ALL magistrates have received a letter from the acting deputy attorney-general telling that in view of the many accitelling that in view of the many accidents that have been caused by people trespassing on the railroads during the year ending March 31, 1911, something should be done to stop such trespassing. "Attention has been called to the numerous accidents caused by persons trespassing on the railroad tracks. During the year ending March 31, 1911, 140 persons were killed and 69 injured while so trespassing. The Dominion Railway persons were killed and 69 injured while so trespassing. The Dominion Railway Act, R. S. C., chap. 37, section 408, provides that every person not connected with the railway or employed by the company who walks along the tracks thereof, except where the same is laid on or across a highway, is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$10, and alike provision is made by the Ontario Railway Act, 6, Edward VII., chap. 30, section 240. It is important that the law should be strictly enforced in all proper cases, the strictly enforced in all proper cases, the matter being of importance, not merely as it effects the railway companies, but from the public point of view as well."

Tax Reform.

It is expected that at the next session of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario the question of eventually abolishing the present system of taxation will be discussed, the idea being to substitute something more just and equitable.

That we should any longer tolerate the taxation of improvements is divertisements without specific directions will be so absurd, that it seems scarcely red till forbid and charged accordingly. necessary to argue in favor of taxing ground values instead. However, up to the present the Provincial Government has not seen fit to even seriously consider a change, where by it would be possible to gradually reduce taxes on buildings, improvements, and business assessments, and at the same time increase taxes on land values to make up the differences. As I understand the plan as proposed by the Tax Reform Association, there is no idea of an immediate and radical change from one system to the other. It would on the other hand be gradual. That is to say the first year it might be possible to deduct from the assessed value of improvements, say 25% and add the same amount to the land tax. The second or third year 25% more might be taken from implements and placed upon land, and so on, little by little, until the old

> outlined by the Tax Reform Association will meet with a hearty approval of the majority of tax payers, once they fully understand that it is not a system of highway robbery, but is on the other hand an equitable and just method of collecting the taxes necessary to meet the bills.

The immediate effect of abolishing the tax on improvements would be a political boom. WON BY A DRUM.

The Battle of Arcola a Romantic Episede of French History.

There stands in the French town of Cadenet, his native place, a monument to the memory of "The Little Drummer of Arcola," Andre Estienne, the hero of one of the most romantic episodes in French history. It was an episode that illustrated the extraordinary military value, so often attested by the world's greatest generals, of what Othello called the "spirit stirring drum." It may be said, curiously enough, that Napoleon Bonaparte's great career was built upon a drum, for the battle of Arcola was won by the beating of Estienne's drum, and the Corsican himself always dated his confidence in his own fortune from this battle, won in 1796. The circumstances were these: stances were these:

Bonaparte, hemmed in with a small army at Verona, between two greatly superior forces, sallied out at night, made a forced march, and with 14,000 men fell upon the rear of 50,000 Austrians. The battle lasted seventy-two hours. On the second day of the fighting the Austrians obtained such a coefficient that they completely and murging that they completely and murging the second of the s position that they completely and mur-derously swept the bridge of Arcola, which the French had gained and which they must hold if they expected to win the battle.

This left the bridge clear, and the French began to pour across. Andre was joined by other drummers. The Austrian flight became a rout. The French swept on, with Andre Estienne, still drumming, at their head. Soon the whole Austrian force was retreating, utterly beaten.

Years later Estienne's heroic act was celebrated by being represented in stone on the front of the Pantheon at Paris. The funeral of the little drummer of Arcela was attended by a great sengence of French officers and great concourse of French officers and soldiers.

THE DOMINION ELECTIONS.

The Laurier Government Defeated. Mr. R. L. Borden will Form a New Government and Select a Cabinet.

The general elections on Thursday last resulted in the defeat of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's administration which has directed the governing of Canada for the past fifteen years. In the course of a few days Sir Wilfrid will hand his resignation to the Governor-General, who will call on Mr. R. L. Borden to form a new government. Automatically as it were Mr. Borden will become Premier and will select his cabinet from members of the Conservative party elected last week.

The change of government will take the reciprocity question out of politics and the agreement will not likely be heard of in the new parlia-

The result of the elections was somewhat of a surprise to both political parties. While the most sauguine Conservative did not expect such a complete turn-over, the Liber-als expected that Sir Wilfrid would be returned to power with a slightly

decreased majority. In East Lambton the former representative, Mr. Joseph E. Armstrong, was returned with an increased majority. It has been suggested that Mr. Armstrong should receive the portfolio of Postmaster General in the new administration. He has made an exhaustive study of postal conditions, and it was through his initiative and persistent advocacy that the rural free delivery was introduced. No doubt a large number of the electors of East Lambton, both Grit and Tory, would be plaased to see Mr. Armstrong receive the appointment, as he is undoubtedly the best-fitted man in the new parliament for the position.

The election returns for the Dominion will be found on page seven Since these were printed some slight changes have been made in the seats. Below we give the estimate of the leading party papers. The reader can figure it out for himself, as the correct majority will not likely be known until a vote is taken in the new House.

THE DOMINION ELECTIONS.

The Laurier Government Defeated. Mr. R. L. Borden will Form a New Government and Select a Cabinet.

