

THE DEATH OF HISTORIC CHARACTER

He Gave Good Advice to Governor in Troublesome Times of '37

Quebec, Jan. 10.—The death is announced at Nicolet of Henry A. Chillas, aged 94 years. There was a small English colony at Nicolet during the stormy times of 1837, and their position was naturally uncomfortable, but it was due to the good advice given by Mr. Chillas to the governor general that the rebellion in that part of the province was not more serious. His advice, for which he was afterwards warmly thanked by his excellency, was that instead of forming militia company the governor should leave the people to be handled by their clergy. This was acted upon with the best results for peace and tranquility.

Charleston W. Va. Jan. 10.—The message of governor Chas. M. Canfield to the legislature today, recommended the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people and protective insurance legislation.

JAPS DECIDE NOT TO COME

Will not take Chances on Visiting San Francisco

Tokio, Jan. 10.—The Japanese government has decided that on account of anti-Japanese agitation on the Pacific coast, the training squadron will not visit the Pacific coast but will go as far as Honolulu only.

Americans are Sore

Washington, Jan. 10.—Members of the California delegation in congress, in discussing tonight the decision of the Japanese government to abandon the proposed visit of the training squadron to the Pacific coast, or account of the anti-Japanese agitation expressed that opinion that San Francisco would have extended a welcome to the fleet. Representative Kahn, who represents San Francisco in the house suggested that the action of the Tokyo government may have been on advice of the Japanese consul general at San Francisco.

More Arrests in New York Life

New York, N. Y. Jan. 10.—More arrests may be made in the investigation of the affairs of the New York Life insurance company according to announcement today by district attorney James T. Perkins. The announcement was made while the district attorney was opposing an application of counsel for Geo. W. Perkins now under indictment in the New York Life case for an inspection of the entire minutes of the December grand jury. Mr. Jerome said that it would be defiance of public policy to grant such a request because persons are mentioned in the evidence who have not yet been arrested all but who may be at some future time. No decision was reached in the matter today.

Standard Oil Elects Old Officers

New York, Jan. 10.—All the old directors of the Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey were re-elected today. It was announced that there would be no change in the officers of the company.

ONE LEAGUE IN ANOTHER ONE OUT

Many Things Happen at the Annual Meeting of the National Baseball Association

New York, Jan. 10.—Because the board of arbitration of the National Association of baseball leagues decided to admit the Tri-State league to the territorial rights of Wilmington and Trenton, which quashed the application of the Atlantic League, the Atlantic league has decided to pull out from the National Association.

The ground upon which the Tri-State League's application for territorial rights was granted was that the league, although recently admitted, had a prior claim upon its field on account of its older organization.

With a view of regulating salaries and making them uniform in each league at least to the extent of putting a limit upon them, an important amendment to the constitution was adopted. This provides for a maximum monthly salary limit for each club of the several leagues below class A. The classification is to be governed by population requirements, and to be fixed by the respective leagues.

A statement of maximum limit must be filed with the secretary of the board of arbitration immediately after the opening of the championship season in each of the leagues affected, and it will be the duty of the National board to enforce it.

The association took a stand like that of the major leagues with reference to post season games and amends its constitution to the extent that no club will be permitted to participate in such games except under the regulations of a board of control.

The National board was given power to impose penalties for violations against this amendment. The board adopted a resolution putting all players who are ineligible to play in the eligible list of the Tri-State League.

Provision was made for the trial of players and umpires against whom charges may be made. An amendment was made to the constitution imposing a penalty of \$50 for invasion of territorial rights.

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THE TELEPHONE QUESTION

Some persons seem to be a bit alarmed about the business against the Bell Telephone Company. The same fears were expressed when Calgary undertook the matter of an electric light concern.

The electric light company is a harder rival than the telephone company for the reason that the company owning the electric light plant is a very strong one, and all its interests are in Calgary and it has many friends. But the Bell telephone company has practically no outside interests in Calgary, is not a consumer, is not a large employer of labor in Calgary, and has no friends.

There are not very many examples of a municipal company competing successfully with a private electric light company, but there are hosts of examples of a municipal telephone system competing successfully with the Bell Telephone Company.

In Grand Rapids there was a fierce fight between the people's system and the Bell with the result that at the present time the Bell has 3,400 subscribers, while the people's has 8,000 subscribers. The fight in the district shows even more plainly that the public system has the other system beaten to a finish.

This is one illustration. During the next few days the Albertan proposes to mention a few more in order to show that the remedy for this telephone difficulty is in the hands of the people.

A PUBLIC LIBRARY

From time to time some person advocates the establishment of a public library for Calgary. No one denies the need of it, but the city council has never got around to seeing their way clear to undertake it. The city can find money for other less deserving things such as the Hornby lake and things of that kind, but it can never get around to the matter of a public library.

The people want a public library. It is safe to say that no city in Canada the size of Calgary that can do without it. If they are without a library it is a poor advertisement for them.

Through the people of Calgary want a public library they have been accustomed to reading in the rooms and libraries and they feel very much the need of some such service. The lack of it is very keenly felt. They size up the city by services such as these.

MISREPRESENTER WORKS AGAIN

The Calgary Herald is attempting at this late hour to make more trouble about the census. In its numerous dilations and exhortations it does not stay with the facts.

When the Hundred Thousand Club was organized, there was a great opportunity for the knocker to come out and say things, but he kept under cover and every person believes that the 100,000 idea is the proper thing and that we shall all see it before he gets many years older.

Either the knocker is dead, or to be in the Calgary fashion just now he has been converted, changing his nature under the glorious gospel of prosperity.

EDITORIAL NOTES

WINTER BIRDS IN ALBERTA

Citizens of Calgary are not so given to gathering coin as to be quite oblivious of the presence of these beautiful plumaged birds indigenous to New Mexico, which you mention in this morning's Albertan, to be seen in and around the city.

This is the third winter I have observed the strangers about town. The first one I observed was on the wing; it looked like a wild canary of abnormal size. I drew your attention last summer to the humming birds to be seen in our gardens, and this winter quite a few blackbirds are still with us. If the instinct of birds, natives of the south, draws them westward, what's wrong with sunny Alberta winters?

The sight of them feeding on the maple seeds in front of our doors and windows at this season is worth many members to the 100,000 club.
