SHELDON GETS FIVE YEARS

Schemer Started His Game by Lying to Y. M. C. A. Members

His Receipts from Dopes in One Day Were Over \$300,000

Montreal, June 16.—The culmination in the great Sheldon drama was reached this morning in the Court of Special Sessions, when Justice Langelier meted out a five year sentence to Charles D. Sheldon, the man whose financial exploits have dazzled all Canada. The charge upon which he was sentenced was theft of \$15,000. Other charges of securing money under false pretences will be held in abeyance.

Justice Langelier, in announcing his decision, said that he found Sheldon guilty under a section of the criminal code which provided a penalty for unlawful failure to account and unlawful conversion.

Sheldon heard the verdict calmly. Before being sentenced he pleaded for clemency on account of his advanced years, asking that the sentence be made as short as possible in order that he might be able to pay back the money he had. "To this purpose," he declared, "I intend to devote the balance of my declining years, and they will be all too few for the purpose."

Y. M. C. A. BOYS DUPED

About three years ago he came to Montreal and started operating in a mild way in a bucket shop. His eloquence started him giving lectures to Y. M. C. A. youths over a St. Catherine street shop. The youths fell for it and entrusted Sheldon with their tens and twenties to "invest."

Sheldon did so well with these sums that more money came rolling in. He set up with desk room in an office on St. Francois Xavier street, and began to advertise in a quiet way. Twenty per cent a month was what he claimed to pay by beating the market.

Newspapers began to question Sheldon's profits. Here was where the wizard showed his persuasive powers, and in the face of a better-running opposition, he was able to talk his victims round so well that money poured in by the hundreds of thousands.

On one day he took in \$375,567, but on the other hand the public got frightened. After paying out several hundred thousand dollars Sheldon found he could not stem the tide and he disappeared.

On Columbus Day, October 13, 1910, the New York market was also closed. A neat sign on the door said it was closed for Columbus Day and that it would open on the morrow. The morrow found the office left to the mercy of creditors and spiders. On the twenty-fifth of March, 1911, Sheldon was located in Pittsburg under the name of Ross. He had been playing the market again and apparently did not have a cent. He was brought back by Chief McCaskill, arriving in this city on April 1. He elect a summary trial before a judge, and was tried last Thursday, June 8, before Judge Langelier.

Sheldon had operated under different names in several United States cities.

POLICEMAN WAS ELECTROCUTED

Beverly, June 15.—Patrolman Daniel McLeane, 39 years old, who lived with his wife and six young children at 10 Congress street, was electrocuted at 11.45 o'clock last night at the corner of Rantoul street and Railroad avenue, coming in contact with an electric light pole which was charged with electricity.

The body was discovered lying in the gutter under the electric light pole by Albert Lord and J. C. Goodwin, two citizens who were riding by the place in an automobile.

When they saw patrolman McLeane they believed there was life remaining in his body, so they sped on to the police station, which is near the scene of the accident. They told Capt. Otis Burnham that patrolman McLeane was unconscious in the street, and Capt. Burnham and a squad of officers hurried to the scene.

When they arrived McLeane was dead. His body was taken to a local undertakers room nearby, and Medical Examiner George A. Stickney viewed the remains.

A police guard was immediately placed about the scene of the death of the patrolman to prevent further accidents and the electric light company was notified to shut off the current from the poles in the vicinity.

An investigation revealed the fact that Patrolman McLeane had rung in his last duty call at 11.25 o'clock last night from the box at the corner of Rantoul and Wallis streets, not a great distance from the place where he was killed.

The body was found at 11.45 p. m. last evening. Capt. Burnham from his investigations, is inclined to believe that McLeane walked from Wallis and Rantoul streets, after ringing in his duty call, and probably at about 10.30 discovered the electric light on the pole at the corner of Rantoul street and Railroad ave., was out. Then, it is believed, he probably kicked the pole, so as to jar the carbon down so that the arc would be completed and the lamp relighted.

It is supposed that the pole was charged with 2400 or more volts of electricity which escaped from the wires and the lamp and was going down into the ground when Patrolman McLeane kicked the iron and that he received the full force of the escaping electricity.

The company shut off the power from all the lights and wires in the neighborhood to prevent further accidents pending an investigation, and there was darkness as a result. Electric lighting experts have been at work endeavoring to ascertain how the accident happened.

Patrolman McLeane was born in this city 39 years ago, and he has long been one of the popular and best known young men of the city. He was first made a policeman 12 years ago, and he has been a regular member of the force for five years. He was appointed to the regular force Nov. 2, 1906, by Mayor Joseph A. Wallis. He travelled the route known as the shoe district, between Pleasant street and Railroad avenue. He was an efficient officer. He was a member of Beverly council, Knights of Columbus.

