## REPORT.

CITY OF KINGSTON, OCTOBER 26th, 1853.

To the Representatives of the Grand Division of the Order of the Sons of Temperance, for that part of the Province of Canada formerly called Upper Canada.

Another year of labor has passed, and we through the guardian care BROTHERS :of The Great Patriarch above, are again permitted to assemble to discuss and adopt measures for the promotion and advancement of the Temperance

And let us all engage in the duties of this Session with a zeal bearing some proportion to the importance of the objects for which we are associated; and while so many of our fellow men are engaged in the unholy and ruinous traffic in intoxicating liquors, notwithstanding the blazing light which shows so plainly the misery resulting from such a traffic.

The occasion is one of the deepest interest to us, to the thousands whom we represent, and our beloved country. Our labors here are not for to-day, or to-morrow, but for that long undeveloped future, whose horizon, grey with the old age of eternity, no eye hath ever seen. They are to pertain to the vicissitudes of days and years not yet in existence, and to form a part of the history of beings not yet invested with our principles, but still under the influence of habits that degrade and curse and kill.

The past season has been rather disastrous. Discouragement has prevailed in many sections. Inactivity has been the result. In many places apathy has opened the gates for the enemy, and he has "come in like a flood"; yet we have a force in the field still, firm, unwavering and invincible. Yours is the task, upon the present occasion, to dispose of this force in such a manner as shall render it most effective. Suffer me to hope, that you will apply yourselves to the labours of this Session, with a firm determination that you will do all in your power to bring this Order, to which we are so devotedly attached, to consider its powers, its duties, its responsibilities, and that you will so mould the great soul of the organization, as to render it efficient in the amelioration of the condition of our fellow men; and in the directing of public sentiment to the criminal and degrading influence of the "liquor traffic."

Many Divisions have given way, but when we examine their history, we find that they were broken down by inward, not outward pressure. No regard was paid to the great object of the Order. Many have deserted us, but we find upon enquiring that they had no hearts in the cause.-They were prompted to unite with us, either from a desire to obtain pecuniary benefits, or for the gratification of a mere idle curiosity; very few of this class remain with us at the present time The drones are cast off-

I firmly believe we have at the present time more moral and available power than we have ever before had. Let us then apply ourselves now to the direction of this power in its proper channel.

We have bright pages in our history, around which we can cluster, and from which we can derive encouragement to persevere. Drunkards have teen redeemed, restered to their families, to society, and their God, who yet stand firm, and in common with their friends, are sending up daily, sincere and devout aspirations for our prosperity and success. Families once wretched, are now surrounded with comforts. The morals of society have been greatly improved. Let us then cast aside all the obstructions that are in our pathway, and redeem our professions.

Tract distribution, the dissemination of intelligence, the support of the Temperance Press, I trust will again claim your attention at this time.

Permit me also to suggest the expediency of urging upon all the subordinate Divisions, the necessity of continued effort, by petitioning the Legislature to repeal the "License Laws," and to enact such laws as shall effectually stop and prohibit the traffic in alcoholic liquors as a beverage, and if we do not succeed in obtaining a Prohibitory Liquor Law before the termination of the present Parliament, to make it a test question at the next general election for the Province and to vote for no man or candidate for Parliamentary henors who will not pledge himself unconditionally to vote for such a law, but use all legal efforts to obtain the same; also make it a test question in all Township elections, keep up a continued agitation of this subject, hold public meetings as frequently as convenient, open their Division Rooms to the public as often as once a month for the purpose of hearing addresses, lecturing on, and discussing this subject, appropriate a portion of the funds of the Division each quarter to purchase Temperance Tracts for gratuitious distribution. I would also suggest the propriety of recommending Subordinate Divisions, holding quarterly conventions in each County throughout the jurisdiction of this Grand Div., this plan if generally adopted by all the Divisions will be productive of great good.

It does not seem to be generally understood by Subordinate Divisions that they possess the power to do away with the benefit system in their respective Divisions. They have this power in Art.6, Sec.2 of the Constitution of Sub. Divs., the latter part of said section reads. "Nevertheless this Division may suspend benefits by a two-third vote of the members present at a regular meeting, after two weeks notice of such action." would respectfully ask Sub. Divisions to deeply consider this question, and if after mature consideration, they are of opinion that it would tend to the prosperity of their Division, and more particularly to the interest, promotion and furtherance of the Temperance cause, to avail themselves of this privilege and suspend the payment of benefits at once; this need not deprive them of giving assistance to a worthy Brother or his family when needed. I fervently and prayerfully solicit all members of this order who take an interest in the Physical, Mental and Religious welfare of their fellow men. in the prosperity of our beloved Canada, to punctually attend the Division meetings, promptly pay their weekly dues, and in conducting the affairs of their Div. strongly adhere to the Constitution, By-Laws, Rules and usages of the Order, not to take up unnecessary time of the Division in discussing Constitutional points, and in no case to make them a bone of contention or cause of discord. To differ in opinion is not criminal, but always cheerfully submit to the constituted majority, and if matters of this kind cannot be settled to the satisfaction of the Div. write to the proper officer of the G. Div. for his opinion, and if still dissatisfied, the matter can be laid before

