Docithe Thibodeau of New-castle Killed.

MANY OTHERS INJURED

special Collides With Pulp Wood Train at Beaver Brook

Yesterday forenoon, conductor Sears' special ran into conductor Doyle's working train, while the latter was backing down towards Beaver Brook. The collision took place on the S. curve about a mile and a half above Beaver Brook. The special smashed through, breaking up two cars. Of the 29 men in the rear, only one, Wm. Fogan escaped unhurt.

Docithe Thibodeau was killed. All the men but Thomas Holleran were in the second, or passenger, car. Mr. Holleran jumped in time, and escaped with a few scratches. Had the men been in the van, few could have escaped instant death. The special bore through the van, driving the lower part of it through the next car, where the men were, and smashing into the engine, injuring the boiler. The cars took fire. Part of the track was torn up, and the wreck piled in all directions. The conductor, engineer and fireman were unhurt, and no one on the special was hurt.

Of the twenty-nine working men on the "pulp" train, only one, Wm. Fogan escaped unscathed. The accident was late in the forenoon, and help was at once summoned from Newcastle about eleven miles away.

Only Dr. Desmond was available and he immediately started for the wreck. The special sent up from here brought the wounded men home arriving here about 2:30.

A gruesome sight met the eyes of the spectators as one by one the badly hurt were carried into the station, and the less badly injured walked in with their heads or arms bandaged, and in many cases the face covered with blood.

Dr. Desmond was on hand, and with the aid of many willing assistants, hastened to complete his work.

Besides the dead man, Docithe Thibodeau, who leaves a widow and two children, four are very seriously hurt: Caius McLellan, Wm. Black, Alfred Witzell, and John McCullum, all married men.

Those injured very badly are: John Fogan, crushed in the breast; Wilbur Tonchie; Elijah Astley; Jas. Macdonald; Wm. Condon, and Jas. Macdonald, all married; Wm. Elliston and Edward Benson.

Wm Stewart jumped from the train, and had several ribs broken by falling debris.

James Wright had his hand crushed.

Walter Galley, single, and Chas. Keating, married, had each an arm broken.

Howard Jeffrey had a bad cut over the eye.

Thos. Norton, widower, had a bad cut on the head.

William Kitchen, Andrew Wells, Andrew Cobb, Mr. MacKenzie and three others escaped with slight injuries.

Dr. Desmond worked hard and did all that could be done to relieve the suffering.

Such a terrible wreck has not been known to the people of Newcastle for many a day.

### Sad death of Lady Grenfell

Ottawa, Feb 4.—Lady Grenfell, eldest daughter of Lord and Lady Grey died at Government House about midnight. She was suffering from typhoid but was thought to be recovering when she took relapse.

Ottawa, Feb 4.—There is a strong probability that when Parliament meets today it will adjourn until Tuesday on account of the death of Lady Grenfell at Government house. Just what course will be pursued is not yet known as this is the first time that a member of the Governor General's family died at Rideau Hall, which has been the home of Canada's Governor Generals, since confederation. All social engagements, on the part of ministers and others have been for the present cancelled. Lady Grenfell was in her 29th year. She married Arthur Grenfell, of London, England four years ago. While travelling with her husband in Mexico she contracted typhoid. Her husband was with her when she died, as well as their Excellencies. The remains will be forwarded to England.

### TOWN COUNCIL

Warm Discussion Re Local Option

MUNICIPAL TELEPHONE

Council to secure Legislation to Establish System.

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening, there being present His Worship the Mayor and Couns McLennan, Blackhall, Andrew, Vantour, Miller, Taylor and Currie.

A communication from S. W. Dimock was read making a new proposition to the Council in re the opera house with a seating capacity of 1200 if the town will give a guarantee that they will not put up a competitive building for a period of ten years and exempt from taxation the lot of land on which he proposes to build the opera house for ten years.

The matter was referred to the special committee on the town hall matter.

Coun Currie was appointed to represent the Council at the Forestry Convention to be held in Fredericton.

