Ottawa, Jan. 12—Hon. L. P. Pelletier, postmaster-general of Canada, has entered into a new agreement with the government of the Common-wealth of Australia for the direct exchange of parcels under which the present rate of twenty-four cents a pound is reduced, either way, after the first pound to twelve cents a pound. The reduced rates take effect from the first of January, 1914. It will be a decided improvement on the previous rate and will no doubt lead to an increased volume of parcel post business between the two countries.



London, Jan. 12—The marine tragedies of 1913 are unusually heavy, the monetary loss totalling \$35,000,000. Not for many years have such heavy liabilities been faced by the underwriters of Lloyds as in the year just ended.

During the eleven completed months of last year, there have been 5,332 accidents of all descriptions to vessels of 500 tons gross and upward, collisions being responsible for 1,820, strandings for 1,532, weather damage for 895 and fire and explosions for 423. "I am not saying this with any seriousness," he remarked with a smile; but an experiment he carried out-one of a series in the course of his secture—indicated that there was coundation for his observation. The lights were turned down and in the darkness radium emanations were pumped through the tubing, and in an instant the sulphide was glowing luminously while the audience—many of whom were medical men—loudly applauded.



FIRST THINGS

The first writer of fairy tales to gain an international reputation was Charles Perrault, the "father" of "Mother Goose," who was born in Paris on this date in the year 1628. Perrault has no claim to the invention of "Mother Goose," "Cinderella," "Jack and the Beast," and other nursery tales, but he is entitled to immortality for his skill in adapting style to matter. The Frenchman was famous as biographer and historian before he began writing his "Contes des Fees," or "Tales of the Fairles." He was in his seventient year when the book was published. Many of the legends to which he has given immortality were of German origin, while others were French and English, and they had been told and re-told, but never written, for centuries before Perrault gave them enduring form. Paris has a monument to Perrault's memory, and thousands of children annually visit the Garden of the Tuileries to gaze in awe upon the marble face of the man who gave the world its most delightful fairy tales.

BRITISH THANKSGIVING DAY.

While Thanksgiving Day, as an annual institution, is peculiar to the United States and Canada, many special national days of thanksgiving have been observed in Great Britain. One of these was celebrated just a century ago today, Jan. 13, 1814, when the whole British people gave thanks for the successes of England and the allies over Napoleon Bonaparte. The first English thanksgiving day was held in 1588, for the defeat of the Spanish Armada, Queen Elizabeth attending the services at St. Paul's. In 1702 and again in 1704 Mariborough's victories were the occasion of national rejoicings. Thanksgiving days for the recovery of members of the royal family from illness have been held several times, notably in 1789, for George III., and in 1872 for the recovery of the Prince of Wales.




