OTTAWA, April 24. The Quebec Government has entered an action against Mr. Middleton for the recovery of the Tanneries Land Swap property.

NEW YORK, April 24. A fearful accident is reported from New Orleans. Steamships John Kyle, Exporter and Charles Bodman, took fire yesterday afternoon at the foot of Poydras street and burned. Many lives are said to have been lost. The loss of property amounts to \$180,000.

LONDON, April 24. The colliery owners of South Wales agreed to throw open their pits to miners at a reduction of 15 per cent on wages.

A despatch from St. Petersburg reports the Marquis Decaux, husband of Adeline Ratti, killed in a duel.

New Zealand.

Until very recently, New Zealand was a sort of terra incognita to the inhabitants of Great Britain. Even now, there exists but a dim perception of the resources and history of the country. It is not more than thirty-five years since the British Government planted its standard on the islands; and with the proverbial indifference of the British people to the Colonies, it is not surprising that the majority of them have remained in partial ignorance of a country which has the most abundant resources, and which is destined to play no unimportant part in the future development of the empire.

The common opinion has been that New Zealand and Australia were closely connected—forming in reality parts of one vast continent. But according to Sir James Ferguson, they are utterly separated from each other divided by at least 1200 miles of ocean, and with as little actual relation between them as there is between Portugal and Great Britain.

In the absence of historic monuments, however, which may prove the handy-work of man, there is abundant evidence of the workmanship of God. The soil of the country is surpassingly rich—capable of producing almost any and every kind of vegetable and fruit. It has a climate most salubrious and healthy; and scenery which for grandeur and beauty will compare favorably with the finest panoramic views presented to the eye of the traveller up the Rhine, or in any part of Scotland or England.

The present aboriginal population of New Zealand is known as the Maori tribe. According to their own traditions, they owe their origin to some of the Pacific Islands, from which their earliest ancestors passed over in large war canoes. They are a stalwart and warlike race—war indeed being described by Sir James Ferguson almost as their normal condition.

It is certain that the country is now becoming populated by emigrants from Great Britain; and so far all who have found their way there have every reason for congratulation. All the necessities of life have been secured in abundance; and many of the earlier settlers are on the high road to affluence and honor.

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There is a local government actively at work. About £10,000,000 are to be expended upon public works and emigration. Already 530 miles of railway have been constructed, and 399 miles more are in construction. In 1874 82 ships were sent out from Britain, carrying not less than 23,975 persons. There is room for all; and in the over-crowded state of the Mother Country, and the present depressed condition of much of its trade, it will be an advantage to thousands to turn their faces towards New Zealand.

Numbers of our young men are constantly leaving this and the surrounding towns for California, Washington territory or the Western States. It is a curious truth that estates are mortgaged, personal property pledged or sold by fathers to raise money for the boys to seek their fortunes in the far or farther West. What the result is to be to this region is a most serious question.

Our Grand Southern friends at Saint George, and the advocates of railroad extension in Calais will notice with attention and pleasure, the fact that the Penobscot and Lake Megantic railway is to become a fixed fact, since Directors have let a contract for its construction to Messrs. Scriber and Burpee. The line will be surveyed and this season, and in the hands of the present contractors is sure to reach a successful completion.

SAINT ANDREWS, APRIL 28, 1875.

The Sessions were closed on Friday afternoon last; the principal business during the last two days being the confirmation of some Parish lists, granting licenses, and arranging St. Andrews Parish affairs. Mr. John Bailey was voted \$75 for his cottage which was pulled down, during the late fire, to prevent the conflagration spreading to the adjoining buildings.

The concert was more largely attended than for several years, and the proceedings were conducted with great harmony. The Grand Jury Report will be seen in another column, and is a document worthy of an attentive perusal, as it contains impartial comments on the County and Parish accounts. The Grand Jurors passed a vote of thanks to their foreman, Mr. Irish, for the able manner in which he discharged his duties.

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The political rumors of a change in the Cabinet at Ottawa, have no foundation in fact. The reports are the emanations of disappointed politicians whose wish is father to the thought. No minister has expressed a wish to retire; this information comes from a source which can be relied upon. Would-be leaders and would-be ministers will remain a little longer in the "cold shades," as there is not a distant prospect of a coalition.

GRAND JURY REPORT.

APRIL SESSIONS, 1875.

The Grand Jury beg leave to report? They visited the Jail and found it generally clean and in good condition. They beg leave to present that the committee for repairs of the Jail, Court House and premises effect any repairs of plastering, and as in their judgment may be necessary not to exceed \$24.