Coun McLennan of the Electric Light-Com. reported on the matter of the municipal telephone as follows:

A good telephone system of 200 telephones, with an ultimate capacity of 300 phones could be installed for about \$10,000. The revenue and expenditure in connection with the above would be about as follows:

As the New Brunswick Telephone Co., who are now operating in our town, have advanced their rates 33 per cent on private services, and as we have no guarantee that there will not be a still further increase, we would recommend that this Board take immediate steps to secure the passing of an act enabling us to establish a system of our own.

The report was received and adopted unanimously after a little discussion.

Coun McLennan from the special committee re-genuineness of signatures to local option petitions reported that they had examined the list and petitions and found the required number of names were on each petition.

This report was signed only by two of the committee Couns. McLennan and Andrew Coun Vantour refusing to sign it.

Mr. W. A. Mott was heard before the Council on behalf of the Liquor Licensees and in a vigorous speech objected to the mode of procedure both as regards the filing of the petitions and the Council's action in regard to them. He said the petitions had been fraudulently filed and they were not signed by ratepayers. He contended that the names should have been sworn to.

There was quite a lively scene when Mr. Mott referred to the manner of filing of the petitions. Mr. Gray rising in the audience and taking issue with Mr Mott in regard to the matter.

The Mayor called order and the discussion resumed a milder tone.

Mr. Truman, at the conclusion of Mr. Mott's address arose on behalf of the temperance people, and

said the Council had dealt with the petitions in a perfectly legal and legitimate manner. In regard to Mr. Mott's contention that the signatures should have been sworn to he pointed out that under the criminal code it was an indictable offence for anyone to administer an oath when not specifically instructed to do so and in this case the Act was strictly silent on the question. He also stated that the lists by wards had been obtained from the County Secretary and the committee was perfectly within the law in bringing in the report.

The report, however was referred back to the committee.

The Mayor and Town Solicitor were authorized to prepare notice of legislation re permanent sidewalks, town hall, municipal telephone and other matters, after which meeting adjourned.

### Roosevelt Commends Admiral Davis

Washington, Feb. 1.—The president today in unequivocal terms gave his approval of Admiral Davis' entire action in connection with his visit to Kingston, Jamaica to render aid to the stricken city, and, in addition, requested the secretary of the navy to express to Admiral Davis his heartiest commendation for all that he did.

The long expected report of Admiral Davis of the circumstances leading up to the withdrawal of his squadron from Kingston, reached the navy department today and was at once laid before the president. Inasmuch as the president has already announced that the diplomatic phase of the case is a closed incident, the report itself will not be made public but late today Secretary Metcalf, gave out the letter of Admiral Evans, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet, warmly commending Admiral Davis for his conduct of a situation "which was, to say the least, somewhat embarrassing."

Secretary Metcalf remarks further that it was particularly fortunate that there was at hand an officer such as Admiral Davis to deal with the problem which arose.

The correspondence is supplemented by a strong letter of commendation of Admiral Davis by the president and by Secretary Metcalf, who adds his approval and commendation of Admiral Davis' "distinguished service to humanity."

### THAW'S TRIAL BEGUN

Prosecuting Attorney spoke for Only Ten Minutes in Addressing the Jury

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—There was a delay in resuming the trial of Harry K. Thaw today owing to the formalities attending the postponement of the February term of court, which was scheduled to begin this morning. The regular panel of 100 February jurors added to the list of the special jurors in the Thaw case, some 125 in number, crowded the court room to overflowing and kept even the newspaper men from their assigned places. Thaw's trial having been begun in the January term, that term will hold until the case is disposed of.

During the wait for Thaw's trial to go on rumors continued to fly thick and fast as to the possibility of two more jurors being removed before District Attorney Jerome would be content to have the case proceed.

No confirmation of the reports was possible and it was said that if a decision had been reached no announcement would be made until court had convened.

