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

The Brotherhood of Telegraphers, which, was organized in Chicago several weeks ago, has been initiating 50 to 75 men at every meeting. According to a secret circular given out to operators "the Brotherhood of Telegraphers is a secret, beneficial, protective organization composed of railroad and commercial telegraph operators," its object being an improved condition of affairs in the profession. "The constitution," says the circular, "is about the same as that of the brotherhood of 1883, except that the organization is affiliated with the Federated Railway Employes instead of the Knights of Labor. To the railroad operator this federation is of vast advantage, inasmuch as the railway operator is necessary to you, and anything that strengthens them helps you. The obvious intention of the new brotherhood is to organize railroad operators so as to prevent their coming to fill strikers' places, as they did in 1883. A significant statement of the circular is that the brotherhood relies on "the hearty cooperation of all 'the faithful of '83."


