MRS. GEO. MORRIS LEADS ALL CANADA

Wife of Pastor of the Queen Square Church Takes Second Prize.

St. John, Dec. 16.—Mrs. George Morris, wife of the pastor of the Queen Square Methodist church, has recently headed the list of all Canadians in a competition for the best musical setting to the words of a Christmas carol written by Dr. Joseph Cook.

The competition was started by "The Christian Guardian," which first offered a prize for the best Christmas carol. Many gems of poetry were submitted and the one selected as the best was that written by Dr. Joseph Cook. The Guardian then published Dr. Cook's carol and opened a competition for the best musical setting for his words. The results of this second competition in which there were many entries of marked merit have just been made known. The winner of the first prize for the music is Mrs. E. L. Ashford of the staff of the Vanderbilt University of Nashville (U. S. A.), who was the composer of the well-known song "My Task." The second prize winner, the first Canadian on the list, is Mrs. George Morris. She is receiving hearty congratulations on her well deserved success.

Mrs. Morris is a musician of high order and this prize winning composition is not the first beautiful piece of music which she has written. She spent five years studying at the Scotch Western School of Music in connection with the University of Edinburgh (U. S. A.). The first two years were devoted to the study of the teaching of music, the next two, to the artistic training and the last to voice culture and theory. Mrs. Morris showed herself an apt pupil and her remarkable talent was highly developed.

Gladys Klark Company Unable To Open At Opera House Tonight.

Owing to the Gladys Klark Company's Special Baggage Car being carried through by the Railway Company it will be impossible for them to open their engagement at the Opera House tonight as scheduled.

This car contained all the Special scenery, lighting equipment, wardrobe trunks, and effects, etc., in fact all the paraphernalia necessary to stage and present their various bills. It arrived in Campbellton with the Company, last evening on the Ocean Limited but owing to a bungle instead of being set off here was carried through with the train, presumably to Montreal.

This mistake was not discovered until this morning, too late to get the car back to Campbellton in time for tonight's performance. This is indeed to be regretted as it will disappoint a large number of patrons—the advance sale having been particularly good and many seats reserved by phone, to say nothing of the numbers who purchase their tickets in the evening.

However the car has been diverted and will be back in plenty of time for tomorrow night's show when the company will open with "The Bird" which was to have been presented to-night.

Those who have already purchased tickets for tonight can have their money refunded at the Box Office or their seats changed for to-morrow night's show.

DEATH OF JOHN CANTLEY.

Another of our respected residents has gone to his reward in the person of the late John Cantley, who died on Sunday evening the 14th inst., after a short illness.

Mr. Cantley was in his 80th year and during his long residence in Campbellton made many friends. For a number of years he was an employee of the Intercolonial Railway until advancing years necessitated his retiring on a pension.

Since the death of his wife which occurred some years ago his niece, Mrs. W. A. Trueman has been in charge of his home, but owing to her serious illness, it was found necessary when Mr. Cantley was taken ill two weeks ago to remove him to the home of his nephew Mr. A. A. Andrew. Here he received every attention but his illness was too great a tax on his failing strength, and on Sunday evening he passed peacefully away.

The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon, the service being conducted by the Rev. Hugh Miller, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Rowley.

Mr. Cantley was a member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. W. L. McKensie, wife of Mr. H. L. McKensie, New Richmond, Quebec, died at the home of her sister, Mrs. Hugh McKensie, 790, 16th St. E. on Thursday last, Nov. 15th.

She was here on a visit to her sister, coming three weeks before her death. She was born in Bonaventure, Quebec, 96 years ago and married Mr. McKensie of Maria in 1872 and they have been residents of New Richmond for many years.

Does the husband, seven children survive: George, Boston; Herb, and Bertha in New Richmond; Reuben of Young, Sask.; Mrs. Kern, Saskatoon; Mr. Hicks, Hamilton; and Mr. Bateman of London. Her daughter, Mrs. Hicks was in Owen Sound for the funeral.

The deceased was a member of the Plymouth Bethel. The late Mrs. McKensie was little known here but those who had the privilege of meeting her were impressed by her quiet demeanor and Christian character. Owen Sound Sun-Times.