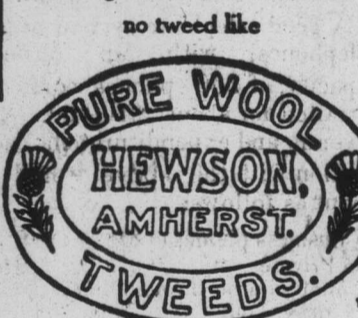
When the February jurors had been dismissed and Justice Fitzgerald had taken the bench there at once began a conference of attorneys at the judge's desk.

the witness, also were in court, although the list of those who are to appear for Thaw has not been made public.

The Thaw trial is on. Assistant District Attorney Garvan opening for the prosecution. Mr. Garvan spoke less than ten minutes. All the witnesses, except experts, have been examined from the room. May McLenzie, Mrs. Harry Thaw and Mrs. Wm. Thaw were included in this order.

Lawrence White, son of the late Stauffer White, was called as the first witness for the prosecution.

### REV. FR. MACAULEY DIED SUDDENLY.

Heart Failure the Cause—Expired Before Arrival of Physician.

Another chapter was written yesterday in New, Albert Co., tragedy, when Father MacAuley one of the central figures and who some believe the priest of Mary Ann MacAuley took place died very suddenly. The death, which occurred about half past nine yesterday morning, was due to heart failure and came as a great shock to the whole community, for although it was no secret that he had been suffering with heart trouble for some time, he had not been confined to his house. For the last ten days Father MacAuley had felt a severe pain around his heart which annoyed him greatly, although it did not materially interfere with his work. Yesterday morning about four o'clock however, he was suddenly taken ill and continued to grow worse as day-light approached. It was soon seen by Miss Mable Williamson and John Day who were with the priest, that his condition was serious, and a messenger was sent to Dr. S. C. Murray of Albert, an old friend of Father MacAuley's, who lost no time in getting to the priest's home. He arrived at ten o'clock only to find that Father MacAuley had passed away half an hour before.

When those who had gathered at the chapel for the funeral of Father MacAuley's condition a large number assembled at the priest's home and did everything that was possible to aid those who were waiting upon him. It is generally believed that the strain of the past few months, in connection with the murder tragedy, had a great deal to do with underpinning Father MacAuley's health, which was not the most robust at any time. Father MacAuley will be remembered as the principal witness at the recent trial at Hopewell Cape, of Thomas Collins, who is now under sentence of death in the jail at Hopewell Cape. He was on one witness stand continuously for a day and was afterwards recalled and re-examined for the greater part of an afternoon. The strain to a man of his age, and who had been in the habit of doing a great deal of work with hastening the end.

Father MacAuley was sixty-two years of age. He was born at Richibucto, Kent County, and after spending some time in the local schools, he went to St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, and afterwards to Laval University, where he completed his education for the high calling which he had chosen. He was ordained to the priesthood 35 years ago by the late Rt. Reverend Bishop Sweeney of St. John and his first ecclesiastical functions were in Moncton, then a mission in Fox Creek. He remained for about a month and then went to St. John where he remained for a short time. In 1868 he was placed over the Grand Lake Mission Queen's County, remaining there for three years. He was then appointed to the mission in Albert County, where with the exception of a few years he has remained ever since. The dead priest had a large number of relatives, among them being three sisters, Mrs. Hogan and Mrs. Harriet Rexton, Kent Co., and Mrs. Hogan of Seattle, Mrs. Charles Morris of Harvey Albert County and Mrs. I. Ward of St. John are nieces, and Edward Hogan of St. John a nephew, David Harriet, formerly of the I G R here, but now in the west was a grand nephew.

The news of Father MacAuley's death was received in Moncton with much grief. The deceased priest was quite well known here and had many friends, by whom he was held in much esteem and regard.

### SELLING COAL BELOW COST.

Vancouver Dealers Act Generously During Temporary Shortage.

