The writ for the South Huron election to the Ontario Legislature has been issued. Wednesday, Oct. 8th, is the day of nomination, and polling takes place on the following Wednesday. According to the Hamilton Times, the contest promises to be a triangular fight. Mr. Archibald Bishop, Warden of Huron, is the regular Reform candidate. Mr. George Case, of Seaford, is the regular Tory candidate. Dr. Worthington, of Clinton, comes out as a prohibitory candidate. The Huron Signal of Wednesday, however, thinks that according to present appearances there is not likely to be a contest.

The Monetary Times says:—"It is confidently stated in banking circles in Montreal that the existing Pacific Railway Company will immediately throw up the charter. If the project was difficult to finance before, there does not now exist the remotest possibility of floating it in the present hands."

Hon. John Young and the Ministry. The Montreal Herald, of Wednesday, publishes a long letter from Hon. John Young to the electors of Montreal West, in which he explains the whole affair of the Pope-Macdonald letter. He says that he applied to the Hon. T. N. Gibbs on the 19th ult., asking him for the form in which he should apply for his commission as flour inspector under the new Act. Gibbs replied that, as it was an office of some emolument, it would, if accepted by him, prevent him from retaining his seat in Parliament; so he (Gibbs) had not contemplated submitting his name to the Governor-General for re-appointment. Hon. Mr. Young then went to Ottawa to see Gibbs. He saw Pope, who thought the Inspection Act did not interfere with his continuing as member of Parliament and as Inspector also. On the 25th ult., he received an unintelligible telegram from Pope: "I will see you to-morrow on my way home. No cause for alarm." He then says: "On Tuesday evening I met Mr. Pope, who declared that, in his opinion, neither my position as Inspector nor my seat in Parliament would be interfered with. I intimated to him, however, that whatever might be the result to me personally, I had made up my mind not to give up my seat for the Western Division of Montreal. Soon after I got the interrupted letter from the Premier to Pope. When I realized that it was genuine, and recollecting that it was in reply to Mr. Pope's letter, after seeing me here on the 27th, I saw a deep laid scheme of political villainy between the honourable gentleman; and I felt it would be an act of moral cowardice in me not to hold up to the public view this gross iniquity in our public men. While Pope and Sir John were assuring me that there was no intention of interfering with the Western Division or my commission as Inspector of Flour, they were conspiring together to rob me of both, under the belief that I would be compelled to yield to the pressure from necessity. Macdonald wrote on the 6th Sept., saying he would be justified in publishing Young's letter of the 23rd Aug., laying Young's case before the Government. Young replied to publish it by all means, but he added that he hoped Sir John would also publish all the private and official letters to the Department of Inland Revenue. The Premier dare not do that. Mr. Young leaves it for the electors to decide whether he has done right or wrong. Hutchison his deputy, has laid a petition before the Superior Court, praying that a writ of mandamus be issued, authorizing him to grant the office of Flour Inspector, on the ground that he is better qualified than Young. Such a mean act is worthy only of one of the Premier's underlings.

The Provincial Show. The London Advertiser says that the exhibition in the Horticultural Hall and the palace do not reach, for the number of entries at any rate, the level of expectation. The Horticultural Hall will show many bare spots which doubtless would have been filled had the weather on Monday, and during the end of last week, not interfered with the preparations. The Hall has been very tastefully decorated throughout with evergreens, intertwined with streamers.

In the live stock department the show is a great success. There are breeders from all parts of the country with stock of the purest blood and really first-class in all that constitutes excellence. The County of Wellington is largely represented. The extensive carriage sheds are filled with vehicles of all patterns, the local manufacturers showing a splendid collection. Outside the sheds are a lot of heavy, well-made, agricultural and other kinds, is very large and varied. A number of exhibitors have taken advantage of the steam power provided by the Association and show a good collection of small machinery in the building provided for that purpose. No one will be dissatisfied with the display of poultry, all the favourite varieties being well represented and the oops all full.

J. B. Armstrong, & Co., Guelph took the first prize for their patent cast-steel springs, and an extra prize for an assortment. The various springs which competed were tested by the judges as to their strength, and the identical springs which took the first prize at Guelph, over Mr. Armstrong's, broke under the testing pressure, whilst Mr. Armstrong's springs came out of the ordeal unimpaired. It should be noticed, also, that every light vehicle which took a prize was fitted with Messrs. Armstrong's springs.

