Canada is asking her people to subscribe \$500,000,000.00, in Bonds bearing interest at 5 1/2 per cent and of this sum NOVA SCOTIA is expected to raise, \$25,000,000.00 of this amount, we in King's Co. are asked for \$750,000.00. There is, in the various Bank agencies and Government savings Bank accounts throughout the County, fully double the amount asked for, drawing only three to four per cent interest. It has been reported to me that a member of the Clergy, when asked to attend a recent meeting held in the interest of the Loan replied, "This is a rich man's campaign. I have no interest in it."  
A man who has money to invest, when approached on the subject of taking a Bond replied, "I can put my money at interest and obtain six to seven per cent for it. why, should I take a VICTORY BOND, bearing only five and a half per cent interest?"

Siege Battery and went overseas over a year ago.

A daughter was born on Oct. 23 to Mr. and Mrs. Willis I. Huntley.

On Thursday Oct. 17th the marriage took place here of Mr. Lester Rafuse of Burlington to Gladys Myrtle daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Lea of Auburn.

Mrs. S. P. Bligh has received the news that her son Dr. Addison R. Beardley has been chosen as a Republican candidate for the State of Massachusetts. He has already been elected three times.

The following from Kingston Ont refers to a son of the late townsman Mr. W. A. Reed. Dr. G. B. Reed, assistant professor of botany and lecturer in bacteriology at Queen's University, believes he has isolated the Spanish influenza germ. He is growing the germs by millions, and has prepared a vaccine, with which he has already inoculated some two hundred persons with good results. Each cubic centimetre of the serum contained about a thousand million germs and about three thousand cubic centimetres was used yesterday.

NOTICE TO SOLDIERS ON HARVEST LEAVE.

Attention is directed to a recent announcement published in the Press by the Military Service Branch, Department of Justice, regarding extensions to be granted to men EXEMPTED AS FARMERS.

It is pointed out that this DOES NOT IN ANY WAY AFFECT MEN WHO HAVE BEEN ORDERED BY THE REGISTRAR TO REPORT to Depot Battalions and who have thereafter received leave of absence from the Military Authorities.

Once a man has been ordered to report for duty by the Registrar he leaves the jurisdiction of the Registrar and comes under that of the Department of Militia and Defence, and is to be considered as a soldier. This applies to men of the 20 to 22 Class who have been ordered to report by the Registrar in virtue of the cancellation of exemptions by Order-in-Council of the 20th April last, as well as to those ordered to report in the usual way on refusal of claim for exemption, or on expiration of exemption granted.

All men, accordingly, who have been ordered to report, and are therefore SOLDIERS, and who have subsequently been granted harvest leave by the military authorities, MUST, NOTWITHSTANDING THE NOTICE ABOVE REFERRED TO, REPORT ON THE EXPIRATION OF THAT LEAVE, unless they are notified to the contrary by their Commanding Officer or by general notice published by the Department of Militia and Defence.