this body at a regular Session. In all your Division meetings, let the object for which we are united to perpetuate, be prominently brought before, and be impressed upon the minds of the members, viz., Temperance and the Prohibitory Liquor Law. Let our conduct both in and out of the Division be courteous and brotherly, united we stand, divided we fall, Union is strength. We have a great and hard battle to fight, a powerful enemy to overcome. Therefore if we expect to conquer it is absolutely necessary that every soldier should be at his post, armed to the teeth, and ready and willing to meet the foe at all points, to wage a continual and ceaseless war until victory shall crown our united efforts. Bear in mind we are fighting an enemy of the human race, an enemy of our country, and our God. Our experience, thus far, has shown us that we can hope to accomplish but little good, unless we wage an uncompromising war against the "liquor traffic." We may succeed in securing thousands to the pledge. We may continue our efforts in behalf of the drunkard, but we can gain but little, until we drive the enemy from his stronghold. In view of this, I suggest that this G. D. cause an address to be published, setting forth in strong language the evils attendant upon the manufacture and sale of Alcoholic drinks as a beverage, and calling upon all friends of humanity, to lend us their aid and sympathy. Action, constant, unceasing, untiring action, is all that is now demanded. It is for you my brethren, to set the ball in motion now. We have been too long governed by expediency. Our efforts have been thwarted by a want of proper reflecting upon our position and

It is my duty, also, to suggest for your consideration the necessity our duties. of collating, compiling and publishing in a convenient form, for the use of subordinate Divisions and members of this Order, the decisions of the National Division, and the decisions and By-Laws of this Grand Division, together with the Constitutions as amended. These are now spread over

too wide a surface, and are not easily available. I have endeavored to make myself fully acquainted with the condition of the Order at this time, in that part of the Province of Canada under this jurisdiction. Viewing as I do the Order as perfectly valueless, only so far as its strength and influence could be brought to bear against the evils ansing from intemperance, it has been my constant aim, to direct the brethren to the Cardinal principle of the Ordor, and urge them to remove all abstracts, which operated against the attainment of this object.

The history of one portion of the Order, so far as my observation ex-

tends, is the history of the whole. Defection, desertion, lukewarmness, neglect of stated meetings, nonpayment of dues, laxity of discipline, disregard of moral and civic duties, as well as neglect of the great principles of the Order, have existed in some sections to a fearful extent, while in others, amid fearful discouragements, our bands have stood up mantully to the contest.

The Order has arrived at that point in its history when it is incumbent upon it to act and act efficiently. It is the only organization outside of the Christian Church, that is calculated to promote the work in which it is engaged, and if the great heart of the Order can be brought to consider its position, its responsibility, its duty, the day is not far distant, when we shall have a prohibitory Liquor Law for this Province, when thousands who are now oppressed, degraded, wretched and ruined, will "rise up" and call

In consequence of the organization of this Order, as well as its rapid growth, other associations have almost ceased their efforts-have in many cases disbanded. and the Christian Church has in a great degree thrown the responsibility of carrying forward the Temperance Reform, upon our shoulders. We must then consider our position and act accordingly.

Since your last Session, there has been another Session of the National Division of the Sons of Temperance of North America, at Chicago, which I attended as one of the Representatives of this Grand Divisions .-The proceedings of that body have been published, and I doubt not, many of you have had an opportunity to examine them. Your attention will be

particularly directed to some acts of that body.

During the Session the utmost harmony and good feeling prevailed; and much business relating to the Order and affecting the cause of Temperance, for good as we trust, was transacted. Proof sheets of the New Ritual were laid before the National Division for inspection and consideration. Several propositions were adopted by the Division, recommending certain modifications and changes; and then the ceremonial was referred back to the Committee, to make such others as might be considered expedient and cause it to be published and distributed to the different Grand Scribes at as early a day as possible.

The New Ritual is I believe now ready for delivery and can be obtained from the Grand Scribe. I would advise Subordinate Divisions to lose no time in procuring the work. A circular should be immediately sent by the Grand Scribe to all the subordinate Divisions under the jurisdiction of this Grand Division, informing them that the New Ritual can be procured at his office. stating the cost, and that the price of the work must be

received by him before the work can be forwarded.

Owing to the present reduced condition of the finances of the National Division, and the further fact that the means to pay the printing &c., was to be derived from the sale of the work, cards, &c., the M. W. S. was directed to require the money to be paid before delivery for all ordered. They will be furnished to G. S. and through him the subordinate Divisions will be supplied. A circular setting forth the cost, where obtained, and other necessary information, has already been received, it is presumed by the G. S. of this Grand Division. And it is respectfully suggested, that this body take such action on this subject as it may deem proper.

The Constitution of subordinate Divisions was so amended as to allow a reduction of the initiation fee to one dollar; Rule 15 of Constitution of Grand Division was so amended, as to require each subordinate Division to pay to the G. D. instead of a percentage, not more than 3d perquarter for each of its members, whose names may appear on the F. S.'s books. Therefore it will be necessary for this G. D. to determine at this Session the amount to be paid quarterly by sub-division for each of its

members.

For further information with respect to the business transacted at the last session of the N. D., you are referred to its printed proceedings.