Messrs. Wm. Hood and Thomas McCrae, of Guelph, have between them carried off every prize in the class of Gallows. Mr. Hood takes twelve, and Mr. McCrae nine. This is a clean sweep. With one exception, also, all the prizes for grade cattle go to exhibitors from this county. Many other prizes in the live stock and other departments are carried off by residents of this section, details of which we shall give.

On Wednesday, a popular day there was glorious weather, and the hopes of a large attendance have been realized to the fullest. The number of paying visitors to the ground is about 32,000. This is about 12,000 more than visited last year's show at Hamilton and about 6,000 more than attended the last Provincial Exhibition held in London. The length and number of the trains

coming into the city during the day bringing people from all quarters, were something amazing. The city is honored with the presence of His Royal Highness the Prince of Hesse, the husband of our Princess Alice. His Royal Highness, whose ship now is lying at Halifax, came on Tuesday night, very quietly. His Highness was met by the Bishop of Huron, whose guests he is during his stay of a day or two. His Highness paid a visit to the fair ground, and was conducted round by the President of the Association, Mr. Andrew Wilson, of Maitland, and other officers.

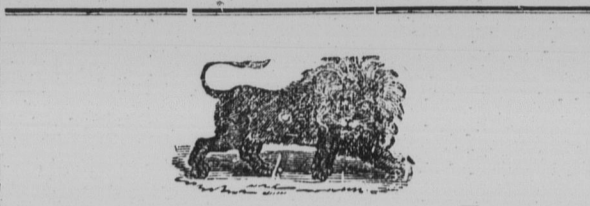

The Rival Clansmen:

A Scottish Vendetta.
CHAPTER I.
THE VOW TAKEN—"COMING EVENTS CAST THEIR SHADOWS BEFORE."
Our story opens on a dark, lowering day toward the end of October in the year 1744.

In Western Ross the hill-tops had been since morning clouded with a thick mist which hung over them, and which at times presented the appearance of a shroud of snow, again changing to the dark hue of a funeral pall.
During the day the sun had also at times shown out with a strange hectic brilliancy, for a brief moment partially clearing away the mist, only to retire again, leaving the gloom darker and denser than before.

About mid-afternoon the rain began to descend with a gentle pattering noise on the trees and on the hill sides; then there was a moaning sound heard issuing from the gulleys and the glens, and the waters of Loch Maree became ruffled; there was a rustling amongst the tree-tops, and the first symptoms had been felt of the coming storm.

The shepherds of Glen Dochart, and those tending their flocks on the steep sides of Ben-Sleugach and Ben-Lair, looked up and around at the now dark and swiftly heaving clouds, and, with many a shudder and anxious glance, firmly grasped their staves, whistled on their faithful collies, and made for their huts in the glens and on the mountain sides. The rain, which had at the beginning fallen gently, a summer's evening shower, now poured down in torrents; and the wind, zephyr-like at first, tore along the surface of Loch Maree, howling and shrieking, joined by the feeble but not less biting blast which swept down Glen Letterewe, and up from the mountains of Torrillon, dashing through Glen Dochart and over Loch Rusik with the fury of the storm fiend.

The hill streams, some at which had in the morning been almost dry tracks, while others flowed gently downwards emitting sweet music, they cleared the rugged rocks, making pretty cascades half hid among heath and moss, were now filled to overflowing, and came dashing, leaping, and tumbling down through the glens and over the plains, their waters here dark as ink, and there red as blood—flooding the shielings and huts imprudently placed too near their banks, and tearing on, discharging themselves in the lochs—now foaming and rising in billows, and now subsiding, the music of the streamlet changed into the sullen roar of the cataract.

The huge firs on the mountain sides and in the glens also cracked and bent before the fury of the gale, and some, having their roots less firmly imbedded in the soil than others, were torn up and dashed to the ground, suggesting to us that when the trials and storms of adversity hover around and dash themselves against humanity, it is only those who have themselves firmly rooted in the foundation of truth, honesty, sincerity and goodness, who can withstand successfully the ragings of the tempest.

Obscured by the mountains on either side, the gloom away up Glen Letterewe had deepened almost to darkness before the hour of the sun's setting and not without the utmost difficulty could a traveller have made his way along the steep, rugged, and almost invisible path up the glen.

About a mile up from Loch Maree, and just as the darkness was chasing away the last glimmer of light, a feeble gleam, evidently emanating from some dwelling, might have been seen suddenly to flash out and shine steadily through the gloom.

It was an inhabited hut, and as we reach the interior a young man is just engaged putting some oil in the black crucible which hung before the fireplace, and placing some peats on the fire, causing it to burn up cheerfully and throw a brighter light around.
