DROP IN WHEAT BUT WEST HOPEFUL

Decline of More Than Four Cents in Wheat in Montreal Tuesday.

What Has Seen Worse Trouble, However, and is Not Downhearted—Cattle and Coarse Grains Cheaper.

Montreal, Nov. 27.—A weak feeling developed in the Canadian grain situation yesterday which was attributed to the absence of outside support, heavy liquidation and the constant weight of hedging sales.

Even more serious was the falling off in the value of cattle and coarse grains. The market for these commodities was also weak, and prices for both were lower.

GOVERNMENT ASKING ULSTER TO AGREE IS LONDON NEWS

Whole Cabinet Reported Back of Suggestion—Ulster Premier is Called to London and Will Leave Ireland Tomorrow.

London, Nov. 3.—Reports that the government had decided to ask, or had already asked, Ulster to agree to a plebiscite in Tyrone and Fermanagh were current here this morning.

CRAIG TO GO TO LONDON FRIDAY

Belfast, Nov. 3.—Sir James Craig, Ulster premier, will leave here on Friday evening for London. He will remain there until November 16. Then he will proceed to France for the meeting of Sir Edward Carson, former Ulster leader, of a monument erected to the memory of the Ulster division.

REBELLION IN SAXONY PLANNED

German Money Back of It, Says Saxon Minister—Alleges There is a Murder Group.

London, Nov. 3.—The minister of interior of Saxony yesterday announced in the Saxon parliament that a network of secret organizations had been discovered in Saxony aimed at the destruction of the constitution and the stirring up of a monarchist rebellion.

BANKERS UNITE FOR PROTECTION AGAINST BANDITS

Toronto, Nov. 3.—Through the Canadian Bankers' Association officials are being distributed all over Canada offering a reward of \$5,000 for the apprehension and conviction of anyone connected with recent bank robberies.

TWO ARRESTS; THOUGHT TO BE IN MAIL CASE

New York, Nov. 3.—Mystery today enveloped the arrest of two men in Jersey City last night, supposedly in connection with the recent mail truck robbery. The two known to Jersey City police as Michael Arbest alias Rafaelo Derosa and Frank Calabrese, both of Hoboken, were held in \$5,000 bail as suspicious persons.

BANK OF ENGLAND RATE DOWN AGAIN

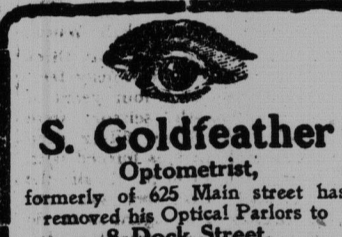

**SWEEPING MINES  
FROM HIGH SEAS**  
Dangerous War Measures are Almost Extinct Now.

London, Nov. 3.—The work of clearing the Heligoland Bight minefields has now been successfully accomplished by the Germans. This marks a definite stage in the work of restoring the seas to normal conditions, since the entire North Sea is thus rendered clear of moored mines. At the time of the Armistice enormous numbers of mine fields and dangerous areas existed all over the world, principally in European waters. The waters surrounding the British Isles are now entirely cleared, the Mediterranean Sea is practically cleared, only three small areas on the Albanian Coast remaining, the clearing of which should be completed this year.

Four small areas remain in the Arctic, for which Germany is responsible, and a German mine-sweeping flotilla is at present at work there, but in all probability she has effected their clearance during the last four winters. In the Baltic mines still exist between latitudes 56 deg. 30 m. N. and 60 deg. 30 m. N. to the eastward of 20 deg. 30 m. E. and here mine clearance is in progress. In the Adriatic, the three small areas still to be swept will be cleared in the near future, one by Italy and two by Jugoslavia.

**Black Sea Unswayed.**  
The one exception is the Black Sea. Here are still numerous mine-fields. No international agreement exists for their removal, and it is now in a far worse condition again than when the British mine-sweeping force withdrew, more mines having been laid by the Russians. Considering the vast tonnage afloat and the enormous aggregate mileage covered, it is remarkable that accidents have been so few, and where there have occurred it has in all cases been proved that the casualty was directly caused by a breach of the instructions.

A young girl, Florence Madden, 13, of New York, has confessed that she stole a \$15,000 diamond brooch from Mrs. J. J. Brown, an American visitor to Deauville. The brooch was the only valuable saved by Mrs. Brown, who was a passenger on the Titanic when it sank in 1912.

**SCIENTISTS STUDY CHARLIE'S HUMOR**

Probably the most hilarious meeting in the history of the British Association was held during one of the last days of the Edinburgh meeting. It was the new vigorous psychological section that worked this miracle. Their object was to study the humor of the scientist as a permanent section of the association is having a humanizing effect upon this august body of normally grave savants. Old traditions have been broken, and a great gathering was convened for an hour in listening to the funny stories which were the result of an investigation by Dr. C. W. Kimmins into the sense of humor possessed by school children.

