[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Sept. 10.-The fatal fire at Westman's hardware store in London has resulted in a thorough investigation into the fire-fighting appliances of the Forest City by officials of the Canadian Underwriters' Association, and Inspector Howe, in his report to be submitted to the city authorities in a few days, will hand out some rude jolts to the citizens of

The inspector, in his report, will point out that the water pressure in London is insufficient, and recommends that steps be taken at once for an increase of the supply. The report will, however, say a good word for the London fire brigade and its efficiency at the fire, which resulted in the death of Chief Clark.



#### USED AXE ON HIM

Terrible Deed of Man While Suffering From Temporary Insanity.

Later he was taken to the hospital. The wife, when the husband was taken before her, told the police that he was a good, kind husband, and Mrs. Johansen said she did not want him severely punished, as he had been very good to her.

SQUIRRELS HAD BUBONIC.

Los Angeles, Sept. 9. - A case of bubonic plague has been discovered. The patient is a boy named Mulholland, and is convalescent. Three weeks ago the boy found a sick squirrel in the park, and picked it up. The squirrel bit the boy on the hand. Sickness followed and the attending physician declared it to be bubonic plague. Other physicians were called into consultation, and discovered that squirrels in the park are afflicted with the disease No other cases have developed, and it is believed by the authorities that there will be no spread of the plague.



see no reason, so far as his knowledge of the western provinces went, for any foundation to the pretensions of the 3 25 Conservative press that Sir Wilfrid Laurier would meet with defeat west of the lakes.

"We Liberals in Alberta," he added, "hope to send a solid contingent to Ottawa, and if the last provincial election can be taken as a basis we shall do so. So far as my information goes the Liberals in Manitoba after the next Dominion election will stand pretty much where they are now.


