SPANIARDS ARE BUTCHERS.

Shooting Down Brave Women in Cold Blood.

AWFUL STORY FROM CUBA. Many Prisoners Shot, Including a Very Beautiful Young Girl.

On the Other Hand, the Insurgents are Treating Their Spanish Prisoners in the Opposite Way - Weyler's Lieutenants Talk About the Shooting of Women as "Exploits" - A Brave Cuban Woman's Death.

Havana, Oct. 19.-In the fight which General Melgudo had with Gen. Maceo's forces a short time ago, Melgudo captured 40 rebels, whom he ordered shot on the spot.

At the recent engagement between Maceo's troops and the Spaniards, under the command of the latter caused 22 prisoners to be shot, including a very beautiful young girl and two older women.

Bernal says he saw one of these women killed in the bush near by and he paid no attention to her at first, believing she was a refugee, but after the fight was over a stray shot picked off one of his soldiers when they all rushed on her, she killing 17 before she was captured and killed.

This statement is positively true, as the facts were heard from the lips of Gen. Bernal in person, when he was interviewed on his arrival in Havana, and confessed that without shame to all the reporters, who shortly listened to his "exploits."

With the 40 men killed by Melgudo there were four women and a child, but he does not know whether the child was abandoned in the woods or killed. They tried to force the women to tell them the whereabouts of Maceo and his plans, but the only words they got out of them were, "I don't know."

REBELLION AND RIFLES

An Anarchist Threat Made to the City Council.

WHOSE BLUNDER IS THIS?

The Corporation Has to Pay \$3000 to Get Out of a Bad Scrape.

Where Does the Fault Lie This Time?—A Fight for a Cheaper Class of Pavements for Residential Streets—The Resort at Adelaide and Toronto-streets to be Opened on Monday—Municipal Candidates to Have a Cheap Campaign.

Yesterday's meeting of council will probably in future years be looked back to as unique in the history of municipal institutions in the Dominion. Advantage was taken of the privilege of addressing the council being extended to a deputation of citizens to openly threaten rebellion and the securing of redress of alleged wrongs by the use of the rifle.

The most serious matter that engaged attention perhaps was that in which it was shown that by some blundering by somebody in the Works Department the city had been led into a nice lawsuit, and that the only way out of it was to authorize the immediate payment of \$3000 to settle the case, which the aldermen did with the best grace they could muster under the circumstances.

Mr. S. R. Hallett also addressed the council, the burden of his complaint being that the work was not fairly distributed and that the officials are giving it to their friends and relatives and the members of the societies to which they belong.

Mr. James Stewart, in support of the resolutions and urged that the council give them careful consideration.

Mr. Watt again declined any intention of opposing a resolution upon members of the council.

Mr. Watt: I don't take it back. I am a Scotchman and the words I used were uttered under the influence of anger and suffering, and until those wrongs are righted I cannot take them back.

THE MAYOR BLOKS IT. After the letter had been read Ald. Boustead asked: "What do you propose to do next, Mr. Mayor? I suppose you will call the committee together."

"QUARTZITE" MEN PASSED

Mining Investments Now on a Better Basis. LEGITIMATE BROKERS IN IT

The Rat Portage District Continues to Attract Great Attention

From All Parts of the World—English Investors on the Ground Everywhere—Mining on the Seine River—The Rat Portage District is Ontario's Trail Creek Machinery for Rosland—General Mining News.

Investments in mines are now being made on a better basis than during the early days of the gold boom. In Toronto "quartzite" men are now being passed over by the public, who are learning to rightly prefer doing business through the legitimate brokers and dealers.

The latest reports from Rat Portage go to show that the development of the mineral resources of the region continues to attract people from all parts of the world. The hotels in the town are all overcrowded with mining men from England, Australia, South Africa and different sections of Canada and the United States, among whom Toronto, Montreal and Winnipeg men figure largely.

Englishmen Everywhere.

The Witch mine, which was sold the other day for \$500,000, is operated by a company under a capitalization of \$250,000. Some English gentlemen who are now on their way back from Rosland are said to be interested in the property.

Capt. Bell of the Alaska gold fields, who is at present in Rat Portage, is reported by The Globe and Mail as saying that the gold belt near the Ontario town is the best he ever saw.

Crown Timber Agent Margach of Winnipeg, in an interview the other day, said: "I have just returned from the Seine, and left the Foley people hard at it settling up the Foley mine. The foundation is laid, the frame up and they are now placing their machinery. They are running it by the middle of November. Everything is looking remarkably encouraging. The mine is steadily widening as depth is reached. There are now eighty men on the Foley roll at the present time, and also at the Ferguson mine, where thirty men are hard at it, increasing the mineral wealth of old Ontario."

Mr. Ferguson—who is now on the spot picking up the Foley mine, is an air compressor and steam drills. He has spent from \$500 to \$700 in building a road to the mine, and is now in many places it was swamped and required quite an outlay to prepare for the heavy weights which were to pass over it. Now, as to lumbering, continues Mr. Margach, in the district this winter, and from fifteen to twenty million feet of lumber will be cut on the Canadian side. This means employment for 800 men at least. In the light of this, it is not surprising to see a big call for woodwork from Manitoba, and you can imagine what the outlook is for a busy lumbering season.

ONTARIO'S TRAIL CREEK.

What the Rainy Lake Region Will be Before 1900.

Here is what the Rainy Lake Journal has to say about the outlook for the country it represents: "If those of our readers who are interested in the gold-bearing lands here take their map and look at it, starting from Jackfish Bay on the north shore of Lake Superior, and following the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway to Rat Portage on the Lake of the Woods, a distance of nearly 600 miles, and from there down the triangle to Rainy Lake and up to the starting point, they will get some idea of the great extent of the Rainy Lake gold fields, comprising one of the largest and most wonderful mining districts in the world.

All over this great region there is heard the splash of the explorer's paddle, the sound of the prospector's pickaxe, the boom of the dynamite, the rattle of the stamp mill, where four years ago naught was there but the primal wilderness save the few men of an occasional trader or lumberman.

Yet, active as is the work of prospecting and mining all over the gold fields, it is but a drop in the bucket, as it were, to what will take place here within the next decade, or even to the year 1900, and experienced mining men confidently assert that in a short time the history of Cripple Creek and Trail Creek will be repeated here—only on a much greater scale.

And the men who make the statement are backing up their belief by securing all the gold-bearing lands here that it is possible to acquire. Such being the case, it behooves those who have property here to take heed, and awake remembering that the Bible says something about the wise virgin who had her lamp in shape when the bridegroom came. Just see to it that you catch on to what Dame Fortune has to offer here now, while prices are reasonable, and do not wait till the boom comes and sends prices beyond your reach, for the you will be compelled to mourn over lost opportunities, and as Bro. Gardner well and truly says, "Dars' what de mournin' comes in."

Frontaine Falls Into Line.

If discoveries of mineral resources continue to increase in number Canada will have to be looked upon as one of its mine. Frontaine and Benfroy Counties now come forward with alleged discoveries of gold and graphite. Benfroy is said to have the gold deposits and Frontaine the graphite beds. R. A. Campbell, M.L.A., was in town yesterday with some samples of both.

A Big Deal on. A deal is involving the sale of the interest of the late Mr. Payne of the Payne group of mines in the Slocan, including all of the Mait of Erin, Two Rocks Mountain, No. 1 and one-half of the Payne. The intending purchaser is A. W. McCann, of Salt Lake City, and the sum to be paid is larger than has ever been paid for any individual property.
