SCOTT ACT AMENDMENT.

An amendment to the Scott Act, in-troduced by Dr. Almon of Hallifax, has, after considerable discussion, been adopted in the Senate by a vote of 28 to 26. The amendment is to the effect that the sale of beer and light wines should be exempted from the operations of the Act. exempted from the perhaps in commenting upon this amendment; which is certainly a considerable de-parture from the prohibitory nature of the Scott Act, the Montreal Gazette

parture from the prohibitory nature of the Scott Act, the Montreal Gazette sensibly observes:

"There is a great deal to be said on both sides of this question. There can be no doubt whatever that if the people of this country could be induced to confine their drinking to beer and light wines, edunkenness, with all its concomitant evils, would practically diseppear. Final is a proposition which we think will be very generally accepted. On the continent of Europe, where light wines are the common beverage, drunkenness is almost an unknown vice, and where it prevails at all, it is in those districts where the people have acquired or are acquiring a taste for more ardent spirits. The question is whether the exemption now proposed to be made would really result in people confining themselves, where the Scott Act was in force, to the use of lighter beverages. If one could be assured of that, there would be a strong reason thereby for adopting the Scott Act as amend is in every city and county in the Dominion. The fear, of course of those who are opposed to the measure is that licences to sell beer and light wines would practically be made to cover the sale of spirits as well, and that the Scott Act, in its prohibitory clauses, would become absolutely inoperate. There is no doubt danger that this would be the result. On the other hand, the experience of the Dunkin oill was that the effect of local prohibition was to drive people to the use exclusively of ardent spirits. Beer and light wines cannot very well be sold illicitly—they are too bulky; while every man can have a flask of spirits in five process. The result, in so far as this obtained at all, was to force the use of precisely those neverages which are most dangerous and most deleterious, to the exclusion of those which even temperance men will admit are comparatively innocuous. We are inclined to think, therefore, that the effect of this clause would be to encourage, on the part of those who desire to use intoxicating liquors of any kind, the use of heer and

A large crowd assembled before the palace and were kept back by a troop of Cossacks. The Imperial family were all assembled at the death bed. A council of the State was immediately convened, and all places of public resort are closed. An official messenger makes the following announcement: "God's will has been done. At 3.25 this afternoon the Almighty called the Emperor to Himself. A few minutes before his death the Emperor received the sacrament."

St. Petersburg, March 14.—The Imperial manifesto promulgated this morning is as follows:—We, by the grace of God, Alexander III. Emperor and Autocrat of all the Russias, Czar of Poland, Grand Duke of Finland, etc., hereby make known to all our faithful subjects that it pleased the Almighty in His inscrutable will to visit Russia with a heavy blow of fate, and call her befrefactor, Alexander II., to Himself. Hie fell by the hands of impious murderers, who repeatedly sought his precious life, and made their attempts because they saw in him the protector of Russia, the foundation of her greatness, and promoter of the welfare of the Russian people. Let us bow to the unfathomable will of the Divine-Providence and offer up to the Almighty our prayers for the repose of the pure soul of our beloved father. We ascend to the throne which we inherit from our forefathers, the throne of the Russian Empire and the Czardom and Grand Dukedom inseparably connected with it. We assume the heavy burden which God imposes upon us with firm reliance upon His almighty help. May He bless our work for the welfare of our beloved fatherland, and guide our strength for the happiness of all our faithful subjects. In repeating before Almighty God the sacred vow made by our father, to devote, according to the testament of our forefathers, the whole of our life to care for the welfare and honour of Russia, we call upon all faithful subjects to unite before the altar of the Almighty their praises with our, and commend them to swear fidelity to us, and to our successor His Imperial Highness the hereditary Grand with the first year of our reign.


