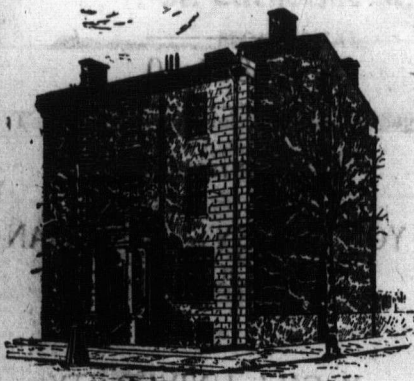

AND MCGILL COLLEGE AVENUE.

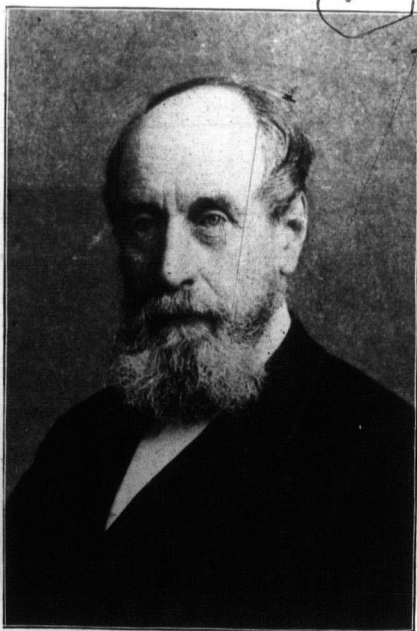
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## Greeting.

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## The Student and the McGill Y. M. C. A.

MY DEAR FRIEND:—

Are you a Freshman or new Student, not having as yet given any anxious or careful thought to your spiritual state, and your relations to the salvation offered by our Divine Redeemer? If so, Christ's great invitation—"Seek *first* the Kingdom of God, and His righteousness,"—that is, His pardoning and justifying grace, and the holiness of character which comes of the working of His spirit in the renewed heart,—this should have your first thought in your present new position, where you will have new surroundings, new companions, new temptations, and where every day of delay may remove you further from the great change which trust in Christ will effect. Every hour's delay here is dangerous. There are, it is true, many means of grace open to you, the preaching of the Gospel in the different Churches, and by evangelists; the reading of the scriptures; meditation and prayer; but I may truly say that none of these claim earlier attention than the Y. M. C. A., one function of which is to attract your attention to all other means of spiritual enlightenment and growth.

But perhaps you are already a Christian, and desirous of growing in the Christian life. If so, the call is still quite as urgent, for you have not only the will of your Saviour to consult, but probably also the kind wishes and prayers of loving Christian friends at home; and you are in a position at once to make a new advance in your Christian life by becoming an active member of the Association, and thus

making your influence for good felt, as well as further promoting your own spiritual life by all the various means provided by the Association. You will also enjoy the comfort and strength which proceed from the Society of kindred minds aiding each other in love and in good works. They can introduce you to the best friends among your fellow-students; and you will find very helpful their meetings for prayer and praise, and mutual encouragement, their Bible-classes, their library and reading-room, their connection with student missionary bands in Canada and elsewhere. You will also have increased opportunities for personal influence among your fellow-students, and to those members and friends of the University other than students, who take an interest in your higher welfare.

But Christ in His invitation to seek first the Kingdom of God, recognizes the fact that there are other things to be sought, things necessary or desirable in our life here; and He goes on to say "all these things shall be added unto you." You have come to the University for education in literature and science, or for training in the knowledge and skill required for a useful profession. Now we have the sure promise that if we seek first the spiritual life, God will so bless our earnest endeavors after the things really good in this life that we may seek after, or need. You may therefore reckon that, with God's blessing, any time you may devote to the Y. M. C. A., will be more than made up to you, and that now as in time past, the godly student will be the most successful in his College career. I would here say, that as your progress in education is your chief duty as a student, you may confidently ask God for His blessing on your conscientious efforts; and also on the air and exercise necessary to keep up your

## Pointers.

Study the calendar.

Consult the list of boarding houses at the General Secretary's Office, Association Building.

Do not buy books until you are sure you will need them. You will find them advertised second-hand on the bulletin boards. Don't take your notes on scraps of paper. Buy good note books.

Don't get up your college work on Sunday. You can't do as much work in seven days a week as you can in six.

Subscribe for the College paper.

Watch the various bulletins, as notices of importance are constantly being posted.

There are large libraries connected with the different faculties from which students may draw books. From those wishing to borrow books, a deposit of five dollars is required, which is refunded when the books are returned.

