

Tarsus, Asiatic Turkey, May 3— (via Constantinople, May 4—The Armenian population of the village of Kozolook was put to death under the following circumstances:

Word that the Mohammedans were killing Armenians reached Kozolook before the actual attack on the place, and when the first considerable party of Mohammedans arrived, they found the Armenians well armed and in good positions standing on defense. The Mohammedan s did not feel strong enough to attack, so they gathered reinforcements until there was more than 1,000 of them, well armed, surrounding the village.

STORM CAUSES LOSS OF FOUR LIVES ON LONG ISLAND SOUND

New Haven, Conn., May 4.—Driving with terrific force over the upper waters of Long Island Sound and along a part of the Connecticut shore, one of the severest storms which has been experienced in several years, claimed a toll of four lives during last night, sent four barges to the bottom of the Sound off Branford, cast one sahore in that vicinity and piled three others on the rocks off Faulkner's Island. The persons drowned were Caplain Marshall A. Percy, of the barge Susquehanna, one of the three on Faulkner's Island, his wife, eleven year old son, and a deckhand, whose name has not been learned. But one of the bodies, that of the boy, has been recovered. It was brought to this city today.

MR. PUGSLEY IS UNFIT FOR HIS POSITION.

On the records of the New Brunswick Legislature appears the statement of Mr. Pugsey to the effect that the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Company paid Evans & Elkin \$180,000 for the Central Railway. This money came from the Provincial Treasury. Every dollar expended by that company, which was merely a disorganized department of the Government, was public money.

Mr. Pugsley, a member of the Government which supplied the money, and of the company which received it, allowed the House to understand that the price of the railway was \$180,000. But the Central Railway Commissioners say that Evans & Elkin got only a trifle over.\$140,000. The company declined to pay as much as agreed on the plea that a perfect title to the road could not be supplied. After a good deal of discussion Evans & Elkin decided to accept this partial payment as a full settlement of the account.

Mr. Pugsley was the directing force of the company. It was impossible that he would not be aware of these facts. Yet he told the House of Assembly that \$180,000 had been spent in acquiring the railway. Nearly \$40,000 disappeared. The Commissioners will not say who got it, but they are convinced that it was appropriated by some person or persons in no sense entitled to it.

Mr. Pugsley deliberately misled the House. In other instances he concealed facts of importance from the Legislature. During the time that he was a Provincial Minister his account was continuously overdrawn. Thousands of dollars were in his pocket which should have been in the treasury. He paid no interest on this money. Moreover, the debt never appeared in the Public Accounts, but was carried over from year to year in a Suspense Account. In this way he deceived the Legislature.

Habits such as this are hard to break. The idea that Mr. Pugsley will be a good Federai Minister is surely an extravagant one when his previous career is considered. The Public Works Department spends a great deal of money in the course of a year. Is Mr. Pugsley of the Suspense Account and the Central Railway a suitable man to spend it?

Whatever facts have been gleaned concerning Mr. Pugsley in other spheres of action tend to throw suspicion upon his moral stability and his public spirit. The impression grows that he is a self-seeker whose carelessness in the administration of public money is a matter of general knowledge. Before accusations so grave as those made by the Central Railway Commission a British Minister could not remain in office an hour. If he did not resign of his own motion, his resignation would be demanded by the Prime Minister. This is a British country, and British practice might be adopted here with advantage to the Government

PUGSLEY'S POSITION

(From the Montreal Star.) The astonishing thing is that the Government seems satisfied to leave the Pugsley case where it is.* The Toronto Globe regards it as a good defence to ask why the Opposition does not force an investigation before the Public Accounts Committee, though the New Brunswick railway charges can have only an indirect relation to that body such as the Baie des Chaleurs case had to the Senate Committee which investigated it, and though the departmental papers show not the slightest evidence of McAvity's bargain with Mayes. The Opposition did demand a special committee of inquiry in the latter case; but the Government voted it down.

It looks like poor party tactics for the Government to leave things in this position, even if the Conservatives are willing to do so. The suspicions of the country are aroused. They do not like the look of that transaction between McAvity and Mayes, and they are not reassured by the accusations of Premier Hazen's Commission. Mr. Pugsley must in his present position be a weakness to the Ministry throughout the Dominion, whatever his electioneering skill may make him in New Brunswick. The Government must feel the need of the Minister very greatly when it does not tell him that he must take steps to quiet this suspicion or give up his portfolio. He could settle the Mayes matter by suing Premier Hazen for libel; and that would practically compel Premier Hazen to take the charges of his Commission into the courts, too, in an action to recover the money which it reports missing.

Canadian public life cannot be regarded as in a satisfactory condition when a man can continue to administer one of our great spending departments with such unprobed charges hanging over his head. Even if every shred of them were false, and if his colleagues believed in their falsity, they should think enough of their repute in the country to compel a refutation or a resignation.
