



TRADE AND COMMERCE

COMMERCIAL JOURNAL OFFICE,

Tuesday Morning, Nov. 6.

VICTORIA.

Business continues steady, in most lines, and there was the usual sorting up trade after the end of the month. There are no special features in the general situation, which remains unchanged. Bank collections due on the fourth of the month were fairly well met. Collections are still reported slow, although during the past two months ready money in merchants' hands has been free, on account of returns from the salmon fisheries and sealing fleet.

The Vancouver News-Advertiser says: "Merchants report business as fairly steady, and while there is no rush in any line, the prospects for the winter trade are fairly good. Money is still tight, but collections for the present month have so far shown a slight improvement. In the lumber industry there are already signs of improvement. The rumor that the Ross-McLaren Lumber Co. had secured a large contract for South Africa, has been semi-officially confirmed and the fact that the machinery, which has laid idle for a couple of years or more, is being overhauled, tends to confirm the report. The change in the United States tariff has also given an impetus to the local lumber industry and two vessels have already been chartered to convey lumber to San Francisco from this Province, while there is every indication that an extensive business will in time be worked up. In wholesale, as usual, there has been quite a brisk trade at the opening of the month. Wholesalers expect a fairly good business this winter, judging from present indications." [3

SALMON.

The Corryvechan sailed Oct. 28 for London with a cargo of 55,314 cases salmon. The British schooner Rimac, 855 tons, Capt. Warn, is now out 88 days from Santos for this port to load salmon on account of Findlay, Durham & Brodie.

Stocks are now pretty well cleaned up, and when the Senta and the Rimac finish, there will be a small quantity left to supply the local demand.

LUMBER.

The American schooner Sadie, 295 tons, Capt. Smith, sailed Oct. 3) from New Westminster, with a cargo of 410,-000 feet valued at \$2,870, from the Brunette Mills. Anderson, now on the way from Shanghai, has been chartered to load a cargo at Moodyville for Shanghai, at 43s by Messrs. R. P. Rithet & Co., L'td. It is rumored that a number of vessels have been fixed for loading at the Hastings Mill but patticulars of charters are unobtainable for the present.

DON'T ADMIT YOUR LOSSES.

At all seasons of the year there are a great many firms which advertise in large, flaring headlines, that they are selling goods away below what they cost. Supposing that this is true in every particular-we hardly think that it is a good plan for one to admit that he is compelled to, or does sell for less than what he pays for goods. Would it not be a more telling point to have people suppose that it were simply your regular line of business to sell goods at a much lower price than other stores, and that it was your facility for buying that enabled you to do this?

One idea in cutting prices on goods, or in making special prices, is to give the public the idea of the reasonableness with which you can sell merchandise. It does not impart to them any particular knowledge of your ability to make close prices when you say that you are selling below cost. Anyone can sell below cost who has a mind to do so, but it takes a great store indeed to be able to sell at these very low prices and still make money. Might it not be that you would gain a greater reputation for yourself, if, in all cases where you are compelled, or do, for any reason, sell at less than cost price, if you would do so without admitting the facts of the case, but rather boasting of your ability to make these special values, when your competitors are not able to do so without losing money?

A firm sometimes overreaches itself in the endeavor to be constantly harping upon the fact that it loses money on any In the first particular line of goods. place it is not a good reputation to gain that one is not making money, as it very often leads to the thought that the business is unsuccessful.

A merchant would gain a much greater reputation by letting people know of the cheapness of his goods, and let them say to themselves that "This is so much cheaper than I can get it elsewhere," and let them believe, if they will, that it is his regular business to make such prices on all kinds of goods.

NOT FOR SHOW.

It will be remembered that, some months since, on the occasion of a firemen's demonstration when the Montreal brigade were turned out for show purmores and the city was left unprotected, a tire of very considerable proportions occurred, the electric light works among other institutions being materially damaged. And Montreal, owing to the excellence of its appliances and service enjoys the benefit of low fire insurance premiums. Here, in Victoria, however, where we do not indulge in such follies and where Chief Deasy and his small band of assistants attend strictly to business, we are by no means as well appreciated by the underwriters, who classify us with communities which are rated at a high price.

Why this should be we fail to see, except that the gross amount of insurance business to be done here is only small and unless a heavy premium was charged it would be impossible to maintain so many agencies. Considering that as matters stand there is no competition in so far as the premiums to be paid, we think, as we have previously said, that the business could be much more advantageously divide among a far smaller number of companies. But, in regard to the show business, we were glad to see that the Victoria Fire Brigade were not turned out to receive the Governor-General.

EDITORIAL COMMENT.

RECENT advices from Australia show business in the import market to have been void of animation, there was limited inquiry and poor prices. The weather had been variable, but there was reported to be a go d show for the coming warm season. The New South Wales Assembly was considering a new land bill, while several important measures were under consideration affecting commerce and shipping. Confidence was being slowly restored, money was easier and property sales had been more numerous. Mining matters were quiet, the coal trule particularly not being as brisk as could be desired.