David Morgan in August says "I cannot say anything favorable as regards the progress and prosperity of the Divisions about this locality, they seem to be at a stand still, neither going ahead, or sufficiently cold enough to die; it appears that everything connected with the formalities of the order of the Sons, is become so monotomous to the people generally, by its frequent and continued use, that they are actually getting tired of it. In my opinion we need a change in some way. And I cannot think of any that would prove so beneficial to the Order generally, as that of allowing the Ladies to join us and thus bring two organizations into one."

Robert March in August reports Iona Division, their numbers are considerably decreased, yet those remaining are still faithful to the great principles for which we are banded together and are determined to do all in their power to forward the great and glorious cause of Temperance, but we are much in want of public speakers, and no Lecturer has been our way for a long time, so that we cannot make that impression on the public mind that we would wish, however all we can do is done cheerfully \* We have finished a commodious Hall which has been built chiefly by the voluntary contributions of the members.

J. S. Bliss on August 8 reports, I may remark that some few Divisions in this vicinity have rather declined, and even some I am sorry to say, have gone down altogether. This is not the case in my district which consists of only one Division, Frankford No. 70. This Division is in as prosperous condition, and perhaps more so than at any other time since its organization Frankford has been widely known as a very hard place, where vice, drunkenness and immorality have reigned supreme for a great length of time, but through the influence of the Sons, an entire revolution has taken place. It has materially changed in its appearance as a village, its size having nearly doubled within two years, and the character of its inhabitants is as much different from what was two years ago, as can be imagined, and from present appearances we are destined to reach a very high state of society, churches have been built or are in progress of erection .-Bible classes, Sunday Schools, and juvenile Temperance societies have been established. The Sons and Daughters have in operation a circulating library. The young men have a well organized Brass Band of music, all of which have been in a great measure the result of the influence exerted on behalf the Temperance cause. The Division has now about 80 members including some of the most influential characters among us, we have one Councilman, two Magistrates, two Physicians, one limb of the law, and last but not least one D. G. W. P., who have exerted and still are exerting their utmost, in promoting the glorious cause of Temperance, we have three groggeries here, still very little liquor is sold to people residing in the village, and having two Temperance Hotels now in operation, we are rejoicing in the hope that before another year rolls round, we shall not have any such thing as a rum hole among us. Could that portion of the G. W. P's report relating to making our cause a Political question be generally circulated and understood it would be the means of doing a great deal of good. As the next session of the Grand Division is to be at Kingston, I would suggest the propriety of making it the object of a special circular, enjoining upon each and every Division the importance of the attendance of every brother entitled to a seat in the G. D., it would not only exhibit the strength of the Order which would be beneficial in its effects, but would also awaken the Representatives to renewed exertions in their fields of labor at home."

Another cause which has alienated from the order the affections of many of its best friends here, is the action of the National Divis. on the colored question, and the, I may say, acquiescence of car G. D. in the decision of the N. D. on that subject.

"Notwithstanding that our order seems to have lost most of its influence in this neighborhood, I am happy to say that I think the mass of the people are in favor of our principles, and of the means by which they alone can effectually be carried out-A Prohibitory Law-one proof of which, is, that the "traffic" is already suppressed in our Township, so far as the people have the control over it through their Council."

Benjamin Pearson, on 3rd October, Reports-

"It is with feelings of heartfelt pleasure, I have to inform you that the good work is progressing. Whitechurch Division No. 106 continues to increase in numbers and in usefulness; its business is harmoniously transacted, and the only strife known, is a commendable one,-viz, which shall

best promote the interests of our beloved order.

"The order of the Sons of Temperance stands high in public estimation here. Whitechurch Division, (notwithstanding the village is small, and the surrounding County not densly populated), contains a goodly number of members, and they are not all "little and unknown," as is sometimes asserted by our opponents. Among its members is our M. P. P., one Town Reeve, several Justices of the Peace, and Township Councillors. The Post-Master, and in fact all the respectable part of the community are either members or are very friendly towards us; but while we rejoice in our prosperity, we have to sorrow that some of our members return to their cups. The number thus violating their obligations now is not so great as might have been expected, taking into consideration the numbers that have been reclaimed, and the indemnity held out, and the facility with which liquor can be obtained. The division is unanimous, and I may say, enthusiastic in favor of the Maine Law, as the only effectual means of putting a stop to the traffic, and if a Prohibitory Law is enacted, I think it will be fully and fairly carried out.

"There, is one question which tends to retard the work in this part of the country, causing many to stand aloof from us, and many of our numbers to think seriously of withdrawing, in fact, was near breaking up the Division, I mean the Cider question. I only succeeded in allaying the storm, by telling the division, that if they were aggrieved by the action taken or the position in which the question now stands, they should petition the G. D. to have the Rep's to N. Div. instructed to bring the question before the N. Div., and endeavor to have it altered, so as to meet their views. I really wish something could be devised to satisfy them on this point, or draw

their minds away from it."

