It has been stated that the company had refused to grant an increase in pay, or shorter hours, to the telegraphers. This statement is not correct. The company is willing, and has so indicated to the committee, that we should take points where the pay may not seem commensurate with the amount of work involved, and where the compensation is less than is paid by our neighboring lines under similar conditions, and adjust them, but the company cannot make a uniform minimum scale, as is desired by the telegraphers, which shall apply to all stations, whether branch lines or on main lines; whether or not the employe is provided with house, fuel and light, as is the case at a large number of the stations, whether there are but two trains a day each way, or 15 trains a day each way; and whether the earnings of the station may be but \$100 or less per month, or \$1000 per month;







We in Toronto are near enough to the sources of supply to build up an enormous trade in fruit for local distribution, and for export by rail and boat, if we will set about it in the right way.







METHODIST MISSIONS.

The 74th Annual Report Has Just

The Methodist Missionary Society's 74th annual report shows that in Japan there are 25 missionaries, 15 teachers and 2370 members, and during the year \$21,455.22 has been expended. In addition to this

members, and during the year \$21,430.22 has been expended. In addition to this \$999 was devoted to Japanese work in British Columbia.

In the Dominion there are 50 Indian missions and 37 missionaries, 17 assistants, 32 teachers, 11 interpreters and 5407 members. The expenditure in this branch of the work was \$85,946.56. In China and in British Columbia there are 10 missionaries, 2 assistants and 4 teachers looking after the celestials. The sum expended was \$12,192.99

In the domestic fields the grants have been increased \$11,386.76. In the 408 missions there are 390 missionaries, 34 assistants and 37,603 members. The \$24 paid agents of the society received \$02,881.44 last year. The French work is disheartening, and the missionaries report unrecenting hostility.

Detective Thomas Flynn has just received a letter from his brother-in-law, Mr. Alex Shields, master mechanic of the Scuthern Indiana Railway, who was formerly a direman on the Grand Trunk with the late Engineer Brady, who was killed in the Murray Hill disaster. Mr. Shields had just read the account of the disaster in which his old friend was killed and his heart was heavy. "Central in the group of the dead," he says, "was Blily Brady, whose strong resolution in discharge of known duty was a matter with which I was familiar years ago. The suggestion made by some poor carrion-souled ignoramus that he was intoxicated at the time of the accident is too flagrant to notice. We who knew him pass such a suggestion with disgust." Mr. Shields Knew Brady.

A Pointer on Christmas Cards. The attention of the public is called to the fact that Christmas cards are not permitted to pass through the mails prepaid at the one-cent per two ounces rate, unless they are left open to inspection. Notching of the corners of the envelope is not sufficient; the ends must be left open to inspection; otherwise they are sent to the dead-letter office, and in consequence delay ensues in effecting delivery.