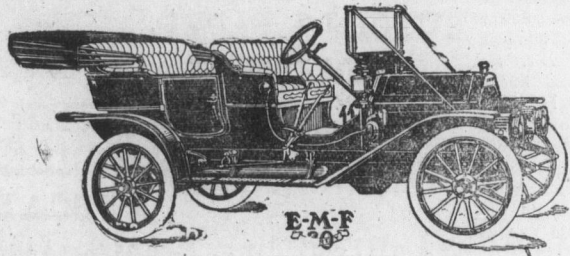

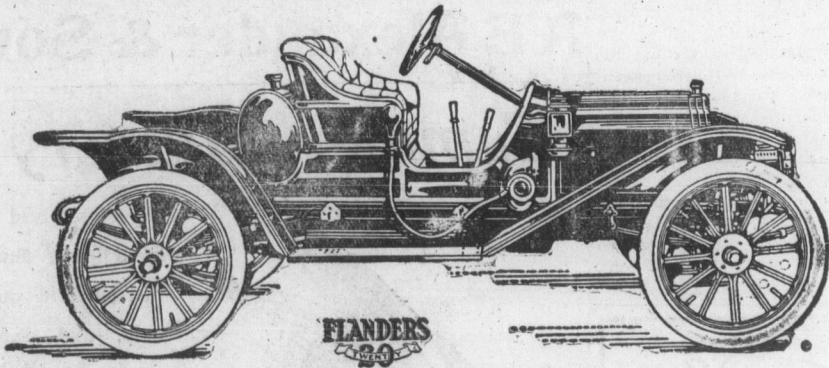

THE METRIC SYSTEM

To the Editor of The Union Advocate, 8 Sir.—Allow me a few words on the Metric System, tho it is not my hobby (I haven't any hobbies).

Assuming the Equatorial circumference of the earth to be 25,000 miles, and its very close, and also assuming that the Equatorial and not the Polar Quadrant should have been the basis, the Metre would be 39.6 inches, 3.3 ft., or 1.1 yds long. Five Metres would equal 5.2 yds, or 1 rod, the Kilometer would be exactly 5.8 of a mile, and the Myriameter would be exactly 6.1 miles.

In square or surface measure, the Sq. m (Centar) would be 10.89 sq. ft., the Ar, rd, be exactly 4 sq. rods, and the Hectar would be exactly 2.12 Acres.

In volume had weight, the Liter would be nearly 62.1 cu. m., and the Gramme 15.68 grs., the Cubic Metre rd contain nearly 35 Cu. ft., (35.637), the Kiloliter rd, contain nearly 224 gallons, and the Metre Ton rd weight nearly 2240 lbs., about the same as our present Long Ton.

We would then have some equivalents to our present weights and measures, but the Metric System disarranges and confuses all this, giving nothing equivalent, definite or even accurate.

After all it is only a fancy System, based on a mere theory.

CANADA'S PROSPERITY IS GREAT

Ottawa, June 16—Final figures show Canada's revenue last year ended March 31, to have totalled \$117,780,409, which is the greatest by far the dominion has ever had and is \$16,250, ahead of the preceding year.

This year there is every indication that the revenue will approach \$130,000,000.

In the last fiscal year customs revenue amounted to \$72,965,394; excise, \$16,869,837; postal returns, \$9,146,953; public works and railways, \$10,818,834; miscellaneous, \$7,979,391.

The expenditure on revenue account last year was \$87,773,998, an increase of \$8,250,000.

Expenditure on capital account totalled \$33,096,222, a decrease of \$500,000.

During the first two months of the present fiscal year, ended May 31, Canada's revenue was \$18,573,441.

WHIRLED TO DEATH IN CHATHAM PULP MILL

Henry Dumont, aged about 30, met a frightful death in Chatham, Thursday afternoon, being buried around in the fly wheel in the Miramichi Rossing mill, and having his brains dashed out. Dumont was in the employ of Wm. Groat, a teamster, and had backed up his team to the door of the mill. As the tail board would not work properly, he went back to fix it, but in some manner fell into the machinery and was caught in the large fly wheel. He was carried around at a terrific rate, finally striking his head on the roof and dashing out his brains. He had been married only a short time.

Dan Connolly, of St. John, and Umpire Doyle, of Calais, have been recommended to fill the position of professional umpires for the N. B. & Maine League.

