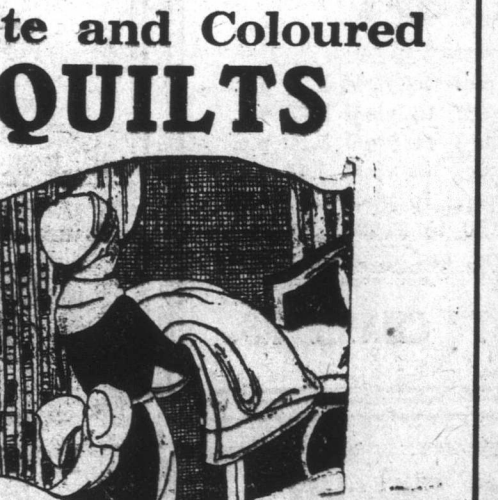
