Hon. John Young and the Ministry.

The Montreal Herald, of Wednesday, publishes a long letter from Hon. John Young to the electors of Montreal West, in which he explains the whole affair of the Pope-Macdonald letter. He says that he applied to the Hon. T. N. Gibbs on the 19th ult., asking him for the form in which he should apply for his commission as flour inspector under the new Act. Gibbs replied that, as it was an office of some emolument, it would, if accepted by him, prevent him from retaining his seat in Parliament; so he (Gibbs) had not contemplated submitting his name to the Governor-General for reappointment. Hon. Mr. Young then went to Ottawa to see Gibbs. He saw Pope, who thought the Inspection Act did not interfere with his continuing as member of Parliament and as Inspector also. On the 25th ult., he received an unintelligible telegram from Pope: "I will see you to-morrow onny way home. No cause for alarm." He then says: "On Thesday verning I met Mr. Pope, who declared that, in his opinion, neither my position as Inspector nor my seat for the Western Division of Montreal. Soon after I got the interrupt letter from the Premier to Pope. 
