He gave a glowing account of its 3000 seats and the expenditure of hundreds of dollars in the city. But the climax was reached when he said that he knew that although the clergy would not go to theaters, they were in favor of circuses, especially the Methodist ministers. [Laughter.] They either personally patronized them, or sent their families. They did this for the enlargement of their minds and for educational purposes. [Renewed laughter.]
Ald. Stewart moved that the license fee be refused to \$300. A Circus In The Committee,

Afraid of the Oity's Morals.

The fact is we have a lot of prohibitive and Pharisaic bylaws on our city statutes which ought to be repealed. A circus is welcomed in every other town in the province; why then put a prohibitive tax on their coming to Toronto? We are no better than other communities. If our bylaws militate against the enjoyment of the people, abrogate the whole lot. The people should be left free to patronize them or stay away, just as they pleased.

The Chairman: It is no use talking, we cannot reduce the fee.

The position requires no special skill. A doctor, a lawyer, a journalist of a merchant are equally qualified for the position. Yet for this office, that requires Savings banks pay but 3 or 4 per cent.

It is difficult enough for persons now in business to make a living without being subjected to the competition of numbers of new men, who have already proved their unfitness for it.

It is to be hoped when the matter is under that discussion such considerations as these I have ventured to submit will have weight in Parliament.

A Banking Failure.
By the failure of one of the smaller Banks of the Dominion—a Bank which was very far from the Dominion—a Bank which was very far from the prudently managed—the soundness of our urrency law has again been demonstrated. The whole of the note issues of the Bank were edeemed within a few months of the stoppage to the operation of the preferential lien on the seets of the Bank.

The Bank Redemption Fund in the hands of the Government was not called more the seet.

The President having invited remarks from the shareholders present, Mr. John Morrison said that the report for the past year was one of the best that had ever been issued by the bank within his recollection. It now occupied a position which had neyer been equalled at any previous period in its history.

Mr. John Crawford spoke in favor of half-yearly unetings, which, among other things, would have the advantage of bringing the directors and the shareholders into closer touch. He aliuded to the fact that the balance sheet showed the net profits for the past year to have been about \$26,000 in advance of 1893, and said that the result of the year's workings had been exceedingly satisfactory. He thought that the directors, managers and shareholders should all be equally gratified at the result, considering the mercantile depression which had prevailed on both the eastern and western continents. He

mercantile depression which had prevailed on both the eastern and wastern continents. He then went on to speak of the Rest account, and suggrested that as it had now reached 50 per cent of the paid up capital it should stop there, and after the contingent fund had been added to the extent of \$500,000, the profits, after an 8 per cent dividend had been paid, should be distributed amongst the Shareholders. To go on ephancing the rest must have one of two results, it must either lead to extravagance, or it must inevitably paralyze the energies of the pest managers in the world. He contended that a 50 per cent. Rest had been generally accepted by the English banks as amply sufficient to meet all contingencies. In conclusion he called attention to the fact that the Dominion Bank paid quarterly dividends, and said that the time was coming when this would be general.

Mr. John Morrison spoke in opposition to semi-annual meetings and quarterly dividends.

The General Manager, in reply to Mr. John Crawford, said: With regard to the matter of quarterly dividends, it is sometimes forgotten by the advocates of them that the stock books would have to be closed four times a year, instead of twice, as at present. As to the Rest account, Mr. Crawford is entirely in error in supposing that the principle of 50 per cent. has been accepted generally by the English banks. I have a list before me of some of the banks in England. It shows that, Parr's bank, which was formerly a lancashire bank, and amalgamated with the Alliance has a capital of one million and a Rest of one million; while the London & Provincial has a rest of 118 per cent. In the provinces there is the Manchester and Lounty, with a capital of a million and a rest of £1,00,000. In Ireland there is the British Linen Company, with a capital of £1,250,000 and a rest of £30,000; a Bristol bank with a capital of a million and a rest of £1,400,000 and a rest of £1,400,000.