Gilbert William Cook, on 30th September, Reports as follows :-

"In my present Quarterly Report, I shall take into consideration a greater length of time than it is intended to comprehend, from the fact that I am not aware, that the G.W.P.has ever received any report of a similar nature from this District, (No 23). The Order here has had its ebbs and flows. At the time this division was organized, (Nov. 15, 1850), Temperance was at low water mark, and a feeling in favor of a Prohibitory Liquor law was almost unknown. Now, behold the contrast! Several "Maine Law meetings" have been held in this locality, and resolutions in favor of said law passed almost unanimously. Last week we held a similar meeting (well attended) when the following resolutions were passed unanimously, viz :- Resolved, 1st That we want the Maine Law. 2d That we will have the Maine Law. 3rd That we will put it in force when we get it.' This will show you what a revolution has been effected in the public mind in this vicinity, which is only attributable to the efforts put forth by zealous members of our division. And, is not this the case elsewhere? Yes, and even greater than this has been accomplished. We have three, and sometimes four Ministers residing here, who change every year or two, and it is our custom, whenever a new Minister (or Ministers) come, to appoint a committee to make arrangements for a public meeting, and invite said Ministers to Lecture. By this means we have got some in the way of lecturing, who never did before, and have accomplished good, I may say in a two fold point of view, for certainly, some of them whom we have drawn into the habit of lecturing, have given us some very able lectures before they left us. This plan works well here, and has accomplished much good. I have only to add that our division is composed of staunch tectotalers, who have, and are still willing to sacrifice time and means in our glorious cause, and are still determined to press onward, till our nation becomes a sober nation, and our people a sober people.

Thomas Howe, on 4th Oct., Reports as follows :-"In presenting this, my first Report, as D. G. W. P., I am sorry that I cannot say much for the prosperity of the divisions under my charge. They were in rather an unprosperous state when I received the charge, and though efforts have been made to stir them up and bring them out to Division Rooms, these efforts have been apparently unsuccessful. I shall, however, take up each division separately, and begin with Dundas Division No. 67, the oldest in my distric, and the one from which all the divisions around emenated, (seven divisions having been started as so many branches from the parent stem). This division paying back to all the members going out to form new divisions their Initiation Fees, and rendering other pecuniary assistance in the shape of printing, &c., until such time as each was sufficiently strong to maintain itself. This division once numbered over 200 members, now reduced to 125 by expulsions and withdrawals, yet, still going on pretty prosperously, and though there is at present a good deal of apathy exhibited, chiefly by the scanty attendance in the division room, still I have no fears of its future success, as there are some stout hearts and willing hands determined to stand by it "through good and ill." I might give as a proof of this determination, the fact that a bargain is just now concluded for the purchase of a division room at a cost of £200 currency.

"Desjardines Division No.354 started into being as the result of the labors of the com. of Dundas Div. appointed to take up names of candidates for a new division, the same being in order to meet the views of some influential parties here, who had objections to mingling with some of the material of which the old division was composed. The new division started under the most favorable auspices, having in its ranks the then Reeve of the United Counties, the Deputy Reeve of the Town, and a number of Merchants and men of talent and influence, men capable of pushing to a favorable ultimate, anything they might take in hand; yet, those men, without either jarring or discord, have allowed that division to run down so low, that

officers have not yet been obtained for the current quarter. "Jerseyville Division No. 44 is a new division, situated in a locality famed for its support of Total Abstinence principles for many years past, and formed by eight members going out from Dundas Division. It numbers 32 members, all alive and active in the cause, and contains good material as to intelligence and respectability, combined with zeal for pushing forward the interests of our order, and I have good hopes of its future

stremity of the same naving been received from it now for three quarters past. Its distance from Dundas, some 17 or 18 miles, precludes the posibility of my visiting it, without incurring expense which the division could not or would not pay. However, I went up on the occasion of its anniversary, in the month of June last, and when there consulted with the members, and at their repuest deputed one of their P. W. P.'s to install their officers for the quarter commencing 1st July, on the express condition, that all the returns should be at once made out and furnished; but these conditions have not been fulfilled, and I fear, from the fact of three letters to them on that head remaining unanswered, that they have not been able to keep up their meetings.

"Beverly Division No. 293, located in the middle of the same township of that name, has not had a meeting during the whole of the last quarter, except one after the night of installation; the benefit members of that division are, without an exception, defaulters in both payment and attendance, and the division has for the last twelve months been entirely sustained by non-benefit members, paying only 71 d each per quarter for dues. do not consider as within the Rules, but as there appears a probability of sub-divisions being permitted to act on the non-benefit principle, I thought better to take no notice of their present wrong position, but on the contrary, have encouraged them to persevere. A few days since I had an application, through one of the P. W. P.'s, to permit the changing of the location to one more convenient for the members, with an intimation that if such were permitted the cause would be helped forward by two ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church, one of whom resides at the new location. As the removal is only a matter of a few miles, not interfering with any other division, and making no alteration in the charter, and in the hope that good might result, I gave permission, provided all the divisions were satisfied, and I hope to have better news next quarter if still in office.

"There are some causes of the declension in numbers and defection from our ranks, which, in my intercourse with the division, I find so obvious, I cannot refrain mentioning; and first, in all the country divisions I have visited, I find the eider question to create more trouble than any other, especially since the motion of the G. D. contained in page 40 of the last minutes. I have in all cases endeavored to explain, that the action of the Grand Division, was but the carrying out the decision of the National Div. in the same matter, and consequently they, the G.D., are not to blame, but there appears to be a general clamor to have the thing altered, making a difference between sweet and fermented cider in the pledge, and were it not for the poverty of the funds of country divisions, I strongly suspect your next meeting would be filled with representatives instructed on this point alone, it being one which touches the principle of selfishness (not the weakest) in the farming classes of the community.