The general elections on Thursday last resulted in the defeat of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's administration which has directed the governing of Canada for the past fifteen years. In the course of a few days Sir Wilfrid will hand his resignation to the Governor-General, who will call on Mr. R. L. Borden to form a new government. Automatically as it were Mr. Borden will become Premier and will select his cabinet from members of the Conservative party elected last week.

The change of government will take the reciprocity question out of politics and the agreement will not likely be heard of in the new parlia-

The result of the elections was somewhat of a surprise to both political parties. While the most sauguine Conservative did not expect such a complete turn-over, the Liberals expected that Sir Wilfrid would be returned to power with a slightly decreased majority.

In East Lambton the former rep resentative, Mr. Joseph E. Armstrong, was returned with an increased majority. It has been suggested that Mr. Armstrong should receive the portfolio of Postmaster General in the new administration. He has made an exhaustive study of postal conditions, and it was through his initiative and persistent advocacy that the rural free delivery was introduced. No doubt a large number of the electors of East Lambton, both Grit and Tory, would be plaased to see Mr. Armstrong receive the appointment, as he is undoubtedly the best-fitted man in the new parliament for the position.

The election returns for the Dominion will be found on page seven Since these were printed some slight changes have been made in the seats. Below we give the estimate of the leading party papers. The reader can figure it out for himself, as the correct majority will not likely be known until a vote is taken in the new House.



Field Crop Bulletin.

A bulletin on the field crops of Canada issued last week gives their average con-dition by provinces at the end of August, together with estimates of the production together with estimates of the production of spring wheat, oats and barley at that time. The per cent. condition of wheat is given as 86.80, of oats 84.44 and of barley 84.73, which is about five to seven per cent. higher than last year and nearly the same as two years ago. The other crops range in condition from 80 to 86 per cent. and are generally somewhat lower than in 1909 and 1910. The rains of August hindered the ripening of grain and some injury was caused by hailstorms, low temperature and rust. Tostorms, low temperature and rust. To-wards the end of the month frosts prevalled in many sections of the Northwest prov-inces, the full extent of which could not inces, the full extent of which could not be determined at the date of the reports, but in the case of wheat, oats, and barley production was lowered by probably 12 per cent. which has been followed in the table. In the older provinces the grains ripened earlier and little damage was sustained excepting from drought in some localities, and the reported con-dition was 75 or over

The fall wheat was reported last month at 17,706,000 bushels, being grown almost wholly in Ontario and Alberta. The total wheat yield of the country is therefore estimated to be 204,634,000 bushels or 81,849,5000 bushels more than last year at the same date. The average per acre is 19 50 bushels, or 6.30 bushels per acre more than last year.

For the Dominion the yield of oats is given as 368,753,000 bushels, which is \$4,906,000 bushels more than last year's estimate at the same date, and the average at 33.81 bushels per acre, being more than last year by 7.10 bushels. The average for barley is also higher, than last year by 7.10 bushels, and the total yield is estimated at 51,559,000 bushels, as against 39,388,000 bushels for last year.

The estimated yield of spring wheat for Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta this year is 181,535,000 bushels, of fall wheat 3,193,000 bushels, of oats 204,758,000 bushels and of barley 30,205,000 bushels, as compared with 98,808,000 bushels spring wheat, 1,082,000 bushels fall wheat, 92,201,000 bushels oats and 14,723,000 bushels barley in the previous year.

In Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick the estimated and New Brunswick the estimated yield of spring wheat is 1,453,000 bushels, of oats 16,699,000 bushels and of barley 437,000 bushels; in Quebec 1,777,000 bushels spring wheat, 44,619,000 bushels oats and 2,389,000 bushels "barley; and in Ontario 2,163,000 bushels spring wheat, 14,513,000 bushels fall wheat, 14,513,000 bushels fall wheat, 103,007,000 bushels eats and 18,500,000

102,077,000 bushels oats and 18,528,000 bushels barley.

The final estimates of last year printed in the December Monthly gave the production for the whole country as 16,610,000 bushels fall wheat, 133,379,600 bush-

els spring wheat, 323,449,000 bushels oats and 45,147,600 bushels barley. The October number of the Census Monthly will give the statistics of the areas of field crops of the Dominion this year as taken by the Census of the first of June.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Goes Down in a Crushing Landslide.

With a Majority of Forty-Three Seats Up-to-Date Mr. Borden Vindicates the Independence of Young Canada -Eight Ministers Are Beaten and Government Completely Discredited-Big Majority Without Aid of Bourassa.

Toronto, Sept. 22.-Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Government were over-whelmingly defeated in yesterday's elections.

According to the summary to-day Mr. Borden will have a majority of 43 on the elections already held. This includes the Nationalists of Quebec, but without them he will have a work-

ing majority.
Eight of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Min-isters are defeated, and but four of them survived the battle of the balthem survived the battle of the ballots. Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself was elected in two constituencies, Quebec East and Soulanges, but Hon. G. P. Graham, Hon. Mackenzie King, Hon. William Paterson, Hon. Sydney Fisher, Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon. Sir Frederick Borden, Hon. William Templeman and Hon. Jacques Bureau were unable to hold up their end.