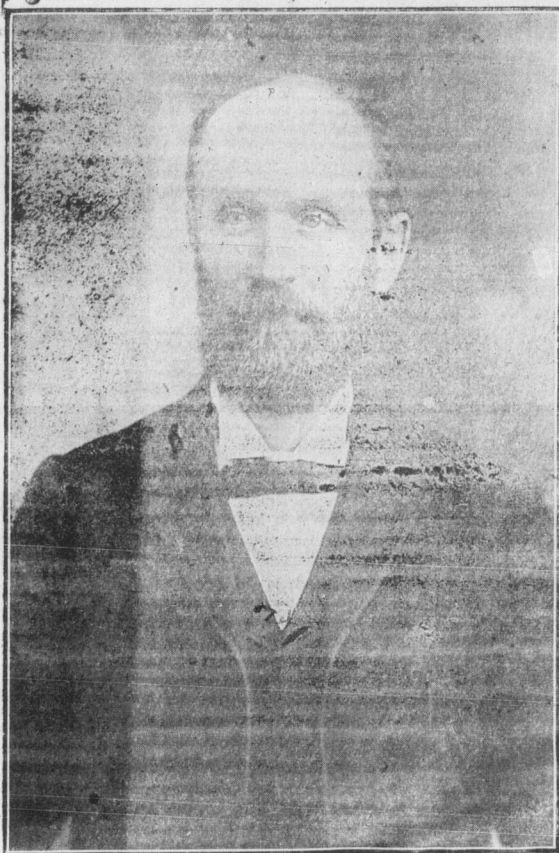

AGAIN THE STANDARD BEARER

W. B. LOGGIE, M. P.
Member of Parliament for the Liberal interest

The annual meeting of the Northumberland County Liberal Association was held in the Temperance Hall, Chatham, on Thursday last with a large number of delegates from the various parish associations present.

The chair was occupied by the president the Hon. J. P. Burchill of Nelson, who, in opening the proceedings extended a cordial welcome to the delegates and expressed his pleasure at seeing so many present. In addition to the ordinary business which usually came up at those meetings, they would have to consider the matter of nominating a candidate for the next election.

There might be an election before their next annual meeting and there might not but in any event it would do no harm to be prepared for it, and then they would not be caught napping. He was glad to be able to say that from a Liberal standpoint matters in the county were in a very satisfactory condition, and he did not know of any complaints in any quarter. It was with extreme regret that he had to remind them since their last meeting they had lost one of their most valued members, the late Warren C. Winslow, a man who commanded the respect of all men. Liberals and Conservatives alike, a man who was always ready to do all in his power to help on the good of his party. He (the speaker) thought it would be well to frame a resolution by which they could place themselves on record as appreciating all that the late Mr. Winslow had done for the good of Liberalism, and also as a mark of respect for the man himself.

After some discussion a nominating committee was appointed by the chairman, consisting of two delegates from each parish to make the selection. This committee reported that the only nominations received were: For President, Hon. J. P. Burchill; for treasurer, Patrick Hennessy; and for secretary, W. F. Cassidy. On motion the report was unanimously adopted.

J. W. Vanderbeck wanted to know if Mr. Loggie would guarantee that the government would not close the Blackville-Chatham Junction section of the Canada Eastern. If he could not do so, he would not have his (Vanderbeck's) support.

Mr. Loggie said he had been speaking to the Railway Commissioners about railway matters the previous evening, and the closing of the road had never been mentioned. Mr. Williston of Bay du Vin said he was as staunch a Liberal as any one present, and he did not intend to support any man who would not promise to get them a railway down to Esquimaux.

The next business was the nomination of a candidate to contest the county at the next election. Some

discussion ensued as to the mode of selection, when W. B. Snowball said that as far as he could ascertain there was only one name ever mentioned in connection with the nomination, that of W. S. Loggie, and that if he was in order, and to simplify matters, he would move that Mr. Loggie be asked to stand as candidate.

Mr. Vanderbeck wanted to know if W. B. Snowball's name was not going to be put before the meeting, as he had heard that that gentleman was willing to stand.

Mr. Snowball said that he was not. Mr. Loggie's name was then put to the meeting and carried by a standing vote.

Mr. Burchill, in tendering the nomination to Mr. Loggie, humorously remarked that the meeting had decided to condone his past offences and give him another chance, and notwithstanding his sins of omission and commission, they still had some confidence in him and hoped he would do better in future. (Much laughter.)

Mr. Loggie, in returning thanks said that sometimes words failed to adequately express a person's real feelings, and that was his position then; but notwithstanding the chairman's little lecture, he felt very deeply the kind manner in which they had received his name and offered him the nomination. He had tried in the past to do his duty as their member and he felt that the county had received its full share of public works. They would no doubt expect him to say something about the issues of the present day.