The Grand Jurors report as follows on the Parish accounts: LEPREAUX. The accounts are correct. \$150 recommended for the support of the Poor for the ensuing year.

ST. PATRICK. The St. Patrick accounts are generally correct, except the account of Jas. Kinney, Overseer of Poor, who states a balance of six dollars and seventy cents as due to him, but on examining Stewart Kerr's account we find a voucher in which he acknowledges having received the amount. No estimate of Assessment for the support of the Poor.

DUMBAULTON. Accounts correct. \$125 recommended to support Poor for the ensuing year.

PENFIELD. Accounts correct, except two charges, one of debit the other of credit, not particularized in Collector Shaw's account. The charges are one for \$12.56, the other \$18.80, both charges are on the credit side in place of as above stated—County rates and Wild Land tax. These charges are made for delinquencies and should have been particularized and attested to? The Grand Jury present that Collector Shaw be ordered to make out a new account containing the particulars of these charges, duly attested; so that the matter may be more explicit. No estimates.

ST. DAVID. Accounts correct \$400, suggested for the support of the Poor, for the ensuing year.

ST. CROIX. Accounts correct. No estimate for support of Poor.

DUFFERIN. Accounts correct. No estimates.

ST. ANDREWS. Accounts correct. \$1200 estimated for the support of the Poor.

ST. JAMES. Accounts correct. No estimates.

ST. GEORGE. Accounts generally correct, but find the Collector for the Upper district, Ronald Campbell, by his own statement to have \$185.93 in his hands for the collection of 1874; also the sum of \$89.95 due from his own statement in his account for 1873—making the large sum of \$275.88 due by this Collector to the Parish fund—the want of which seems to add very materially to the sum of indebtedness which appears to be due by the Parish. Therefore the Grand Jury present that the proper officers take steps to collect the amount from the said Ronald Campbell or his bondsmen respectively for the year 1873 and 1874; and that forthwith, \$1200 estimated for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.

CLARENDON. Clarendon seems to be blessed without poverty as there are no Poor accounts. The accounts of the Collector for the purpose of Highways are very imperfect and unsatisfactory, the Collector Frederick Boyle shows a collection of \$37.14, and at the same time states that he has \$132.50 to collect, without showing any account of the balance of \$95.36. The Grand Jury present that as Collector Frederick Boyle has not done his duty in presenting such an insufficient account that the officers of our Worshipful Court order said Frederick Boyle to make a further and new account showing as well something about the said balance, as well as a paper writing that may be intelligible to the Grand Jury.

The Grand Jury present the account of Peter Dewade, Collector of Rates, as containing charges for sums of money not touched for to a considerable amount; of having charged commission on the whole amount of his warrant instead of the amount collected; and of having charged commission not only far too high, but for having entered the amount of that twice in his credit. No estimates for the Poor.

The Grand Jury present that the affairs and accounts of this Parish are much confused and irregular; that Cyrus Thomson, Collector of Rates and Commissioner of highways has not presented any account of his doings; and that the proper officers take immediate steps to enforce the laws made to remedy such matters. That W. G. Maxwell, Commissioner of the Alms House has a charge of \$11.32 without a voucher, and that Wm. D. Christie, Collector of Rates, has a lump sum of \$10.22 for taxes that cannot be collected, but no particulars. The Grand Jury observe that the Collector of Taxes in most of the Parishes, (except the parish of St. George,) are in the habit of putting a lump sum in their accounts in the shape of "delinquencies or taxes that cannot be collected," in place of giving the particulars; and further that most of these accounts and statements are not sworn to; that even the account of Ronald Campbell, the collector of the upper district of St. George, is not attested to; neither is the account of G. K. Wetmore, of the middle district, who also appears to have a balance of \$2.40 in his hands, and who also has charged commission on his whole warrant in place of the amount collected; all which the Grand Jury would wish to see corrected, and therefore bring the matters to the notice of the Court. No estimate for the Poor.

WEST ISLES. Accounts correct. No estimate for the Poor. GRAND MANAN. Nothing from this Parish.

COUNTY TREASURER'S ACCOUNTS. We have examined these Accounts and find them correct; showing a balance on hand of \$277.91.

COUNTY CONTINGENCIES. The Grand Jury are of opinion that the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Dollars be an Assessment for the contingencies of the year.

