


NEW YORK, April 15—Interest in the case of Harry K. Thaw centres about the probable changes he will make in his staff of lawyers. While no official amouncement has been made in this regard, intimations have come from the lawyers themselves that changes have been made and that others will follow. Delphin M. Delmas, who led the fight at the recent trial, has, it is stated, severed his connection with the case. In this connection the story of the remarkable proceeding of Thaw at a critical period of his trial is published here today. The story recites that when the trial was resumed after the report of the lunacy commission, Mr. Delmas alled Dr. Hamilton to the stand to have him testify as to Thaw's tand to have him testify as to Thaw's nental condition when the murder was committed. He was just about to quesa note which read: "You are no longer in charge of my case." Delmas, surprised, secured the court's permission to confer with his client and when he asked Thaw what the note meant Thaw is said to have repiled, "It means just what it says. You are not going to make these men testify that I am insane. I am sane and you know it. You are no longer in charge of my case." Mr. Delmas then asked Thaw for permission to withdraw, but his request was refused. Delmas, under the law, could not drop the case, and asked Thaw what he wanted done. "I don't want you to put Dr. Hamilton on the stand Jeain," was the reply. Delmas attempted to reason with Thaw but he was immovable. Delmas then rested the case and Dr. Hamilton was excused.



The fact is the King's Congo administration goes annually deeper in debt. It has outstanding bonds amounting to \$60,000,000, not including the 27,000,000 francs loan made by Belgium, in return for which Leopold made his will in favor of the state. Notwith standing the yearly deficit, however, untoid millions continue to pour out of the Congo, and the profits on concessionary imports are enormous. How much the king's revenue really is has always been a matter of speculation. It has been estimated at \$6,000,000 to \$12,000,000. HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the fither is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land awned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the sall

Six months' notice in writing thould be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.



LONDON, April 13.—The delegates who will represent Great Britain at the Hague peace conference have been selected, and their names will be announced in a few days. Considering the prominent part Great Britain will take in the conference in view of her proposalis for the reduction of the expenditures on armaments, there is little public interest shown here in the approaching meeting. This is largely due to the belief among public men that the discussions will have no result zo far as the more important subjects are concerned, owing to the great divergence of opinions among the powers and the decision of several governments to abstain from participating the discussion of any articles of the Russian programme which they believe will not lead to useful results.

The same opinion is held to a certain extent in official circles here, but nevertheless the British delegates will be instructed to bring up the question of the reduction of the expenditure on armaments, and will broach the subject immediately after M. Nelidorff's opening address, in which the chief Russian delegates will explain the Russian programme, if the subject is not included in that programme, which might even yet be done by the issuance of supplementary agenda. Great Britain is taking this step, not because of the belief that the powers will agree to reduce their armaments, but because she believes the discussion will have a good moral effect among the peoples of various countries. The British government therefore does not understand why Germany should dissent from the proposal to bring up the question, as to nullify it her delegates would simply have to vote against it.