As they were all probably aware, Sir Wilfrid Laurier was at the present time in England attending the imperial conference, and they had no doubt read his speeches with much interest, and they would see that he expressed his surprise to find talk of disloyalty in Canada, when it did not exist except in the imagination of certain politicians, and that only for party purposes.

The great question before the country at the present time was that of reciprocal trade relations with the United States. In 1893 he (Loggie) was one of the party who went from this county to Ottawa to help to frame a platform upon which the Liberal party, then led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, could go to the country. The two chief planks in that platform were tariff for revenue and reciprocal trade with the United States. That platform was acceptable to the people and when the Liberals came into power in 1896, they at once put it in force. The first step was the British preference, which they successfully inaugurated. They next sent delegates to Washington to try and bring about reciprocal trade, but they were not well received, and came back having accomplished nothing.

Sir Wilfrid then said they would wait for our neighbors to make the first move, so that in the elections of 1904 and 1908 respectively had not been an issue, because there had been no overtures from the United States, since then there had been these overtures, and the government was willing to consider them. The policy of the Liberal party was to reduce taxation. When they came into power duties were about 19 per cent, now they were 16 per cent only, and reciprocity carried it would make a further reduction of about 3 per cent. The Conservative party said the government had no mandate for reciprocity. Why it had been the policy of the government ever since it first came into power.

Reciprocity would not injure vested interest in the least degree. It would reduce taxation on natural products and the necessities of life, but it hardly affected manufactured articles at all. A small reduction in the amount of duty on agricultural implements was all that was proposed. Typewriting machines were put on the freelist. It was said that packing houses in Canada would be heavily handicapped, but the fact really was that they would be able to get cattle and hogs for their business from the states at 3.4 of a cent less duty than they paid at present. In many respects, the treaty would be of incalculable value to Canada, because there were many commodities produced in this country that there was no other market for except the United States, and if the duty on these commodities was remitted that would mean so much more for the Canadian producer. To the Miramichi alone, it would mean \$36,000 a year extra in the fishermen's pockets. Canadian producers would get the benefit of American reductions in duty, and Canadian consumers would get it by the Canadian remissions.

The agreement when it was made would be binding just as long as both parties pleased, and could be changed at any time by either. In conclusion, he begged his hearers not to take for granted all they heard about reciprocity, but to look into the facts for themselves.

In response to calls W. B. Snowball said that he had been asked to allow his name to be put in nomination, but he felt that at the present time he could not well devote the time to the duties of the position, but if on a future occasion the nomination was offered him, he might feel it his duty to accept it. On the present occasion he should give his whole-hearted support to Mr. Loggie, who had made the county a most efficient representative.

NATION IN HIS DEBT

DR. WILLIAM SAUNDERS HAS DONE MUCH FOR CANADA.

Director of Experimental Farms Has Spent the Last Twenty-Three Years Laboring Unflinchingly for the Prosperity of the Farmers of the Dominion—Many Fruits and Grains Have Been Imported.

Canada's system of experimental farms is one of the most interesting and perhaps the most original feature of the Dominion Government. To the experimental farm, without doubt, more than to any other factor, is due the splendid development of the northwest Dominion to-day. Through 23 years, Dr. William Saunders, the head of the system, has worked untiringly and the results have been great. His first connection with the service was in 1885, when he was a business man making a hobby of horticulture. At that time he was sent abroad to study agricultural work in other nations, and upon his return he was made director of five experimental farms about to be organized. Since then, under his guidance, the work has progressed by leaps and bounds. The potential yield of every acre of Canadian farm land has been increased; fruit has been successfully raised on the north plains, and besides this, there has been established a great educational extension service for the training of the young Canadian farmer.

The keystone of this experimental farm system in Canada is the so-called central farm, near Ottawa. The first branch farm was established between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and this was followed by a farm at Brandon, for Manitoba. Then came a branch for the Northwest Territories, which was placed at Indian Head, and others have been established since.

These experimental farms have

been of great value to Canada, enabling her to take an inventory of her agricultural resources and to know the possibilities of her land. She has demonstrated that many grains and fruits not indigenous to her broad prairies can be grown upon them, and in this way has distributed an immense amount of useful information among her agriculturists which has added immeasurably to the wealth of the country.

Temperance in Ireland. Remarkable figures regarding the strength of the temperance movement in Ireland, were given in the report of the Temperance Committee recently submitted to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, Belfast, Ireland.

The report also referred to the work among the Roman Catholic community, showing that the Young Men's Association numbered 100,000 and the Phoenix, an adult society, 150,000. In some localities in the West 90 per cent of the people had taken the pledge.

Dr. Pigou, the dean of Bristol, England, has for long had the reputation of being one of the brightest humorists in the church.
