THE BLOCKADE HAVANA

The North Atlantic Squadron Sailed Yesterday by Government Orders.

Washington, April 21.—The North Atlantic Squadron, it was learned shortly after 2 o'clock this afternoon, had sailed already for Havana from Key West. The decision to send the fleet was reached at the special cabinet meeting this afternoon and was announced as follows: Hurried orders were despatched to the fleet to establish a blockade of the entrance of the harbor of Havana immediately. The fleet later on will be supported by troops, who will be despatched to Cuba as soon as, in the opinion of the President, it is possible to use them advantageously in the occupation of the Island.

THE WAR IS ON.

Washington, April 21.—War between the United States and Spain is a fact, though it was not officially declared by Congress. The stirring events of yesterday were succeeded to-day with rapidity by others of equal importance, culminating in the afternoon in orders for the departure of the fleet to the Atlantic for Havana. This practically is an act of war, so that the war between this country and Spain may fairly be said to date from April 21, 1898.

MANY DIPLOMATIC CALLERS.

Washington, April 21.—There were an unusual number of diplomatic callers at the State Department to-day, the list including the British, French, German, Italian, Spanish, and Japanese Ministers, and the Ministers from Denmark, Belgium and Japan. It is believed that the object of the French Ambassador's call was to notify Judge Day of the Spanish Minister's request for the return of the Spanish Minister to the United States Government.

WOODRUFF'S ACT ON.

Minister Woodruff's action during the day, as reported to the State Department in a late telegram, indicated that he was following a carefully prepared program. A significant feature of his message was the statement that the Spanish Government notified him that it regarded its withdrawal of Minister Pazo yesterday as terminating diplomatic relations, showing that it was not disposed to accept the compromise intention of this government to continue Minister Woodruff as a medium of communication until Saturday.

RECEIVED WITH GRACITY.

The Navy Department to-day, aside from giving the orders to the squadron, continuing the work of the fleet, and purchasing another ship at Norfolk as the news of the actual beginning of war was received with gravity at the department. The intention of the department was to establish a blockade of Havana, a notification which was received from the British Embassy.

WOODFORD BOUNCED

Given His Passports Before He Could Deliver His Ultimatum.

Madrid, April 21.—5.35 p.m.—In the Spanish Senate to-day, Marshal Martinez Campos asked the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Senor Gallon, to make a statement regarding the relations between Spain and the United States, whereupon the Minister replied that all relations were broken off.

There was a slight fall in prices on the Spanish bourse to-day as a result of the severance of the diplomatic relations between Spain and the United States.

The semi-official Correspondencia this afternoon says: "Spain's feelings have been outraged to the highest point by the injustice, coarseness, infamy, bad faith and insults of all kinds heaped upon her by a vile people with the most ignoble passions and basest feelings."

Marshal De Campos said he warmly approved the wisdom displayed by the Government, which had "Accepted Voluntarily all the propositions compatible with the dignity of Spain."

Senor Gallon, the Foreign Minister, thanked the Senate, "Not in the name of the Liberal Cabinet, but in the name of the Government."

WITH SHOT AND SHELL

Spain is Very Likely to Answer the Ultimatum Sent by President McKinley. New York, April 21.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: "Spain's answer to President McKinley's ultimatum may take the form of shot and shell, fiercer and fiercer."

ANTI-AMERICAN DEMONSTRATIONS.

Madrid, April 21.—Enthusiastic processions are now moving through the principal streets. The mob gathered in front of the building of the Equitable Life Insurance Company, and insisted upon the removal of the American flag, which was thrown down and smashed to bits.

SPAIN CALLING OUT RESERVES.

London, April 22.—A special despatch from Madrid says the Government has authorized Lieut-General Correa, Minister of War, to call out 80,000 reserves. Three vessels loaded with troops left Cadix yesterday (Thursday) for a destination not disclosed.

TWO LABOREES DROWNED

They were Railroad Men Working on the Ottawa & New York Road—Their Boat Sank.

Corwall, Ont., April 21.—Two laborers on Brennan & Foster's contract on the Ottawa & New York Railway on Corwall Island were drowned in the river here yesterday afternoon. They were Richard Martin, a pensioner of the British Government, about 45 years old, and Jerry Corwall, about 25. They were in town in the morning, and Martin drew his pension, when they went to the island. Martin was considerably intoxicated. Their boat leaked badly, but they got along safely till they struck a rapid current near the opposite shore, when the boat upset and they were swept down the river clinging to it. They were never seen again, and there is no doubt but that they were drowned. The boat was found late in the evening, but no trace of the men.

