Liverpool maize futures fell 1/4d to 1/2d per bushel today.

Chicago corn declined today. Prices advanced 1/4d in London per cent.

Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past three days, 206,000 cwt., including 57,000 cwt. of American. Corn same time 143,000 cwt.

THE DOER FRANCHISE BILL Was Discussed by The Volksraad Yesterday and Seven-Year Franchise Idea Was Endorsed. PRESIDENT KRUGER'S SUGGESTION Was That the Alteration be Accepted, as it Was Only a Slight Difference Any Way.

PRETORIA, July 18.—The Volksraad resumed discussion of the franchise bill at its session to-day. The trend of the debate favored seven years' retrospective and prospective franchise. Replying to a question, President Kruger reviewed the Bloemfontein conference and said that the proposals of Sir Alfred Milner, Governor of Cape Colony and British High Commissioner of South Africa, were too wide, but that after seven years' retrospective and prospective franchise, the Volksraad would be in a position to accept the alteration. The Government would not be bound by the proposal, but would give the alteration the approval of the Volksraad. In secret session, ultimately adopted the seven years' franchise proposition.

ULTIMATUM TO THE BOERS. British Cabinet Had the Document Prepared by Mr. Chamberlain Before Them. London, July 18.—Considerable importance attaches to to-day's Cabinet meeting, as it is understood that the Colonial Office has issued to the Ministers an important communication relative to the Boer ultimatum. The general trend of the news is that the Government is in a peaceful settlement of existing difficulties there.

RHODES WARMLY WELCOMED. Cape Town Was Decorated and the Former Premier Was Enthusiastically Cheered. Cape Town, July 18.—Cecil Rhodes, former Premier of Cape Colony, arrived here to-day. He was welcomed by a reception committee, composed of influential citizens, and enthusiastically cheered as he traversed the streets in a motor car. The buildings of Cape Town were decorated with flags, and in front of the town hall a big arch had been erected and inscribed with the words: "Welcome, great pioneer, Cape Town."

HUTTON WANTS PERFECT DRILL. The Major-General Put the Canadian Regulars Through Their Paces at Ottawa. Ottawa, July 18.—The first general inspection of the Royal Canadian Infantry Regiment at the Rockcliffe camp ground took place this forenoon. Major-General Hutton, who has been kept quiet in the examination of the appointments of the companies, and was most rigid in the drill movements with unsparing comment. He then addressed the rank and file, and delivered a communication to the officers, respectively, pointing out their peculiar position in the army, and the high regard in which they were held by the Government. After an interval he reviewed the companies in the drill order, and was equally exacting in his demands for perfection.