Vancouver, B. C., Feb. 1.—The coal dealers of Vancouver deserve Carnegie medals for their heroic conduct in not raising prices during the fuel famine, in fact they have been delivering coal at an actual loss. Macdonald, Marpole & Co., who handle the Dunsuir colliers' output here, are selling at \$7 a ton coal that costs them 7.25. In order that rich and poor may be served alike they only allow each customer half a ton this week, and they will keep the allowance at that point till there is no further danger of a shortage. It costs the firm \$4 a ton at the mines, 25 cents for wharfage, and freight from Vancouver Island added to the cost of delivery makes the other \$3. Evans, Coleman & Evans, who represent the Western Fuel Company sell their coal at \$6.50 a ton on the wharf here, the customer hiring an express wagon to deliver it. C. M. Marpole has just returned from the collieries after arranging for a thousand tons to fill the urgent orders. He says by the time this is snatched up the mines will have increased the output appreciably. He adds: "Mr. Cunsuir has promised that the supply of coal for Vancouver will be kept up hereafter, and I have no fear of fuel becoming so short as it has been the last few days. Why a few days ago our coal bins were absolutely empty, and there was not a sack of coal to be had in Vancouver. I think I can say that condition will not occur again."

"The undue shortage was due to sickness at the mines, where fully 10 per cent. of the men have been laid up with the grippe. The shortage at Seattle is much worse than in Vancouver."

### C. P. R.

Will have to pay for Running Rights over I. C. R.

Ottawa, Feb. 1.—A conference has been arranged between the department of railways and the Canadian Pacific railway to consider the application of the company for running rights over the Intercolonial between St. John and Halifax. It will take place about the middle of next week, probably Wednesday. The date has not yet been fixed. Hon. H. Emmerson, Mr. Butler and Mr. Pottinger will represent the Intercolonial, and Sir Thomas Shaughnessy and some of the other officials of the C. P. R. will represent that company.

R. as far as Georgian Bay. If the C. P. R. will pay the shot there is no doubt the application will be granted. However before anything final is done, the minister will lay the whole matter before the cabinet.

### MARLBOROUGHS Separation has Royal Approval

London, Feb. 1.—An authoritative statement embodying what the family desires to say on the case of the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough was given out tonight. It is as follows:

"The difference between the Duke and the Duchess of Marlborough have been settled privately. The children will arrive at Sutherland House today and her children will proceed to the continent early next week."

This statement is somewhat ambiguous owing to the possible interpretation that the duke and duchess have settled the differences and resumed the relations of husband and wife, but the family express desires to let it stand as it is without giving it further preciseness.

In other well informed quarters this statement is interpreted as meaning that the duke and duchess have arranged privately a settlement of terms under which each will have the care of the children for a portion of the year and other details. In other words, the children will now pass six months of the year with each parent. It is understood that the duchess will continue to make Sutherland House her London home, while the duke will have town headquarters at a west end hotel, as he has done since October last.

King Edward has been, more acquainted with the full terms of the settlement through the duke himself, who had an audience with his majesty at Buckingham Palace today. There is great relief in royal and social circles that the affair of the Marlboroughs will not get into the courts.

### WARSHIPS COMING

Quebec, Jan. 31.—Quebec will next summer have within its harbor a gathering of British warships, representative of the best type of modern engines of ocean warfare. Word has been received that the pick of the channel and first cruiser squadrons will arrive here, included in the list being such ships as the "Good Hope," "Cressy" and "Cressy" of the first cruiser squadron, with the channel fleet have been chosen to proceed to Hampton Roads, to take part in the international demonstration on the occasion of the opening of Jameson's tunnel. The British government was invited by the President to take part in naval display, as the celebration is to commemorate the tercentenary of the first permanent settlement of English-speaking people in the American continent. Rear-Admiral George Neville, C. V. O., in his flagship the "Good Hope," with the squadron of first-class armored cruisers, will cross the Atlantic some time in May, and will, after the celebration, visit Quebec and Halifax before returning home. The ships of the first cruiser squadron include the "Antrim," "Argyll," "Daynaire," "Good Hope," "Hanshire" and "Koxborg." They are all armored cruisers of 10,500 tons each. The channel fleet includes the "Albatross," "Cassard," "Canopus," "Cornwallis," "Duncan," "Exmouth," "Glory," "Goliath," "Illustrious," "Jupiter," "Ocean," "Prince George," "Switsure," "Russell," "Triumph," and "Anson." These battleships are all of 12,500 tons.