He introduced the scientists to Charlie Chaplin, Mutt and Jeff, and Punch and Judy as the special favorites of children, and defined the reason for the extraordinary popularity of Charlie Chaplin with children of the ages of five, six and seven.

"It is not only done," he said, "to Charlie Chaplin's continual movement and change of action, but because he breaks all the social conventions, and is always doing all the things that children are forbidden to do."  
"Children of from five to six are mainly amused by action, noise, and dramatic effects. They like to see anybody fall down." Dr. Kimmins, continuing, said that he asked that the children should send in the funniest stories they had ever heard. "Ten thousand were received," he added.  
"Girls of seven and eight were at least a year ahead of boys in their appreciation of a play upon words, and they liked stories showing stupidity in boys."  
"A great change was seen at nine years. One girl of nine wrote: 'The funniest book I have read was Mr. Shakespeare's "Comedy of Errors.'"  
"The jumper story was very popular. A lady was knitting a jumper. Her ball of wool fell down, and the cat swallowed it. The cat soon afterwards had kittens, and each was born with a jumper on."

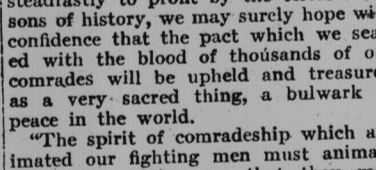

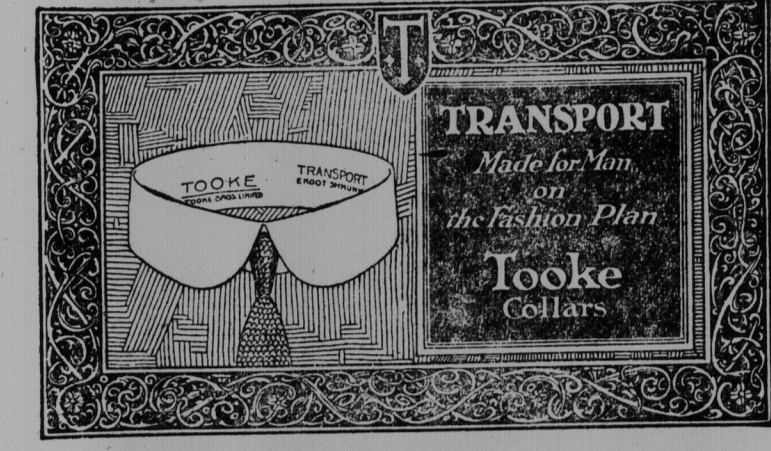

**DRY AGENT REFUSES  
BRIBE OF \$25,000**

Prohibition Fraud Investigator Approached Over Telephone in Behalf of Abraham Levy — Attempts to Date.

(New York Times.)  
A bribe of \$25,000 was offered Howard R. Kiroack, investigator of liquor frauds for the Prohibition Department, late Saturday night if he would consent to drop his investigation into the alleged extensive illegal liquor operations of Abraham Levy, who keeps a theatre ticket agency and photographic studio at 2,102 Seventh Avenue, Kiroack said yesterday. The offer was made over the telephone by a person who did not give his name. Kiroack refused the offer. Kiroack explained that he did not con-



sent to accept the money and then arrest the person for attempted bribery. In a case the record of the United States District Attorney's office fails to disclose a single conviction for attempted bribery of prohibition agents.  
An offer of a bribe has also been made over the telephone to Assistant United States Attorney McCormick, who is prosecuting the case. Attempts to bribe agents operating under Acting Federal Prohibition Agent E. C. Yellowley now nearly one hundred.  
Kiroack declared yesterday that the alleged operations of Abraham Levy in-