THE contract for the Dominion Goverament buildings in Victoria has, we notice, been awarded to Mr. Frederick Toms, of Ottawa. They are estimated to cost \$190,000, in addition to the site for which \$75,000 were paid. Messrs. Elford & Smith, of Victoria, were some \$8,050 higher than the successful tenderer. is said, that work on the new buildings will be commenced at an early date, and that it will be vigorously prosecuted. Another favorable report is that to Brudstrot's concerning October bank clearings, which reflect the enlarged Fall trade in a total larger than for any month since June, 1893. The aggregate reported to Brodstreet's for October this year is \$4,228,287,550, an increase over September, 1894, of 21 per cent., and over October last year of more than 6.3 per cent. The cities very generally report increases over a year ago, only about one-seventh showing decreases. New York City clearings fair to show as large a proportionate increase as do other cities. Only one in the Eastern and Middle States shows a decrease from October a year ago. For ten months this year, the decrease in clearings compared with 1893 is 9.6 per cent., and compared with 1892, the falling off is 27 per cent.

Throughout some portions of the North West, complaints are still heard of unseas-nably mild weather, with consequent unfavorable effect on bisiness, while there, as elsewhere, interest in the political situation just prior to election day checks business ac ivity somewhat.

Exports of wheat and flour as what, both coasts of the United States, amount to 2,934,000 bushels, against 3,353,000 bushels last week, and as compared with 2,860,000 bushels in the corresponding week a year ago, 3,714,000 bushels two years ago, 3,820,000 bushels three years ago, and with 2,209,000 bushels in the low priced goods, for the number of like week in 1890. The total stocks of pairs produced and shipped seems greater available wheat, United States and Cansoia, those atleat for Europe from all sources and held in Europe on November 1st, were the largest on record, 178,-682,000 bushels, or 5,800,000 bushels more than one year before, and much heavier when compared with corresponding dates in previous years.

> At present the volume of business transacted is on the whole smaller than in 1892, though a presidential election was then close at hand. Comparison of railroad carnings is less valuable, because passenger traffic a year ago was extraordinarily large owing to the World's Fair, but while the freight movement, outside eastbound shows some gain the eastbound movement from Chicago is a quarter less than last year, and for the month has been 195,458 tons against 236,302 last year, and about 290,000 in 1892. Eurnings for the latest week show a decrease of 4.6 per cent, and for the month of October thus far 4.3 per cent. compared with last year and 11.3 per cent. compared with 1892. Bar and wire show no improvement, and The average of quotations for various kinds of iron and steel is 3 per cent lower than in July, 6.5 per cent higher than at the lowest point in April and 20 per cent lower than in July last year. A conference of steel rail makers resulted in no change of policy, though purchases of English rails by Mr. Huntington for Pacific delivery and by Canadian roads indicate that American makers are losing part of their natural market.

The Government has austained a heavy deficit for the most of October, and customs reports are disappointingly light. Otherwise the money markets reflect only a remarkable absence of commercial demand, though the possible reduction of interests on deposits may lead some withdrawal of country funds. Exports for the past four weeks were 16 per cent less than last year, while imports were 9 per cent greater. Failures continuo small and for four weeks ending October 25th, liabilities were \$8,206,892, of which \$3,149,655 were of manufacturing, and \$4,091,434 of trading concerns. During the past week failures have been 249 in the United States, against 358 last year, and 50 in Canada, against 28 last year.

DAIRY PRODUCE.

The Montreal Trade Bulletin says: Butter receipts during the past week were 3,522 pkgs against 3,850 pkgs for the week previous. The market is quiet, and the only business of any account refers to the local trade. While some holders of September and October creamery refuse to accept under 21c, others are offering to sell at 20hc and 20hc, a good round lot being offered at the latter price. July and August goods can be bought at 19c, and June goods have been placed at 17 to 18c. In dairy butter, a lot of 500 tubs of Kamouraska was off-red yesterday at 15c to a Newfoundland firm; but it was not wanted. The English market offers no encouragement whatevet, and low prices seem to be the order of the day. We quote:

FAILURES IN BUSINESS.

Henry Taylor, in a hardware contemporary, has an article on " Failures, and How Avoided." He has no hesitation in ascribing the large proportion of failures to want of capital, want of experience and want of principle. The more cash a man has, he says, other considerations being equal, the greater the chances of his success. He should have at his command a sufficiency of cash to meet his liabilities as they mature, and, says Mr. Taylor, except under special circumstances, fifty per cen . of this should be his own. Referring specially to his own line-the hardware trade-though his remarks will largely apply elsewhere, Mr. Taylor observes: "In these days of close competition, it is useless to expect success, even with a sufficient cash capital, unless one has the experience only to be gained in the hardware trade by a steady, perservering application in the study of the various lines of goods which go to make up the stock of the regular hardware store. The experience to fit one to enter the lists of the retail hardware men of to day in Canada is much more exacting than was formerly the case, for, as years roll on and the country improves, the lists of goods enlarge, and a more general knowledge is needed. Then, in addition to this kind of knowledge, that of bookkeeping is absolutely necessary.'