AN UNWISE DECISION.

The action of the majority of the Bathurst ratepayers at the public meeting on the 30th ult., in turning down both the proposition to authorize the fire wardens to contract with a company to supply the town with water and the amendment providing for a plebiscite on the water question, seems to us very unwise.

The Spanish government has come to grief over the vexed question of Church and State. The late Cabinet, which was forced to resign a few days ago, because it was unable to meet the wishes of its Radical followers, proposed to enact religious laws somewhat similar to those passed in France several years ago.

FORESTRY CONVENTION.

It is to be hoped that the Forestry Convention, which assembles in Fredericton, on the 20th inst., will be an unqualified success.

Our forests are, at present, our most valuable asset, and too much cannot be taken of them. Fires, have, each year, been allowed to make great inroads upon them; and many private owners have cut everything off their lands, regardless of the future.

Women's Rights was a prominent subject at the seventh annual conference of the British Labor Party held at Belfast, last month. A resolution in favor of the extension of the franchise to all adult men and women was carried by 605,000 to 268,000 votes represented.

THE GERMAN ELECTIONS.

The result of last month's general elections in Germany augurs ill for the world's peace. The Kaiser's government, which is not responsible to parliament, was defeated in December on the question of increased military appropriations for the South African colony.

Regarding the Socialist set back, the Toronto Globe editorially remarks: "It seems clear that most, if not all, of the political parties in Germany have determined to cooperate for the virtual destruction of the Socialists as a party."

On the first day's voting the total vote of the three strongest parties in the Empire was as follows: Socialist, 3,251,806; Centre, 2,742,097; Conservative, 1,124,923.

The Lower House of the Austrian parliament, last month, unanimously adopted a resolution calling upon the government to prepare an Old-Age Pensions Bill for submission to the Imperial Parliament of Austria-Hungary.

Recently, a firm of London, England, draughtsmen had within two hours, 351 personal applications for a two-weeks position as porter. Many of the applicants were dressed like city clerks.

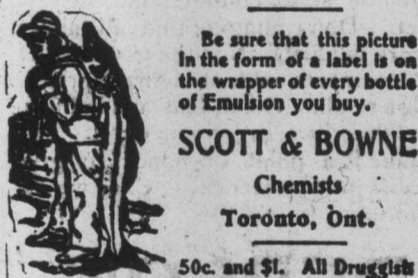

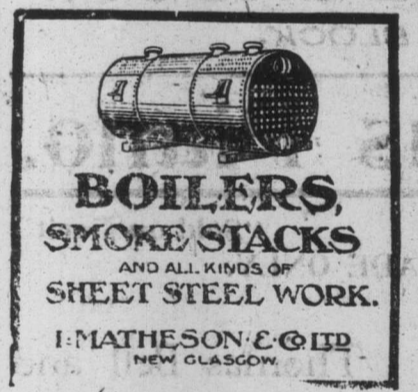

### EARLY GENIUS.

**Men Who Were Young in Years, but Old in Manners.**

Davy made his epochal experiment of melting ice by friction when but twenty. Young was no older when he made his first communication to the Royal Society and was in his twenty-seventh year when he first actively espoused the undulatory theory. Fresnel was twenty-six when he made his first important discoveries in the same field, and Arago, who at once became his champion, was then but two years his senior.

Forbes was under thirty when he discovered the polarization of heat, which pointed the way to Mohr, then thirty-one, to the mechanical equivalent. Joule was twenty-two in 1840, when his great work was begun, and Mayer, whose discoveries date from the same year, was then twenty-six, which was also the age of Helmholtz when he published his independent discovery of the same law. William Thomson was a youth just past his majority when he came to the aid of Joule before the British Society and but seven years older when he formulated his own doctrine of dissipation of energy. And Clausius and Rankine, who are usually mentioned with Thomson as the great developers of thermo-dynamics, were both far advanced with their novel studies before they were thirty. We may well agree with the father of inductive science that "the man who is young in years may be old in hours."—Exchange.

