CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.
onthrio.
In every part of the province iumber of all kinds is moving actively. The fall demand irom retail dealers has presented itself within the past week, and at the same time numerous representatives of United States houses bave visited the mills on this sude in searth of stock. Not for many years have the yards been so thoroughly cleaned up at the close of the sawing season. Prices have stiffened slightly, and in the lower grades some advances have been made. At Toronto the wholesale price of $1 \times 10$ and 12 mill culls is $\$ 10.50$ to $\$ 11,1$-inch siding mill culls $\$ 9.50$ to $\$ 10$, and inch siding ship culls $\$ 11.50$ to $\$ 12$. These grades have advanced 50 cents within the past week. Inch fine dressing and better is also higher, being quoted at $\$ 22$ to $\$ 23$. The exceedingly high price of mill culls is the subject of much comnent by the trade. United States dealers have paid $\$ 8$ per housand for mill culls f.o.b. cars at Geurgian Bay points. To this must be added $\$ 2$ for duty and about $\$ 4$ for freight making the cost of the lumber delivered in the Eastern States about $\$ 14$ pet thous and. Nuch of this lumber, no doubt, is being used for the manufacture of boxes. Hardwood prices have rem:anned almost stationary for some time. A slight advance has been made on maple of first and second quality.
Shingles and lath continue to be much inquired for. XXX pine shineles, $16 \cdot$ inch sell at $\$ 2.60$ wholesale, and $\mathbb{X} . \mathrm{S}^{\prime}$ at $\$ 1.70$. No. 1 lath is quated it $\$ 2.60$ at Toronto and No. 2 at Si 75. with an upward ten dency.

There are indications that the shipping season is drawing to a close The exces. sive freight rates and insurance charges may terminate the season catice than usual. European trade is quiet, although regular shipments are being made to the Cnited States, the market there for clap. boards, shingles and other eastern pro-
ducts having greatly improved of late. Upon Boston rate of Ireight extra cedar shingles are now quoted at about $\$ 3.15$ to $\$ 3.25$. From New Brunswick and Nova Scotia seavy shipments of lumber are being made to South Anerira, from which quarter a heavy demand has lately arisen In Quebec there have been heavy rains, but in New 13 runswick the lumbermen are meeting with difficulty owing to then logs being hung up on account of low water.

## united staths.

Peculiarly favorable conditions characterize the lumber trade of the United States. Notwithstanding the many advances in price lists which have been niade, there is a tendency to mark prices still ligher. Fieight rates from Lake Superior to the Eastern market have now reached $\$ 4.50$, which dealers are pasing very reluctantly. In the face of this and of the acknowledged shortage in lumber there is litile fear of any break in prices before the spring of 1900 at least. Some of the best authorities state that the stocks of lumber on hand at the opening of the new year will be the lightest known in years. In the Tonawanda market there is a tendency on the part of dealers to ad. vance prices on box lumber and No. 3 barn, of which there is a decided shontage, while mill culls are nowhere to be found in any quanuty. In the Saginaw valley log my quannty. ranges from $\$ 16$ to $\$ 25$, box trom log run ranges from $\$ 16$ 10 $\$ 25$, box trom
$\$ 15$ to $\$ 16$, Norway from $\$ 12$ in $\$ 18$, and $\$ 15$ to $\$ 16$, Norway from $\$ 1210 \$ 18$, and
mill culls from $\$ 12$ to $\$ 1.4$ Hemlork has undergone an advance of one dollar per loousand at Buffalo and New York, being quoted at the base price of $\$ 13.50$ and $\$ 16$ at the respective points. Hardwonds have not changed. Canadian hirdwood lumber, such as ash, elm, basswood and maple, is eagerly sought for, and at pies if anyhing hugher than quotations of one week aro. White ash is quoted at Boston at $\$ 45$ for 1 -inch. $\$ 50$ for $1 \$$ and $1 \$ 2$ and $\$ 55$ for $2 \cdot$ inch. One-inch maple sells at
 inch at $\$ 31$, and 3 and 4 neh at $\$ 37$.
Lath is still strong, white pine selling at Chic sgo at $\$ 4$ and doy mixed at $\$ 3.75$. In the Susinat valley quotations we $\$ 3.50$ and $\$ 3.75$. $\$ 00$ standards, from Grindstone Island, Que., was sold about the madde of Seplember at 26 ijs per stitndard in a west coast buyer, and probably $£ 7$ is about the average selling quotatom at the present time. Less than one month aro sales were made as low as $f .6$ IEs, wheh gives a farr idea of the rapidity of the advance. Some merchames ire siorme stocks of spince, upon the beliet that by the new spince, upon the belind that by the new

At presemt the hagh values have a tendency to cheak business, but as the con. sumers satisly themselves that the adrance is to be mannamed, business will resume ats nomal contaion. masket.
France and Germany are reported :o be buying ennsiderable lumber, but prices are not altogether satisfactory. The South American demand appears to be steadily expanding, white in Australia the trade has shown a stixht improvemen:, atthoush no advance in price has been made.

The steaner Darwent Holme is loading A cargo of deals at Quebec for Honfleur, France, consigned by McLean, Kennedy \& Co .