The necessity of a regular system of stock-taking is dwelt upon with considerable force, and this alike in the interests of one's creditors as of one's self. In regard to lack of principle, it is pointed out how many dangers are avoided by the man of principle, for the business struggle is a constant up-hill fight, which, together with the rocks of which he has to steer clear, emphasizes the well-tried maxim that it is not luck but labor that makes

TACOMA TRADE.

The Tacoma West Coast Trade says . "While all lines of trade have not shown fully the same degree of activity that characterized the last week of the Interstate Fair, the general trend of business has not been unsatisfactory, and there has been a fair sprinkling of visiting buyers in the market making purchases, since last review. Though it is little trouble to find unfavorable elements in the business situation at this time, there are also bright spots and many indications favorable to improved conditions. The opening of traffic relations between the Burlington system and Northern Pacific, practically giving Paget Sound another transcontinental railway line, and throwing open a wide and profitable field heretofore inaccessible to our lumbermen, will probably accelerate the railway movement in this product, while the announcement that work will commence next season upon the Midland Pacific, another transcontinental railway centering on Paget Sound, is favorable news from a railway transportation standpoint. export movement in both lumber and wheat is fair, while the sailing of the initiatory vessel in a line of clipper and steamships to South Africa, and the prospective establishment of a line of South American vessels from Puget Sound, demonstrates the growth of commerce upon the high seas. Crops of nearly all kinds have yielded an abundance, and though prices ar · distressingly low, still the movement is bringing in considerable There is no lack cash from the outside. of new manufacturing establishments going up in the cities and towns of the State, and there is a steady movement of population in this direction."

DRY GOODS.

The Toronto Empire says: "During the past week the fine mild weather has had the effect of loosening the demand for heavy goods. Just now the sorting trade is particularly susceptible to climatic influences. A cold wave stimulates demand and a few days of warm weather causes a dropping off. Apart from the orders received for cottons and imported woollens for the spring trade, which have begun to come in quite satisfactorily, demand runs on lines suitable for fall and winter wear. Overcoatings, suitings, mantle cloths, box cloths, tailors' trimmings, heavy dress goods, serges, flannelettes, flaunels and heavy coarse woollens. The latter has been in continuously active demand by lumbermen and storekeepers in lumber districts, and stocks in the hands of wholesale merchants and manufacturers are being

exercised by importers. We notice that some retail houses are advortising special sales. These are not a circumstance to the slaughtering in progress about this time last year. Mill agents report placing orders for both cot ons and woollens for the spring trade as being ahead of those of last year. Canadian prints have done particularly well, and a good sorting trade is looked for later on. The clothing manufacturers are now placing a few sorting orders, and reports so far go to show that sales to date have been quite fair. In about a fortnight the domestic mills will have patterns of new 1892 fall tweeds lines on exhibit. The samples of new spring prints laces and carpets, and some lines of imported woollens, have been in the hands of travellers for only a week or ten days, but the trade seem quite disposed to order with moderate freedom. The present spring like weather may be exercising an in fluence in that direction. Payments are fair to good, not only from Ontario, but from eastern and western provinces. We note again the satisfac ory returns from Manitoba. In a good many instances we hear of paper renewed from time to time, having been cancelled and reduced materially The feeling among the trade here is that the retail trade in Manitoba and in the Northwest is in an improved position "

The Berlin Royal Library has acquired a Semitic manuscript by a Hebrew doctor of the fourteenth century, which promises to throw much light on the instory of medicine.

Scientific cleanliness is to be promoted in French schoolrooms by boiled drinking water, damp cloths, instead of dry dusters and brooms, and an antiseptic cleaning once a week.

The largest death-rate of any city in the world, from the use of alcohol, is recorded in Stockholm, the Swedish capital. The number of deaths from this cause is ninety in 1,000.

It is said that Mr. Thomas Moore, of Land and Water, London, and Mr. Cleve, a Belfast gen leman, will invest about £6,000 in an enterprise in British Columbia, and if a success, the total investment will be about £50,000.

In the foreign notes of a recent number of the Literary Digest, there is the statement that the German Government has received a petition signed by many influential merchants asking the authorities to push the passage of laws against dishonorable competition. The petitioners advise a revision of the law according to the French system. In France, for instance, a manufacturer or dealer may not advertise his wares as the "only reliable," or "the best in the world," if it can be rapidly reduced.