### CHINESE SKILL WITH AXES.

**Carpenters of Cathay Will Compare With Occidentals.**

In judging the performance of the native Chinese workman it is almost impossible to avoid the popular bias that attributes to their own methods and tools invariably bespeaks fastidious conservatism. Though this is in many cases true, it will often be found on careful observation that what has passed for a stubborn blindness to the virtues of innovation is in reality a keener perception of comparative merits than the judge himself was aware of. This is particularly true of Chinese carpenters. While most of their commonest tools differ in some radical way from our own, it is never safe to assume the superiority of the western product. Their small axe, for example, is a beautifully balanced tool, and they are remarkably adept in the use of it, being able to work as true a surface therewith as can be obtained with an axe in the hands of the white man. The great bustard (*Otiscus*), a bird still found in the southern provinces of Russia, is the heaviest European fowl. In size it exceeds the Norwegian black-cock; the old males attain a weight of thirty-five pounds, and where food is plentiful specimens weighing thirty-eight pounds and even forty pounds have been captured. These birds have disappeared from western Europe, where once they were almost as numerous as partridges, and are seen only in small flocks in the sand hills skirting the lower valley of the Danube and here and there along the north coast of the Caspian. The hen lays eggs as big as ordinary pears. A larger and heavier bird, the casowary, is incapable of flight, but it can kick with the strength of a mule and uses the sharp, bony quills of its wings as a cock uses his spurs.

### Marriages in Bible Times.

### David Hume and His Wine.

A jocular bequest of David Hume to his friend John Home was curious. Home liked claret and diluted port, calling it poison, and the two friends had many discussions on the subject. They also used to have disputes as to which of them took the proper way of spelling their common family name. ### Ringings in the Ears.

"Ringings in the ears is a most peculiar condition. It is interesting to learn that, though the brain so directly receives the impression of sound, there is really no sound at all. The sensation is produced by derangement of the nerves of the ear, caused by poor circulation or such pressure and interference as come from hardened, excessive wax, boils, etc. Some one oddly remarked that when the ears were ringing they were "inaane." ### A Weather Stone.

A writer tells of a curious stone that is to be found in Finland. It is a natural barometer and actually foretells probable changes in the weather. It is called a senakur, and its peculiarity is that it turns black before approaching rain, while in fine weather it is mottled with spots of white. Investigation has shown the stone to be a sort of fossil mixed with clay, rock salt and niter. ### CABINET SPURNS BISHOP'S PROPOSAL

M. Clemenceau Calls Suggestion of Church Leases an "Insolent Ultimatum"

Paris, Feb. 1.—That the Cabinet will not accept the proposition which the bishops, with the approval of the Pope, submitted for a modus vivendi on the basis of a virtual lease of the churches in perpetuity to the parish priests by the mayors was made known by M. Clemenceau, Premier, in the Chamber of Deputies this evening.

During debate on the public meetings bill, which was finally passed, 550 to 5, the Premier called the bishop's declaration "an insolent ultimatum." Continuing he said: "If the episcopate considers this a basis for negotiation we do not respond. The bishop will not obtain anything beyond the common law. We will not concede anything, but we will hold the line of battle with unexhausted resources."

Previous to this declaration there was an exciting incident which resulted in M. Briand threatening to resign. M. Clemenceau, during a reply to criticisms by M. Jaures on what he termed the "present imbroglio," admitted that incoherence existed, but said that he (the Premier), although not responsible therefor, intended to stand by his colleagues. M. Briand thereupon retired to the lobby, determined to give up his portfolio, as he thought the Premier's remarks referred to himself. After repeated efforts by his colleagues M. Briand consented to reconsider his decision and finally returned to the Chamber with M. Clemenceau.

The Premier expressed regrets from the tribune for what he called a slip of the tongue, and declared that he regretted M. Briand as indispensable for carrying out the reform undertaken by the Government.