You will never have the same opportunity of influencing others for good as you have while at College. Use it.

Be a University rather than a faculty man.

Keep up with your work. When once behind you cannot catch up.

New students are urged to connect themselves with the college societies. By doing this they will not only derive the benefits which the different societies aim to confer, but will get to know students of other years and other faculties.

Do not treat the men collecting subscriptions for College societies or other objects, as public enemies, but rather lighten their work by subscribing as often and as promptly as you possibly can.

It is the duty of every student to support in every way he can all the athletic interests of the University.

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If you are in doubt about any matter do not hesitate to ask a Professor or Senior Student; they will always be glad to give you any advise or assistance, and it may save you much trouble and annoyance later on to be set right at the beginning of the session.

BEFORE MAKING PURCHASES REFER TO OUR ADVERTISEMENTS, and patronise as far as possible those whose ads. appear there, mentioning this hand-book.

The General Secretary desires to be considered the friend of every student. His office hours will be announced at the beginning of the session.

Take every opportunity of improving yourself socially; your studies will not suffer for an occasional evening spent in social intercourse.

The importance of taking good healthy exercise cannot be too strongly impressed upon all. Make inquiries and find out what sports are engaged in; then choose what suits you. We would put in a strong plea for the gymnasium; three to five hours spent in it every week will repay any student. Remember "*Mens sana in corpore sano.*"

Don't bring all your high school books with you; you'll have enough to carry back without them.

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## McGill University.

McGill University was founded in 1821, under bequest of the Hon. James McGill, who left his estate on the slopes of Mount Royal and the sum of £10,000 for this purpose.

In 1829 the college was formally opened in "Burnside House" under the Principalship of Rev. Dr. Mountain and three professors. The present arts building was opened in 1843 but at that time consisted only of the central building and east wing, without connecting corridor.

Here the classes in Arts and Medicine met until the re-organization of the University, under its new charter, in 1852.

During all this time and for some years succeeding, the University labored under difficulties which at times seemed insurmountable. The erection of buildings caused a serious drain on the funds of the University, the charter of 1821 was cumbrous and defective, Government support was most meagre, and that private munificence, which of late has been the source of her prosperity, was then undeveloped. In 1835, Dr. Mountain resigned the Principalship, and was succeeded by Rev. Dr. Bethune, who after eleven years of office, gave place to E. A. Meredith, afterwards Deputy Minister of the Interior. Principal Meredith was succeeded in 1853 by the Hon. Justice C. D. Day, LL. D., then President of the Board of Royal Institution, who acted as Honorary Principal for two years, until the appointment of Dr. Dawson, whose firm hand and wise council guided the University in a path of prosperity and renown for thirty-eight years.

In 1852, an amended charter was secured, all but absolutely essential expenses were cut down, and portions of the estate were sold in

order to obtain an income. The classes in Arts were then re-commenced with new vigor, and with increased staff, in the new building known as Burnside Hall, which was situated on the site of the present Fraser Institute. At that time the College classes occupied the upper part of the building, and the High School, then connected with the University, occupied the lower portion.

The revenue from the land disposed of, together with a government grant of £1300, relieved the pressure temporarily, but a few years later it was found necessary to make an appeal to the citizens of Montreal, which was liberally met by the subscription of an endowment fund of £15,000. The amended charter, the appointment of Dr. Dawson as Principal in 1855, and the creation of a permanent endowment fund was the dawn of better days for McGill.

In 1861, Wm. Molson, Esq., announced his intention of erecting a new wing to the College, and the next year the Molson Hall and the corridors connecting it and the East Wing with the main building were completed, and classes in Arts were finally transferred to the original College buildings where they still continue to meet. Since then advancement both in extension of buildings and equipment has been uninterrupted and rapid.

The Library was founded in the same year by the purchase of a small collection of historical works. This has gradually increased, until the library at present occupies the magnificent building, the gift of the late Peter Redpath, Esq. It is capable of containing nearly one hundred and fifty thousand volumes, and has a spacious reading room where every accommodation both for the comfort and convenience of the students has been provided.

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The Peter Redpath Museum was erected in 1881, and contains many valuable collections.

In 1863 the Observatory was erected on the west side of Molson Hall. It has recently been enlarged and improved.

The main part of the building of the Faculty of Medicine was erected in 1866. This, however, became too small for the number of students. The gift of Sir Donald Smith, and the Campbell Memorial Fund, made possible the extension of the buildings in 1885. But these again became too small to meet the growing needs, and through the timely generosity of the late John H. R. Molson, Esq., they were enlarged to nearly double their former capacity, and the whole interior of the buildings, both old and new, was re-arranged. Last year Lady Strathcona and the Honorable Mrs. Howard each donated the sum of \$50,000 for the further extension of the Medical Buildings.