The J. D. King Co. Strike.

As was intimated in The World yesterday the action in the King strike is becoming a little more rapid, and tactics are being developed. On one side this has taken the form of sending a man to the States to obtain workers, and naturally the men feel indignant at this. Mr. King continues calm and undisturbed, waiting a little occasionally, but displaying to his credit against the strikers. The men were watching the trains from Boston yesterday, but no aliens showed up.

A YEAR OF ORO-MINING

Hidden Wealth of the Province Sought After as Never Before.

Annual Report of the Bureau of Mines—As Many Companies Formed in 1917 as Since Confederation—Ontario Gold Mines Are Safe Investments—Progress in Other Fields.

The seventh report of the Bureau of Mines, prepared by Director Archibald Blue, was issued yesterday. It is a work of 106 pages and contains much interesting information, not alone for miners, but for the public generally, touching the mineral resources of the province and other developments.

The Boom of 1857. Some suggestion of the mining boom is to be gathered from the fact that during 1857, within six as many mining companies were incorporated in Ontario as during all the previous years since Confederation. Last year 140 companies were incorporated, with an aggregate authorized capital of \$10,551,000.

The locations sold and leased last year numbered 1255, embracing an area of 115,509 acres; whereas during the five years previous the number was only 1052, with an area of 10,821. The revenue last year was \$14,400,000.

Scope for Development. There is room, Mr. Blue states, for large development in the mineral industries of the province. Not only does the province include all of the principal and more commonly found minerals, but it also embraces the comparatively rare metal nickel, the deposits of which in the Sudbury district constitute one of the two sources of the world's supply.

Some of the minerals which are not touched, among the non-metallic substances we possess the basis of two permanent and important industries in our salt beds and petroleum wells. The whole shore of Lake Huron from the mouth of the St. Clair river to the mouth of the St. Marys river is underlain by a deposit of 1000 feet thick, supplying the raw material not only for refined salt itself, but for carbonate and bicarbonate of soda, soda ash, bleaching powder, and other essential for the chemical industry.

The petroleum industry leads all others of a mineral nature in the province. The output is limited only by the market. The petroleum industry has under gone satisfactory development during the past few years. In the production of oil, the terra cotta and sewer pipe—the output is limited only by the market.

As Fair Reward as Any Other. Referring to Ontario gold mines as a field for safe investment, the director says: "The few mining ores of Northern and Northwestern Ontario offer probably as fair a reward to the miner and capitalist as any other in the world."

Through the Provincial Board of Health—Striking Statistics in the Secretary's Annual Report—Consumption in Ontario's Broad Scourge—Municipal Evolution and Public Health Go Together.

The annual report of the Provincial Board of Health has been issued and contains evidence of encouraging progress in the health work of the province.

Taking three five-year periods down to 1898 it is shown that deaths from smallpox have decreased 93 per cent., from scarlatina 50 per cent., from diphtheria 67 per cent., and from typhoid 46 per cent.

From the time of its organization in 1882 the Provincial Board has been unremitting in its efforts to disseminate a knowledge of sanitary matters. The principal subjects to which the Board has especially devoted its attention may be classified as follows: Machinery of public health work, collection of sanitary information, dissemination of sanitary information, health legislation, investigation into causes of disease, and the control of disease, and the control of disease.

Water. The installation of public water supplies and sewerage systems has played an important part in the health work of the province. There are 100 public water supplies, all but 12 established since 1882. On the waterworks of the province \$11,000,000 has been expended since 1882. Sewerage works more or less complete are enjoyed by 98 per cent. of the population.

Another illustration of municipal evolution is to be seen in the work of providing hospitals, which are playing an important part in the public health work. In 1878 there were 10 hospitals receiving provincial aid and they treated 4372 patients; in 1917 there were 47 hospitals in receipt of Government grants, and the patients numbered 19,617.

Laboratory Results. The need for provincial laboratories of hygiene research is emphasized by a comparison of the work done in Massachusetts in 1896. 484 samples of milk were examined and in Ontario only four. This question is discussed at considerable length and is followed by a report by J. J. Mackenzie, bacteriologist to the Board, on laboratory results in serum diagnosis of diphtheria.

