Berlin, April 16.—The events at Bel-grade explain King Milan's reconciliation grade explain King Milan's reconciliation with his wife, Queen Natalie. Both had intended to return to Belgrade, if necessary, to advise their son in his difficult situation. Alex. proved cool and firm enough to carry out the coup alone. M. Diokitch, the new Prime Minister, on the pretense of a holiday, went to Paris a fortnight ago to consult Milan, while exqueen Natalie was instructed to sound the Czar and see whether Russia would approve of the meditated change. M. Garlashanin and Pachitch, the Servian Radical leaders, and a number of the chief officers of the army were taken into confidence, and while the regents were kept in absolute ignorance everything was prepard for the coup. The regents have themselves to blame, as, failing to get a parliamentary majority, they endeavored to govern the country by force. Alexander's new Ministry is judiciously chosen. The chief danger in the present situation is that Russian instigation and probably promises of assistance may revive the feeling for revenge and precipitate a quarrel with Bulgaria.

PARIS, April 16.-J. C. Carter for the United States continued his address before the Briages continued his address, before the Bering Sea Court of Arbitration. He discussed the law governing the tribunal and likened the unrestricted destruction of seals to pelagic piracy. The original rights of Russia in the Bering Sea, he claimed, were founded on the discovery of the waters by Russian navigation. When necessary for the protection of the seal industry the search and seizure of vessels are justified. He quoted from the decision of Chief Justice Marshall to the effect that the right of seizure and search was not limited to three miles, and said he had no doubt that Great Britain admitted this theory.

Sir Charles Russell intimated that Great Britain held a contrary opinion.

Mr. Carter replied, that in that case, the judgment of Chief Justice Cockburn must be upset, as he upheld the theory referred to. After further argument the court adjourned until Tuesday.

LONDON, April 16.—Thousand of dockers and other riverside workers met in East London this afternoon to consider what attitude they might best adopt toward the Hull strike. Chairman Edwards said that he was bitterly opposed to the immediate ordering of a general strike, as had been proposed yesterday. A conference of waterside delegates from all parts of the United Kingdom had been called to meet in London to-morrow and determine upon a course of to-morrow and determine upon a course of action. He appealed to the meeting to await the event of that conference.

He was authorized to quote the opinion of John Burns that no strike should be instituted before the conference discussed the matter. What is that to us? We are too far away, you say? Yes, we are, and we are not. If we go by Halifax we are; if we go by the Cleveland-Pensacola short route we are right home. To place the matter right before the people interested in the welfare of Ontario and this neighborhood in particular, I must answer the embargo question. The people of the United States are the rulers of their country, and President Harrison and country, and President Harrison and Grover Cleveland are servants, and in office Grover Cleveland are servants, and in office can go so far and no farther, having to answer for work done in four-year doses. They are our friends and will act right and fair. Next, by the short route, our goods will reach the market in a more saleable condition in four to seven days and at a less price than round the Horn by way of Halifax, as at the present, which may pay the Eastern Provinces but not Ontario. Now what is wanted to complete this matter is a company which can take these goods and pay for them right here, and give us the money to raise hogs and produce, etc. Get up the busy hum, and take off some of the load of idleness resting on unwilling shoulders. hum, and take off some of the load of idleness resting on unwilling shoulders. 



The managers are determined to make the most of the business. Unionists are filling their houses with Ulster men as guests, and all the Tory clubs are arranging dinners in their honor. Lord Salisbury will preside over the dinner of 200 leaders before attending the gathering at Albert Hall, and on the Monday following 1,200 of these demonstrators will be taken to Hatfield and entertained in his lordship's grounds.

Russell argued against the bill on the strength of his late visit to Canada, Mr. Blake said Mr. Russell when in Canada had fallen among Orangemen, who did not beat, wound, rob or despitefully use him, but received him hospitably, and crammed him full of things he was only too anxious to swallow, but Quebec experience showed that the fears of the Protestant minority of Quebec always had a fair share, and generally more, in the government of their country. He paid an elequent tribute to the tolerance and the recognition of, the rights of the minority shown by Catholics in the Province. The whole essence of the controversy was whether to adopt a policy of trust and belief or a policy of incredulity and despair. The speech was well listened to by the whole House, Mr. Gladstone following it with the closest attention. Mr. Blake was much more at ease than on the first occasion, and though, owing to the lateness of the hour, the press comment is slight, the general verdict is highly favorable. 