In 1878 the department of Applied Science was created a Faculty, it having been up to this time merely a department of the Faculty of Arts. In 1890, Thomas Workman, Esq., died, leaving a bequest of \$110,000 for the construction of workshops for the use of students in this Faculty. This gift was shortly afterwards followed by a still more generous one from W. C. McDonald, Esq. With the latter, two immense buildings have been erected, one the Engineering Building adjoining the Workman shops and containing lecture and drawing rooms, laboratories, testing apparatus, museum, library, etc.; the other is devoted to the Department of Physics and has a perfect equipment.

During the session of 1896-97, Mr. Macdonald (now Sir Wm. C. Macdonald) still further shewed his princely generosity toward McGill by making a donation of \$650,000 for

the erection of a Mining and Chemistry Building. This is now completed and is considered to be one of the finest of its kind in the world.

In 1884 the Donalds Special course for women was endowed by Sir Donald Smith, who has since erected and liberally endowed the beautiful Royal Victoria College on Sherbrooke Street, which will be occupied this session.

In addition to these three Faculties, the University comprises a Faculty of Law, recently placed on a sound financial basis by the munificence of W. C. McDonald, Esq., a Faculty of Comparative Medicine, ably presided over by Dr. D. McEachran; a Normal School for the training of public school teachers; and, united to her by terms of affiliation, are several rural Colleges, and four Theological Colleges in Montreal.

To-day when prosperity smiles upon McGill, when she is recognized as one of the leading Universities of America, one name will always stand out in bold relief, the one who stood by her during her adversity and laid the foundation of her present greatness, the name of our revered Honorary President, Sir William Dawson.

In the session of 1895-96, Prof. William Peterson, M.A., LL.D., of Dundee, Scotland, was appointed principal. Dr. Peterson has proved himself an able and competent leader and has constantly grown in popularity and in the esteem of the students.

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## University Societies.

### The Young Men's Christian Association.

This is distinctively a college organization, including in its membership men of every department in the University. It extends the privilege of a religious influence, non-sectarian in nature and profession. It seeks to develop a Christian character at once broad and true, and as such as will commend itself to the thoughtful student.

#### Membership.

Any man of good moral character, either student or member of the Faculty, may become a member on payment of a minimum fee of \$1.00 and, after election by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

The Active membership is composed of men of the above standing who are members of an Evangelical church. Others rank as Associate members.

#### Meetings.

During the session of 1899-00, the religious meetings of the Association will include a course of addresses on Sunday afternoons from 3 to 4 o'clock, by H. M. Tory, M.A., Lecturer in Mathematics, on subjects of a practical character; a number of group Bible Study Classes in the different faculties, assembling weekly at hours to be agreed upon; and a general meeting for prayer at 8.40 a.m. daily.

Besides other occasional social gatherings, of which due notice will be given, a regular meeting for friendly intercourse is held every Saturday evening, including games, music and refreshments. To attend this, a standing invitation is extended to all. The building will be open every Sunday evening after church, for a social song service.

The building includes a parlor, reading-room, audience chamber and bath-room, and it is furnished with such conveniences as a telephone and a piano. All of these are at the disposal of members of the University, and every student is invited to make use of them to the fullest possible extent.

Every man on coming to McGill should undertake a regular course of exercise. If likely to take part in Athletics or Football, get your measurements and certificate from the director as soon as possible after entering college and thus save trouble and delay later on. (See regulations in Calendar.) To many, Football and Hockey have certain disadvantages which prevent them from being followed systematically enough to do any good. To such men we would specially recommend regular work in the gymnasium (19 University street). The class meets three times a week at 5 p.m., and the work is so arranged that three-quarters of an hour at least of vigorous all-round work can be had without the risk of over-exertion.

The best way to get a new gymnasium on the College grounds is to show that the old one is appreciated.

Make the gymnasium hour fill a place on your time-table like any lecture and you will find it an hour gained.

Don't be afraid to make the Director your confidante in all matters pertaining to your physical life. He can help you in many difficulties and will always be found glad to do so.

Be regular in your attendance that you may graduate a better man physically, as well as morally and intellectually, than when you entered college life.

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Circular lines in red represent distances and  
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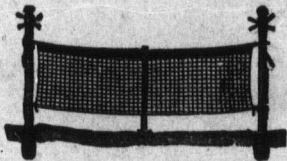
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
