LEPROST ADDS ITS HORBURS TO THUSE OF CHOLERA.

The People Dying in Hundreds-Fearfu Ravages in Cairo-One of Gen. Wood's

LONDON, July 23.—Returns of the mor tality from cholera differ. One dispatch gives the number of deaths at Cairo yesterday as 427, Ghizeh 68, Chibin 150. The government will despatch twelve doctors.experts in cholera, to Egypt to-morrow. A doctor with forty assistants has been or dered to proceed from Simla to Egypt. A serious outbreak of cholera is expect at Bombay. Thirty-seven sporadic cases

occurred last week. At Suez the quarantine against infected ports has been re-

coccurred last week. At Suez the quarantine against infected ports has been renewed.

Advices from Egypt state that in addition to the cholera at Foleskour, eight miles southwest of Damietta, leprosy has appeared and is spreading rapidly. There are no doctors and no medicines.

A Cairo despatch states that the disease is spreading everywhere, and the mortality increases hourly. The evictions at Bulak were ordered by the native ministers. The inhabitants were suddenly driven out of their homes by the police during Friday and Saturday nights, and were huddled on board barges. Eight hundred of them were landed at Turah to-day. Since then there has been a case of cholera among Gen. Wood's force at Turah. The deaths at Cairo on Sunday were 481, besides fearful mortality among the Egyptian artillery.

PARIS, July -3—Inspectors are visiting all the houses in the populous quarters to guard against cholera.

M. De Lesseps Determined to Proceed Whether England Helps Him or Not— Rumored Bivisions in the Cabinet. LONDON, July 23 .- In the house of commons Mr. Gladstone said consideration of the canal agreement with M. De Lesseps was dropped owing to general objection to the scheme, and because more time had

How Chinamen Calculate. The counting machine universally employed by the Chinese differs from the abacus, once used in Canadian primary schools, in that the frame is divided by a wooden crosspiece. On each wire there are for the loss of thirty-three wickets, or an average of 33 per wicket.