Canadian divine who lately crossed the
border in response to a call from the
Metropolitan Methodist Church, Washington, D.C., preached in this city yesterday
to congregations which packed the Queen's
Avenua Methodist Church, morning and
evening. His evening discourse was
founded on II. Corinthians, iii., 17: "And
where the Spirit of the Lord is there is
liberty."

where the Spirit of the Lord is there is liberty."

He illustrated at length the true meaning of liberty, which entailed not only bodily freedom, but liberty of mind and soul. As an example he said that it might be called an infringement of liberty to decree that a man should not take a glass of liquor, but if that man felt that he must have that glass it was shondage of the soul infinitely worse. True liberty reigned wherever "the Spirit of the Lord is."

"It becomes us well to guard our liber-

"It becomes us well to guard our liber-ties," he continued. "There is an enemy among us assailing our liberties, assailing our open Bible, assailing our public schools. The Church of Rome as a church is a great historical institution. It has sent out its heroic missionaries who have conversed historical institution. It has sent out its heroic missionaries who have conquered dangers to the eads of the earth. But Rome as a political institution, Rome as ultramontanism, is to be dreaded and watched. It is time for us to say: You Jesuit fathers, you shall have the same rights and liberties as we have of free thought, speech, press and worship; you shall have british fair play—but we swear to him that liveth that you shall not do for us we you have done in Mexico, in Austrai, in Spain, in Italy and wherever you have gained power; but if you assail us you shall go, bag and baggage. The Pope had issued an encyclical ordering a more diligent study of the Bible. Let him put it in the hands of the people as well as the priest, and what a blessing it would be!

The spirit of the inquisition was not dead, said Dr. Johnson, but lived not only in the Papacy but in the narrowness of some Protestants as well. The speaker made an allusion, which was pretty well understood, to unnecessary excitement and feeling which was being worked up.

The Established Church he characterized as a semi-Romish despotism. It tied the fetters on the conscience by assuming the superiority of one church over another. "Where the Spirit of the Lord is" there was freedom from all ceremonial. "Ritualism is losing sight of the conscience and spirit of God; let these things be torn to shreds as mummy rags." He condemned the injustice of forced contributions for the benefit of the Established Church.

OUTGOING GOLD.

United States Secretary Carlisle Stops the Issue of Certificates.

Washington, April 16.—The continued export of gold from this country to meet the Austrian demands has reduced the free gold in the United States Treasury to \$1,860,000. This allows for \$1,250,000 taken from the New York sub-treasury Friday for shipment by Saturday's steamers. It is the belief that the gold will continue to be exported for some time to come and in order to supply the demand for gold and to replenish the depleted stock in the New York sub-treasury. It is stated that the Treasury Department has been shipping gold from the treasury to New York for the past week. The amount thus shipped, it is thought, is not less than \$10,000,000 and may be more. Secretary Carlisle yesterday directed the sub-treasurers throughout the United States to issue no more gold certificates at present. Secretary Carlisle said that while the \$100,000,000 gold reserve had not yet been reached he was so close to it that prudence dictated that no more gold certificates should be issued.

The Visitor's First Impression Upon Entering the Grounds.

CHICAGO, April 14.—The first feeling of a stranger entering the gates at Jackson Park is that of speechless awe, of inarticulate astonishment, of voiceless wonder, of dumb admiration. Stretching away on every hand, with magnificent vistas and dazding reaches of water between, stand magnificent temples of snowy whiteness, colossal pillars and titanic domes, crowned by luminous hale of sunshine or veiled by pearly gray mists, which on somber days beat about these stupendous summits like winged couriers of the sky above some Alpine peak. There are palaces there more magnificent than even crowned Athens or Rome in their palmiest days. The marvelous beauty of Venice has been surpassed in this little world at Jackson Park. One is puzzled which to admir most in the mighty congress of peerless structures that grace the 600 arches of this park. The awe-inspiring proportions of the liberal arts building presents a strong contrast to the administration building, with its towering dome overlocking all the rest. One gazes longingly and lovingly at the severely classical facade of the fine arts building, and returns to it again and again. It covers ten acres of ground, and is so perfect in proportion and so classic in deeign that it has been pronounced the grandest piece of all the group.