**DRASTIC PROVISIONS OF BILL.** The Public Meetings bill consists of four sections. The first authorizes meeting without previous declaration of intention; the second repeals the restrictions contained in the acts of 1883, 1905 and 1907; the third instructs the Mayors of France to place the existing meeting places at the disposal of the public, and the fourth holds the organizers of meetings responsible for damage. This law will become operative as soon as it passes the Senate.

The attitude of the extreme radicals who are incensed at the peremptory tone of the bishop's communication and at the despatches from Rome representing the Vatican as being determined unless the bishop's proposition is immediately accepted, to order the parish priests to leave their churches and suspend public worship, greatly embarrasses the moderates.

The latter believe that the Government, having accomplished the separation of Church and State, can afford to accept any definite solution of the difficulties in the interest of peace.

### MONCTON WILL ENFORCE THE SCOTT ACT

New Chairman Of Police Committee Gives His Orders to The Force

Moncton, Feb. 2.—There is likely to be a pretty brisk movement in local Scott Act enforcement before many weeks have passed. The new police committee, of which Percy Crandall, a strong temperance advocate, is the chairman, met last night in conjunction with Chief of Police Chappell.

Chairman Crandall said he wished to put himself on record at the beginning as saying he wished to have the Canadian Temperance Act enforced the same as any other law and that if there were any obstacles or hindrances in the way of the work of the police, the committee would do the best they could to remove them.

Mr. Chappell said the police had never had any even footing to work on in enforcing the Canada Temperance Act, and Mr. Crandall said he believed he would have the whole council at his back in the endeavor to enforce the act.

### ST JOHN MAN IN TROUBLE IN MAINE

Augusta, Me. Feb. 2.—Charged with unlawfully importing into the United States an alien who was suffering with a dangerous and contagious disease, Wm. Copen of St. John, N. B., was arraigned before Commissioner Burlinghame today and held for the February term of the United States District Court, at Portland.

The person imported was Solomon Kobolevsk, a Russian Jew, and the disease with which he is afflicted is trachoma. Copen was arrested at Calais by United States Deputy Hasty. The penalty for conviction is a fine of \$1000 and five years imprisonment.

The officers allege that Copen took the immigrants by train from St. John where he recently arrived from England, to St. Stephen, N. B., and from there they walked across the line to Calais, a distance of four or five miles. Boston is understood to have been the intended destination. Kobolevsk was sent back to St. John and probably will be deported. As Copen pleaded guilty, a preliminary was not held.—Ex.

### NEW COMPANY TO MAKE HARDWOOD FLOORING

St. John, Feb. 2.—In this week's Gazette notice appears of the incorporation of the Hillsboro Hardwood Flooring Company, Ltd. The incorporators are R. G. Haley, Harley W. Gross, and J. W. Vanwart, of St. John; John L. Peck

and Walter M. Steeves' of Hillsboro.

The capital stock is fixed at \$300,000, of which, however, the present issue will amount to \$17,000. It is the intention of the new company to proceed as soon as the frost is out of the ground with the construction of a factory near Hillsboro. A good site has been secured, and the district in which operations will be carried on is well wooded. Mr. Gross who for some years has held a responsible position with R. G. Haley will manage the business, and this will, of course, necessitate his removal to Albert County. The new mill will have a capacity of 1,000,000 feet of logs per year, all of which will be made into hardwood flooring for which there is a ready market. The output of the mill will be increased next year if deemed advisable.

Winslow, President Randolph of the Fredericton Boom Company, said that any impression to the effect that there was any difference existing between the directors and the Messrs. Winslow were quite erroneous so far as he knew. It was simply a matter for the court to decide whether liquidators would be appointed as applied for by the Messrs Winslow or whether he, as President of the Boom Company, should go ahead under the resolution of the directors and apply for the appointment of a curator. It was a question as to which act governed the case.—Gleaner 2nd.

### KING AND QUEEN VISIT PARIS

London, Feb. 2.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra left London for Paris this morning, travelling incognito as the Duke and Duchess of Lancaster. This is the Queen's first visit to Paris since 1889, when as Princess of Wales she visited the exhibition. As their majesties desire the trip to France to be as private as possible, there was almost absence of ceremony in their departure.
