

If the trouble had arisen because of such examination, then there had been little reason to find fault considering that such examinations in no way interfered with any privilege enjoyed by Protestants. The speech of Mr. Pitts today was mild compared with his agitation of last year. Inflammatory circulars had been sent all over the country, and an sattempt had been made to create the impression that the Protestants of Bathurst had a real grievance. What were the facts? That from the passage of the school law down to 1889 the public schools existed in Bathurst town. During all that time Bathurst town. During all that time the Catholics maintained their own schools, and notwithstanding that they were largely in the majority and paid most of the taxes the Catholics allowed

the Protestants to have full swing in the running of the public schools. Previous to 1889 the cost of the public schools had been about \$1,100. Since the Catholics came under the law ther has been an additional cost of about \$350, the number of pupils since their attending the rublic schools being nearly doubled. Protestant children have in every respect all the privelege they enjoyed previous to 1889, and the same conditions of things exist today as previous to 1889, regarding teachers in the grammar and public schools and as regards grades. Coming to Bathurst village, Mr. White said allthrough there were 170 Catholic children attending the school there as against 16 Protestan children. There had always been on and sometimes two Protestant schotrustees. Every consideration had be shown both in the Bathurst village and town for the feelings and opinions of Partestants, and as the son of an Orangeman he (White) must say that there was little or no grounds for this soulled early rights aggregate. called equal rights agitation. Fault had been found because prayers had been said in some of the school buildings after school hours. AND HOW TO MANAGE IT WHEN MADE.

A hot bed is not necessary if one is convenient to a city where there are large seed stores, if plants are required for a small garden, as early varieties are kept in stock, but on the farm, if large crops of early cabbage, tomatoes, sweet potatoes, peppers and other crops, which re quire protection for a while, in order to secure early plants, are grown, a hot bed will be valuable. With the hot-bed should be constructed a world can vouch for this, as it | that the hot-bed requires glass, while the cold frame, which serves for large plants (transplanted from the not-bed later in the season), may be covered with boards only, especially fintended for such hardy plants as early cabbage or lettuce. The frame may be 16 inches high at the rear, and 14 inches in front, from the level of the ground, and covered with sash of any desired size. The boards may be simply nailed together at the corners, fastened to 2 by 3 inch scantling, but gardeners first make a pit, one foot deep, and 'Oh, sir;' he cried, 'is it really as a frame 24 inches at the rear, and 22 inches at the front, according to the kinds of planes to be grown.

If too much heat is generated, use cold water alone.