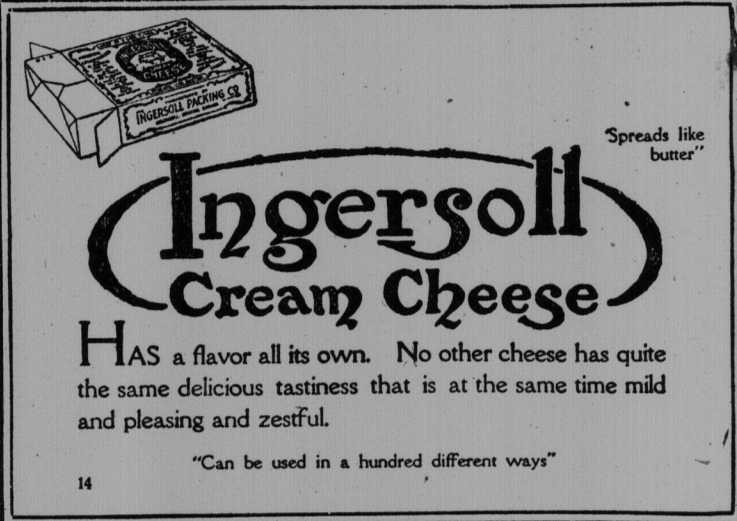


cluded the illegal withdrawal of 40,000 cases of whisky, valued at bootleg prices at more than \$5,000,000, on which between \$500,000 and \$600,000 in graft was paid. Kiroack also learned that Levy had been arrested in connection with the transportation of Biscardi rum under the name of Eugene Smith and other aliases.  
At least 7,200 cases of Biscardi rum said to have been let out by the Biscardi Rum Corporation have been accounted for through his investigations, including the delivery of 1,800 cases to William A. Collins, a fictitious name, and 1,800 cases to Albert MacKenzie, dead for two years. Kiroack has checks showing payment of \$10,000 at one time and \$12,000 at another. An affidavit made by Levy that William A. Collins was an assumed name was obtained from the United States Mortgage and Trust Company, showing that Levy wanted to withdraw \$3,830 deposited in the name of Collins. Kiroack said Levy had bank accounts all over the city in different names. Subpoenas are being issued for the banks where such funds are found.  
"To show that he had a pull at prohibition headquarters," Kiroack said "the permit issued in the name of Collins was revoked in February. In May 1,800 cases of rum were withdrawn on approval of the prohibition office at West Twenty-seventh Street."  
Kiroack declared that there would be further revelations in the case on Tuesday, involving prominent politicians and others. Investigations so far, he said, had shown that the bootleggers in almost every instance have had confederates in the director's office. Levy boasted so frequently of his "pull" in Washington that Kiroack went to Washington and took the case up personally with Commissioner Hayes, who has sent Attorney Johnson here to assist McCormick.  
"Now that things are beginning to be cleaned up in the Federal Prohibition Department," said William H. Anderson, State Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, at the Methodist Church Brooklyn, last night. "We are expecting the mud batteries to open up on Federal Prohibition Commissioner Hayes very shortly, followed by a poison gas attack."  
Representing themselves as thirsty football players, a squad of prohibition agents, headed by Herman Wittenburg and accompanied by two women, called for drinks at Van Cortlandt Inn, in Van Cortlandt Park, Saturday night. They said they got three drinks of whisky for \$2.25 and then handed a summons to the owner, Thomas Farrell, and arrested the waiter, Edward Edelweis.

REPORTING BY WIRELESS

(Halifax Chronicle)

A noteworthy feature of the news reporting of the International Schooner Races off Halifax was the continuous wireless service furnished by the Canadian Press. This was made possible by the installation by the Marconi Company on the Government steamer Tyrian the official press boat, of a special set providing for use of the Company's continuous wave system, which enables operation of the wireless while other ships in the immediate vicinity are sending or receiving on the regular wireless wave. An aerial was erected above the Canadian Press Bureau, Granville Street, Halifax, where the uninterrupted "running story" of approximately 3,000 words for each race was received direct from the press-boat. From the Halifax Bureau the story was telegraphed all over Canada and the United States. For example a few minutes after the Elsie's foretopmast snapped on Saturday, the news was common property on the Atlantic seaboard. The technical supervision of the service was conducted by R. Letts, manager at Halifax of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of Canada and, it was thanks to his special knowledge and skill that the service was continuous and satisfactory.

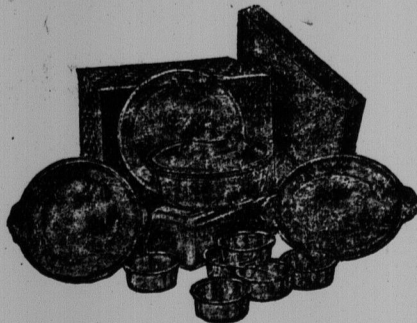

CHARTER REPORT. Chartering business remains restricted in volume, most fixtures effected being on the grain account. The tone of the market is decidedly improved in spite of the fact that nothing has occurred to alter the trade outlook, which is still overhung with exchange difficulties and the uncertainty of the political situation. One of the features of the week was additional fixtures for coal to the West Indies. Fixtures to South America are about through for the season. It is expected that coal shipments to Italy will revive and that rates will undergo a rise. There were a limited number of charters in the sugar carrying trade. Tonnage was sparingly offered and met with a prompt response, the rates adjusting themselves to the demand, which was almost confined to the transatlantic grain trade. Rates out of Montreal are strongest owing to the desire to get the grain out of the port before the close of navigation. Most of the grain moving out of Montreal is to the Continent, and very little to the United Kingdom. Time charter rates are weak owing to small demand. The little inquiry in the market is only for single voyages and for small boats.

