





The reports published that warrants were issued for Superintendent Lynch and two other officials were absolutely without foundation.

The evidence adduced on behalf of the company disclosed that they had purchased in 1871 the land in dispute, altho the same had not been fenced along the true boundary. The evidence further showed that possessory title had not been acquired by the Town of Orillia and that in any case the title to land being in dispute, the magistrate had no jurisdiction. At the conclusion of the hearing the magistrate reserved decision, which he gave this morning.

The solicitor for the company elicited the information from the mayor and chief of police that when the three arrests were made, there was no warrant and not even an information—the men being arrested while committing no of-

and not even an information—the men-being arrested while committing no of-fence and brought up and held in tha-police station until bail was furnished. This high-handed and unwarranted proceeding on the part of the Orillia authorities will probably result in three interesting actions for false arrest. Not Enough Mileage.







This province of over sixty-eight million people, more than the total population of Germany, is the Chinese province most distant from western civilization. This is not a fault, it is an advantage, because the cause of Christian missions is not handicapped as in the case of the coast provinces of China by the presence and spread of so many forms of the cor-rupting influence of the Occident. The province is not only of great importance in view of the vast number of people belonging to it, but also because of the great influence which it is destined to exert upon neighboring prov-inces of China and upon the spread of Christianity in Thibet and other parts of Central Asia. I do hope that the

full program proposed may be carried out in the not distant future. The laymen present, after full discussion, unanimously decided to raise a sum of \$300,000 annually for a period of five years, for the objects stated, this amount to be solicited from those who feel that they are able to give more largely than they are at present doing to the general fund, which latter it is felt, must not only be maintained at its present figure, but increased yearly for some time to come at the rate of \$50,000 per year. # TO WIELD A "BIG STICK"

H. C. Hocken Points Out What Commissioners Could Do to Relieve Toronto If They Wanted to.

H. C. Hocken writes The World expressing regret at the revived agitation for the expropriation of the Toronto Railway Co., which, he believes, is what the company desires, and declaring that the laws already enacted by the provincial legislature provide the means to fully protect the interests of the citizens.

"The public has been brought to the

"The public has been brought to the present pitch of exasperation that they might more readily listen to the arguments in favor of expropriation," is his opinion. "It is so greatly in the interests of the company that there can be no doubt whatever that the directors would be glad to enter upon arbitration proceedings. They would have a right to claim the value of the unexpired term of their franchise. They pired term of their franchise. They can show net profits last year of \$1,500,000. They will be able to show from their records of the past ten years that 500,000. They will be able to show from their records of the past ten years that there has been a progressive increase in their net revenue. If they establish their contention for a proportionate in crease, they would be able to make out a good case for a payment of at least \$20,000,000 for prospective profits alone. Add to that the value of their plant as a going concern, which is represented by stocks and bonds to the amount of \$12,000,000, and we have the sum of \$32,000,000 as an inside figure that the city would have to pay at the present time to recover the franchise. "If the citizens were led into such an expenditure as this it would mean that the capital charges to be met on street railway account would make it impossible for them to secure a reduction in fares for forty years to come. Are they willing to face such a contingency as this, especially in view of the fact that the existing statutes of the Province of Ontario, if reasonably applied, provide an ample remedy for the present intolerable situation?

Powers of Railway Board.

"To prove my contention that the law provides a sufficient remedy, I refer your readers to Chapter 31 of the Statutes of Ontario, 1906. This is an act constituting the railway and municipal board. It gives that board power to order as many cars as the traffic of the city demands and to regulate the details of the operation of the whole system in conformity with its agreement with the city. Clause 63 reads: Where it is alleged by a municipal corporation having jurisdiction over, or maintaining a highway, along which a railway is operated, in whole or in part, under an agreement between such municipality and the company operating the railway, that the company has violated or committed a breach of such agreement, or where it is alleged by such company that such municipality has violated or committed a breach of such agreement, the board shall hear all matters relating to such alleged violation or breach of agreement, and shall make such order as to the same as it may seem, having regard to all the circumstances of the case, reasonable and expedient, and in such order may in its discretion direct the company or the municipality to do such things as in its discretion direct the company or the municipality to do such things as are necessary for the proper fulfilment of such agreement, or to retrain from doing such act as constitutes a viola-tion or breach thereof."