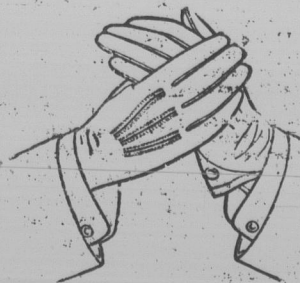

SKULL THAT OF MISSING SOLDIER

Restigouche Soldier Now Officially Declared to Be Dead.

St. John, Dec. 11.—A court of inquiry was held on Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of investigating the identification of the skull which was found dug up by a dredge some time ago. It was presumed then it was the skull of Private D. J. Pike, who had been missing for more than a year, but no confirmation of this could be obtained as there was no trace of anything except the rifle and the skull to identify by.

At the court yesterday the records of the dental department were produced by Major Megee, and it was established by them that the skull was that of the missing man. This information will no doubt be forwarded to Ottawa, and the late Private Pike will be exonerated for the charge of desertion, which had been preferred against him.

PROHIBITION FOR GREAT BRITAIN

Measures Will Soon Be Introduced in House of Commons.

London, Dec. 6.—The text of a local Prohibition Bill applying to England and Wales was made public this morning by direct vote to prohibit the issue within such areas of licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors, and also the common sale or supply of such liquors in licensed premises, clubs, or elsewhere.

The principal clause provides that during September 1920 and in the same period in subsequent years, one tenth of the parliamentary electors of any parish in a rural district, borough, or ward thereof in any urban district, may address a written requisition to the borough, urban or district council demanding a poll of the electors on the question of the grant or issue of licenses to premises within the area for the sale, wholesale or retail, of intoxicating liquors.

When the poll is decided, for prohibition or against it, another poll may not be taken before the lapse of three years. The bill is intended to come into operation in 1923.

SKIRTS AND PRICES TO GO HIGHER

Increased Production Needed to
Cheapen Women's
Clothes.

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 6.—The style
Committee of the National Cloak, Suit
and Skirt Manufacturers' Association
recommends skirts from three to four
inches shorter than at present for the
1920 season in its report today at the
closing session of the annual conven-
tion here. The committee decreed that
skirts next season will be from seven
to nine inches from the floor for
women and about ten inches for
misses, as compared with four to six
inches for women and six to eight
inches for misses at present.

Skirts the style makers say, will be
"frankly short," but without abbrevi-
ation. One thing to be avoided, if one
wishes to be stylish, is the extreme
Tunic and plaited skirts will be worn.
Fullness at the hips will be a fea-
ture of many of the smart spring
suits.

Sleeves will fit snug and close to

was approved as Standard Bearer of

The opportunity for another North

two sons and one daughter.

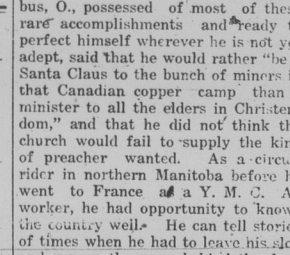

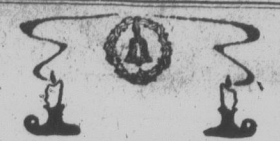

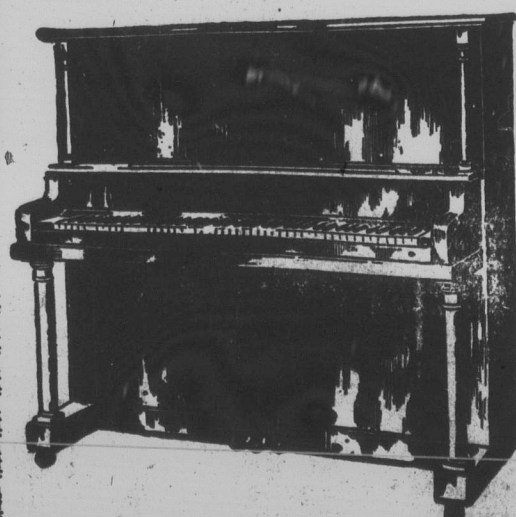

The Experience of a German-American.

A painful struggle in abject destitution, two years in a mad whirl of affluence, then once more the black bread of poverty.

This is the story of Adolph Schwarzman, formerly a St. Paul resident, now living in Munich, Bavaria. A few years ago he was a plodder in St. Paul. With a painful effort he barely managed to support his family on the \$12 a week which friends say was his wage.