The Protestants will attend divine service in Knox church, City road, while the Catholic members will attend the 11:30 o'clock mass at the Cathedral. All those taking part in the parade will meet at the armory, and the parade will start at 10:30 o'clock, taking the following route: Carmarthen, Mecklenburg, Sydney streets, south to Market square, Charlotte, Coburg and Garden streets to City road. RIVER PIRATES ON THE ST. JOHN

Grand Manan Man Says He was Robbed of \$175

Tells of Armed and Masked Men from Speedy Motor Boat Boarding His Craft and Relieving Him of Proceeds of Sale of Fish.

One does not nowadays need to delve into the realms of fiction or travel in retrospect into the middle ages to uncover the tales of pirates; tales of daring hold-ups can be produced almost from our own front gardens. The mind of a Times reporter was carried back to the days of the "big doings" in the Spanish main by a story told this morning by Daniel C. Barnes, of White Head, Grand Manan, on his return after a fish-selling expedition up the St. John river.

Mr. Barnes last week took a motor boat load of fish up river and by making inland trips by team sold his cargo. With some \$175 in his pocket he set out on his return trip by gasoline boat. Just as dusk was gathering last Monday evening his motor stalled and he set about making repairs. In a few minutes he noticed the approach of another boat, painted white and evidently possessed of considerable speed and power, approaching. It bore no lights.

Thinking the boat was bringing assistance, Mr. Barnes welcomed its arrival, but to his surprise he says he was suddenly confronted with two masked men, each armed with a revolver, who commanded him to stand and deliver. The muzzle of a gun within a few inches of his head precluded any argument in the matter and Mr. Barnes felt there was no alternative but to hand over his money. He passed them a roll containing about \$175, but managed to retain \$10 which was in another pocket. The men boarded his boat and were soon lost in the darkness.

Mr. Barnes finally effected sufficient repairs to his engine to enable him, with the assistance of a man who he says he was suddenly confronted with two masked men, to make his way to the city, where he told his story to the police. He said that he had heard other tales of robberies of this kind in the West-end. One was in connection with a motor car which was held up and its occupants robbed of \$25. In another case he said a road was blocked with stones in an evident attempt to hold up another automobile party, but the scheme was reported to have failed.

Mr. Barnes said that on account of the darkness he was unable to obtain a complete description of his aggressors, but he thought they would be both about thirty-five years of age and were dressed in dark clothes.

SIGHT SEEING DAY FOR CHIEF OF THE "DOKEYS"

Mr. Meese at Courtenay Bay, Musquash and on Harbor Trip—Montreal May Have Temple.

Gus Meese of Spokane, Wash., Imperial Prince of the Dramatic Order Knights of Khorassan, was this morning a guest of members of Adlia Temple on an automobile tour to Courtenay Bay where the new harbor development work was inspected and to Musquash where the hydro electric development work was viewed with much interest. They also visited other points of interest and some of the prominent manufacturing plants in which Mr. Meese is especially interested owing to his activities in brush and broom manufacture in Spokane. He is also a member of the Board of Trade there and takes a keen interest in all development work. He was accompanied by Mrs. Meese, also James S. Lord of St. Stephen, royal visitor of Adlia Temple, and S. L. Silvester of Auburn, Me., past grand chancellor of the Pythian order in that state. An informal luncheon was served at the Royal armory.

This afternoon Mr. Meese will be a guest of Rotary Captain Bruce Weston, a member of Adlia Temple, on board a tug boat, which will cruise about the harbor where the terminal facilities will be inspected. At six o'clock the distinguished visitors will be guests at a banquet served in the dining room of the Pythian Casino, after which a ceremonial will take place at which thirty-five tyron will be led into the mysteries of the Oriental rank. This is expected to carry the party to a late hour. Tomorrow the visitors will be given an opportunity to sight seeing or shopping prior to their departure from the city enroute south where Imperial Prince Meese will continue making his official visits. Yesterday Mayor Schofield called on Mr. Meese and extended greetings on behalf of the city. He met Mr. Silvester who explained that he was the bearer of greetings from the mayor of Auburn, Me. Mr. Meese expressed himself as being greatly impressed with St. John and considered its position tended to make it a national asset. He said he felt that the city should make rapid progress so soon as conditions righted themselves after these trying years of strife and unrest. The Pythian order in Montreal is contemplating organizing a "Dokey" Temple and while here Mr. Meese has been in communication with the Pythian officials there by wire. He expressed a wish that the initiation meeting might be held during his visit in the east as he is very anxious to see a temple instituted in the metropolis of Canada.
