ST. JOHN'S CHANCELLOR EXPRESSES HIS SURPRISE

Thinks Head of Victoria University Should Not Have Been on Mr. Blair's Platform.

Toronto, Victoria, Jan. 15.—Chancellor Burwash, Victoria University, Toronto, has addressed the following letter to Chancellor Burwash of Victoria University.

Dear Chancellor—I was somewhat surprised to read a speech from your commendatory of the Conservative candidate in North Toronto, and in support of Mr. Blair, who is a candidate of a government that has been proved in the courts of our land and elsewhere the worst aggregation of modern times.

FACTORY GIRL'S DEATH IS
DUPLICATE OF LEVEL CROSSING

Miss Rachel Crozier Took Fatal
Short-Cut Along C.P.R. Tracks
 From Brock Avenue.

While taking a short cut to her work at the gutta percha factory, by walking along the C.P.R. track from Brock avenue to O'Hara-venue early yesterday morning, Miss Rachel Crozier was struck by a train and killed. Her body was crushed in and blood was coming from her ear when she was found.

The girl started from her home at 13 Colborne-avenue, to the factory shortly after 7 o'clock, and as is the custom among those employees of the company who have to take that particular route, she took to the tracks when she reached the Brock-avenue crossing, instead of the safer road down to Maple Grove, avenue to O'Hara and along to the factory.

The exact nature of the accident will probably never be known, but at 7.45, when Miss Sadie Weir and Mr. May passed along the track, they found the dead body of their companion lying only a few feet from her destination. Two of the factory hands were called and the body was taken inside the factory. Dr. Harris, when called, said that death had been instantaneous. The body was removed to Craig's undertaking establishment.

The case only indirectly shows the need of a subway at Lansdowne-avenue. The girl was trespassing on the tracks and had, along with others who took the same route, been warned by any number of warnings both from the Bagman at Brock-avenue crossing and from the factory. The safe road time been detailed to warn trespassers away from the tracks. The safe road to the factory, for those people living across the tracks to Brock, Maple Grove, and along Maple Grove to O'Hara. This, however, means a detour of about half a mile to the crossing at Lansdowne-avenue would obviate the danger and remove the temptation that has so long existed for people to trespass on the tracks.

The unfortunate victim of the accident was 19 years old and lived with her widowed mother. She had been employed at the factory for over four years. An inquest will be held to-night.

Licenses Remain the Same
By Vote of Thirteen to Ten

City Council Refuses to Even Consider the Proposition to Reduce the Number in Toronto

After one of the warmest debates in years the city council yesterday refused to even consider the proposition to reduce the number of tavern licenses in Toronto by 25. Notwithstanding the appeal of the temperance men to allow the matter to be placed before council, the members by a vote of 13 to 10 refused to allow a formal reading, a courtesy which is seldom rendered any bill, the discussion and vote usually taking place in committee on the whole. While the by-law probably cannot be carried in this year's council, it was the question of politics that ensured its defeat yesterday. The fact that the city could only reduce the number, while the government had the power to say which licenses should be cut off, was considered too great a weapon to be placed in the hands of any party.

The vote, therefore, can hardly be considered a fair indication of the feeling of the members on the question itself. The division was very much as expected, the only changes being Ald. Church, who favored giving the bill a hearing, and Dr. Noble, who was expected to vote in favor of the reduction, but for whom the political argument proved too strong.

Strongly Political.
 The speaker of the council strongly political in tone, especially those of Controller Hubbard and Ald. McGhie, who denounced the local government emphatically. There was no attempt to discuss the merits, however, the mayor interposing only to rebuke the gallery for interfering with Controller Hubbard's utterances.