The Inperial Lumber Co, of Toronto, are repotted to lave purchased the Booth \& Gordon stock of luniber at Sudbuis, Ont.
The Hanbury Manufacturing Co., of Brandon, Man., will pet out ibnot 12,$\infty 0,00$ feet of logs this winter, chiefly of spruce and tamaric.
The Harbor Commissioners of Montreal are invitung tenders for the annual supply of umber and planks for the year 1900. The date limit is October 9 th .

On Sepiember 2 gth the booms at the mouth of the Catheau river gave way, and about 150,000 logs belonging to and abuut 150,000 logs belonging to Oltawal lumb
Oltawa river.
Jeter Wallace. of Midland, Ont., has gone to Eifhteen Nile Island, French River, where he will cut about $=, 000,000$ feet of logs for Chew Bros., of Midland. He has a contract to cut all the timber on the island in three years.
M. P. Kinsella, representing the (iilmour Company, of Trenton, Uni., has placed an order with J. D. Ciarew, of Lirdsay, for 100,000 leel of dimensinn lumber and about 400,000 feet of hemlock and pine. The stock will be shipped to Trenton.
The Department of Indian Affairs at Otti:va invites tenders up to October t2th for 500,000 lee: of stancling spruce timber on the Crane river Indian Reserve, on the north-west side of Lake Manituba The northowest side of take Manituba.
The tumber is subjeat to Crown dues of 80 cents per thousand feet.

Owins to the recent heavy rans, the boom at the S:. Marlice Lumber Co.'s mill at Thice Ruets, Que., broke on Sep. tember 27hh, carrying away between 15, $\infty 00$ and 20,000 logs. Later the govern. ment booms, containing about $50,000 \operatorname{logs}$, and the immense boonis of the Laurentide Pulp Co., at Grand Mere, Que., gave way, allowing about 200000 logs to be swept out into the St. Lawrence. The loss to the owners will be quite heavy.
The Keewatin Lumber Co., of Kee watin, Ont, have experienced a very busy season, operating their nill nicht and day. In the winter of 189899 t.te com pany cut on their limits on Lake of the Woods $10,000,000$ feet of logs. This, together with the timber procured from Minnesota, made a total for the year's operations of $21,000,00$ feet. Sonie of these logs, however, will be carried over for sawing next spring before the drives arrive.

ICarterpondence of the Cavaida Luanemanas:l There is just now a rush of dealers from this side into Canada after pine lumber. The prices have gone up so high that there is a peneral uneasiness never the future, so it was ike relief across the line it was high time to co after it. This move has greath incteased the amount oflumber to come in from Camed this fall. The purchase of $20,000,000$ fect by this fall. The juluchase of $20,000,000$ fect by
the Montgomery's at Midland and other Georgian lay points will swell the importation,
but as a rule the tealer who is after Canatian lumber 15 gulng into $l_{3}$-districts for th, in the hope of gening it at a more mondernte price. In nome cases be will succeed, for nolody is any too well posted on the condition of the market, hut he will have to sit on the pile till It is on the way to his own yard in some cases. There is any amount of complaint that the saw mill man has struck a custonier who will pay more for the stock and has sold it again. Une or two Buffalo dealers are loohing into the lan of the case and will bring suit if there secems to be any chance of recovery, but as a rule there is no remedy, for the law obliges the purchaser to prove actual damages whinch in many cases the is not able to du, so he takes what comfort lie can in grumbling.

This matier of keepung posteci on the condsuma of the market is no swall sulice of wondet to those who are alwajs well abreast of it. They are always alile to find dealers right at home who are cominually selling their lumber at less than mardet prices, and doing this with no pasticular end in view, all becanse they are not posted. Others who are aware of this are sometimes afraid that too much of the situa. lion will be given away by the trade papers. From their oun standpoint this is a correct mea, but if the lusiness as a whole is to le made the most of, the clearest and most complete view of the slate of trade must be had on all sides, without reference to individual demands.

All sorts of lumber is still going up, most of it quite rapidly. The hemloct prodacers have been beset so terribly for stuck that they could not turn out that they kept puting up the price $s 0$ cents at a lime all summer in the hope of chutting off the demand, but this liad so
little apparent effect on it that they at last ondered it up one dollar, making the base price $\$ 13.50$ at wholesale and $\$ 16.50$ at retail. This has frightened the luilders, and Hill have the effect of shutting out speculative building to a great extent, esprecially as the price of everything else in the building line is also very high.
The advance in price, next to hemlock, is in pine, which is nou at fever height and is still going up. The report from Canada now is that the prices on pine are $f$ or the most part fally up to ours, minus the duty, so that there is no chance of special profit there except on odd lots that may still be found here and there Sitl there is poing to be considerable bough here from this tume on, unless the prices ge 00 stecp, for the searcity at home is such that it is hard to find a supply of lumber that is desurable. There is no longer any chance of buying this or that just as it may happen to be wanted. The seller sells as he likes. Ile is oncmamad of the situation and will not sell the creati, and leave the rest un his hands. In spite of nur high prices, they have ail been cnforced by the attitude of the producer, as a matter of self-defence. As $n$ rule the prices are still lower than should be the case if the asking prices at the mills are made the basis, and if it were not that our sales are mostly made of luntber bought some months ago, and therefore at a price considerably Inwer than we can duly for now, there would be actua "e
