REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

MONTREAL, CANADA EAST, 22nd July, 1866.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY SIR J. MICHEL.

THE first Military Industrial Exhibition in Canada, was opened at the Victoria Skating Rink, Montreal, on the 14th May, 1866, by His Excellency Lieut.-General Sir John Michel, K.C.B., Commanding the Forces.

By special permission, Her Majesty was graciously pleased to extend Her patronage to the undertaking, and a Royal Salute was fired on the occasion. His Excellency the Governor General also gave his support to the Exhibition by becoming Vice-Patron.

An Address was delivered, on behalf of the Committee, by Major-General the Hon. James Lindsay, Commanding the District, which was acknowledged by the Lieut.-General.*

The earliest intimation that this Exhibition would take place was made on the 14th November, 1865, to the following Corps in the District. (Memo dated 14th November, 1865, † in which the object of the Exhibition was explained. Further instructions ‡ were given on the 8th January, 1866, and the names of the Officers of the General Committee, and Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers, comprising the Regimental Committees, were published.

On the 14th April, 1866, instructions || were issued, fixing the date of opening and the place of Exhibition, also regulating the price of admission, &c.

The Articles for sale § were received into the Exhibition building on the 7th and 8th May, also a large collection for shew, from various Staff and Departmental Officers.

Separate Stalls were allotted to each Corps, which were tastefully arranged in the order of classification of the Articles.

On the day after the opening of the Exhibition, Jurors sat to award prizes to the most deserving in each Class.

Two prizes were given for each Class, without reference to Regiments, and two prizes were given to each Class in every Corps; the former being

termed "General" and the latter "Regimental" prizes; of the former 25 were awarded and of the latter 105.

Lists of the Jurors and Prizes are appended.*

Articles to the Amount of 1273 dollars or $\pounds 262$ sterling were sold during the Exhibition, and at an Auction, in the building, a few days after.

The Exhibition was open for six days and seven evenings, during which it was visited by 6105 persons, of whom 2400 were Soldiers and their wives, and the sum of \$958.08 or £196–13s. $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. sterling, was received for tickets and admission. The total receipts and expenditure of the Exhibition are shewn in the Treasurer's accounts.†

It is highly gratifying to the Committee to be able to state that they were enabled, from the receipts alone, to defray all the expenses of the Exhibition, award prizes, and remunerate the Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers who assisted in the arrangements; the undertaking has therefore been a complete success, which cannot fail to have the good effect of encouraging Soldiers to continue their industrious efforts.

The Committee have great pleasure in recording the fact that a large number of the Articles exhibited for sale, displayed ingenious design and superior workmanship, ealling forth expressions of approval and satisfaction from the Jurors and Visitors; some of the exhibitors were rewarded with the honor of their Articles having been purchased for Her Majesty.

It may here be remarked that eabinet, earpenters' work, and fancy turning were in great demand; and although the Committee do not wish to take upon themselves to lay down what particular articles it would be most advisable for Soldiers to make, (for the great object is, the employment of idle time, and the interest excited by neat workmanship, displaying genius and design) yet they consider it necessary to notice that many articles, which must have eost the maker much time and trouble, did not sell; for instance, "Ornamental Models, and Expensive Faney Work of no utility. Large Patch Work Quilts of high price, did not meet with ready purchase at first, though most of them were sold before the closing of the Exhibition. If these articles were made of smaller dimensions, and were not so costly they would meet with a better sale.

The Committee, on the other hand, wish Soldiers to understand that nothing can be considered of too trivial a nature for Exhibition, as several things made from pieces of wood, cane, and cloth pieked up in the barrack yard, and which were ingeniously worked into pretty and useful articles, sold well. Basket, Wieker and Cane Work, none of which was exhibited, would also usefully employ men in their spare time.

It is rot the least agreeable part of the duty of the Committee to state that from the information of the Lady Jurors, the Embroidery and Needle Work, by the Soldiers' wives and children, appeared to be very creditable. The Plain and Useful Needle Work by the women was generally good, but that of the children differed much in Regiments; some shewing that every attention had been paid to this branch of instruction, while others displayed a great want of it; as the Exhibition brought the children's work into competition, better results may in future be expected from those hitherto negligent.

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hat ral nek les, ed, In conclusion, it is most satisfactory to notice that no accident or loss of any article occurred. The Committee fixed the prices of admission for Soldiers at a low uniform rate for each day, without reference to the higher rates paid by other persons on special days; and it is most gratifying to state that the general good conduct of the men, throughout the period during which the Exhibition was open, amply proved that this decision of the Committee was wise, and valued at a proper estimate; and that the success which has attended this Exhibition has been appreciated by the Soldiers, and that many who at first did not understand its object, or who doubted its benefit, have since acknowledged its valuable results.

APPENDIX A.

MONTREAL, 14th May, 1866.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

1. While the Exceutive Committee express their regret at the absence of His Excellency the Governor General of British North America, who has been pleased to give this Exhibition, (the opening of which has been arranged for this day,) the benefit of his patronage, yet they beg to assure your Excellency that they are deeply sensible of the support you have extended to it by having consented to inaugurate the Soldier's Industrial Exhibition of this District.

