Prominent In Law, Politics and Other Spheres-Ill Few Days

DR. J. ROY CAMPBELL, K C., prominent lawyer of Saint John, died at the Saint John Infirmary at 2.40 a. m. today after a brief illness.

Dr. Campbell had been a pa tient at the Infirmary for only a few days and it was not generally recognized that his illness

Mr. Campbell, K. C., was prominen in legal and political circles in the province and a leader in many educational and church activities as well as in various organizations and philanthropies. He was a man of distinction in his profession. Always the oldest and best known of the residistinction in his profession. Always an ardent Conservative in politics he headed the polls in 1917 when he was a candidate for election to the provincial house as a representative for Saint John city. In that election, Hon. Saint John city. In that election, Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, the late Mayor F. L. Potts and Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts were returned from Saint John city. Dr. Campbell's extensive knowledge of Dr. Campbell's extensive knowledge of law men building at the corner of Macaulay, Howie, Vivyan. Division 3: Saint John. 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Dr. Campbell was the son of Rev.

J. R. Campbell, D. D., now resident of Fredericton and his wife, the late Mrs. Anna Brough Campbell. He was born in Yarmouth, N. S., on May 16, 1866. His early education was obtained at the Fredericton Grammar school and his college studies were taken at Dalhousie University from which he graduated in 1888 with the degree of LL. B. Seven years later he received the degree of C. L. from the law school of King's College.

Dr. Campbell was called to the bar in 1899 and was created a K. C. in 1918. He has practiced his profession in Saint John with great success. He had been a member of the Council of the New Brunswick Law Society and a past president of the Saint John Law Society of which latter body he was a council member at the time of his death.

INTEREST IN LAW SCHOOL.

The law school of King's College, owes much to Dr. Campbell's un-

commission which drew up the Saint John Assessment Act and he was at all times interested in the welfare of the community. He served as a member of the board of governors of the Wiggins' Orphanage, devoting much of his time to the duties involved.

Besides his aged father, Rev. Dr. J. R. Campbell, a veteran in the Anglican ministry, Dr. Campbell is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss. Edith E. L. Barker, a daughter of the late Chief Justice Sir Frederic Barker, and one son, F. Lloyd, who is at present in Amherst, Mass., and was expected to arrive in the city today. He also leaves one brother, William Campbell, who is a civil engineer, practicing his profession in South America.

Which Makes the Best Second Wife, a Widow or a Spin-ster?—Shall the Bride Let Her Homesickness Spoil Her Husband's Success?—The Only Cure for a Fault-Finding Mother-in-Law.

DEAR MISS DIX-Should a man who has lost his wife feel that he should never marry again?
I am a widower with children, and there is a widow with children whom I think a lot of, and whom I think I could marry. Also there is an unmarried woman. Which would make the best wife, the widow or the spinster?

LONESOME.

ANSWER:

Certainly there is no reason why a widower should not marry again, and every reason why he should if he can find a suitable mate.

Being married seems to unfit people for the single estate. They miss having their own homes. They miss the close companionship to which they have been accustomed. They even miss having somebody handy to fight with, and they find they are far lonelier than any old maid or bachelor. Therefore they do well to marry.

But if they have children, they are not free to marry, as they please, any one on whom their fancy falls. They have their children to consider, and they should think more of what kind of a stepmother or stepfather they are giving their children than they do about what sort of husband or wife a man or woman is likely to make.

A widow is generally a safe choice for a widower, because she also has had matrimonial experience, and understands the technique, so to speak, of matrimony. She is broken to double harness and knows how to pull her half of the load.

She has learned how to cook on her first husband, and is apt to be a satisfactory housekeeper. Her experience with her first husband has taught her not to expect too much of a man, and also how to sidestep a husband's little peculiarities. Therefore she is easy to get along with.

She is quite as likely as any other woman to make a good stepmother. Often, if she is a childless woman, she takes her stepchildren into her heart, and satisfies her mother-yearning by lavishing an affection and 'enderness on them that makes them forget that they are motherless.

But the widow is only a good wife for the widower if she has no children of her own. It is madness even to think of marrying her, because she cannot keep from favoring her own to save her life.

In such a case a man finds invariably that he is tolling to give luxuries to another man's children, while his own children are pushed aside and wear the castoffs, and are the Cinderellas of the family. Two families do not mix, and if a third is added to it, bedlam ensues.

HOMESICK.

I would be a good sport and stick it out. I wouldn't be such a poor, weak creature that I didn't have enough backbone to do the right thing, and the thing that would help the man I loved.

I wouldn't want to make my husband sorry he married me, and that is what you will do if you keep doing the cry-baby act, and weeping to go back home to mother and the girls. And he will curse the day he married you if you blast his prospects in life by forcing him to give up his big opportunity, and go back home and settle down into some little job that hasn't any future to it.

Love isn't everything to a man, my dear. Especially it isn't everything to a real go-getter, such as you have married. There is also his career. There is his life work. There is his ambition, and his wife interferes with that at her peril. No man ever really forgives a woman who stands between him and success, and who balks him in doing the work that he set out to do.

Probably you can nag your husband into giving up this work in which he is interested, and in which he has his big chance, and induce him to go back home. But don't deceive yourself into thinking that you will be happy. You won't, because he will be irritable and discontented, and will be always reproaching you for having stood in the way of his advancement.

This man intimated that this car might have been carrying liquor. Following up what he had heard, the inspector engaged in casual conveasation with an other man, who told him that a scow loaded with what seemed to be kegs and boxes had landed at Pre d'en-Haut wharf.

CUSTOMS MEN NOTIFIED.

From his knowledge of the country and putting together all he had heard, he concluded that a large quantity of liquor had been landed and hidden in one of two barns not far away from the place of landing. He notified the customs authorities, after which he immediately got in touch with W. U. Goodwin and the other prohibition officers. An automobile was procured, and shortly after + o'clock they passed one of the suspected barns. The inspectors noted that heavy tracks led from the main highway to the barn. In the yard near the barn was a team and two young men. They did not stop, but proceeded to the other suspected barn. As they approached, they noticed that no hauling had taken place there, and so returned to the first place within a few minutes.

INSPECTORS RECOGNIZED. CUSTOMS MEN NOTIFIED.

INSPECTORS RECOGNIZED. The young men had recognized the prohibition inspectors, and evidently had tried to cover the smuggled liquor more completely during the short interval elapsing between the time they went to the second barn and returned, for when they arrived the young men left the barn, jumped in their team and departed. Mr. Bourgeois entered the barn and, taking a hay-fork, lifted the hay which was spread out in a space below the main floor. He soon came in contact with kegs. Then he uncovered cases of gin. He called in the other inspectors. They saw the case was one for the customs and, leaving two inspectors on guard, they notified Collector Girouard, who had already been seen in the morning by Mr. Bourgeois, and told of his suspicions.

Eleven truck loads of contraband were taken to the customs storehouse, where two men are still on guard and will remain until the goods are shipped to Saint John.

The smuggled liquor is believed to have been landed by a schooner which came up the Bay of Fundy recently.