One day an attorney came and told him that through the death of a relative in Germany he was heir to \$75,000. Sudden possession of so large a sum changed the Schwarzman mode of life.

Memories of a drab, colorless life pressed wearily on him. All his experience had been a succession of suppressed desires and enervating work that seemed to bring not even comfort to him and his family. Then as he saw the bank draft with almost unbelievable eyes he resolved to throw discretion to the winds, live for the day and let fate arrange whatever accounting there was to be.

All America could not confine the possibilities of his wealth, and while the balance still stood largely in his credit he went to Europe. Then came the war.

A letter just received by Mrs. D. M. Furness, No. 229 North Oxford St., from Bella, the eldest of Schwarzman's daughters, says that the day of reckoning has come. Sometimes, the letter says, there are potatoes on the Schwarzman table, often there are not. The family has been living on black bread, and tea made from dried apple leaves.

Now the friends who remember Schwarzman when he drew \$12 on Saturday night are coming to his assistance. Mrs. Furness and others who knew the family are mailing an occasional package.

COLD TEA AT \$12 PER QUART

City's Thirsty Jolted on Thanksgiving Day—Sold Cold Water.

Cold tea at \$12 a quart was bought by a number of thirsty ones in Biddleford, Me., as an adjunct to their Thanksgiving dinner. Early in the week a pocket peddler who let it be known that he had a "small supply of real liquor" had no difficulty in disposing of four cases of tea at \$1.50 a piece. Individuals who have been in the habit of taking a nipper just before they sat down to their Thanksgiving dinner thought it a rare opportunity to get an appetizer, even if the cost was high.

Most of the customers put their bottles of appetizer away in the cupboard until Thanksgiving. Others could not wait and opened their bottles of "cheap rum" the same day with the result that they found out earlier than they had been cuneed.

Those who did not sample their purchase before the holidays were just as nearly heart-broken when they found that it contained nothing but tea.

Water \$100 a Can.

This is not the first time the thirsty ones of Biddleford have been victimized. A smartly dressed man arrived in the city recently and dropped into bowling alleys and poolrooms, where he made friends.

When the time was ripe he represented to a young man that he had a five-gallon keg of fine old Kentucky whiskey he would sell at a bargain. The liquor, he said, he had put away for his personal use, when the holiday law went into effect, but being in need of money he would sell the liquor for \$100.

The salesman took the victim to a shed where the contraband liquor was hidden. There was a tap to the keg, and a "sample" was readily drawn, which convinced the man that the liquor was of the brand represented, and he came across with the \$100. Later in the day he asked an acquaintance to sample the stuff, but when he turned the faucet there was no flow of liquor. Breaking in the head he found nothing but water. Around the spigot was a small tin can which had contained a couple of drinks of liquor, which he and the salesman drank.

"Jakey" Had Many Travels. Large quantities of Jamaica ginger are said to have been taken to Biddleford for the holiday trade. One story that is going the rounds relates to a tenement house in the residential section, where it could be obtained quickly for customers. The young man who bought the Jamaica paid \$750 for it, but expected to retail it at \$2 for a small bottle. Three men, who learned the location of the "plant," went to the house, it is said, and represented themselves to be deputy sheriffs. The occupant of the tenement, who was not one of the owners of the stock, wilted when the bogus officials appeared and allowed them to transfer it to an automobile without a protest.

They carried the "jakey" to another part of the city and then went down town to look up a market, for the suit so the story goes, they offered it for \$1.50 a bottle, a cut in the market price of fifty cents, and took many orders. The following day, when they returned for the goods, they were told that the ten gross of Jamaica had been carted away by two men the night before. Investigation disclosed that they were the real owners of the fluid who had quickly gotten on the trail of the make-believe officers and recovered the "jakey."

LITTLE BRITISH WAR IS ENDED

London, Dec. 15.—Another miniature British war has just been concluded with the return of two columns operating to the northeast of Mosul and to the southeast of Amadia, Asiatic Turkey, after successful expeditions against the Kurds, in order, as officially stated, to punish them for murders.

The troops, consisting of four battalions of Indian infantry and a mountain battery, and three companies of Assyrians, met with enormous difficulties in a country almost impassable, but the health of the men remained good throughout and their losses in engagements were slight.

Civil administration has been restored in the district and the troops have been withdrawn.
