Until writs are returned, no by-elections can be held to make way for any necessary cabinet reorganization. But once a return is in from an individual constituency, and the constituency again rendered vacant, a writ for a by-election may be issued. As to when the earliest by-election could be held, there is some doubt. The distance and nature of the constituency have to be considered in making preparations but it is estimated that a by-election might be held in an average constituency within 85 days of the issue of the new writ.

The American crop is placed at 211,960,000 hundredweight against 272,670,000 last year.

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

Text Books, Home Study and Schools and Sport Provide Interesting Material in Addresses Given at the County Institute.

CRITICISM of school teachers who in their desire for uniformity make un reasonable demands on pupils in the matter of exercise books, pencils, pencil boxes, etc., was voiced by Dr. W. S. Carter, Fredericton, Chief Superintendent of Education for New Brunswick, in his address this morning before the opening session of the Saint John County Teachers' Institute here in the High School

The speaker canvassed reasons why they took up the teaching profession, and said: "Trudy those who enter upon and continue teaching from the standpoint of money and social standing must become filled with bitterness and enry which is sure to find an upjust vent on the innocent children. Teachers, he said, should not make unreasonable demands along this line and he criticised teachers who were fussy in this respect. In conclusion, he referred briefly to book agents and warned his hearers not to believe any canvass that certain lines had been endorsed by the Board of Education. THE LAST FRONTIER.

Scientific Students To Get Training As They Work

AN ATTEMPT to provide closer contact and co-operation between the college world and the world of industry has resulted in the adoption of a new plan by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, one of the world's leading scientific schools.

A selected group of students who have finished two years of the regular course in electrical engineering will be transferred to New York city, where they will be placed on the payroll of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co.

Instructors from Cambridge will conduct classes for them in the evenings. But during the daytime, they will be under the direction of the telephone company's executives and expected to earn their day's pay by doing a day's work. As soon as a student learns one job thoroughly, he will be shifted to another. Thus the students will be continuously learning something new as well as doing useful work.

The students will spend half of the eight months of the school year in New York and the other half in Cambridge.

Because of the advanced nature of the work and the heavy demands which it will make, these students upon graduation will be awarded the degree of bachelor of science as well as the degree of bachelor of science.





After several interviews with His Excellency at which the position brought about by the recent general election was fully discussed and all alterntaives presented, I have taken the responsibility of advising His Excellency to summon parliament for the earliest practicable date in order to ascertain the attitude of the parliamentary representatives towards the very important question raised by the numerical position of the respective political parties. His Excellency has been pleased to accept this advice.

DUTY TO MEET HOUSE.

"After careful consideration of the constitutional precedents and their bearing upon the situation which has arisen as a result of the general election, the cabinet decided unanimously this afternoon that it was their constitutional duty to meet parliament at the earliest possible moment, regard being had for the legal requirements with respect to the time necessary for the return of the writs and the official gazetting of the members who have been elected.