PRESENTMENTS. The examination of the Court House reveals the fact that a quantity of water in the basement of the building at the west corner having become ice, and being allowed to remain, has occasioned injury to the wall, and without too strongly reflecting upon the Committee of Repairs of the Court House, would say such neglect cannot be allowed to pass without notice, as a small drain would effect a remedy by turning off the water; and the Grand Jury would bring the matter to the serious attention of this Court, and that the sum of \$100 be allowed for repairs of Court House. That the County Accounts be referred for examination to the Court.

Presented—That in the opinion of the Grand Jury, no recommendation to draw the \$100 voted by the Grand Jury of 1873, for the purpose of building a Tank, as this Grand Jury considers the appropriation injudicious. Respectfully submitted, JOHN W. STEVENSON, S. C. IRISH, CLERK, FOREMAN.

Andrew S. Phair, Esq., who for 30 years Postmaster in Fredericton, died at his residence on the 21st instant, after a long and painful illness.

The Hon. Surveyor General who was unwell for the past week, we are pleased to notice has recovered from the severe attack of quinsy, and was in town on Saturday last.

The President and Directors of the Grand Southern Railway, held a meeting on Friday last to make arrangements with Col. Mayo, agent of the United States contractors. They intend to push on the work without delay.

The Surveyor General left by train for St. John on Monday.

T. E. Grinden, Esq., of St. John, is in town.

OUTRAGE.—Mr. J. Walter Scammell while leaving his office, Smyth street, St. John, on Saturday night, was struck down by a ruffian, who made his escape. Mr. Scammell called out "murder," and his brother ran out of the office, and lifted him up from the sidewalk, and had him conveyed to a doctor's, who dressed his wounds—a cut on the back of the head, and the end of the middle finger of the left hand missing. We are happy to learn that Mr. Scammell's recovery is believed to be certain, but it will be some days before he can leave his house. The greatest indignation was felt by the citizens, at the outrageous assault. A reward of \$500 is offered for the apprehension of the would be murderer.

The weather though fair is still cold, and a moderate rain would be of infinite service to prepare the ground for agricultural labor.

It is reported that coal has been discovered at Perry, a specimen has been examined by the State assayer of Massachusetts, proved to be good bituminous coal.

Government House, Ottawa, Friday, 15th day of January, 1875.

PRESENT: HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it has been represented that large quantities of Coal Oils are continually being placed in various ports in the Dominion, samples of many of which will not stand the fire test required by the Inland Revenue Act, 1868, and amendments thereto; also that large importations of certain products of Petroleum, such as Gasoline, Benzine and Benzole are being made, such articles being very explosive at a very low temperature.

His Excellency, on the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under the provisions of the 17th section of the Act passed in the Session of the Parliament of Canada, held in the 31st year of Her Majesty's reign, chapter 59, and entitled "An Act to increase the excise duty on spirits, to impose an excise duty on refined Petroleum, and to provide for the inspection thereof" has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that with a view of the better regulation of the foreign Petroleum trade and the security of the lives and property of her Majesty's subjects, the following regulations be and they are hereby adopted and established, that is to say—

1. From and after the date thereof, the officers appointed to gauge and test spirituous liquors, wines, &c., at the respective ports of Toronto and Hamilton, in Ontario; the port of Quebec in Quebec; the port of St. John, in New Brunswick; and the port of Halifax, in Nova Scotia, shall be and they are hereby appointed Inspectors of Imported Refined Petroleum at those Ports respectively, and that the respective Collectors of Customs at all other ports and outports in Canada shall be and they are hereby appointed Inspectors of Imported Refined Petroleum at their respective ports and outports, with power to employ in the actual process of testing such oils, any officer or officers under their respective surveys whom they shall consider competent for that purpose.

2. That the instrument to be used for testing all imported refined Petroleum shall be the "Coal Oil Pyrometer," made by Charles Pottier, Toronto, Ontario, and all such Petroleum as will not stand the fire test of 105 degrees, as required by section 2 of chapter 15, of 28 Victoria, when used according to the instructions accompanying the same shall be dealt with as may be ordered by the Minister of Customs in each case.

3. That every package of Imported Refined Petroleum, imported as before provided, shall be legibly marked or stamped in such manner as the Minister of Customs may direct.

4. That no imported refined Petroleum, which will not stand the said test, whether designated as "Coal Oil," "Naphtha," "Benzine," "Benzole," "Paraffine," or other oil or fluid, distilled, manufactured or produced by any process or treatment whatever, shall be admitted to entry for consumption or Warehouse in Canada, unless the importer shall have produced a license from a Collector or other proper Officer of Inland Revenue, authorizing him to import and keep the same on hand.