"I shall briefly refer to another 'evil under the sun,' namely: the benefit system. In view of the evils which this system, as it at present exists, has propagated, and is entailing on the members, both in town and country, especially in the country where benefits are not so much required. I would say, that steps should be at once taken to permit divisions, at their option, to throw off what many of them consider a great burden, and I am confident that the adoption of the non-benefit system and nominal dues would be the means of doubling country divisions in a very short time."

James Breakenridge Reports the Division in his District, viz : Coleman's Corners No. 5, and Mallorytown No. 10, in a prosperous and healthy

Bev. J. E. Ryerson, on 14th October, Reports the Division in his District as doing very well.

Alexander Martin, on 12th October, says: "Hope Division has had

but few members added to its number, yet has pursued a steady course, and about held its own. Brighton Division has not been so fortunate; we have had to expel a great many during the year for non-payment of dues, still our funds are in a safe state, having about \$100 on hand. Of late the division has been better attended, and I anticipate an increase in numbers during the coming winter. No true Son of Temperance can observe (without extreme regret) the coldness and indifference manifested by Divisions in this section. Drunkenness has been fearfully on the increase in this village (Brighton) during the last two years, and in defiance of the S. of T. tavern keepers violate the law with impunity, and when brought before the Magistrates they can prove anything, yet with all these drawbacks we are not discouraged, firmly believing that our order is destined to be the main instrument in obtaining a Prohibitory Law, and it must be apparent to every man of observation that nothing short of such a law will confer anything but a temporary benefit."

Tho's Nixon, on 19th Oct., Reports the Division in his District rather

George Dawson, on 18th October, Reports Meford Division No. 314 in the ascendant than otherwise. in a good condition, and thinks there is not a division in Canada in bettet working order. He says: "we do not allow any discussion that will create any angry feelings; we have generally a good attendance at Division, which consists of some whole-souled Sons. A few members have been suspended last quarter for non-payment of dues. We have four Sons in the Township Council, and one tectotaler, and this is the third year that the Council has refused to allow a tavern in the Township, consequently, we have no drunkeness here, which demonstrates the propriety of the Maine Law. You see we are ready for it, as the Council was elected on the Temperance Ticket each year by large majorities. We have searcely any violation of the pledge, as there is no temptation in the way.

Alonzo Sweet, on 15th October, says he attended twice to install the officers of Walpole Division, but a sufficient number of members did not attend to form a quorum : considers the division near broken up : have not

surrendered their Charter, and probably may never. John Douglas, on 8th October, Reports Percy Division No. 27, and Benevolent 160, as not in a prosperous state: considers the system of benefits as the cause of much of the declension of our order.

Benjamin Knapp, on 2nd October, Reports Brockville Division prosperous, and Birmingham Division doing well. He says—"The fact is, there has been more done in this part in the temperance cause, by the order

of the Sons, than I thought ever could be done.

I. B. Bellamny, on 21st Oct., says-"I am pleased to be able to inform you that the Divisions in this District, with but one exception, are in a very prosperous and thriving condition. I have reference to Central Augusta Division 238, and East Augusta Division 294. These divisions have been instrumental in reclaiming a great many very hopeless cases. North Augusta Division No. 3 is wading through difficulties at the present time, and our enemies are those of our own household. I am quite satisfied that we are very deficient here in one important characteristic of the true temperance man, and that is, a bold determination to assert our right to make the Traffic in intoxicating liquors, a subject not merely to be confined for discussion in our division rooms, school houses and churches, but a grievance to be carried to the poll at our town meetings, and our county elections, and in this way to let the supporters of intoxicating drinks know, that, unless they possess the majority, that we are quite determined to have law to prohibit the sale of them, and until we come up to this standard we shall never, in my opinion, be full-grown Sons of Temperance."

A. Cheat, on 20th October, Reports the Division in his District as holding on as well as they can, considering they have two of the worst

kind of groggeries licensed in their midst.

John C. Ferrier, on 14th October, Reports Mimico Division 98, Lambton 94 and Philanthropic 353, although stationary and numerically less, yet may be fairly reported as firm.

J. Wigfield, on 12th Oct., says-"Mercy Division 375 does not make

much progress, but is holding its ground."

John McMichael, on 30th Oct., Reports the order in a flourishing condition, in that vicinity (Blenheim).

L. M. Losie, on 14th Oct., says-"Franklin Division 81 is doing very

well: fears that Canton Division 133 will go down."

J. Deming, on 10th Oct., states—"Demerestville Division is going the same as usual. On the whole, the cause is progressing."

Joseph Lenon, in October, says that Division is not gaining ground, but has hopes of the good cause reviving. Several of the members are in arrears for dues, and he fears many never will pay up. There seems very little interest taken in the temperance cause in this part of the country. A good Temperance Lecturer is wanted.

