



THRILLING PICTURES OF AFRICAN HUNT

AT OPERA HOUSE

Six Reels of Remarkable Films
Enjoyed by Large Audience—
Will Continue All Week

Packed houses greeted the first two showings of the Paul J. Rainey's African hunt pictures in the Opera House vesterday. From an instructive and scenic standpoint these pictures are the best that have been seen in this country and depict, in a striking manner, the lives and habits of various species of animals found in British East Africa. The pictures were obtained only after twelve months of painstaking labor and an expenditure said to be a quarter of a million of dollars. The 350 men who assisted in the work of securing these marvelous pictures of real life did so at a great personal risk. A particularly thrilling scene is shown where a giant rhinoceros, while being pictured, charges the frail tree in which Hemment, the photographer, was stationed with his camera, and the life of the camera man was saved only by the timely shot of Allen Black, the marksman of the party.

The hunt is shown in six pictures, between which colored slides of scenes in different stages of the hunt are shown. In the first reel is pictured the preparation for the safari, or trip across country, in which is shown the unloading of the supplies from the trains and leading them on the backs of the native porters. The loads are then transferred to the backs of a number of camels for the desert journey.

The second section shows the setting of the traps and the capture therein of the jackal and hyena. An interesting feature of the section was the placing of the trapped animals in cages for shipment to the zoological gardens.

The trailing dogs locate the scent and round up the lion in a thicket where, after an exciting battle, the hunting dogs finally hold him until he is dispatched by a bullet from Mr. Rainey's gun.

The pictures, as a whole, are unusually clear when one takes into consideration the difficulties under which they were obtained. A lecture delivered by Dr. F. N. Glover during the showing of the pictures, explained many of the situations and served as a guide to the methods of the hunt.



THREE-STORY FLATS

The question of three-story flats was discussed at the annual meeting of the National Housing Association of the United States in December last. Mayor Fitzgerald of Boston, in the course of an address told of efforts made in that city to improve the tenement house law and provide for its better enforcement and for better housing conditions generally. Then he said:
