

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#### ARBITRATORS' REPORT ACCEPTED

In the Dispute Between the City Engineer and Contractor Evans.

Mr. Evans to Receive \$176 and the City to Pay the Costs of Arbitration-A Storage for Corporation Tools Is Required.

The Board of Works last night decided to accept the award of the arbitrators in the dispute between City Engineer Graydon and Contractor John C. C. Evans, and the latter will receive \$176 64, and the city will also pay the costs of the arbitration, \$25. As statted in a recent issue, Mr. Evans had the contract for the carpenter work on the recent City Hall alterations. For extras on the job he claimed to be entitled to \$231, but Mr. Graydon figured them as being worth \$54 95, which Evans refused to accept. Arbitration was resorted to, and Messrs. Win. Jones and John Purdom were named to represent the contractor and city respectively, and John Shopland to act as referee. Their report to the committee was to the effect that Evans was entitled to \$176 64 and costs, \$25. M.r. Graydon opposed the payment of the sum, on the grounds that the arbitrators did not take into consideration what he called inferior workmanship by Evans; that no allowance was made for the failure to complete the work within the specified time by 60 days; that Evans' tender and not his agree-ment was examined, and that no con-sideration was taken of alterations to the original plans which saved the the original plans, which saved the contractor fully \$30.
"I move the award be accepted," said

Ald. O'Meara. "We appointed the arbitrators, and we should accept their decision. The engineer objects on certain grounds, one of which is alleged inferior work, but this is no time to bring that up." Ald. Parnell was willing to stand by

the award, but before doing so he wanted the terms of the agreement relative to over-time carried out. "But the engineer has granted his final certificate," said Ald. Nutkins. "That ends it, then," said Ald. Par-

The award was adopted. "While we are accepting the award," continued Ald. Parnell, "we might just as well understand that the man appointed to arbitrate for the city was strongly opposed to glving Mr. Evans a single cent."

She declines, however, to include the territory within the Schomburg line, as she regards that territory as without doubt a portion of British Guiana.





Carbature is a universal practice among the Chinese and Japanese, but, owing to their crude taste and their disregard of perspective their efforts are seldom interesting to any but thems lves. It is Greece that is the native home of all that we now called art. After reading pages and pages of art gossip we are ready to ask: Is there one thing in painting or drawing, in device method or style, known to us, which was not familiar to the Greeks? They had their Landseers, men grea in doss and animals, they had artists because there is more darning to be dene. Is it your fault? 



Co.'s weekly statement of trade in Canada

From Montreal we hear that the fine, open fall weather is not wholly favorable to the dry gooods trade. Country stocks are reported as not being very much broken into, and sorting orders are only moderate. Travelers, however, are selling some fair bills of spring goods. Several mills have given notice of advances in hosiery, underwear, flannels, pillow cotton and bleached and unbleached sheetings. Green hides are down another cent this week, and for leather, which continues dull, easier prices pre vail. The improvement in wool is well held, and stocks of foreign are quite moderate. A considerable proportion of a cargo from the Cape has been sold to advantage to American buyers. Glass is advanced, Shipments of cheese have been very heavy and the advanced values are fairly held, The butter market shows much activity,

and a further gain for the week of 1 cent to 12 cents on fine creamery. The wholesale trade at Toronto is fairly active, the orders of a sorting up character being fairly numerous. The tone of the drygoods and hardware markets is strongest with advances in prices fully maintained. The outlook is considered promising, with stocks of merchandise in the country within bounds. Retail merchants continue to buy cautiously, and are thus enabled the better to meet a maturing obligation. Wool is pretty well cleaned out, the shipments of fleece combing being larger to the States this season, Prices have ruled strong throughout, and dealers have done a profitable trade. The hide market, on the other hand, is in a demoralized condition, and prices are fast declining. In the Toronto Stock Exchange, there has been a better demand for bank shares, with an advance in incorporate these in a rough draft and some cases. The semi-annual dividends will be paid on Dec. 1.

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
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