Joseph Cumming, on October 11, states—"I have visited and installed the officers of Glengary and Martintown Divisions."

J. S. Glendening, in October, states Liloes Creek Division is improving.

D. B. Stickney, on 17th Oct., Reports that Newburgh Division 77, Centerville Division 120, Hannoverian 225, as not being in an encouraging or satisfactory condition, and says,—"Sonship, in fact, is loosing ground in

this District, not so much for violation of Art. 2 as for non-payment of dues. In my opinion, the system of weekly dues and benefits now in operation has a tendency to keep a great many from joining the order, and also draws a great many out that do belong, by allowing themselves to be expelled for non-payment of dues. I think the G. D. should take some action on the subject. Brockville Division No. 1 still pursues a steady course, and is composed of members who are determined to face the enemy

until he is exterminated, and victory shall crown their efforts. "It gives me peculiar pleasure to inform this G. D. that there has been a marked improvement in regard to my Deputies making their official reports since last session of this body, which reports contain much useful information, and many important suggestions; and I here beg to return my best thanks to those deputies, and who are also entitled to the thankful consideration of this G. D. and the whole order, for the interest and zeal manifested by them, in promoting the cause of temperance. Upwards of 80 official reports have been received from D.G.W.P.'s since last session. It would give me still greater pleasure to be able to state that not one had omitted this important duty.

"The G. S.'s Report will contain a more statistical account of the Order, showing, with other information, its strength in numbers and divisions; also, what divisions have made their quarterly returns, and those

that have failed in that all importent duty.

"The Treasurer's Report will show the financial state of this Grand

Division."

In conclusion, the remarks ought not to be withheld, that the Order of the Sons of Temperance, in this Province, is destined to go down, unless its members shake off their sloth, and that, abandon it they never will; but this one thing they will do, work with it, and for it, and by it, until it shall have done its part and all its part, in achieving the victory. In a word, they must devise such measures as shall put into it new life and vigor, and that speedily, or its days are numbered.

I would suggest whether it may not be advisable to take such steps as may result in resuscitating extinct Div. and in strengthening such as are

# REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE.

Grand Worthy Patriarch and Brethren:

This day closes the annual term of this Grand Division, and the second year of my connection with the office of the G.S., and therefore, as required by our Constitution and By-Laws. I herewith present a Report of the transactions of the office since my last.

There have been chartered during the present term nine new divisions, making a total of 113 new divisions chartered during my two years term

of office.

I came into office at a period when the Order was daily increasing in numbers, as 65 new divisions were instituted during my first six months

Thirty-two Divisions have surrendered their charters since May last. Lists containing the names and numbers of the above Divisions will

be appended to this Report.

Not only the irregularity of sending in returns, but the absence of information from parties connected with some Divisions, precludes my ascertaining whether many divisions are defunct or have only neglected to send in their returns.

If the defunct Divisions, and those not in working order, are taken into account, there are to be considered nearly 315 Divisions in good standing.

I have alluded so particularly in my previons Reports of the irregularity of sending in returns, and sent circular after circular and letter after letter upon the subject, that it is almost useless to revert to it again. Up to the very evening before my departure for this city, returns and letters have been pouring in, each mail bringing its dozen,s and numbers have been handed me since my arrival, so that it is quite impossible to make out correct statistics.

There is a want in subordinate Divisions in respect to their financial

system, which ought to be remedied.

In other organizations a certain sum is paid weekly, and a portion is credited to a benefit account, another to a widow and orphans fund, and another to an expense account, so that if any money is required it must be drawn from its specific account Now with us the only distinct account is that of the widow and orphans' fund, consequently what ought to have been reserved for the benefit fund, is frequently consumed by ex-

What is loudly called for from every portion of our organization is the permission to admit non-benefit or honorary members, at any rate the subordinate Divisions deem requisite for their own safety. I recommended this plan shortly in my report at the St. Catherines Session, and the Grand Division of Western New York, petitioned the National Division for the privilege, but it was not granted.

I consider that the want of the non-benefit plan has kept many from

joining our Order, and driven thousands out of it. There is evidently a great apathy throughout the entire Order, and much depends upon the Legislation of this body, whether the organization

can again be organized to its former zeal and activity. The sole and principal point to which every endeavor of our Legislation should be aimed is in the attainment of the Maine Law, and to secure this precious boon all encouragement must be given to other organizations tending to the same end, but the introduction of every subject tending to occasion discord in our ranks should be avoided.

I have received two specimins of certificates from the New York Organ office, one of which could be afforded at a very low figure to the subordinate Divisions, as they are only at the rates of 20 and 10 cents each

I have incurred an obligation for the new Rituals of \$500, being for by the thousand. 200 complete sets, containing Blue Books, Officers Cards, 12 Ode Cards,

and 250 B. B. solely for D. G. W. P.'s.

I observe that for the former, the G D. of Ohio charged S. D's \$2, and for the latter \$1. Of course this G. D. will use its own judgement in the matter, but I would also remark that I ordered these documents, under the special promise that they were to be settled for as soon as possible, as the resolution of the Grand Division is -"That it be required of all Grand Divisions to accompany their orders for the new Ritual and Cards, with the money necessary to pay for the number of copies they may require."

Every Temperance Tract, amounting in all to 36,600, has been sold

at half-price to S. D.'s, as the accounts in my book will show.

No portion of the sum granted to the committee appointed to co-oporate with the executive committee of the League has been expended, but by resolution both committees were made one joint committee, and by a resolution of the G. D. Committee the sum of £50 was placed at the disposal of this joint committee, provided that all future operations were to be carried on under the name of the joint committee.

No action was, however, taken relating to the money, and subsequently I received a note from the Secretary of the League, stating that after considering the resolutions I have referred to, that a committee of three had been appointed, viz: Messrs. Ormiston, Woodall, and the Sec'y to co-operate with a similar committee of the G. D., but owing to certain circumstances, the G. D. Com. was not appointed, and there the matter

Notwithstanding, however, that the League movement has so far proved not quite as successful or as efficient as might have been expected, yet I trust this G. D. will continue the same kindly spirit to this organization as they did at its previous session. It is perfectly impracticable and impossible for the Sons of Temperance alone to enforce the Maine Law even when it is carried by Legislative enactment, as has been already very clearly tested in the State of Massachusett. Therefore, although we cannot make a majority of the population Sons of Temperance, we can, by our example, induce members to join an association, having for its sole object the carrying of the Maine Law, and the enforcement of it after it has

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as contributing members, a majority of whom in many cases to my knowledge, have not entered a Division for one, two and three years, and are rather an incumbrance than aid to the proper carrying out of the objects of the order as they too frequently bring discredit upon our Association. As this is the last and final report, I shall ever render to this G. D. in my capacity of G. S., I trust that that will excuse my making so many suggestions for the purification and re-animation of our beloved order.

At the termination of the June quarter the number of contributing members were nominally 16530-say there were actually at that time 10,000 paying members at 1s. each per annum would give a revenue of £500which is more I think than the actual percentage at three pence now

The subject of printing the entire proceedings of this G. D. requires your serious consideration, involving as it does, an enormous and almost useless outlay. The Committee on printing had 1500 copies of the last G. D. published and although by tenders, amounts to the sum of £37 3s. 10d., of course the quantity of rule and figure work augmented the amount, besides being a pamphlet of 78 pages. Now in several cases these books are not even read by, or to members of the Subordinate Divisions, but are locked up in the R. S. or W. P's. box. I consider that a synopsis sheet such as I published immediately subsequent to the last St. Catherines Session would amply answer every requisite, and at the same time save this G. D. an annual outlay of at least £60 or £70 per annum. The 5000 Reports of the Maine Law Committee of the House of Assembly, were also published and distributed in accordance with your resolution at least at a cost of £6-although a large printing establishment with two steam presses, asked your G. D. Committee the sum of £15. Large as the number of 5000 pamphlets appears, it only afforded a small quota for each of the Divisions and D. G. W. P's. It may not be out of place to mention that I have learned since my arrival in this city, that a resident distiller had 2000 copies published of the notorious and Rev. Mr. Lovejoy's tract, against the Maine Law, and that a Brewer of Montreal had 10,000 copies of the same unique and edifying pamphlet, printed and distributed through the length and breadth of the land. Now when single individuals can thus employ their means to such an extent for the propagation of injury and error, how much more ought such a society as this to exert itself for the diffusion of tracts, to convince their fellow men of their errors, and thereby prevent the destruction and death of down-trodden and suffering humanity.

If we earnestly and sincerely desire the Maine Law and its fullfilment when passed into Law, we have much more to do than many of our san-

guine and enthusiastic friends of the cause imagine.

If in Ohio where an intense and arduous agitation has been going on for many weeks past, where some thirty of the leading lecturers of the U. S., have been energetically engaged, where millions of Maine Law tracts and ca npaign newspapers have been scattered gratuitously, throughout the length and breadth of that State, our fellow laborers have failed, what can be expected to result in Canada, where, in comparison to the late work in Ohio, nothing has been done.

One great error many worthy men fall into is, in imagining that their sole requisite is the obtaining of the passage of the act for the Maine Law, whereas it is really of much more consequence so to act upon public senti-

ment, as when it is passed it may be easily carried into effect.

An application has been made to this office for a Charter for a new Divison to be established at Whitby, to be termed "Maine Law Division." The papers relative to the application, I forwarded to the G. W. A., for information as he had been connected with the Committee appointed upon

Whitby Division.

117 Divisions have contributed to the fund for assisting Br. Brunsden, the sum of £31 10s. 112., a statement of which, with his receipts will be placed in the hands of the Finance Committee. I am proud to state that Hamilton Div. No. 25, is in a most flourishing and healthy condition. Into it 24 new members have been initiated during last quarter, besides a number of other persons who joined by card, and you can seldom enter the Division Room, but you will find some 50 to 70 members actively and earnestly engaged in business.

It is now exactly two years since I was chosen the G. S. of this G. D., and during that entire period I have devoted myself exclusively to the Order of the Sons of Temperance, and the general extension of the Temperance movement. I have, during the whole period, paid an assistant out of my salary, in order to carry on the official duties in a manner satisfactory to the G. D. and myself.

The system has been such, that if every account book in the office had been destroyed or burnt, by procuring my letters from the various Divisions the exact amount of moneys received could have been ascertained as well as the exact balances on either side-every sum having been acknowledged that was paid into this office, and every return examined and the errors

and omissions stated.

I have never in my previous reports stated either the number of letters received or forwarded from the office, but as this is my final report to the Grand Division, I feel myself fully authorized to state, that during the two years I have forwarded over 10,000 letters, including of course, circulars, besides some thousands of other packages through the Hamilton Pes Office. In fact, in a portion of my two years, the Subordinate Divisions were at their greatest prosperity, and in their largest number, consequently the work was more then than at any previous or later period, independent of the increased number of entries, caused by the new system which I had introduced.

A great many, to me unpleasant, remarks have been made by members of this G. D. relative to my salary, but I can in sincerity and truth state that the sum of £200—with a sum for an office, would not have been more than an equivalent, for the labor and the requisite outlay for office, assist ant and fuel, to say nothing of the present well known increased rate of labor and food.

Paying £35 a year for a house, £5 per taxes and £36 for an able assistant, leaves a large balance to maintain a man and his family out of £150 a year. I can positively state, that after two years in any other employment, I should be not only better off in pocket, but would not have lost my health by the intense and close application which I have bestowed upon the duties of the office and the interests of the cause generally. Id not, however, regret or repine at the time so spent, because I know that have done something towards improving and benefitting fallen humanity.

At one period I wrote to my kind and urbane friend the M. W. S. relative to the salaries of other G. Scribe's with a similar amount of duty and he immediately referred me to the G. S. of Pennsylvania, as a like jurisdiction with this—and that the incumbent had \$800 per annum besides other allowances.

## REPORT

OF THE COMMITTEE TO WHOM THE GRAND SCRIBE'S REPORT WAS REFERRED.

To the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance of Canada West :-

Your Committee, to whom were referred the Report of the G.S., beg to Report—

That your Committee regret that in consequence of a multiplicity of other business, they find themselves unable to give the Report of the G.S. that degree of attention which its merits demand.

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Your Committee, in order to expedite the business of the G.S., and to afford that officer a reasonable time to prepare his semi-annual report, and arrange his papers in a proper manner, would strongly recommend that it be made imperative upon the Sub-Division to have their quarterly returns in the office of the G.S. at least seven days before the day of meeting of this Grand Division, and that Representatives of Sub-Divisions neglecting to send in their returns, before such period, be not allowed to take part in the proceedings of this G.D.

The principal of admitting non-beneficial and honorary memeers, so forcibly explained by the G. S., your Committee would recommend to the best consideration of the Grand Division. Your Committee doubt not but that such a privilege would tend to increase the number of members of pledged total abstainers from the use, or countenancing the use of ardent spirits.

The recommendations of the G. S. respecting the procuring the passage, by the Legislature, of a Prohibitory Liquor Law, your Committee cannot too strongly recommend to the consideration of the G.D., believing it to be the surest means by which permanent good can be effected.

The suggestion to provide certificates of membership to members of this and the Subordinate Divisions, your Committee believe to be a good one. In the opinion of your Committee it has three things to recommend it, viz: It will be ornumental, useful in saving time, by giving explanation of principles, and reasonable in price.

Your Committee have particular pleasure in knowing that 350 complete sets of the new ritual for Subordinate Divisions have been procured. Your Committee are decidedly of opinion that it will be a great means of infusing renewed life into that branch of our Order, and we would recommend to the Representatives the urgent necessity for procuring a copy of such ritual for the use of their respective divisions. Your committee would recommend that the price of said ritual be placed at the lowest possible figure, and at the same time, they beg to express their hope that the pledge given by the late G. S., respecting the payment thereof, will receive prompt attention.

Your committee are gratified to learn that 36,000 Temperance Tracts have been distributed by the publishing committee, at one-half of the first cost. Your committee believe the principle of keeping the public mind well informed on the benefits resulting from temperate habits, and the evils flowing from intemperance, to be a wise one, and would recommend its continuance.

Your Committee are not prepared to recommend the suspension of the printing of the proceedings of this G. D. Rather than see the proceedings not published, your committee would recommend that copies thereof be sold at such rate as would cover the cost of printing, but they would

strongly recommend that a synopsis of the proceedings be prepared as speedily as possible after the meeting of this G. D.; be printed in circular form, and furnished to the subordinate divisions for their information. The action of the P.G.S. heretofore in this matter was most commendable. And your Committee would further recommend that the returns from the S.D's. be published quarterly, believing as they do, that too much value cannot be placed on such statistical information.

Respecting the want of a proper system in the management of the financial affairs of many of the G. D.'s, your Committee have nothing to recommend, believing that such should more properly come from the Finance

In concluding the Report, your Committee have great pleasure in bearing their testimony to the efficient and satisfactory manner in which the P. G. S. has conducted the duties of his office, alike beneficial to this G. D. as creditable to himself, and your Committee would in the strongest manner recommend, that in view of such arduous and important duties, so well and truly performed, and the smallness of the salary of that officer, in proportion with his labors, a gratuity of One Hundre Dollars be granted out of the funds of this G. D. to Rep. H. W. Jackson, P. G. S., as a mark of their approbation of the value of his services.
