Ingersoll and Socialism.

In an interview with the 'Advertiser' Col. Ingersoll says: 'Socialists seek only to reform at the bottom. This is the narrow view of the great problem of life, Socialists want the men who are in the vanguard of progress to halt and wait for the laggard to catch up with the procession.'

No, Mr. Ingersoll; but they are the primary condition of life, without which there cannot be any higher condition of life. Unless the masses are assured of the necessities of life they cannot think of a higher life, nor comprehend its possibilities nor attempt to reach them.

No, the cooperative commonwealth will not raise such questions, but it will rear one great collective of intelligent and superior men. More than that, it will whip out its arms to all workers, to whites and blacks, to men and women, to the rich and the poor, to the world through the individual as the channel.

Again he says: 'Every one of us ought to be a success, but nature dictates otherwise. The great trouble is that nine tenths of the people today are failures. Nature keeps on producing these failures and out of tens of thousands there is only one genius.'

Now the great trouble in our social structure is not that nature stubbornly keeps on producing failures such as working men without jobs, but quite the reverse. In my youth I was taught to believe that all the seeming anomalies in this world were arranged and foreordained by an all-wise and perfect God, upon whom the responsibility of every crime was unloaded by the perpetrator.

Then to side with truth is noble when we share the burden, and 'tis nobler to be just, than to be good, and 'tis nobler to be good, than to be just. The world is a vast chess-board, where the crown stands aloft, and the king's subject spirit till his Lord is crowned.
