For three or more successive sessions W. F. Maclean has tried in the
house of commons to have a law passed regulating the rates of the express
companies of this country, and on every occasion the Laurier government
have ordered their followers to vote it down. He showed that the railways
really owned the express companies, that they were doing an ever increasing
business in express parcels, that in Europe the government regulation
had developed an enormous movement of farm truck to the cities by express
at low rates, that the fruit and vegetable growers and the producers of milk,
cream, butter and poultry for our Canadian cities were absolutely at the
mercy of the express companies. This had no effect on Sir Wilfrid
Laurier or Hon Mr. Fitzpatrick, minister of justice, who discovered grave
constitutional impediments in the way of such a law. So it was kicked out of
parliament.

Archie McCallum, the farmers' candidate in North York, declared him-
self on Wednesday for state regulation of these express charges by means
of the railway commission. Mr. Aylesworth assumes responsibility for the
Laurier government's rejection of W. F. Maclean's amendment putting ex-
press companies and their rates under the regulation of the railway com-

## HEAVY RECEIPTS OF CATTLE IMPROVEMENT IN QUALITY

Good Butchers in Fair Demand—Sheep and Lambs Steady—Hog Prices Tend Lower.

Thursday, Nov. 2, will probably stand as a record day on the old City Cattle Market. Within 48 hours, dating from Wednesday morning, not less than 125 cars of stock, consigned from all parts of the province and Western Manitoba, were received. Not alone this, but the abnormally heavy receipts of Tuesday had set the market in a demoralized condition, with considerable stock unsold, and a moderate estimate of the stock from all sources in pens and on rail at the opening of the market yesterday would be 150 cars, say 4,000 head, and the offerings were 200 cars, 8,000 head, of sheep and calves. One year ago, Nov. 3, the receipts on the City Market were 100 cars, comprising 600 calves, 200 sheep and lambs, and 50 calves. The increase in the volume of trade from 100 to 150 cars in one year is significant, but if the increase in business is shared, the same cannot be said with respect to the quality of the offerings. The cattle offered on the City Market were not of the class demanded by the best trade of the city. Too much of the stock consisted of heavy, fat, but unprofitable animals, and the result that serious financial loss has resulted, not alone to the drover, but eventually to the farmer. The coming up season is here and regarding the condition of the stock, it is being unloaded on an already congested market. Commission men yesterday were a unit in deprecating the failure of the farmers to fully mature their stock before shipment.

Report cattle—Of really good export calves there were no deliveries, nor was there any demand. The nearest approach to export trade was in a lot of big rough steers, ranging from 200 to 240 lbs., of which the majority were not properly finished on the grain. This class, said Mr. Wilson, Mayne, Wilson & Hall, were practically unsalable. ## CHINA, URGED BY JAPAN, SEEKS NEW CONSTITUTION

Is to Include Best That is and Tend Toward Powerful Asiatic Alliance.

New York, Nov. 2.—Yu Chuan Chang, a member of the Chinese commission, is to draft a constitution for the Chinese empire, arrived here to-day from Hamburg. He is a secretary of the branch of this commission, which will study the constitution of the United States. Other sections will investigate simultaneously the constitutions of foreign countries. Yu Chuan Chang said to-day:

"When these special ambassadors have finished their work and submitted the draft of the constitution for China to the emperor, China will step out of the ranks of absolute monarchies and enter that of constitutional monarchies. The Chinese constitution will embrace all the best features of the constitutions of Great Britain, America, France, Germany and Austria. The travels of the special embassy will end in about eight months, after which the envoys will draw up a constitution."

"Mr. Chang added that the departure from ancient usage was due to the gradual spread of Japanese influence over the empire during the recent war. He said that Japan had urged China to modernize her laws and government, and thus form a strong alliance of the yellow races in the far east."

## WHIPPING PEDAGOG A BACK NUMBER

Novadays It's Cultivation of Mind, Not Discipline.

The members of the Empire Club had another instructive luncheon yesterday, following their luncheon at Webb's under the presidency of Prof. Clark. Inspector J. L. Hughes talked on the education of children, dwelling on what he considered the beneficial changes that had taken place in views regarding the cultivation of the minds of the young folk.

"The true idea of obedience is not the subordination of one soul to another," he said. "We are trying to raise the standard of obedience above the old idea. We wish to have the child understand the reason for the law of God within. The modern educational ideal does not demand from a boy any more reverence for an adult than the adult owes to the superior type of coercion in which we call corporal punishment."