If the visitor should enter the ground at the Fifty-Seventh street gate, the first building to attract his attention is the South Dakota building. This is one of the oddest and most typical buildings within the grounds, inasmuch as it not only represents in appearance the Black Hills, but is characteristic of the country in every sense. The Black Hills have a world wide reputation already, and no trouble or expense have been spared by the thrifty people of this State to make their exhibition one long to be remembered by every visitor.

In outward appearance the building is a dark-gray, almost black, stone. It has a massively dignified look, as though it would fain frown upon the frivolous white and gay-colored structures around it.

In the mineral exhibit no other State In the Union has so great a display as South Dakota. Specimens of every kind of ore found in the State have been placed artificially in the pavilion in the mining building, while a miniature cave, representing the Crystal Cave of the Black Hills, is being made underneath the dome of the horticultural hall. This cave is to be adorned with about 200,000 pounds of stalactite gathered from the original cave.

LAND, LABOR AND TAXATION.

An Important Letter Written Over a Century Ago.

Man's Fundamental Right to Labor or

Hon. John Davis, in the Congressional Library at Washington, has unearthed a letter written by Thomas Jefferson, one of the ablest American statesmen, four years before the breaking out of the great French revolution. He wrote at Fontainbleau, in France, on Oct. 28, 1785, from the very center of thought and from the threatening erater of social and political danger. Mr.

"I set out yesterday morning to take a view of this place (Fontainebleau). For this purpose I shaped my course toward the highest of the mountains in sight, to the top of which was about a league. As soon as I had got clear of the town I fell in with a poor woman walking at the same rate with myself and going the same course. Wishing to know the condition of the laboring poor I entered into conversation with her, which I began by inquiries for the path which would lead me into the mountain, and hence proceeded to inquiries into her vocation, condition and circumstances. She told me she was a day laborer, at eight sous, or fourpence sterling, the day; that she had two children to maintain and to pay a rent of 30 livres for her house (which would consume the hire of 75 days); that often she could get no employment, and, of course, was without bread. As we had walked together nearly a mile and she had so far served me as a guide, I gave her on parting 24 sous. She burst into tears of gratitude, which I could perceive was unfeigned because she was unable to utter a word. She had probably never before received se great an aid. This little attendrissement with the solitude of my walk led me into a train of reflections on that unequal division of property which occasions the numberless instances of wretchedness which I had observed all over Europe. The property of this country is absolutely concentrated in a very few hands, having revenues of from 500,000 guineas a year downward. These employ the flower of the country as servants. They employ also a great number of manufacturers and tradesmen, and, lastly, the class of laboring husbandmen; but after all these comes the most numerous of all classes—that is, the poor who cannot find work. I asked myself what could be the reason that so many should be permitted to beg who are willing to work in a country where there is a very considerable portion of uncultivated lands. These lands are kept idle mostly for the sake of game. It should seem, then, that it must be because of

It has been announced in Pittsburg, Pa., that a powerful syndicate is being formed which will rival the combined interests of the Carnegie organizations. The financia backing will come from various parts of the United States and Europe, and the capital stock will be \$100,000,000. Many of the best known capitalists of Pittsburg Cincinnati, New York, Boston, Chicago, Philadslphia, Birmingham, South Pittsburg Ala., and St. Louis, are connected with the enterprise. The most important feature of the business probably is that James Harvey is the projector of the syndicate. He is the inventor of the famous nickel steeland the Harveyized steel from which armorplate is made. The Carnegies use his patents in the manufacture of armorplate, paying the inventor a royalty on the production. Harvey was dissatisfied with this arrangement, as he had counted on being a member of the firm, and he determined to get into business for himself. Influential persons were approached and the present syndicate is the result.