"It is clear to every citizen of Toronto, and must be equally apparent to the members of the railway board, and to Sir James Whitney and his government, that the Toronto Railway company is endeavoring to handle its traffic without a sufficient number of cars. It is 'reasonable and expedient' that the railway board should order the company to provide was expedient' the railway board should order the company to provide more cars, and it necessary to their efficient operation, put some of these on routes where there is no congestion of traffic, and thus relieve the congested streets. This clause gives the board the widest powers to enforce the fulfilment of the agreement by the Toronto Railway Company in a reasonable way the Company in a reasonable way. The act also confers upon the railway board most complete power to enforce

their order Can Take Over Railway.

"To prove this I quote sub-sections
No. 2 and 3 of clause 63, which immediately follow: "The board may take
such steps and employ such persons as
may be necessary for the proper enforcement of such order, and in pursuance thereof they may forcibly or
otherwise enter upon seize and false suance thereof they may forcibly or otherwise enter upon, seize and take possession of the whole or part of the railway, and the real and personal property of such company, together with its books and offices and may, until such order has been enforced, assume and take over all or any of the powers, duties, rights and functions of the directors and officers of such comthe directors and officers of such comrany and supervise and direct the mangrany and supervise and direct the management of such company and its railway in all respects, including the employment and dismissal of officers and servants of the company for such time as the board shall continue to direct such management. Upon the board so taking possession of such railway and property, it shall be the duty of every officer and employe of the company officer and employe of the company to obey the orders of the board or of to obey the orders of the board or of such person or persons as it may place in authority in the management of any or all departments of such railway. "It will be seen, therefore, that Sir James Whitney has placed upon the statutes of this province an act which provides for the protection alike of the interests of the citizens and of the company.

Board Has Failed.

"We are brought to our present condition because of the failure of the railway and municipal board to use its powers for the protection of the public. It is inevitable that an act that confers so much authority upon the railway commissioners, is capable of being used for the oppression either of the company or the public. It is unfortunately the case that in every dispute between the municipality and the pute between the municipality and the Toronto Railway Company, the commissioners seem to have lost sight of their duty to the public and consented to measures that are oppressive, but which inure to the advantage of the private corporation. This may be due to the persuasive powers of the representatives of the Toronto Railway Company, or to the inability of the commissioners to fully grasp their responsibility to the public.



The farmer is certainly having his inning now, and it is the profit that has made the town in our west, and will continue to make them. Of course, the great and staple crop here is wheat, but there is money to be made in other crops and products of the farm. Every branch of farming here will yield big profits. Here are some facts and hydres regarding the cost of production and market prices: Potatoes, 75c to \$1.25 per hussle! yield 200 to 300 busheis per acre, no fertilizer and no potato bugs. Potatoes are even planted during breaking, every third furrow being planted, and raw prairies sod turned over them. In most countries that I know anything about, a man would be considered insane to plant potatoes in this manner, and would be wasting the seed and time, for he would never hear from them again. Yet, right here I have seen excellent crops of potatoes grown by this method. Certainly this shows that our soil is most fertile and productive. Cabbages, beets, turnips, onlons and all vegetables grow here and yield big crops, and the market is practically unlimited for them and brings high prices. 

POLICE CONTROL OF STREETS

Chief Grasett Asks for Full Charge of

Chief of Police Grasett yesterday reported to the board of control as follows: "In respect to street traffic I am of opinion that Toronto is much behind well governed cities, and will so continue until the police are given more power to regulate it. At present the police derive most of their authority from bylaws of the city council, which cannot be expected to be familiar with the conditions that prevail in the streets. It is therefore not surprising that traffic regulations in Toronto are defective. I woud surgest that:

"(a) The control of traffic in the streets be placed in the hands of the police commissioners absolutely.

"(b) If not that, then last year's by-law re slow moving vehicles be re-

'(c) That in certain congested parts of Yonge and King-streets, wagons, carts, lorries, etc., having no business there be diverted to other streets,

"(d) That all drivers of vehicles be

of competent age.

"(e) That the use of head or search lights on motor vehicles be discontinued as much as possible within the well-lighted streets."

The controllers decided to ask Chief Grasett what further bydaws he thinks the city council should pass to give the police the control they should have.

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