2. The object which the Executive Committee have had in view in proposing this Exhibition, was to promote a taste for useful, interesting, and intellectual occupation among Her Majesty's Soldiers during the months of a long Canadian winter.

3. Your Excellency is well aware that soldiers have oceasionally much leisure time, and in proportion to their numbers, only small opportunities of employing themselves in profitable occupations, and exercising their ingenuity and skill.

4. The Excentive Committee trusted that an Exhibition of this description would afford to many the means of employing their leisure hours in a manner which the Soldiers would individually find attractive and useful to them during their military career.

5. Your Excellency will now judge to what extent the intentions of the Exceutive Committee have been fulfilled, and developed by those in whose interests the undertaking was commenced; and your Excellency will not fail to bear in mind that owing to the temporary character of the various barracks in this country, from absence of workshops and ether convenient arrangements, work has in many instances been conducted under difficulties.

6. The state of affairs in Canada during the past winter has also had in effect in diminishing the number of exhibitors, owing to the extra dury caused thereby, more particularly in the garrisons of Quebee and Kingston, and frontier stations.

7. ' Executive Committee have been most anxious that this Exhbition should be self-supporting; and bearing in mind that it is essentially a SOLDIER'S EXHIBITION, they have fixed their contributions in visiting it in proportion to their pay.

8. The Executive Committee now request your Excellency to openthis Exhibition for the inspection and judgment of the public, and they tope that it will receive the support of all who take an interest in the industry of those who are stationed in Canada for the defence of the country.

APPENDIX B.

GENERAL LINDSAY, AND MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE :

1. Concurring in the regret expressed by you at the absence of His Excellency the Governor-General, and fully aware of the loss you have sustained by His Lordship's absence, it will now be my endeavour to supply the void and to earry out, however inadequately, the probable intentions of His Lordship.

2. As respects the object, which the Executive Committee has proposed to itself, as an old soldier, I can safely affirm, that there is not one more worthy the carnest zeal, deep concern, and unflinching energy of every one desirous of the well-being of the soldier.

3. The grand problem we have to solve, is how to give the soldier occupation of a character so interesting, and yet so rational, as to lead him insensibly to a due respect for himself.

4. Officers in all parts of the British world have this in their minds.

5. There are some who foolishly believe, that the soldier is differently constituted from themselves.

6. To these I would say : Can it for a moment be conceived that large bodies of very young men, replete with an excess of animal life, the $cr\hat{e}me$ de la $cr\hat{e}me$, (if you will allow me the expression) of British manhood, ean be congregated together for any length of time, without some occupations independent of their military duties, to fill up the dreary monotony of a barrack life, and more especially in a country like this, where the alternations of extreme heat and cold are so extreme, as equally to debar any great amount of out-door amusement.

7. So sensible are officers throughout the British world of this necessity, that in many regiments especial endeavours are made to furnish healthful amusement to the soldier.

8. One officer in this garrison has been pre-eminently active in this respect, and I am glad to have the opportunity of thus publicly acknow-ledging my sense of the merit of his exertions.

9. But, however, useful as adjuncts may be theatricals, reading rooms, monster concerts, rinks, etc, I believe that habits gained by industrial 10. At any rate, industrial occupation must always hold a very prominent position in aiding the attainment of the general end we have in view; and your exertions to this end, gentlemen, as members of the Executive Committee are worthy of our warmest thanks:

11. And when I say our thanks, I do not mean the thanks of the Army only; but also that of our Canadian fellow-subjects, for it must be apparent to every one, that so long as this free and noble country is knit to England by ties of mutual esteem and regard, so long will the well-being of the British soldier be a matter of interest to the Canadian eitizen.

12. In the name, then, of him, whose position I am momentarily filling, and recollecting the anxiety of the Committee that this Exhibition should be self-supporting, I call upon you all for carnest aid in its support, and I hereby proclaim that from this moment, is opened

District Memorandum.

The MAJOR-GENERAL submits the following proposals to Officers Commanding Corps in the 2nd Military District, viz :

That a MILITARY INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION, similar to those which have been so successful, first in the 2-12th Regiment, and secondly in the Camp at Aldershot, be held in Montreal next Spring, for articles made and invented by Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Soldiers of Regiments in the District.

The object of the Exhibition to be explained to the men, viz. :

1. To give those who are willing to work, something to amuse and instruct them during their leisure hours.

2. Articles contributed, to be sold at a price a little above their actual eost, as the main object of the Exhibition is employment not profit.

In carrying out these objects it would be necessary to assist some by providing them with materials and tools. The mode of doing this must be left in the hands of a Regimental Committee, who must arrange it under the sanction of the Commanding Officer, according to the applications made for assistance.

It will be necessary to establish a Committee of three Officers in each Regiment and a Sub-Committee of three Non-Commissioned Officers, and also a General Committee, to whom the Regimental Committees would report.

The Exhibition is also to include the work of the Wives and Children of Soldiers.

Articles to be exhibited by Regiments.

Articles of each Regiment to be exhibited in Classes.

- A Class.—Carpenters' Work, Cabinet-making, Barrack or Camp Furniture.
- B Class.—Military Engineering Instruments, Accoutrements and Equipments, Military Models, &c.
- C Class.-Leather Work.

D Class .- Men's Needle-work and Cloth Work.

- E Class.—Hardware, Inventions or work of Armourer Sergeants, Smiths, &c.
- F Class .- Photography, Drawing, &c.
- G Class .- Miscellaneous, not in other Classes.
- H Class .--- Women's Needle-work, Embroidery, &c.
- I Class.—Children's Needle-work, from 4 to 9 years old, and from 10 to 15 years.

The arrangements will be hereafter detailed at greater length, but enough has been at present said to explain the project to the men.

The MAJOR-GENERAL invites the co-operation of Commanding Officers and Officers of Corps in promulgating this plan, and promoting its success with the men under their command; and request that they will be good enough to communicate with him thereon, on or before Monday, the 20th instant.

FIRST REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

1. The object sought to be attained is to cultivate among Soldiers a taste for useful, interesting, and intellectual amusement, and to induce many to devote a portion of their leisure time to such pursuits.

.

2. The Committee confidently hope that Officers of all ranks will give encouragement and assistance to their men in earrying out this object.

3. A Regimental Committee of Officers, and a Sub-Committee of Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates have been formed in each Corps, under the direction of the Officers Commanding.

4. The time proposed for the Exhibition in Montreal is the end of April, or the beginning of May.

5. Each Corps is to provide such tools and materials as are required by the Non-Commissioned Officers and Men.

6. The Committee understand from the Major-General that there is no objection to advances, from the Canteen Funds of Corps, being made, to give the necessary assistance with reference to Paragraph 5: the object of the Exhibition being to give recreation and interest to those who exhibit as well as to those who will hereafter have the opportunity of inspecting it.

7. A portion of the building, in which the Exhibition will be held, will be set apart for each Corps, who are to arrange their productions according to Classes. Each Corps is to undertake the arrangement of its own portion, and to defray the expenses thereof, subject to such rules as may be laid down by the General Committee. 8. In order that the men of Corps stationed at Quebec and Kingston may have the opportunity of seeing that part of the Exhibition contributed by their comrades, Commandants may, if they think fit, make arrangements to exhibit them in their Garrisons, at such period as will not interfere with their being in Montreal on the day, which will in due course be appointed. The Committee, however, wish it to be understood that all articles exhibited as above, are also to be forwarded to Montreal, as they are anxious for numbers of contributors, as well as the quality of the contributions.

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9. All articles exhibited to be numbered, and if for sale marked with the price. No articles to be removed till after the close of the Exhibition in Montreal. Articles sold in other Garrisons must be sent to Montreal marked " sold."

10. The price of any article sold will be paid to the Treasurer of the General Committee, who, at the close of the Exhibition, will transmit it to the Committee of the Regiment to which the maker of the article belongs, in order that it may be paid over to him. The Regimental Committee will make their own arrangements as to the repayment of advances.

11. Sums received for admission will go to defray the general expenses, and should there be any surplus it will be divided as the General Committee may see fit among the Committees of Corps, who will, in turn, apportion it as each may judge most expedient.

12. It is to be understood that Officers can exhibit any plans or inventions, and men attached to the Military Departments who have been Soldiers can do the same.

13. The Committee have decided upon the following Classes :

1. The Military Industrial Exhibition will take place at the Victoria Skating Rink, Drummond Street, Montreal, and will open at two o'clock P.M. on Monday the 14th of May next, and continue daily from 2 to 9 P.M. until Saturday the 19th, inclusive.

2. All articles for Exhibition must be placed in the building on Monday and Tuesday, 7th and 8th May, as nothing will be admitted after the latter date. The space allotted to each Corps will be pointed out by the Secretary.

3. The Prices of Admission will be as follows, and no change given at the doors :

4. On Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday, Tickets issued will admit of the holders leaving and returning. On other days, no Tickets will be issued, and persons leaving and returning must pay again.

6. Wives and Children of Soldiers, who wish to visit the Exhibition, will receive Tickets from the Regimental Committee on paying the price of admission, without which they cannot be admitted at the reduced price.

8. A Refreshment Stall will be established at the Rink during the Exhibition.

9. Corps stationed at Quebec, Kingston, and St. Johns, are requested to furnish the name of an Officer each, to be added to the General Committee.

10. Any alterations or additions to the original List of Exhibitors, or articles, to be notified to the Secretary by the 1st May, with a view to a correct Catalogue being prepared for guidance in the arrangement of space, and information during Exhibiticn.

11. The name of the Exhibitor to be affixed to each article, and, if for sale, the price also, before being deposited in the building.

12. The Articles for Exhibition will be arranged Regimentally, by Classes, under the different heads given in the first printed report of the General Committee, Paragraph 13.
