W (athercoie, Joh As the waters of the late flood subside, we are enabled to form a more correct opinion of the serious damages to roads and bridges, mills and mill dams, &c., and it is to be regretted that the loss caused by the watery element exceeds the first estimate, and that apart from repairing the damage done, millers in this locality will probably not grind a bushel of grain for months. This state of aftigains at once affects the consumers, as flour is now selling here at \$5 a barrel, whilst in Toronto the same grade is sold for \$3.50. This is bringing coals to Newcastle with a vengeance, but no doubt there will be smart competition here soon in the flour trade. The past week produced such fine spring weather as caused the pastures to assume their life giving productions almost at once, and there is no doubt but this kind interposition of Providence has saved the lives of very many sadly debilitated animals, who otherwise in a few days must have succumbed to their fate, as the very limited quantity of feed amongst the farmers amounted to boiled wheat, and it is to be regretted that in many cases the seed grain has been fed out to save the stock. Still, many are depending on the grass feed exclusively to enable them to put in their crops, as they possess meither hay, oats nor straw for eeding purposes. It is to be hoped that the municipal councils will see at once that none of the poor farmers are left without such assistance in the premises as can reasonably be rendered by way of seed grain—or help if asked for. Surely the lessons taught our agriculturists during the past season will not be forgotten, but will tend, at least, to produce a change in the general banagement of the farm, as evidently wheat growing, so far, has not been remunerative to the husbandman. Barley, hay, or fat cattle would pay much better if once the men most interested would only lay hold with a will and get rid of all prevailing systems of wheat raising to the exclusion of other cereals from the farm.

Cork, May 3.—A mass meeting of the citizens was held here on Saturday night, at which the recent speech of the Mayor was warmly endorsed, and resolutions adopted expressing sympathy with and confidence in that functionary.

Why the fact is that imported books are aircady so cheap that not half the vafue is placed upon them by people who falk about the "tax on knowlege" why that there should be—and if the petty duty were taken off they would not be sold a bit cheaper than they are now. When bibles, testaments and religious works, are to be had for a mere trifle comparatively, and the standard works of British authors for less than one half the sum they brought about a dozen years ago, the talk about taxing knowledge is very superficial, and based on no solid grievance. There is another aspect in which this question should be regarded, viz: that even with this five per cent. duty on books, importers have a great advantage over the manufacturers in this country, as a duty of 15 per cent. is imposed on paper, type, ink and book-binders' materials—a difference of 10 per cent. in favor of the foreign dealer. Something has to be taxed; and with two "deplanate" on our hands in the shape of an Intercolonial Railway and a North-west Territory, it is a very unpropitious senson to level down Customs' duties.