The source of consumption. The report concludes with an address on "House Sanitation in Relation to Consumption," delivered by Dr. Bryce. The most notable facts relating to the mortality and prevalence of consumption, the Doctor said, were:

1. That consumption is a disease rather of the city than of the country.

2. That it is a disease directly associated with the density of population.

3. That it is a disease essentially of houses, and that it attaches itself with great persistency to particular houses, and naturally to particular families who occupy them.

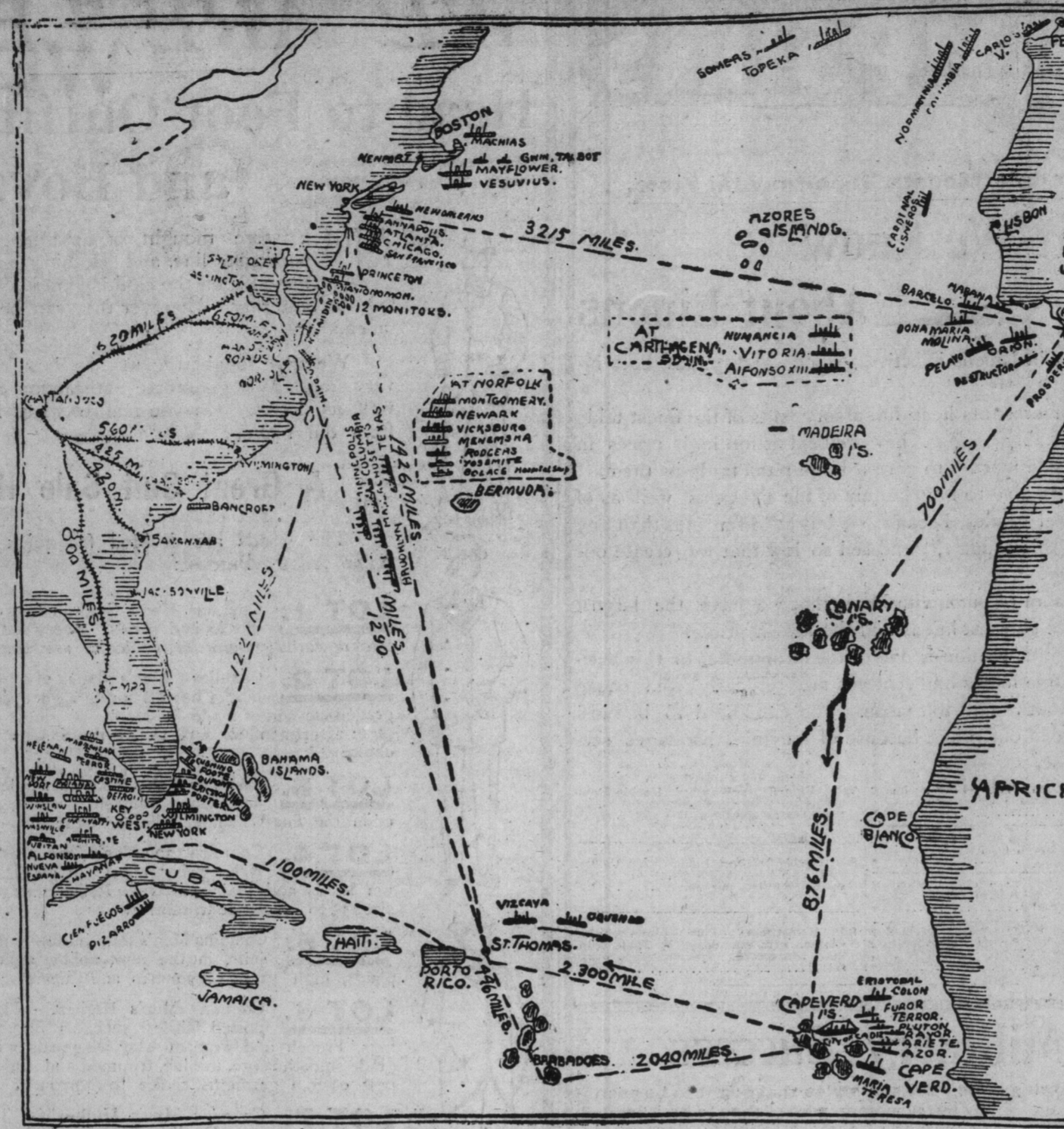
4. That in an older settled country, as in our cities, the number of infected houses slowly increases.

5. That in new settlements and more cases are found in many instances to follow a first case in a house within a year or two.

6. That in the case of the worst infected districts of large cities some houses will year after year continue free from the disease.

Lessons to be Learned. The two lessons to be learned from these facts were:
