PASSENGER TRAFFIC BY

ALLAN AND DONALDSON LINES

The Season Has on the Whole Been and Average One, But Might Have

Been Much Better

The complete report of passenger traffic handled through St. John and Halifax by the C. P. R. steamships is not yet complete. It will show, however a decrease of about 3,000 inward from last year and a considerable increase in outward passengers. The figures for the Allan and Donaldson lines are now available. The dullness in the industrial circles interfered greatly with travel and the new regulations made by the Canadian government put a stop to the rush of unskilled labor from Europe to this side.

The total number of passengers landed in St. John by the Allan line was a considerable increase in outward passengers and a considerable increase in outward passengers. The figures for the Allan and Donaldson lines are now available. The dullness in the industrial circles interfered greatly with travel and the new regulations made by the Canadian government put a stop to the rush of unskilled labor from Europe to this side.

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The total number of passengers landed in St. John by the Allan line was 2907 as against 2896 in the provious season, 2196 in the season of 1905-06 and 3308 in the winter of 1904-05. Of the number landed this year 77 were saloon, 1825 were second cabin, and 1905 wer steerage. The Allan line brought to Hallfax 449 first cabin, 2222 second cabin, and 8305 steerage passengers, a total of 10,976. The Allans sent away from St. John, 178 first cabin, 161 second cabin and 6270 steerage, a total of 6609 and from Hallfax outward 194 saloon, 305 second cabin and 5390 steerage, a total of 6809 and from Hallfax outward 194 saloon, 305 second cabin and 5390 steerage, a total of 5889. The passengers outward from both ports were thus 12,488 and inward 13,883.

The Donaldson line last year prepared by the construction of new steamers, for an increased passenger traffic. In 1904-05 the boats of this line brought only 174 passengers. In 1905 the number had increased to 959 while last year the arrivals from Scotland numbered in all 2097. The Donaldson line has been badly hit in the same way as the other lines by the bad conditions, existing this year. The total passengers landed in St. John were 952 of whom 290 were cabin and 662 steerage. Outward there was a total of 221 of whom 111 were cabin, 84 steerage and 26 deports. The passengers landed at St. John by these two lines numbered 11,928 while those taken away were 6830. The C. P. R. statement will be ready about the last of next week.


