



The fireworks, which, thanks to the weather, were seen to the best advantage by thousands of spectators, proved to be among the best and most novel ever displayed in St. John. The Bostonia orchestra in the main building added new laurels to those won on Monday. Their programme was well interspersed with popular selections and requests for special numbers were acceeded to whenever possible.

An exhibition would seem incomplete without fireworks in the evening and it may be said without fear of contradiction that the display given last night was the best ever presented since St. John exhibitions became the vogue. There were certain features which were quite new, notably the realistic imitation of Niagara and the shells with as many as three separate explosions in mid-air giving a combination of colors of great beauty. The set piece—The Siege of Gibraltar—was elaborate and as realistic as set pieces ever are. The management announced last evening that, should rain again interfere with a display on any night until Friday, an extra performance will be given on Saturday evening. 
